

Resolved, That the following instructions relative to the use of telegraph signal boxes be promulgated by the Superintendent to such precincts as may require and use the same.

CAPTAIN—The Board of Police has established Telegraph Signal Boxes within your Precinct, and located them on the posts most distant from the Station-house, so that in case of any emergency police assistance can be had at short notice. The efficiency and vigilance of your command can be promoted thereby, and the citizens of the district receive that police protection so much needed in remote places that are seldom or never patroled. The Commissioners contemplate furnishing responsible citizens (recommended by the Captain) with a key, to enable them in an extreme emergency to call for the police. A code of signals for the purpose will be placed inside each box. These boxes are to be visited twice or more during each tour of duty as the Captain may determine. You will be particular and see that the rules adopted for their use and operation are strictly complied with.

The rules are as follows:

1. The Sergeants shall carefully instruct the members of each of their receptions.

1. The Sergeants shall carefully instruct the members of each of their respective sections in the proper use of the signal box.

2. Any member who is unable to comprehend such instructions, or the operation of the box, will

be reported to the Inspector as incompetent for the post.

3. The Sergeants and Roundsmen are not required to report from the boxes while on patrol.

They may do so at their pleasure.
4. During inspection at roll-call the members are required to produce the key of the Signal Box.
When a key is lost you will observe the same rule as in the loss of a Fire Telegraph key.

5. The Patrolman when visiting that part of his post where such Signal Box is located, will report to the Station-house by the signal designated for him, which will be promptly answered and repeated by the officer in command at the Station-house.

6. The officer in command at the Station-noise.

6. The officer in command at the desk shall promptly answer and repeat in a clear and distinct manner, all signals sent from the boxes, and keep a record of the same in the blotter.

7. At each return roll-call, the Sergeant in command at the desk shall read from the blotter the number of the box visited, the time when visited, and by whom visited, the name of the patrolman to be announced in full. Any error or mistake which may be discovered, must then be corrected.

8. In locations where gas-light is not available or convenient to the boxes, the Captain will provide a lamp or candle, at the expense of the Department, and place it inside the box.

9. The Patrolman will be held accountable for any injury to the signal-box, during his tour of duty, and shall report at the Station-house all accidents and breaks in the wires on his post.

10. The Patrolman shall not alter or disarrange the adjustment of the telegraph instruments when the bell ceases to work, but will report the same to the Sergeant or Roundsman on patrol.

11. The mounted patrol will be permitted to use the signal-boxes when necessary.

12. Members of the force violating these rules will be reported to the Board of Police for discipline.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,535, as follows, viz.: 5 public buildings, 564 tenement houses, 182 private dwellings, 46 other dwellings, 14 manufactories and workshops, 32 stores and warehouses, 41 stables, I market, 15 slaughterhouses, 2 breweries, 4 manure dumps, 5 public sewers, 7 fat-rendering establishments, I lime kiln, I garbage dump, 23 sunken and vacant lots, I dangerous building, 50 yards, courts, and areas, 81 cellars and basements, 126 waste pipes and drains, 265 privies and water-closets, 34 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 5 cesspools, 2 smoky chimneys, 31 other nuisances, together with 66 visits of the Health Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereou received from the Inspectors was 761.

During the past week 223 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 91 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

123 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 21 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 20 houses, 20 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 3,120 privies, 340 yards, 254 cellars, 254 garbage ces, and 9534 miles of street gutters.

The Ambulance Corps have removed one case of typhoid fever to hospital.

APPROVED PAPERS.
