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BOARD OF ELECTIONS.

Meeting of the Board of Elections, held Tuesday, November 15, 1904, at 12 o'clock M.

Present—Commissioners Voorhis, Page and Fuller.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board held on the 12th ult. were read and approved, and the reading of the minutes of the meeting held on the 8th inst. was dispensed with.

The following communications were received and disposed of as stated, viz.:

From N. Taylor Phillips, Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, dated the 14th inst., transmitting certified copy of a resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a meeting held on the 10th inst., authorizing a renewal of the lease, for one year from December 1, 1904, of premises Nos. 305 and 307 East Sixty-first street, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Board of Elections. Filed.

From H. L. Smith, Assistant Deputy Comptroller, dated the 12th inst., requesting to be informed in regard to the claims that have been filed with the Department of Finance by Joseph Goldstein, of No. 213 Henry street, and J. M. Levine, of No. 50 West Eighteenth street, Borough of Manhattan, amounting to \$5 each, for services alleged to have been rendered on the 29th ult. by said persons as Inspectors of Elections in the Twelfth Election District, Fourth Assembly District, New York County. Referred to the Chief Clerk of the Manhattan Borough Office for investigation and report.

From Andrew T. Campbell, Chief Clerk, office of the Corporation Counsel, dated the 11th inst., returning fifty identification signature cards of election officers transmitted to the Corporation Counsel for use in the case of Rosen vs. Voorhis et al. Filed.

From Wm. H. Kipp, Chief Clerk, Police Department, dated the 11th inst., acknowledging receipt of a communication from the Board under date of the 10th inst., relative to the reception by the Police Department of the ballot boxes used at the general election held on the 8th inst., and stating that the same has been referred to the Chief Inspector, with direction to issue the necessary order. Filed.

From Henry Berlinger, Secretary, Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated the 10th inst., certifying—in response to request therefor—an eligible list of Clerks from which the Board may make appointments for temporary service. Communication ordered on file and the Chief Clerk of the Board directed to notify the persons in the order in which they appear on said list to present themselves for appointment and assignment to duty, etc.

From Henry Berlinger, Secretary, Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated the 11th inst., stating that the name of Chester A. Cruise, of No. 162 East Eighty-fifth street, Manhattan Borough, is to be withdrawn from the above certification of persons for appointment as temporary clerks. To be complied with and filed.

From John Daly, Captain Seventeenth Police Precinct, dated the 9th inst., transmitting the statements of votes cast for each election district in the Ninth Assembly District, New York County, with the exception of the Eleventh Election District, and stating that said district was not included for the reason that the blank statements were mislaid or lost. Referred to the Chief Clerk of the Manhattan Borough Office to cause the Inspectors of said election district to prepare and file such statements as provided by law.

From John Cooney, Captain Twenty-third Police Precinct, dated the 8th inst., reporting that on the morning of the 8th inst., the day of the general election, Patrolman George Hasenmiller, of his command, arrested Joseph Kaveleir, the proprietor of the cigar store at No. 127 East Forty-second street, Borough of Manhattan, which was designated for use as the polling place in the Second Election District, Twenty-seventh Assembly District, New York County, and Samuel Kave-

leir, an employee, for a violation of section 41k of the Penal Code in failing to have the said premises open at 5:30 A. M. on the said day, and that said persons were arraigned on said charge before Magistrate Breen in the Fourth District Police Court and discharged. Filed.

From Albert Ruthenberg, Captain Eighty-third Police Precinct, dated the 11th inst., reporting in relation to the arrest and discharge after arraignment of one Watson Sanford, on the charge of having illegally registered on October 14, 1904, in the Fourteenth Election District, Second Assembly District, Queens County. Filed.

From A. E. Scholes, dated Flushing, N. Y., November 9, 1904, presenting on behalf of the Flushing "Daily Times" a bill for the publication of the boundaries of election districts and the lists of polling places for the days of registration and general election in 1904. On motion, the said communication was ordered on file and the President directed to inform Mr. Scholes that the Board of Elections cannot recognize the aforesaid claim, for the reason that the Flushing "Daily Times" was never designated nor authorized by the Board of Elections to make the said publication.

From Isador Stark, No. 99 Willoughby street, Brooklyn Borough, dated the 14th inst., acknowledging receipt of communication from the Board, under date of the 12th inst. Filed.

From Moritz Ballin, No. 236 West Twenty-fourth street, Manhattan Borough, dated the 9th inst., acknowledging receipt of notice of his removal as an Inspector of Elections in the Ninth Election District, Ninth Assembly District, New York County, at the request of the Chairman of the Executive Committee of the New York County Republican Committee, and asking to be advised as to the grounds for such removal. Filed, having been answered by the President.

From Wm. Braune, No. 120 St. Mark's place, Borough of Manhattan, dated the 9th inst., complaining that when on the day of the last general election he presented himself at the polling place in the Tenth Election District, Tenth Assembly District, New York County, at two minutes before 5 o'clock in the afternoon of said day, and that the polls were closed and the Board of Inspectors refused to permit him to vote. Filed.

From Jacob Levy, proprietor of the store at No. 280 East Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, which was designated for use as the polling place in the Thirteenth Election District, Fourth Assembly District, New York County, presenting a bill for \$26.50 for a table and chair alleged to have been broken by the election officers in said district during the performance of their duties on the day of the last general election. Referred to Detective Sergeant Leahy for investigation and report.

From Henry G. Curtis, No. 507 West One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, Borough of Manhattan, dated the 8th inst., complaining that because of the inefficiency of the election officers in the Fifth Election District, Twenty-third Assembly District, New York County, in getting in the vote, a number of electors were debarred from voting at the last general election. Referred to the Secretary to communicate with Mr. Curtis in relation thereto.

From E. M. Martin, Organizer, West Side Agitation Committee, Social Democratic Party, dated the 7th inst., alleging that certain persons had illegally registered from No. 1924 Broadway, Manhattan Borough, do not reside there, etc. Filed.

From Wm. H. Horwitz, No. 54 Morrell street, Borough of Brooklyn, dated the 13th inst., stating that his employer deducted a day's pay from his wages because of his absence from work, as Chairman of the Board of Inspectors of the Sixteenth Election District, Fifteenth Assembly District, Kings County, in obeying an order of the Supreme Court, directing the said Board to convene and strike from the registry books the name of Ike Axelrod, No. 111 Moore street, Borough of Brooklyn, and asking that the Board of Elections compensate him for such loss. Referred to Commissioner Maguire for consideration and report.

From the Chief Clerk of the Board, dated the 14th inst., reporting in relation to the attendance of the clerical force in his office for the preceding week; and further reporting that the report of the Chief Clerk of the Manhattan Borough office, under date of the 28th ult., of supplies received on account of contract with the Martin B. Brown Company has been compared with said contract and found correct as to quantity. Filed.

From the Chief Clerks of the Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn Borough offices, dated the 14th inst.; the Deputy Chief Clerk of the Queens Borough office, dated the 14th inst., and the Chief Clerk of the Richmond Borough office, dated the 12th inst., reporting in relation to the attendance of the clerical force in their respective offices for the preceding week. Filed.

From the Chief Clerk of The Bronx Borough office, dated the 14th inst., reporting the receipt of supplies therein specified, on account of contract with the Martin B. Brown Company. Referred to the Chief Clerk of the Board for comparison with said contract, and report.

From the Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Kings County Republican General Committee, dated the 7th inst., and received by mail on the 10th inst., requesting the removal of Henry Hopke as Inspector of Elections in the Twelfth Election District, Fourteenth Assembly District, Kings County.

On motion, the aforesaid communication was ordered on file, and the following resolution adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That Henry Hopke, of No. 56 Kent avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, a duly appointed and qualified Inspector of Elections in the Twelfth Election District, Fourteenth Assembly District, Kings County, be and is hereby, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 70 of the Laws of 1904, removed and dismissed as such election officer.

The following resolution was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the persons whose names appear on the eligible list received from the Municipal Civil Service Commission and who have been certified to for appointment, be and hereby are appointed temporary Clerks in the service of the Board of Elections, to aid in the completion of the party enrollment and the preparation of the necessary copies thereof, as required by law, such service to be compensated for at the rate of three dollars (\$3) per diem, and to be in duration in each case at the pleasure of the Board, not exceeding a period of forty days from November 16, 1904, the hours of service to be from 9 o'clock A. M. to 12:30 o'clock P. M., and from 1 o'clock P. M. to 4:30 o'clock P. M., except on Saturdays, when the hours will be from 9 o'clock A. M. to 12:30 o'clock P. M.

My Dear Sir—In compliance with your instructions we have this day visited the work being done by F. N. Lewis, in the construction of a drainage and blow-off pipe line from Gate House No. 6, Jerome Park Reservoir, to East One Hundred and Ninety-second street, Borough of The Bronx.

We met Mr. Lewis on the works and found that he had no register of his employees. A notice requiring him to prepare such a list within three days was served upon him. Mr. Lewis had in his employ to-day 18 men, and informed us that he employed from 15 to 25. We were shown his time book from the beginning of his contract up to date, and find that on almost every day the employees have worked over eight hours. He claims that this is made necessary by the character of the work. The excavation is now 20 feet deep, increasing to over 30 feet, while the bottom of the trench is through at least 5 feet of fine quicksand. This sand has so much water in it that in order to keep the banks from undermining and caving, it is necessary to frequently require labor in excess of eight hours daily, for which overtime the employees are paid.

Dear Sir—On this date we investigated complaint made against Culgin & Pace for violations of the Labor Laws, sections 3 and 13. We find that said complaint is sustained.

Saw John B. Pace, who is a member of this firm and superintendent of work (which consists of construction of new stone wall fencing, New Croton Dam Division, New Croton Aqueduct in the towns of Yorktown and Cortlandt, Westchester County), and asked him how many men he had at work on his contract and his answer was 75 men.

Asked him if he kept a list of his employees as required by section 13 of the Labor Law, and he stated that he had no list or record of names of his employees. We then served him with an order to comply with law.

Asked how many hours per day his employees on this contract worked, and Mr. Pace stated that they worked eight hours per day, but that some of the men did lump or piece work, and at times and against his orders worked longer than eight hours per day.

Could not get affidavits from men employed on this contract that they worked more than eight hours per day, but found at work Tony Cassa, who said he started at work at 7 A. M. and worked until 6 o'clock P. M., with one hour for dinner.

Salvucci Radilia, one of the employees on this contract, stated that he was twenty years of age and two years in the United States, and not a citizen.

Petro Salvucci stated that he was thirty-one years of age, seven years in the United States, but not a citizen.

Juan Pollesci stated that he was twenty-three years of age, ten months in the United States.

Tony Ballau stated that he was fifteen years of age, seven months in the United States.

Asked if there was one man at work on the contract who was a citizen, and none could be found.

The contract is for the construction of a roadway between North Salem and Purdy, about 1 1/4 miles long.

The contractor on record has sublet this contract to Angelo Palladino, of Katonah, Westchester County, N. Y.

On the day of investigation we found about 40 people employed on the job, most of whom we questioned as to the length of time they resided in this country, and we found that none of the persons employed are citizens of the United States, many being only ten days in this country.

No list of employees was furnished to us, although sub-contractor said at first that he had a list. Not finding a list, and from the fact that non-citizens were employed, we served Mr. Angelo Palladino, for the contractor, a notice to comply with section 13 of the Labor Laws within three days from time of notice, viz.: August 25, 1904, and with this notice we also left a copy of the Labor Law.

We furthermore found that the eight hour law is violated on this job; people employed are required to work ten hours a day; while they are paid by the hour, we find ten hours constitutes a working day.

We attach and make part of this report two affidavits signed by Matagrano Natale, of Purdy; Trulli Domenico, of Purdy, showing that they work ten hours per day. First named person is foreman on job. None of the signers of these affidavits are citizens. No citizens are working on job; we had to take affidavits of non-citizens.

On August 28, 1904, I called at their office on Jerome avenue and made known to their superintendent in charge, Mr. Cane, the object of our visit.

Mr. Cane received us very kindly and said he would be glad to give us all the information in his power and immediately turned over to us the list kept at the office of all men employed on this contract. We found this list to contain the names of 1,127 men employed, also showing whether native or naturalized citizens or aliens. We proceeded to make a copy of this list, which was finished on the 20th, and is herewith attached. This list clearly shows that aliens are employed on this contract.

On the afternoon of September 1, assisted by four other deputies and interpreters, we went to the works to obtain the addresses of the persons named on this list, a large portion of which we succeeded in obtaining, as will appear on said list.

In regard to the violation of the eight hour law, we have been informed by the superintendent that in the employment of all their men eight hours constituted a day's work, and that men were not allowed to work more than eight hours per day, except in case of emergency, when they were paid extra compensation—the day's work beginning at 8 o'clock A. M. and stopping at 12 M.; beginning at 1 P. M. and stopping at 5 P. M. To corroborate this statement, taking with me an interpreter, we went to the works September 2 and obtained six affidavits from men employed on the different gangs on the works, all of which freely testified that they did not work more than eight hours per day.

The Aqueduct Commissioners:

Gentlemen—I am in receipt of your communication of the 1st inst., reading as follows:

"We transmit herewith copies of communications from Mr. John Williams, Deputy Commissioner of Labor, Albany, N. Y., dated August 30 and 31, 1904, alleging violations of sections 3 and 13 of the Labor Law by the following contractors for work being carried on under the direction of the Aqueduct Commissioners:

(1) Frederick N. Lewis, contractor for blow-off pipe line from Gate House No. 6 of Jerome Park Reservoir.

(2) Culgin & Pace, contractors for stone wall boundary fences in New Croton Dam Division.

(3) John Twiname, contractor for cutting timber and clearing grounds in the Croton River Division.

(4) Wm. J. Flanagan, contractor for Muscoot Dam, at Muscoot Mountain, Westchester County.

(5) John Twiname, contractor for highway near Titicus river, in the Town of North Salem.

We have transmitted copies of the communications and the inclosures to the contractors and have called their attention to the provisions of the Labor Law and to the eight-hour clause in their contracts, and warned them that they must carefully observe the provisions of their contract and not violate the provisions of the Labor Law.

Will you please advise us what further steps, if any, we should take in the premises?"

(1) Regarding the alleged violations of section 3 of the Labor Law by the contractors named in your communication, I have had occasion quite recently to advise

the various Borough Presidents as to their duty under the Labor Law where contractors violate the provisions of said section 3, as follows:

"Replying to your inquiry as to what course you should pursue in reference to the alleged violation of the Labor Law by certain contracting companies doing work in the Borough of Manhattan, under contracts with the City, such violation consisting of said companies compelling their employees to work more than eight hours per day, I beg to say:

"That by section (NN) of the contracts in question the contractor agrees that he will comply with the provisions of the Labor Law, so far as the same are constitutional and applicable to the contract; and in addition to this he further agrees that no laborer, workman or mechanic in the employ of the contractor, sub-contractor or other persons doing or contracting to do the whole or part of the work contemplated by the contract, shall be required to work more than eight hours in any one calendar day, except in cases of extraordinary emergency, caused by fire, flood or danger to life and property.

"By section (Q) of the contract it is provided that if the Engineer, acting for the City, shall be of the opinion and shall certify to the Borough President that the contractor is executing his contract in bad faith or not in accordance with the terms thereof, the President shall notify the contractor to discontinue all work under the contract, whereupon the President shall have power to contract for the completion of the contract or to place such and so many persons as he may deem advisable, by contract or otherwise, to work at and complete the work under the contract, and to charge the expense of the necessary labor and materials to the contractor, said expense to be deducted and paid by the City out of such moneys as may be due or may thereafter at any time grow due to the contractor under the contract, and in case such expense shall exceed the amount which would have been payable under the contract, if the same had been completed by the contractor, it shall pay the amount of such excess to the City.

"These provisions are inserted in the contract, in accordance with the requirements of section 3, chapter 415, Laws of 1897, known as the Labor Law, which, as amended, reads partly as follows:

"Eight hours shall constitute a legal day's work for all classes of employees in this State, except those engaged in farm and domestic service, unless otherwise provided by law. * * * Each contract to which the State or municipal corporation is a party which may involve the employment of laborers, workmen or mechanics shall contain a stipulation that no laborer, workman or mechanic in the employ of the contractor, sub-contractor or other person doing or contracting to do the whole or a part of the work contemplated by the contract, shall be permitted or required to work more than eight hours in any calendar day, except in cases of extraordinary emergency caused by fire, flood or danger to life and property. * * * Each contract for such public work hereafter made shall contain a provision that the same shall be void and of no effect unless the person or corporation making or performing the same shall comply with the provisions of this section, and no such person or corporation shall be entitled to receive any sum nor shall any officer, agent or employee of the State or of a municipal corporation pay the same or authorize its payment from the funds under his charge or control to any person or corporation for work done upon any contract which in its form or manner of performance violates the provisions of this section."

"Section 4 of the Labor Law provides in substance that any officer, agent or employee of the State or of a municipal corporation, having a duty to perform in the premises, who violates or evades, or who permits the violation or evasion, of any of the provisions of the Act shall be guilty of malfeasance in office and shall be suspended or removed therefrom, and that any citizen of the State may maintain a proceeding for the suspension or removal of such officer, agent or employee, or may maintain an action for the purpose of securing the cancellation or avoidance of any contract which by its terms or the manner of performing violates the Act.

"The constitutionality of the provisions of the Labor Law which prohibit a contractor doing City work under a contract with the City from compelling or permitting his employees to work more than eight hours per day has been called in question, and Mr. Justice White, sitting at Special Term, Supreme Court, Second Department, is reported to have expressed his belief that this law is unconstitutional. But in the case of Aitkin vs. Kansas, reported in 191 U. S., 207, a statute similar to the one now under consideration was held to be constitutional. The United States Supreme Court in that case said, Mr. Justice Harlan writing the opinion:

"It may be that the State, in enacting the statute, intended to give its sanction to the view held by many that, all things considered, the general welfare of employees, mechanics and workmen, upon whom rest a portion of the burdens of government, will be subserved if labor performed for eight continuous hours was taken to be a full day's work; that the restriction of a day's work to that number of hours would promote morality, improve the physical and intellectual condition of laborers and workmen and enable them the better to discharge the duties appertaining to citizenship. We have no occasion here to consider these questions, nor to determine upon which side is the sounder reason; for, whatever may have been the motives controlling the enactment of the statute in question, we can imagine no possible ground to dispute the power of the State to declare that no one undertaking work for it or for one of its municipal agencies, should permit or require an employee on such work to labor in excess of eight hours each day, and to inflict punishment upon those who are embraced by such regulations and yet disregard them."

"Continuing, the learned Justice says:

"Legislative enactments should be recognized and enforced by the courts as embodying the will of the people, unless they are plainly and palpably, beyond all question, in violation of the fundamental law of the Constitution. It cannot be affirmed of the statute of Kansas that it was plainly inconsistent with that instrument; indeed, its constitutionality is beyond all question."

"While it is not proper that a public officer should in the first instance, except for the gravest reasons, raise the question of unconstitutionality of any law, in this particular case it would be imprudent to do so, in view of the decision of the United States Supreme Court.

"I therefore advise you that it is your duty to take proceedings to cancel and annul the contracts of such companies or individuals engaged in doing work for the City who violate the terms and provisions of the Labor Law by exacting more than eight hours per day from their employees. Therefore, if you have clear and convincing proof of such violations it will be your duty to notify the contractors of the cancellation of their contracts by serving on them and their sureties a notice, a copy of which I enclose. Proper affidavits of service of such notice should be obtained and preserved in your Department.

"Appreciating fully the possible involvement of the City in litigation as the result of my advice, the great hardship which may be caused by a sudden stoppage of the public works now in course of construction, and the injury to the great number of men employed thereon who may be thrown out of employment, I am nevertheless forced to the legal conclusion I have stated.

"Under the law in question this duty is imposed upon you, and the statute expressly provides that failure to perform your duty is made malfeasance in office and renders you liable to removal therefrom.

"If you conclude that the law has been violated, the proof of such violation by the contracting companies should be preserved in the form of affidavits in your Department for use in any legal proceedings which may result from any action taken by you in this connection."

(2) As to violations of the Labor Law under section 13, by the employment of aliens, I have this day addressed to the Comptroller a communication on the subject, as follows:

"I have to acknowledge the receipt of a communication from Deputy Comptroller J. W. Stevenson, dated August 17, 1904, and enclosing a letter from the People's Security Company, complaining to you that one I. Selby is employing aliens on the iron work on school buildings now in course of construction under contract with the City at Gates avenue and Waverley place, and at Seventeenth street and Seventh avenue, in Brooklyn, and requesting my advice as to your duty in the premises.

"This question is raised because of the provisions of section 13 of the statute known as the Labor Law, as amended by chapter 454 of the Laws of 1902, wherein it is provided that:

"In the construction of public works by the State or municipalities, or by persons contracting with the State or such municipalities, only citizens of the United States shall be employed. * * * In each contract * * * a

provision shall be inserted to the effect that if the provisions of this section are not complied with the contract shall be void."

Before an answer can be given to your question it will be necessary to have information as to the nationality of the aliens on account of whose employment the complaint is made.

It may be well, however, to discuss now the distinction which may be raised between certain classes of aliens, because not all of them are affected by this portion of the Labor Law, and to point out the reason for the exemption of these from its operation.

"The Constitution of the United States, Article VI., section 2, reads:

"This constitution and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all treaties made, or which shall be made under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land, and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby. Anything in the constitution or laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding."

"The right to enter into treaties with foreign countries was one which was originally ceded to the United States Government by the several States, and any treaty, therefore, made pursuant to this grant of power has all the vigor of the Constitution itself. No State can validly pass a law contravening any of the provisions of such a treaty, and even though there should be a law when a treaty is made, inconsistent therewith, the law must immediately yield to the treaty. Therefore, any such law as the one now under consideration cannot impose disabilities on aliens with whose government there subsists a treaty guaranteeing its subjects equal privileges with our own citizens.

"This question has been passed upon frequently from the very inception of the general government, and in the case of Hauenstein against Lynham, 100 U. S., 483, Judge Swayne of the Supreme Court of the United States, delivering the opinion, said:

"The efficacy of the treaty is declared and guaranteed by the Constitution of the United States. That instrument took effect on the 4th day of March, 1789. In 1796, but a few years later, this Court said: 'If doubts could exist before the adoption of the present national government they must be entirely removed by the sixth article of the Constitution, which provides that 'all treaties made or which shall be made under the authority of the United States shall be the supreme law of the land, and the judges in every State shall be bound thereby, anything in the Constitution or laws of any State to the contrary notwithstanding.' There can be no limitation on the power of the people of the United States. By their authority the State constitutions were made, and by their authority the Constitution of the United States was established; and they have the power to change or abolish the State constitutions or to make them yield to the general government and to treaties made by their authority. A treaty cannot be the supreme law of the land; that is, of all the United States, if any act of a State Legislature can stand in its way. * * * It is the declared will of the people of the United States that every treaty made by the authority of the United States shall be superior to the Constitution and laws of any individual State, and their will alone is to decide. * * *

"It must always be borne in mind that the Constitution, laws and treaties of the United States are as much a part of the law of every State as its own local laws and constitution. This is a fundamental principle in our system of complex national policy."

"From this you will observe that under certain contingencies this Labor Law cannot be invoked and the municipality would not be justified in abrogating the contracts because of the employment on public works of any alien whose natural rights are protected by treaty, nor could the City on such account withhold moneys already due upon the contracts of this character.

"Consider, for example, the relations between the Kingdom of Italy and our Federal Government. By Article 3 of the treaty the subjects of the Italian Crown in the United States are guaranteed the same rights and privileges, in respect to their person and property, as are secured to our own citizens, and so far as they are concerned, this prohibition against their employment under the Labor Law would be clearly ineffective.

"Accordingly, if in any instance it is urged that a contract is being violated under the terms of this law it would be necessary to know whether the aliens employed has the protection of a treaty before it could be established whether the complaint is good."

It is quite likely the contractors complained of will deny they have in any wise broken the law or the contracts. It is of great importance, therefore, that the proper proof of such violation should be obtained by the City officials having the matter in charge before canceling such contracts.

Official investigation, the certificate in writing of the City Engineer having charge of the work showing the wilful violation by the contractor of the conditions and covenants of the contract by which the contractor agrees to comply with the Labor Law, together with the sworn reports of your Inspectors, should form the basis upon which your action is founded, so that when the question of fact is raised by these contractors there may be no doubt of the City's ability to prove the violation. It will not suffice to cancel these contracts upon the statements of irresponsible persons—there must be convincing legal sworn evidence of the violation.

As this is a matter of vital importance to the City, I recommend that great care be taken to obtain and preserve the necessary evidence against the contracting companies.

I would suggest, in addition, that a copy of such record be sent to this Department.

Aqueduct Commissioners:

Gentlemen—I am in receipt of your communication of the 9th inst., transmitting for my information copies of additional communications from Mr. John Williams, Deputy Commissioner of Labor, Albany, N. Y., dated September 1 and 2, 1904, alleging violations of sections 3 and 13 of the Labor Law by the following contractors for work being carried on under the direction of the Aqueduct Commissioners, viz.:

(1) For furnishing and erecting sluice gates at the Muscoot Dam Gate House—The Coldwell-Wilcox Company, contractor.

(2) For constructing highways, bridge piers and stone wall boundary fences in the Croton River Division—Wm. J. Flanagan, contractor.

(3) For constructing fourteen highway bridge superstructures across Croton Lake and river and its tributaries—The American Bridge Company, contractor.

And also transmitting for my consideration copy of the communication from Mr. Frederick N. Lewis, dated August 31, 1904, with copy of a communication from the Labor Bureau, alleging violations of the Labor Law on his contract for blow-off pipe line from Gate House No. 6, Jerome Park Reservoir.

Under date of September 10, I wrote you fully regarding the questions raised by these and similar communications from the Deputy Commissioner of Labor, alleging

violations of sections 3 and 13 of the Labor Law by contractors carrying on work under the direction of the Aqueduct Commissioners. I have nothing now to add to that communication, except, perhaps, to repeat what I then said regarding the necessity for, first, obtaining clear and convincing evidence of the violation by the contractor before canceling contract; and, second, to preserve such evidence so that the City may be able to make use of it when occasion arises.

The Chief Engineer presented the following report:

Report No. 1062.

September 27, 1904.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

Gentlemen—In compliance with your resolution of September 16, 1904, referring certain charges and affidavits of the State Labor Bureau, together with an opinion of the Corporation Counsel concerning the same, and asking for a report regarding the facts, I beg leave to submit a report regarding the contract with Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman for the construction of the New Croton Dam, and the contracts with William J. Flanagan for the construction of the Muscoot Dam, and the highways and bridges in the Croton River Division. Detailed reports of the other contracts will be furnished later.

Under these three contracts men are being employed more than eight hours a day; this has been done with the understanding that the necessity for completing this work at the earliest practicable date constituted an extreme emergency, and, therefore, comes directly within the provisions of the Labor Law, which states that no laborer shall be permitted or required to work more than eight hours in any one day, except in cases of extraordinary emergency caused by fire, flood or danger to life or property. That this is an emergency involving great danger to life and property is shown conclusively by facts taken from public records.

The City of New York is now using from the present Croton watershed approximately 300,000,000 gallons of water a day. This is an increase over last year of about 30,000,000 gallons per day, which is attributable to changes in distribution by which the Croton water issued over a more extended district, and also to a better pressure being furnished, especially in the high service.

Mr. Hill, the former Chief Engineer of the Department of Water Supply, estimated that within a very short time the use of Croton water would be increased to 310,000,000 gallons a day. It was 307,000,000 gallons a day during July. The consumption of Croton water for the years 1900 to 1903, inclusive, was as follows:

Year.	Average for Year.
1900.....	249,000,000 gals. a day.
1901.....	256,000,000 gals. a day.
1902.....	262,000,000 gals. a day.
1903.....	267,000,000 gals. a day.

The maximum safe yield of the Croton watershed, with the present reservoirs, is, under the most favorable conditions, only 250,000,000 gallons per day, a figure which has been established by Mr. John R. Freeman in his report to the Comptroller in 1900, by the engineers of the Merchants' Association employed to make a report about the same time and by the Commission on Additional Water Supply, Professor W. H. Burr, Rudolph Herring and John R. Freeman. These figures are based on actual recorded conditions and results of measurements in the Croton watershed, checked by comparison with other similar watersheds where measurements have been kept for many years. This means that the amount now being drawn by New York each day is 50,000,000 gallons, or 20 per cent. in excess of the available supply in dry years, and it is only the special providence of the Lord during the last four years in sending more than the usual quantity of rainfall, favorably distributed, that has preserved the City from the danger of life, health and property consequent upon a water famine.

In order to show the conditions more convincingly, I have taken the actual quantities left in the present storage reservoirs at the lowest points in the years 1891-92, 1892-93, 1895-96 and 1900-01, respectively, these being ordinarily dry years, and corrected them for the differences in the draught from the Croton watershed between those years and that obtaining the present year.

This computation indicates that with the present available storage in the Croton watershed and with flows of the river like those actually occurring in the years mentioned, the reservoirs would have been entirely empty for considerable periods, as shown in the following table, assuming a draught of 300,000,000 gallons per day from present Croton reservoirs and the actual yield of the Croton watershed, as measured:

Year.	Approximate Periods Storage Reservoirs Would Have Reservoirs Would Have
1891-92.....	38 days.
1892-93.....	84 days.
1895-96.....	56 days.
1900-01.....	44 days.

This shows that within nine consecutive years the storage capacity would have been entirely exhausted for four considerable periods and the City dependent upon the natural flow of the Croton river, which, at times, is less than 50,000,000 gallons per day. If we go back to the earlier periods of extreme drought, such as 1880-83, the conditions are very much worse. The above conditions are shown graphically in Diagram No. 1. Diagram No. 2 shows the state of the present reservoirs if this year had been dry after August 26. These or worse conditions are liable to occur at any time.

I also respectfully call your attention to the fact that long before all the reservoirs reach the points of exhaustion, attempts would be made to reduce the supply to the City to such an extent as to interfere very seriously with the health, best interests and prosperity of the City, and place the fire protection in jeopardy.

A water famine in New York would at once have many serious consequences. The supply of water to boilers in steam power plants would be curtailed, involving:

Shutting down of manufacturing plants;
Interruption of surface, elevated and subway traffic;

Stopping of elevators in buildings; and

Reduction of electric lights in streets and buildings;

resulting in a general and very costly interruption to business of all kinds.

Fire rates would be enormously increased, with consequent increase of insurance premiums to figures which would take millions of dollars from owners of real and personal property before the rates would be lowered, and in case of fire widespread conflagration might easily follow.

Distributing reservoirs would be at least partially emptied and the pressure on service pipes reduced. Street sprinkling and washing would have to be omitted.

Sickness would ensue in many forms directly and indirectly traceable to the shortage of water as the cause, and some diseases would almost certainly become epidemic. The death rate would be very much higher than the normal.

Supplies to railroads and shipping would necessarily largely be shut off. The cost for even one season's experience, such as would surely occur with the repetition of rainfall conditions like those mentioned elsewhere in this report, would be stupendous in both life and money.

With the completion of the new dam and the filling of the appurtenant reservoir there will be added to the available storage 30,000,000,000 gallons, or one hundred days' supply at the present rate of draught.

This vast new reservoir, if completed in time to be filled next spring, will enable the City to avoid a water famine next summer, notwithstanding the increased use of water, even if the season should be a dry one.

The estimated capacity of the Croton watershed, however, even with this reservoir filled, is, under the most favorable conditions, only 300,000,000 gallons per day, or just about what the city is now using, and the consumption is increasing at the rate of about 15,000,000 gallons per day each year. This is not a theoretical estimate, but is based on the actual flow of the Croton river and the actual conditions existing. How much greater, then, is the danger in drawing 300,000,000 gallons per day when the capacity in dry years of the present reservoirs is only 250,000,000 gallons? The rainfalls for the years 1901, 1902, 1903 and 1904 have been unusually large and well distributed, and it is due to this fact only that it has been possible to keep up a full supply to the City.

It seems unnecessary to go further in order to show that this is one of the greatest emergencies that could exist, and that the Aqueduct Commissioners are called on to do everything in their power to hasten the completion of the present work so that the new Croton reservoir can be filled at the earliest possible date. Past records of the flow of the river show that in order to insure the filling of the reservoir the gates should be closed early in January, for it is possible to store very little water after the spring months. Furthermore, it is impossible to lay any considerable amount of masonry during the cold months. This means that the new Croton Dam, the Muscoot Dam, the highways and bridges in the upper division and the clearing of the reservoir must be completed by the end of the year, if possible, and to do this the contractors must work every available man every possible hour of daylight, for it is practicable to work by artificial light on but a very few places.

Without a full knowledge of the facts it might be assumed that this work could be finished by working two or three shifts of men, but in the case of the New Croton Dam and the Muscoot Dam the space is so contracted that only a limited number of men can work, and this is not a question of men, but a question of the number of hours in which they can work. On important structures like these dams it is not practicable to lay masonry except by daylight. Due regard must also be paid to the maintenance of the proper organization, and even granting that there might be space and opportunity to work two shifts of men, it would still be entirely impracticable, as it could be done for only a few months, when the contractors would be obliged to change their entire organization, a very impracticable thing to do where great progress is looked for.

The contractors began in June to increase their working forces and the hours of labor so as to advance the work sufficiently for the storage of water by the end of the year. On investigation I am satisfied that the men have been paid pro rata for all the extra hours worked. This holds good not only for the daily men, but for all the monthly men. By this increase in the hours of labor and proportional pay, a serious strike which threatened the work was averted. No man is forced to work extra hours, but all, so far as I have been able to learn, are glad of the opportunity and work with entire willingness.

These measures have resulted in a great increase in the volume of work done, and the completion of the dam to a high elevation by the end of the year, together with the other work necessary for the filling of the reservoir, which early in the season appeared utterly hopeless, now seems to be assured.

The facts, then, are:

(1) The City is now using 50,000,000 gallons per day more water than the present Croton watershed with existing storage reservoirs will furnish in dry years.

(2) There have been four periods since 1891 when the entire present storage would have been exhausted with the present rate of draught.

(3) The past four years have been very wet and a dry season is now due.

(4) The completion of New Croton Dam will enable the City to avoid a water famine next year.

The Chief Engineer believes that the only possible, practical way has been taken in order to hurry this work, and he is positive that an extraordinary emergency exists; that there is great danger to life and property through a possible failure of the water supply to the City, and he therefore recommends that the Commissioners officially direct the contractors to increase their working force and the hours of labor so that they shall, at all hazards, complete all the work necessary for filling the New Croton Reservoir at the earliest possible day, or not later than January 1, 1905.

Resolved, That a copy of said report and of these resolutions be transmitted to the State Commissioner of Labor, with a request for his opinion or other action thereon at the earliest possible date.

Affirmative—The Comptroller, Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan and Windolph—4.

Notice of motion and affidavit, dated October 6, 1904, filed by Harrison T. Slosson, attorney for the Board of Assessors of the County of Westchester, and attorney for the Supervisors and Highway Commissioners of the towns of Yorktown and New Castle, to be heard at the County Court-house, in the Borough of Brooklyn, on the 14th day of October, 1904, in the matter of the petition of Thomas F. Gilroy, Commissioner of Public Works, etc., for the appointment of Commissioners of Appraisal, Eighth Supplemental Petition, Cornell Dam, was received and referred to the Corporation Counsel.

Report No. 1067 of the Chief Engineer, dated October 3, 1904, recommending the promotion of Percy Davidson from the grade of Transitman to that of Assistant Engineer, without increase of salary, was received and ordered filed and the following resolution offered:

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, contained in Report No. 1067, Percy Davidson, Transitman, be and hereby is promoted to the grade of Assistant Engineer, without increase of salary, he having been certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission on April 19, 1904, as eligible for such promotion.
