The Committee on Law Department, to whom were referred the annexed preamble and resolution directing the Clerk of the Common Council to execute quit-claim deeds to Griffith Rowe and James A. Roosevelt of certain lands, formerly the property of the Corporation, respect-

REPORT:

That an application of a like character had been previously referred to your Committee, who, believing the power to execute the deeds in question, was, by the Charter, vested in the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, so reported, and the papers are still in possession of this Board, being General Order No. 485 on the list of "Unfinished Business."

Subsequently, the annexed preamble and resolution was introduced into the Board and referred to your Committee, who, having learned that the Sinking Fund Commissioners decline to execute the quit-claim, alleging that the order of the Common Council is necessary to the validity of the deed, have concluded to recommend that favorable action be taken thereon. No detriment can possibly occur to the public interests, nor will any loss or damage be occasioned to the City. The adoption of the resolution will simply remedy a defect in the original died of sale by the City, as will appear by the statements contained in the preamble, which your Committee have ascertained to be correct and true in every particular.

Your Committee, therefore, respectfully recommend for your adoption the accompanying pream-

mend for your adoption the accompanying pream-ble and resolution.

Whereas, By deed bearing date November 13, 1848, the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York did convey to the executors of Charles McEvers, deceased, the gore of land caused by changing the lines of Fifty-second street, lying between the northerly line of Fifty-second street and the southerly line of lot number 68 of the common lands of the City of New York; and

Whereas, Lower A. Preserval, by the result of New York; and

Whereas, Griffith Rowe, by divers mesne conveyances from said executors, has become owner in fee of all that portion of said gore extending from a point on the northerly side of Fifty-second street, distant two hundred and fifty feet easterly from the northeasterly corner of Fifty-second street and Fifth avenue to a point on said notherly side of Fifty-second street, distant three hundred feet easterly from said corner; and

Whereas, James A. Roosevelt, by like mesne conveyances, has become owner in fee of that portion of said gore extending from a point on the northerly side of said street, distant two hundred feet easterly from said corner, to a point on said street distant two hundred and twenty-five feet east of said corner; and

Whereas, It is contended that said deed to the executors of Charles McEvers should have been made to the heirs instead of the executors, in consequence whereof the title of said Griffith Rowe and James A. Roosevelt has been questioned; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Clerk of the Common Council of the City of New York be and he is hereby authorized and directed to execute to said Griffith Rowe and James A. Roosevelt, in the name of said Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty, quit-claim deeds of the portions of said gore owned by said Rowe and Roosevelt, respectively, as aforesaid. as aforesaid.

As merchant, financial officer, Mayor, father, husband, and friend, he has left a record worthy of emulation. The swift taking off of the distinguished man we now mourn, in the midst of his high vocation and the vigor of manhood, is the lesson of the hour. "In the midst of life we are in death." So let us live as to apply our hearts to wisdom.

Whereas, It is necessary to provide the means; therefore

Resolved. That the sum of two thousand dollars be appropriated for this purpose, to be expen-ded under the direction of the Finance Committee.

That in the opinion of this Board the Mott Haven District should, for sanitary reasons, be drained by sewers and drains on both sides of the railroad, immediately north of station.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending December 5, 1874:

cember 5, 1874:

The whole number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,764, as follows, viz.: 8 public buildings, 877 tenement houses, 183 private dwellings, 166 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 27 stores and warehouses, 34 stables, 25 slaughter houses, 12 fat rendering establishments, 6 gut cleaning establishments, 2 dumping grounds, 23 sunken and vacant lots, 1 roadway, 50 yards, courts, and areas, 57 cellars and basements, 33 waste pipes and drains, 103 privies and water closets, 29 street gutters and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 2 cisterns and cesspools, 1 piggery, 2 dangerous chimneys, 12 other nuisances, together with 78 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 478.

During the past week 60 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspec-tors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 86 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 86 houses, 86 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

35 cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital, and I dead body to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

Permits were granted to consignees of 46 vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

Eighty-three permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The following number of cases of contagious disease were reported during the week ending December 5, 1874: Typhus fever, 4; typhoid fever, 14; scarlet fever, 58; measles, 2; diphtheria, 140; small-pox, 75; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 3.

194 loads of night-soil were removed by the Scavengers from the privy-vaults of the City.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as being unfit for human food: Cattle, I carcass; calves (bob), 25 carcasses; sheep, 2 carcasses; hogs, 30 carcasses; beef, 287 pounds; veal, 40 pounds; poultry, 357 pounds; and fish, 3,140 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending December 5, 1874, there were issued from this Bureau 521 burial permits for city deaths, 23 for bodies in transitu, and 45 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 521 deaths, 203 marriages, 520 births, 45 still-births, 23 applications for transit permits, and 40 returns from Coroners. There were 21 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths; and 1 transcript of birth record, 6 of marriage, and 16 of death were issued from this Bureau.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, December 8, 1874.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

The last week in November was more favorable The last week in November was more lavorable to lite than any period since the last week in June. The total number of deaths in the seven days ending November 28 was 486, and the equivalent of the death-rate was 24-30 per 1,000 inhabitants annually. The last mortality occurred on the 26th, nually. The last mortality occurred on the 26th, when the total was only 50 deaths, and when only 1 person over 70 years of age, and 19 children under 5, died. Diphtheria was charged with 49 deaths, small-pox with 23, diarrhœal diseases with 11, bronchitis and pneumonia with 69, phthisis with 73, and the class of constitutional diseases altogether, with 07 deaths.

diseases, altogether, with 97 deaths.

In the succeeding week, ending on Saturday,
December 5, there were 521 deaths reported, 126
of which were of the constitutional, and 163 of the zymotic classes respectively. The temperature last week was at 36.8 degreese Fahrenheit, and in the previous week at 40.4 degrees. Diphtheria continues its unequal prevalence. In

the central district of the city, between the Fourth and the Seventh avenues, from One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street to the Battery, and in all south of Broome street, this disease makes no mark as an epidemic; only two fatal cases have occurred in the entire district south of Canal, Mulberry, and James streets during the past three weeks; while in the region of the Twentieth Ward weeks; while in the region of the I wentleth Ward, in which it has been most widely distributed and fatal for the past sixteen months, its greatest fatality is still witnessed. But the diminished mortality by this disease is noticeable, and the precautionary measures and sanitary cleaning which the Board and its Inspectors are arging, will greatly diminish

the fatality and hasten the extermination of this malady. It is a duty to the public health in every city and village, and every school and public institution in the State, to make known the precautionary measures for the prevention of destructive diseases. The full application of these precautions is everywhere required, and especially of vaccination and revaccinnation. The latter duty is most urgent in all the public charities and asylums in the State.
