

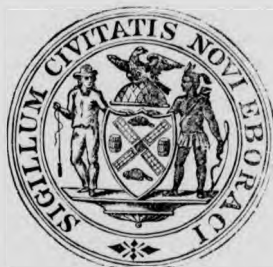
# THE CITY RECORD.

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## DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

Report for Quarter ending June 30, 1889.

NEW YORK, July 1, 1889.

To the Honorable HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor, etc.:

SIR—As required by section 49 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments make the following

### REPORT

of the "operations and action" of the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the three months ending June 30, 1889:

This report, though nominally for the last past quarter, is actually a statement of the result of the work of the Department for the official year, which commences with the assessment of property by the Deputy Tax Commissioners for purposes of taxation, on the first Monday of September, and terminates with the delivery of the assessment rolls, certified by the Commissioners, to the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of July.

During the period for which this report is made the work of revising the assessed valuation of real and personal property for the year 1889 has been completed. The assessment rolls have been prepared and are ready for delivery to the Board of Aldermen this day, as required by the provisions of section 828 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

The following statement shows the assessed valuations of the real and personal estate in the City of New York, for the year 1889, as compared with the same for the year 1888.

The increase, is .....	\$28,759,412
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This increase, as will be observed by the preceding statement, is principally in the Twelfth, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards, and is attributable to erection and completion of new buildings and appreciation in value of real estate.

The decrease in the Twenty-fourth Ward is caused by the City having acquired title to the property embraced within the lines of the new parks in that Ward and the exemption of such property from taxation, the assessed value of which, last year, was \$1,511,610.

The increase for 1889 is \$3,422,471, and is due chiefly to the appreciation in the value of bank shares. Since last year the following banks have organized and commenced business: Bank of Harlem, with a capital of \$100,000; Clinton Bank, with a capital of \$200,000; East Side Bank, with a capital of \$100,000; Empire State Bank, with a capital of \$250,000; Hamilton Bank, with a capital of \$150,000; Hudson River Bank, with a capital of \$200,000; the Fourteenth Street Bank, with a capital of \$100,000, and Twenty-third Ward Bank, with a capital of \$100,000, and the Market and Fulton National Bank has increased its capital from \$500,000 to \$750,000, and the Twelfth Ward Bank has increased its capital from \$100,000 to \$200,000, while the Metropolitan National Bank, with a capital of \$1,650,000, which was assessed last year at a valuation of \$3 per share, was not assessed this year, for the reason that its shares had no value over the assessed value of the real estate belonging to the bank.

The 605 deaths represent a death-rate of 19.86 against 21.06 for the preceding week, and 20.99 for the corresponding week of 1888.

The decrease of 36 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 15 in the deaths from pneumonia, of 7 in the deaths from Bright's disease, 6 from whooping-cough, and 5 from malarial fever. There was an increase of 7 deaths from enteric fever.

The increase of enteric fever was greatest in the Twenty-second Ward, and the decrease of pneumonia in the Seventh and Twenty-second Wards.

#### TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENTLY passed chapter 449, Laws of 1889, which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to repair, repave, or improve and maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repaving, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and disburse the cost thereof out of the property taxes, and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property who shall also be a majority of the property in frontage on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot who may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be included in the assessment to be levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, shall thereupon be relieved from any obligation to pave, repave, or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein specified, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairing, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is directed by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the premises, until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repaving or repairs.

#### PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 450, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 427 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rates:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meter is now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter water rents.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including this year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars \$5 is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings, or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, may be cancelled of record on the books of the Department.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF THOMAS F. GILROY, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 440, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 AND 427, and as amended by chapter 450, Laws of 1887.

The Commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings, in accordance with their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to

time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings, upon which they are respectively imposed, and if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. The extra charges for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters. \* \* \* \* \*

The said commissioner of public works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such penalty shall be added to the regular water rents.

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses shall be based on the basis that the family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

Meters will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they shall be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

BREADERS.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath-tub in the premises.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Consumption of stationary wash-tubs, having a movable dividing, shall be charged at the rate of one dollar per annum for each tub, and the same as for bathing tubs.

BUILDING PERSONS.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for one hundred and fifty dollars per annum, whichever shall be the less, ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COALS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum per stall.

For all other stalls not metered, the rates shall be as follows:

HORSE STALLS.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding one hundred and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, OWNERS AND CARTS.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUEUR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-bow.

PHOTOGRAPH LATHS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horsepower, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal shall be charged as hereinafter stated.

Closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

WATER-CLOSURES.—For each stopcock of the kind which water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the water-pipe, per seat, per annum, one dollar.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the hopper, or depressor, or other device, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cisterns having this description can be seen at this Department.

#### METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops

hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law."

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water.
