

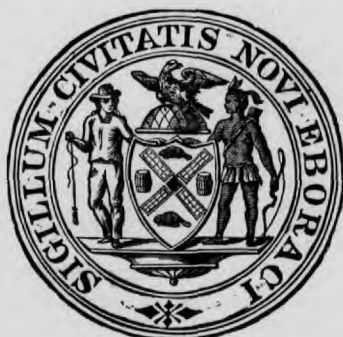

## TWENTY-FIRST DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

## MINUTES.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board, Twenty-first District, assembled at 2 P. M., March 21, 1901, at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue.

Present—President Alderman Geiger, Councilman Murray and Councilman Hottenroth.

Owing to the absence of President Haffen, through illness, it was decided to hear those present on the various matters on the calendar and postpone final action until the 28th instant; accordingly the following matters were laid over:

*Prospect Avenue, Asphaltting, between Southern Boulevard and Crotona Park, South.*

The following additional communications were presented in connection with this improvement which was before the Board on the 7th instant (page 23, Local Board Minutes, 1901).

From Henry P. Shoomaker, President, Southern Boulevard Land and Improvement Company, dated March 21, 1901; protest against sheet asphaltting.

From Samuel S. Cohen, No. 726 Prospect avenue, and others, dated March 21, 1901; protest against sheet asphaltting.

From T. M. Macy, dated March 21, 1901; protest against sheet asphaltting.

From Coleman J. Burke and others, dated March 21, 1901; protest against sheet asphaltting.

*Matters Under Jurisdiction of Board of Public Improvements Ordered Forwarded.*

East One Hundred and Eightieth street, electric light, from Third avenue to the Bronx river.

East One Hundred and Eightieth street, water-mains, from Third avenue to the Bronx river.

Clay avenue, gas-mains north of One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street.

Teller avenue, water-mains north of One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street.

Laid over—Report of Chief Topographical Engineer in reference to Andrews avenue and Weigand place, establishing grades; also East One Hundred and Eightieth street, change of grade, from Andrews avenue to Aqueduct avenue.

Laid over—Communication from Secretary John H. Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board, Twenty-second District, met at 2 P. M., March 28, 1901, at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Municipal Building, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue.

Present—President Haffen, Councilman Hottenroth, Alderman McGrath, Alderman Geiger and Councilman Murray.

Minutes of previous meeting read and adopted.

## LAID OVER MATTERS.

*Prospect Avenue, Sheet Asphaltting, from Southern Boulevard to Crotona Park, South.*

This matter was again laid over until the Board could obtain further particulars in regard thereto.

*Hoe Street, Sewer from One Hundred and Sixty-seventh Street to Freeman Street.*

Petition of Peter J. Stumpf and others was read, and, on motion of Alderman Geiger, it was Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that a sewer and appurtenances be constructed in Hoe street, from East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street to Freeman street, Borough of The Bronx, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*Jackson Avenue, Sheet Asphaltting, from One Hundred and Sixty-third to One Hundred and Sixty-fifth Street.*

Petition of B. Mindermann and others was read, and, on motion of Councilman Hottenroth, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that Jackson avenue be paved with sheet asphalt on a concrete base, between East One Hundred and Sixty-third street and East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, Borough of The Bronx, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*Harrison Avenue, Acquiring Title, extending from Tremont Avenue North to the First Intersecting Drainage Street, a Distance of About 750 Feet, more or less.*

Petition of F. A. Fernald and others was read, and, on motion of Alderman McGrath, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that proceedings be initiated for acquiring title to the lands necessary for Harrison avenue, extending from Tremont avenue northerly to the first intersecting drainage street (unnamed), a distance of 750 feet, more or less, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*Oak Tree Place, Acquiring Title, between Lafontaine Avenue and Hughes Avenue.*

Petition of Jacob Weil and others was read, and, on motion of Councilman Murray, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that proceedings be initiated for acquiring title to the lands necessary for Oak Tree place, between Lafontaine avenue and Hughes avenue, Borough of The Bronx, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*Arthur Avenue, Regulating, Grading, etc., between One Hundred and Seventy-fifth Street and One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street.*

Petition of William C. Bergen and others was read, and, on motion of Councilman Hottenroth, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that Arthur avenue be regulated and graded, curbstones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, crosswalks laid, approaches built and fences erected where necessary, between East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street and East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*Oak Tree Place, Regulating, Grading, etc., between Lafontaine Avenue and Hughes Avenue.*

Petition of Jacob Weil and others was read, and, on motion of Alderman Geiger, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that Oak Tree place be regulated and graded, curbstones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, crosswalks laid, approaches built and fences erected where necessary, between Lafontaine avenue and Hughes avenue, Borough of The Bronx, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*Two Hundred and Fifth Street, Regulating and Grading, between Moshulu Parkway and Jerome Avenue.*

Petition of Joseph J. Chauvet and others was read, and, on motion of Alderman McGrath, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that Two Hundred and Fifth street be regulated and graded, curbstones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, crosswalks laid, approaches built and fences erected where necessary, between Moshulu parkway and Jerome avenue, Borough of The Bronx, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*Lighting East One Hundred and Eighty-third Street, between Southern Boulevard and Arthur Avenue.*

On motion of Alderman Geiger, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that East One Hundred and Eighty-third street be lighted between Southern Boulevard and Arthur avenue.

*Sherman Avenue, Acquiring Title, from One Hundred and Sixty-fifth Street to One Hundred and Sixty-eighth Street.*

On motion of Alderman McGrath, it was

Resolved, That, on petition of A. Newbold Morris and others, duly advertised, and submitted the 28th day of March, 1901, the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that proceedings be initiated for acquiring title to the lands necessary for Sherman avenue, from East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street to East One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, Borough of The Bronx, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*Potter Place (Two Hundred and Fourth Street), Regulating and Grading, between Moshulu Parkway and Jerome Avenue.*

Petition of Ernest C. Weyman and others was read, and, on motion of Councilman Hottenroth, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that Potter place (or Two Hundred and Fourth street) be regulated and graded, curbstones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, crosswalks laid (approaches built and fences erected where necessary), between Moshulu Parkway and Jerome avenue, Borough of The Bronx, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

## The following matters were laid over until the next regular meeting:

Laying out a park at Montgomery avenue, One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street and One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street.

Establishing grades at Andrews avenue, Weigand place, and change of grade in East One Hundred and Eightieth street, between Andrews avenue and Aqueduct avenue.

Bassford place, acquiring title, from One Hundred and Eighty-second street to Third avenue.

Bassford place, regulating, grading and macadamizing, from One Hundred and Eighty-second street to Third avenue.

Bassford place, sewer, etc., between One Hundred and Eighty-second street and Third avenue.

Weier court, laying out on final maps of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, at a width of 35 feet, from Washington avenue 270 feet easterly.

Walton avenue, sheet asphaltting, from One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to One Hundred and Sixty-first street.

*Two Hundred and Third Street, Regulating, Grading and Paving, between Briggs Avenue and the Concourse.*

On motion of Alderman Geiger, it was

Resolved, That the resolution of the Board adopted September 6, 1900, for regulating, grading and paving Two Hundred and Third street, between Briggs avenue and the Concourse, be amended by striking out the words "and that the roadway be paved."

The Secretary was directed to so notify the Board of Public Improvements and the Municipal Assembly.

## Morris Avenue Railroad Accommodation.

The following communication from the Property-owners' Association of the Twenty-third Ward was read:

PROPERTY-OWNERS' ASSOCIATION OF THE TWENTY-THIRD WARD, }  
March 26, 1901. }

To the Honorable Board of Local Improvements, Borough of The Bronx:

At the last regular meeting of the above association its executive committee was instructed to use all possible means to secure a surface railroad on Morris avenue and thus relieve that large central section of Mott Haven and Melrose which is entirely without railroad accommodation, and the property-owners are suffering great financial loss as a consequence.

The committee called upon the railroad authorities and received the promise, which has been repeated the last ten years frequently, that the matter would be looked into.

As a road is being constructed on Webster avenue to continue down Willis avenue the committee suggested that, there being now a road on Willis avenue, by running the Webster avenue road down Morris avenue it would relieve the congested condition on Third avenue and give accommodation to that part of the ward now suffering for the want of a railroad.

The suggestion was well received and there it ended.

Since then the committee has made another suggestion which it thinks better and which will cause the least expense to the railroad company, and also sent a diagram to illustrate the proposition, which is:

To lay a road up Morris avenue to East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, where a double line is now operated, then through that street to and up Jerome avenue, and to run Webster avenue cars down Willis avenue as now proposed. This will give relief to the central section



without depriving any other section, relieve the congestion on Third avenue and be the least possible expense and trouble to the company.

In behalf of the above association the executive committee most respectfully petition your Honorable Board to recommend to the Union Railway Company that it adopt the suggestion of the committee, which will be, if adopted, not only beneficial to the whole ward but to the whole borough.

After some discussion, on motion of Councilman Hottenroth, seconded by Councilman Murray, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Union Railway Company has been in possession of valuable franchises granting exclusive privileges to it to construct, maintain and operate street surface railroads on various streets and avenues in the Borough of The Bronx, among others on Morris avenue, from One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street in a northerly direction; and

Whereas, The Local Improvement Board of the Twenty-first District, upon a petition of the Twenty-third Ward Property-owners' Association, have given the matter due consideration; and Whereas, The said Board has concluded that immediate construction of the said railroad is necessary for the best interests of the residents and property-owners of this borough, and particularly those residing at and near said Morris avenue; and therefore be it

Resolved, That the said Local Board hereby does request that the said railway on Morris avenue, extending from the junction of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Third avenue northerly, or at least as far as One Hundred and Sixty-first street, be constructed forthwith; and be it further

Resolved, That unless the construction of said railroad be commenced within thirty days, this Board shall recommend that the Corporation Counsel institute proceedings to compel the immediate construction thereof, or that the franchises of said company be forfeited, or that he take such steps as shall be deemed advisable to secure the relief required; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to Mr. Edward A. Maher, of the said Union Railway Company.

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that proceedings be initiated for acquiring title to the lands necessary for Bassford place, between East One Hundred and Eighty-second street and Third avenue, Borough of The Bronx, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

Bassford Place, Regulating and Grading, from One Hundred and Eighty-second Street to Third Avenue.

Laid over until City has title to street.

Bassford Place, Sewer, from One Hundred and Eighty-second Street to Third Avenue.

Laid over until City has title to street.

Walton Avenue, Sheet Asphaltting, from One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street to One Hundred and Sixty-first Street.

Petition of J. Cassin and others was read, as was also protests from Charles E. Smith and others and from the trustees of the estate of John J. Astor and others.

President Haffen suggested that the petition be returned to the property-owners with the request that their petition be amended to read "from One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Branch railroad. The Secretary was directed accordingly.

*Monroe Avenue, Regulating, etc., between Belmont Avenue and Tremont Avenue.*

Petition of Mary I. Price and others was read, and, on motion of Councilman Murray, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that Monroe avenue be regulated and graded, curbstones set, sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, crosswalks laid (approaches built and fences erected where necessary); that the roadway be paved with telford macadam, and that trees be planted on the sidewalks, between Belmont street and Tremont avenue, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

East One Hundred and Eighty-second Street, Sewer, from Jerome avenue to Concourse, and in Creston Avenue, from One Hundred and Eighty-first Street to Field Place.

Petition of Mark F. Healy and others was read, and, on motion of Alderman Geiger, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that a sewer and appurtenances be constructed in East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, from Jerome avenue to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, and in Creston avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-first street to Field place.

West Farms Road Sewer, Between Edgewater Road and East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh Street, and in Bryant Street, from Home Street to West Farms Road.

I would ask that the above sewer be recommended, for the reason that there is already advertised a petition for a sewer in Bryant street, from West Farms road to Westchester avenue, and which, when completed, would have no outlet unless the above sewer mentioned in the petition (?) be built.

Engineer Fitch of the Department of Sewers, Borough of The Bronx, stated that it was unlikely that this sewer would ever be adopted as a permanent sewer. This proposed sewer, he said, was only a temporary one and that the people east of the Bronx river should be obliged to pay the entire assessment for this sewer. Mr. Fitch stated further that the petition should have read "for the construction of temporary sewers" as they would have to be constructed under section 559 of the Charter.

The matter was finally laid over until the next meeting.

THE FOLLOWING IS AN EXTRACT FROM the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held Tuesday, February 19, 1901:

The Comptroller presented the following report and accompanying resolution relative to the redemption of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, maturing July 1, 1901:

CITY OF NEW YORK, DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,  
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, February 15, 1901.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN:—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1899, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII, of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of the City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897:

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of the City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

#### CHAPTER 630.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.

Became a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature. Certificates of stock or bonds so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately. Proposals will be received by the Comptroller at his office, No. 285 Broadway, New York City, from the

holders of six per cent Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, for extending the maturity of all or any part of the respective amounts of such stock held by them to the following dates:

JULY 1, 1917,  
JULY 1, 1918,  
JULY 1, 1919,  
JULY 1, 1920, and  
JULY 1, 1921.

Stock so extended will be payable in gold and will bear interest from July 1, 1900, at the rate of three and one-tenth (3 1/10) per cent. per annum, payable, also in gold, semi-annually, on the first day of January and of July in each year. The Comptroller proposes to apportion the amount of stock thus extended so that, as nearly as practicable, one-fifth of the whole amount extended shall be redeemable at each of the five maturity dates above mentioned. Preference will, as far as possible, be given to the proposals received according to priority in the date of their receipt, the proposals first received being entitled to the privilege of the longest extension period, unless such proposal shall indicate a preference for the shorter terms. The stock which is to be extended in accordance with the terms of this circular must be delivered to the Comptroller upon demand, when the certificates will be stamped across their face with the terms of the extension, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, provided, however, that such stock now outstanding in coupon form when presented for extension will be extended in the form of registered stock. Thereafter transfers may be made of such stock on the books of the Corporation in accordance with the general provisions of law and the rules of the Department of Finance in regard thereto. The right to discontinue the offer contained in this circular at any time without further notice is expressly reserved.
