SIR—As required by section 49 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments make the following

#### REPORT

of the "operations and action" of the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the three months ending June 30, 1889:

This report, though nominally for the last past quarter, is actually a statement of the result of the work of the Department for the official year, which commences with the assessment of property by the Deputy Tax Commissioners for purposes of taxation, on the first Monday of September, and terminates with the delivery of the assessment rolls, certified by the Commissioners, to the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of July.

During the period for which this report is made the work of revising the assessed valuation of real and personal property for the year 1889 has been completed. The assessment rolls have been prepared and are ready for delivery to the Board of Aldermen this day, as required by the provisions of section 828 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

The following statement shows the assessed valuations of the real and personal estate in the City of New York, for the year 1889, as compared with the same for the year 1888.

# REAL ESTATE.

The assessed value of real estate was, for 1888	

This increase, as will be observed by the preceding statement, is principally in the Twelfth, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards, and is attributable to erection and completion of new buildings and appreciation in value of real estate.

The decrease in the Twenty-fourth Ward is caused by the City having acquired title to the property embraced within the lines of the new parks in that Ward and the exemption of such property from taxation, the assessed value of which, last year, was \$1,511,610.

The increase for 1889 is \$3,422,471, and is due chiefly to the appreciation in the value of bank shares. Since last year the following banks have organized and commenced business: Bank of Harlem, with a capital of \$100,000; Clinton Bank, with a capital of \$200,000; Esst Side Bank, with a capital of \$500,000; Hudson River Bank, with a capital of \$200,000; Hudson River Bank, with a capital of \$200,000; the Fourtreenth Street Bank, with a capital of \$100,000, and the Market and Fulton National Bank has increased its capital from \$500,000 while the Metropolitan National Bank, with a capital of \$100,000, and the Twelith Ward Bank has increased its capital from \$500,000 while the Metropolitan National Bank with a capital of \$15,650,000, which was assessed last year at a valuation of \$3 per share, was not assessed this year, for the reason that its shares had no value over the assessed value of the real estate belonging to the bank.

MRTERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops

hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for bismess consumption, except private dwellings. It is proyded by section 324, Laws of 1884, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lieu upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law."

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Public Works

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-uppes, street tap, and all fintures connected therewith in good repair, proceeded from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, rallway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot on permitted.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, calway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permit sints be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures mist be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drup or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures. No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelfing or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and it the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed, osees, baths and urnals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Fountains or jets in horels, porter-houses, eating-salcons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly problibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of those, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the vessels will not be allowed.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by deceive plombing and worn-out service papes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucers to be turned on in full force in water-closests, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premisers. The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore, the owner of the premises are supplications for reduction of water ernts, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or pasts of buildings, though such leakage or water may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notined that whenever their remises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is compiled with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
