COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the Meeting held July 28th, 1884.

Present—Franklin Edson, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; S. Hastings Grant, Comptroller; and Hugh J. Grant, Chairman Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The report of the Comptroller on the preamble and resolution passed by the Armory Board of New York, June 4, 1884, submitted at the last meeting and laid over, was taken up for consideration.

After a general discussion, the Recorder moved to amend the second resolution submitted with the report, by adding the following:

"No part of the said sum of \$2,000,000 shall be paid or applied for the purposes mentioned in said resolution, until an estimate of the probable cost of the several armories proposed, shall be presented to this Board"—which was adopted.

The resolution, as amended, was adopted.

On motion, the report was accepted, and the resolutions were adopted, as follows:

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT,

Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held on the 6th instant, Gen. Alexander Shaler, Secretary of the Board created by section 3 of chapter 91 of the Laws of 1884, presented a certified copy of said act, and a resolution adopted by said Board, making certain recommendations to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and asking that favorable consideration be given to them, together with copies of the applications or demands of the commandants of the Eighth, the Twelfth, and the Twenty-second Regiments, and the Second Battery, and of the commanding officers respectively of the First Division, and of the First and Second Brigades of the said Division of the National Guard of the State of New York, asking to be furnished with suitable armory accommodations for their respective organizations, in accordance with the provisions of section 3 of said chapter 91 of the Laws of 1884.

The said documents were referred to the Comptroller, and having duly examined the same, I respectfully submit the following

REPORT:

By sections 1 and 2 of said act, sections 60 and 61 of chapter 299 of the Laws of 1883, entitled the Military Code, are amended so that their provisions are no longer applicable to the City of New York; and section 3 amends section 62 of the Military Code by the creation of a special Armory Board for the City of New York, consisting of the Mayor, Major General commanding the First Division of the National Guard, and the Commissioner of Public Works, who shall act in the place of the officers and board heretofore provided for by sections 60 and 61 of chapter 299, Laws of 1883, and who shall consider the applications or demands of commandants of regiments, battalions, batteries, or troops for suitable armories, or for alterations or enlargements and furnishing of armories,

and if they approve, shall make their recommendations to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, who, if they concur in such recommendations, shall specify the sums to be appropriated for such purpose, rental, enlargement, alteration or furnishing of armories, including suitable accommodations for division and brigade headquarters.

Section 3 of said act also authorizes the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund from time to time, in their discretion, to direct the Comptroller to issue bonds or stocks of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, redeemable in not less than ten or more than twenty years from the date of issue, in such amounts as shall be necessary to provide such sums or any part thereof.

The Armory Board of the City of New York, created by section 3 of chapter 91 of the Laws of 1884, for the purposes above specified, as appears by a communication from Major General Alexander Shaler, Secretary, presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at their meeting on the 6th inst., the following preamble and resolution, viz.:

"Whereas, Applications and demands have been received by this Board from Colonel Josiah Porter, commanding Twenty-second Regiment; Colonel James H. Jones, commanding Twelfth Regiment; Colonel George D. Scott, commanding Eighth Regiment; Captain F. P. Earle, commanding Second Battery, all of the First Division, National Guard, S. N. Y., and from the commanding officers of the First Division and of the First and Second Brigades of said Division, for suitable armories, drill-rooms and meeting-rooms for the use of their respective organizations; and

"Whereas, This Board has satisfied itself of the necessity of providing suitable and convenient armories and drill-rooms for the above-named organizations; therefore

"Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of section 3, chapter 91, Laws of 1884, this Board hereby approves of the demands of the said Colonel G. D. Scott, commanding Eighth Regiment; Colonel J. H. Jones, commanding Twelfth Regiment; Colonel Josiah Porter, commanding Twenty-second Regiment; Captain F. P. Earle, commanding Second Battery, and of the Generals commanding the First Division and the First and Second Brigades thereof, and hereby recommends to the Sinking Fund Commission, as follows, viz.:

"(1.) That immediate steps be taken to furnish suitable armories with drill and meeting rooms for the organizations hereinbefore named.

"(2.) That the sum of \$2,000,000 be appropriated for the purchase of grounds and the erection and furnishing of armories, and for providing suitable accommodations for division and brigade headquarters.

"(3.) That the Comptroller of the city be directed to issue bonds or stocks redeemable in twenty years to the amount of \$2,000,000 or of such portion thereof as may be required for the purchase of the grounds, the erection of said armory buildings and the furnishing thereof, as provided by section 3, chapter 91, Laws of 1884."

The recommendations of the Armory Board are commended by it to the favorable consideration of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, on the ground of "the necessity of providing suitable and convenient armories and drill-rooms" for the military organizations in this city, belonging to the National Guard, which have made their applications and demands in pursuance of the provisions of said act.

These recommendations appear to be reasonable and proper and in accordance with the purpose and requirements of the said act, and I submit for such action thereon, as may be deemed advisable, the preamble and resolution embodying them and providing for the issue of bonds to raise the means required for carrying them out, presented by the Armory Board for the approval and adoption of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, modified so as to conform to the requirements of law relating to the issue of stocks and bonds.

Whereas, The Board created by section 3, chapter 91, Laws of 1884, to furnish armories in the City and County of New York, has considered applications and demands from the commanding officers of various organizations in the First Division, N. G. S. N. Y., and has notified the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the approval of such applications and demands, and has made to them the following recommendations, and asked for their concurrence, as provided in section 3, chapter 91, Laws of 1884.

(1.) That immediate steps be taken to provide suitable armories, with drill and meeting rooms for the said organizations in the First Division of the State National Guard.

(2.) That the sum of \$2,000,000 be appropriated for the purchase of grounds and the erection and furnishing of armories, and for providing suitable accommodations for division and brigade headquarters.

(3.) That the Comptroller of the city be directed to issue bonds or stocks, redeemable in twenty years, to the amount of \$2,000,000, or of such portion thereof as may be required for the purchase of the grounds, the erection of said armory buildings and the furnishing thereof as provided by section 3, chapter 91, Laws of 1884; now, therefore,

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby concur in the foregoing recommendations, and specify the sum of \$2,000,000 as the amount to be appropriated for the purchase of land and the erection thereon of armory buildings for the accommodation of the various organizations in the First Division, N. G. S. N. Y. (including accommodations for division and brigade headquarters), and for the furnishing thereof.

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 3 of chapter 91 of the Laws of 1884, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to issue from time to time, as may be required, redeemable in not less than ten or more than twenty years from the date of issue, and at such rate of interest as he may determine, not exceeding three per cent. per annum, bonds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, to be denominated Armory Bonds, and issued for the purchase of land and the erection and furnishing of armories for the accommodation of the several organizations of the First Division of the National Guard of the State of New York, including accommodations for division and brigade headquarters, which said bonds shall be exempt from taxation by the City and County of New York, but not from taxation for State purposes, as provided by section 137 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and as authorized by an ordinance of the Common Council, approved by the Mayor, October 2, 1880. Said bonds shall also be known as Consolidated Stock of the City of New York, as provided by section 132 of said Consolidation Act of 1882. No part of the said sum of \$2,000,000 shall be paid or applied for the purposes mentioned in said resolution, until an estimate of the probable cost of the several armories proposed, shall be presented to this Board.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—In pursuance of the provisions of chapter 458 of the Laws of 1884, the Board of Education has called for the issue of bonds to the amount of one million dollars, "for the purchase of new school sites, for the erection of new school buildings, and for fitting up and furnishing the same for the use of the Common Schools of the City of New York."

The law provides for the issue of \$2,000,000, with the approval of a majority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a rate of interest not exceeding three per cent. per annum. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on the 23d day of July, 1884, approved of the issue of the amount of bonds applied for by the Board of Education.

It is considered advisable to exempt the bonds from municipal taxation, and I present a resolution to authorize and direct that the bonds to be issued under said act shall be exempted from city and county taxation, as provided by section 137 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

Whereas, Chapter 458 of the Laws of 1884 authorizes the issue of bonds in the name and behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, to be known as "School House Bonds;" and

Whereas, The Board of Education has requested authority to issue such bonds to the amount of one million dollars and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has approved of such issue of bonds; and

Whereas, It is deemed advisable to exempt such bonds from municipal taxation;

Resolved, That pursuant to section 137 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and an ordinance of the Common Council, approved by the Mayor, October 2, 1880, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby, by their concurrent resolution, direct that the bonds authorized on the 23d day of July, 1884, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to be issued in the name and on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, to the amount of \$1,000,000, for the purchase of new school sites, for the erection of new school buildings, and for fitting up and furnishing the same for the use of the common schools of the said city, shall be exempt from taxation by the City and County of New York, but not from taxation for State purposes. The said bonds which are to be known as "School House Bonds," shall also be denominated Consolidated Stock of the City of New York, as provided by section 132 of the said Consolidation Act of 1882.

The report was accepted, and on motion, the resolution was adopted.

II.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—On May 8, 1884, an act (chapter 262) was passed by the Legislature, entitled "An act to provide for the purchase of Riker's Island, in the County of Queens, by the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction of the City of New York, to provide for the annexation thereof to the City and County of New York, and to provide funds for such purchase."

This act provides for the issue of bonds or stocks of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, to an amount not exceeding \$180,000, for the purchase of Riker's Island, to be redeemable in not less than ten or more than twenty years from the date of their issue.

It is considered advisable that the bonds or stocks so authorized to be issued, shall be made exempt from city and county taxation, and I respectfully submit a resolution to authorize such exemption, as provided by section 137 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

The said bonds or stocks shall be denominated Consolidated Stock of the City of New York, as provided by section 132 of said Consolidation Act of 1882.

The report was accepted, and on motion the resolution was adopted.

GENTLEMEN—Under a resolution adopted by this Board, May 20, 1884, leases were sold to the highest bidders, at public auction, of ferries, as follows:

(1.) The ferry from the foot of East Twenty-third street to Broadway, City of Brooklyn, was sold on June 12, 1884, to the New York Ferry Co., for the term of ten years from May 1, 1884, at a yearly rental of \$5,000 for the lease of the wharf property belonging to the city, including the pier at the foot of East Twenty-third street, formerly leased to Henry F. Stone, trustee, which has been assigned to said ferry company and is to be cancelled, for and during the whole term of ten years; and at a rental of \$1,000 per annum for the first five years, and \$1,500 per annum for the last five years, for the franchise.

(2.) The ferry from West Fourteenth street to Hoboken, N. J., was sold on July 3, 1884, to the Hoboken Land and Improvement Company, for the term of ten years, from May 1, 1884, at a yearly rental of \$500 for the franchise, and \$2,000 for the wharf property belonging to the city required for ferry purposes, foot of West Fourteenth street, during the first five years; and \$500 for the franchise, and \$2,500 for the wharf property, during the last five years of the lease.

GENTLEMEN—In accordance with a resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, adopted May 20, 1884, the franchises of the ferry to the North Shore, Staten Island, and to Bay Ridge, Long Island, were advertised for sale, at public auction, on the 29th day of said month, when the Comptroller was served with an injunction of the Supreme Court restraining him from selling the same. The sale was postponed to June 3, to June 12, to June 26, to July 3, and to July 17, 1884, pending the decision of the Court upon a motion to make permanent the said injunction. On the 10th of July the injunction was dissolved and vacated by Mr. Justice Lawrence.

According to the last adjournment, the sale was held at the Comptroller's Office at noon on Thursday, the 17th day of July, and after much competition the franchises of the two ferries were sold to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company, the highest bidder, at fourteen and one-quarter per cent. A deposit was made of the sum of ten thousand three hundred and seventy-three dollars and twelve cents (\$10,373.12) by the purchaser, as security for the execution of the lease under a penalty of forfeiture to the City if the lease should not be executed when notified that it is ready for execution; and upon the condition that the amount shall be credited on the rent of the ferries.

SRK.—There were 870 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 19, 1884, which is a decrease of 85, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 3 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1883. The actual mortality for the week ending July 12, 1884, was 935, which is 37.4 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 35.79 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,358,287.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 208. In the sale of, or keeping for sale, any beverage or drink, no person shall keep, or use any tap, faucet, tank, fountain or vessel, or any pipe or conduit in connection therewith, which shall be composed of or made with brass, lead, copper or other metal or metallic substances that are or will be affected by liquids so that dangerous, unwholesome or deleterious compounds are formed therein or thereby, or such that beer, soda-water, syrups, or other liquids, or any beverage, drink or flavoring material, drawn therefrom shall be unwholesome, dangerous or detrimental to health.
