Gentlemen—The public of New Rochelle and the eastern part of Westchester County are constantly communicating with the representatives of the press, asking them for information as to when the Board of Aldermen of New York will pass the ordinance of the New York and Port Chester Railroad, which has been before that Board for one year.

We would thank you if you will let us know about this matter, as it is the subject of prevailing interest in Westchester County at the present time, and will continue to be the subject of uppermost interest until the Port Chester ordinance is passed.

It is probably needless for us to call your attention to the fact that it has now been established by overwhelming evidence that the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad is a defunct affair, and that that alleged corporation could not use any right which it might obtain from The City of New York, and that the only effect of recognizing that defunct application and corporation would be to cause the public and property-owners of this section generally, and the Borough of The Bronx, to become involved in a lot of needless and expensive lawsuits.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, City:

Dear Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Merchants' Association held last Friday, a communication was presented from the Van Nest Property Owners' Association and other organizations in the Borough of The Bronx, in which direct request is made for the Association to take the lead in such steps as may be deemed necessary to compel the Board of Aldermen to at once take definite action on the application of the New York and Port Chester Railroad for permission to cross the streets and highways in the Borough of The Bronx. As you know, this application has been pending for over a year.

After mature consideration the subject was referred to our Committee on Franchises and Transportation, of which I am Chairman, with full power in the premises. Our Association feels that an improvement of this character, which would be of such vast benefit to the residents in that section by increasing realty values, affording better transportation facilities, etc., should not be held up without good and sufficient reasons being given to the public, which explanation has not been forthcoming. Before starting an agitation I respectfully request that you call the attention of the Board of Aldermen to the unanimous sentiment of the citizens of the Borough of The Bronx, as also the majority of the citizens living throughout the rest of the City, that the Board of Aldermen shall act promptly upon this application, whether the action be favorable or unfavorable. The people of this great city feel that it is unjust on the part of the Board of Aldermen to intentionally refrain for over a year from taking any action on so important a matter. They should either pass or veto the application. If the latter course is adopted the citizens can then proceed to take such steps as will bring about a change of action. If the Board of Aldermen continue to hold up this application the Association will at once commence an agitation, with a view of learning whether the Board of Aldermen are an obstructionist body or one elected for the welfare of the people.

Gentlemen—Inclosed herewith please find copy of action taken by the North Side Board of Trade of the Borough of The Bronx on Wednesday, April 27, 1904, wherein that Board of Trade unanimously adopted resolutions calling the attention of the Aldermen to the necessity for immediate favorable action on the New York and Port Chester Railroad ordinance, and appointing a committee of seven to wait upon Mayor McClellan and urge upon him the necessity of sending to the Board of Aldermen special emergency communications from time to time, urging in such messages upon the Board of Aldermen the necessity for immediate favorable action on the New York and Port Chester Railroad ordinance.

The Committee appointed by the North Side Board of Trade to wait upon the Mayor in this matter consists of Messrs. James L. Wells, Louis F. Haffen, Albert E. Davis, Fielding L. Marshall, John De Hart, D. H. Morris and W. W. Niles.

This Committee herewith respectfully calls your attention to the fact that there has never been before the Borough of The Bronx a matter of greater economic, commercial or industrial importance to this borough than that of the New York and Port Chester Railroad.

The charter of the New York and Port Chester Railroad has twice been unanimously affirmed in the Court of last resort, that is, the New York Court of Appeals, and the company has secured from the cities, towns and courts all the rights and franchises it requires, with the single exception of the formal assent of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York to cross certain streets in The Bronx. The sentiment in favor of this railroad is unanimous, and the public asks that there be no further delay in this matter.

Sir—I desire to ask the co-operation of the Board of Aldermen for the work of this Department.

I am very anxious to secure the consent of the Board for the purchase, without advertising and public letting, of 10,000 cubic yards, more or less, of garden mold, to be delivered at Crotona Park, in The Bronx Borough.

We are very much in need of this mold, and it is important that we secure it at once, as it will be difficult—impossible, perhaps—to get another lot so good or so cheap as that offered at present.

I have a proposition from a reliable contractor, who agrees to furnish in place 10,000 cubic yards of garden mold, at 60 cents per cubic yard, and will furnish, in addition, 20,000 cubic yards of good earth fill, for which no charge whatever will be made to the Park Department, provided he can begin the delivery of this material at once, as the work he has in hand must be completed at the earliest possible date.

Our experience here has shown that it is difficult—in fact, I may say impossible—to secure vegetable mold at anything like the price at which this contractor offers it; and it is important that we secure this mold, as we require it at once. And, in addition to that, we shall have 20,000 cubic yards of good fill at a point where it is very much needed to fill in low and swampy lands, for which no charge whatever will be made.

From what I can learn, it has been much more advantageous to the City to purchase garden mold by private purchase than by public letting; hence I make this appeal both in the interest of economy and expedition in the matter of delivery of material of which we are in great need.

The contractor will be able to begin the delivery of this material at once, both the vegetable mold and the earth filling; and I should appreciate it very much if you would bring this matter to the attention of the Board at its next meeting, and shall be pleased to come before the Board and give any other explanation desired.

Resolved, That the roadway of East Eighteenth street, between Church avenue and Beverley road, be and the same is hereby declared to be thirty feet in width.

Whereas, The Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, Borough of Brooklyn, after hearing had this 25th day of April, 1904, resolved to initiate proceedings to improve Bay Seventeenth street, between Cropsey avenue and Eighty-sixth street, and the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Highways, Borough of Brooklyn, recommends that the roadway of said street be narrowed from thirty-two feet to thirty feet in order to save the trees thereupon;

Resolved, That the roadway of Bay Seventeenth street, between Cropsey avenue and Eighty-sixth street be and the same hereby is reduced from thirty-two feet to thirty feet.

Whereas, The Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, after hearing had this 25th day of April, 1904, initiated proceedings for the physical improvement of Webster avenue, between Coney Island avenue and Gravesend avenue, and the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Highways recommends, in order that the trees along the street be saved from destruction, that the roadway of said street be reduced from twenty-eight to twenty-six feet;

Resolved, That the roadway of Webster avenue, between Coney Island avenue and Gravesend avenue, be and the same hereby is reduced from twenty-eight to twenty-six feet.

Which was referred to the Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—I have received a letter from your Secretary, Deputy Comptroller Stevenson, dated April 4, 1904, forwarding a communication from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity relative to an insufficiency in the appropriation for lighting public buildings under the control of the Board of Education for the year 1904. This letter, dated March 15, 1904, was presented to you at the meeting held March 31, 1904, and referred to me for my consideration and advice.

My attention is also called to the fact that the major part of the expense for lighting school buildings for the year 1903 has not been paid, and that my predecessor advised that the cost of lighting school buildings should be paid out of the appropriation made to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. It is stated, however, that the Board of Education declined to transfer from its own account to the account of the other department the amount which had been appropriated for lighting school buildings for the year 1903, on the ground that the Board of Education had exclusive jurisdiction in this matter.

You also refer to a recent decision which, I presume, is in the case of Gunnison vs. the Board of Education, 176 N. Y., 11, and request my opinion as to which department should be provided with the funds to pay for the lighting of school buildings.

With the letter from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated March 15, 1904, are forwarded certain other papers, the principal ones of which are reports to him from the Engineer of Surface Construction, dated January 25, 1904, and March 1, 1904. There is also a report to the Comptroller from Duncan MacInnes, Expert Accountant, dated March 4, 1904.

There are thus presented three subjects, each of which is nearly independent of the other:

The first and most important one relates to what shall be done as to the lighting of school buildings during the year 1904.

The situation, as I understand it from the papers forwarded, may be stated as follows, without going into the matter in great detail:

No money was appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the lighting of school buildings for the year 1904, except a small sum (\$15,542.73), which is only enough to light the school buildings for a few days; that is to say, no money has been appropriated either to the Department of Education or to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the specific purpose of lighting school buildings during the year 1904, except the small amount just referred to.

Just how or why this happened is not entirely clear from the papers, but it was doubtless due to some oversight or mistake, the occurrence of which it seems unnecessary to try to explain now.

It was apparently intended that an appropriation should be made to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for this purpose.

It is sufficient to state that an appropriation has been made to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, of only enough to pay its usual expected bills for other purposes, exclusive of any expense for lighting school buildings. It is true that an appropriation of \$1,675,563.50 for "lamps and lighting" in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx has been made to this Department, and further appropriations for the same purpose in the other boroughs, which the Commissioner would have power to apply to the lighting of school buildings.

If the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity should use a substantial part of this appropriation for lighting school buildings, there would be a deficiency at the end of the year, or else it would be necessary to cease lighting a part of the streets of the City.

One of two alternatives is thus presented, and it is, I think, a question of good judgment and discretion on the part of the Commissioner as to which one shall be adopted, unless, indeed, some other source of financial supply can be found, the most obvious of which is an issue of Special Revenue Bonds under subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter.

The second subject presented in the communication from your Secretary relates to the expense of lighting school buildings for the year 1903.

The difficulty on this subject has arisen, no doubt, in part from the dispute with the lighting companies as to their alleged contracts with the City for public lighting during the year 1903. This question is still in litigation, and it is hardly possible to answer it fully at the present time, nor is it advisable to attempt to do so, and fortunately it is not necessary to do so. A part of the difficulty also arose from the doubt as to whether the appropriation for lighting school buildings should be made to the Department of Education or to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

My predecessor held distinctly in several opinions that the appropriation for the lighting of such buildings should be made to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity; that this Department has full and exclusive charge of the contracts for lighting of public buildings, and that all bills for such expenditure should be certified by the Commissioner thereof. Two of his principal opinions on this subject were dated June 16, 1902, and November 6, 1902, respectively, and were forwarded to the Comptroller.

The appropriation, however, was made for the year 1903, to the Department of Education, and no money for that year for the lighting of school buildings was appropriated to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

I do not see, however, that this is a matter of very much practical importance. The school buildings have been lighted and the City should, of course, pay the proper charges therefor. The fact that money has been appropriated through the wrong department is a matter of no great consequence. The Board of Education certainly could not use it for the purposes for which it was not appropriated, and hence it would seem that either the bills should be paid directly out of this money, or a transfer thereof made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and that the two departments should co-operate in order to overcome any technicality that may stand in the way.

The third subject relates to the decision of the Court of Appeals in Gunnison vs. The Board of Education, 176 N. Y., 11. I am informed that my predecessor had this decision before him subsequent to the opinions referred to above, but thought that it furnished no ground for changing the advice which he had previously given. I know of no reason to question the correctness of his views, but have made no original re-examination of the subject. I think that the decision in the Gunnison case has no practical bearing upon the advice which has been given in this opinion.

If, when the estimates for the year 1905 are to be made, a review of the question is thought desirable, I shall take pleasure in making it when requested to do so.

"Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel is hereby requested to inform the Board of Aldermen if Resolution No. 100, now in Committee of Streets, Highways and Sewers, permitting the Kings County Refrigerating Company to lay pipes connecting with Walla-

about Market, is drawn up in such form as to be or not to be affected by the reasons assigned by the Mayor in his veto of Resolutions Nos. 114 and 115 on March 18 last."

I have examined Resolution No. 100, to which you refer, and have drawn in lieu thereof a form of resolution, which I inclose, covering the objects sought to be attained and conforming to the reasons set forth in the veto message of the Mayor relating to the giving of a permit to the Harlem Transfer Company to lay certain tracks in The Bronx.

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby given to the Kings County Refrigerating Company to open streets, as shown in the accompanying diagram, for the purpose of laying pipes under Hall street and under and across Flushing avenue to Wallabout Market, under Washington avenue between Park and Flushing avenues, under and across Flushing avenue between Waverley and Washington avenues and under and across Washington avenue within the bounds of the Wallabout Market, provided that said pipe-line shall not be laid at more than three feet below the surface of the street and that said Kings County Refrigerating Company shall enter into an undertaking, to be approved by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, to save The City of New York harmless from any loss or damage that may be occasioned by reason of the construction or maintenance of said pipe-line. The work of said construction to be done under the direction of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the permission hereby granted to continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen.

And provided further, that the said Kings County Refrigerating Company shall pay to The City of New York as compensation for the privilege hereby granted, such amount as may be deemed equivalent thereto by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that the permission hereby granted shall take effect only upon and after the payment by the said Kings County Refrigerating Company of any sum or sums so provided by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; and no permit shall be issued to said company for the construction of said pipe-line until a proper receipt for the amount so paid is produced and submitted to the President of the said Borough. And in case of any default being made at any time in making any payment fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the license herein provided for shall cease and determine without any action on the part of the Board of Aldermen at the expiration of ninety days after such default.

Alderman Wirth moved to adopt the resolution.

Alderman Owens moved as an amendment that the papers be severally referred to the Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I hereby respectfully request that your Honorable Body in its discretion, authorize the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to an amount not exceeding one hundred and seventy-nine thousand four hundred and twenty-one dollars and fifty-five cents (\$179,421.55). This amount is required to make good a deficiency caused by the failure of the Board of Estimate of 1903 to provide sufficient money to take care of the property under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, for the year 1904.

Herewith I beg to submit a schedule of the estimate of the amount necessary for the maintenance of parks and parkways, the Museum of Arts and Sciences and the furnishing of music in the various parks, as formulated by my predecessor, the Hon. Richard Young. I have carefully gone over this estimate and have found it a just and equitable one, but in the interest of economy have deducted certain amounts, which were asked for repairs to buildings, the establishment of a bureau of arboriculture and the purchase of trees, which can be deferred for another year.

Chapter 453 of the Laws of 1902 put all the shade trees in the streets of the City under the care of the Department of Parks. In compliance with this act it was proposed to create a bureau of arboriculture at a cost of fifty-six thousand seven hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$56,775) for the current year. The last Board of Estimate not having granted this amount and the season being now well advanced, it is deemed prudent to postpone the establishment of the bureau of arboriculture for another year.

Last year the Department furnished thirty (30) concerts in Prospect Park and fifty-one (51) concerts in the smaller parks of the two boroughs. These concerts were distributed among about one dozen parks, making an average of about four each during the season, and there has been a persistent demand for more concerts all over the city. In order to satisfy the clamor of the people the Department asked for an appropriation for this year of eighteen thousand seven hundred and forty dollars (\$18,740), which amount would provide for thirty-six (36) concerts in Prospect Park and one hundred (100) concerts in the small parks of the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens. Only eleven thousand eight hundred and sixty-four dollars (\$11,864) of this amount has been granted by the former Board of Estimate.

Salary Account—The clerical force as well as the engineering force of the Department, as at present constituted, is totally inadequate and unable to conduct the business of this Department as it ought to be done. A number of new positions have been asked for, and the demand for the money necessary to pay the respective salaries should be granted.

The increase in the salary account, amounting to nine thousand nine hundred and twelve dollars and fifty-five cents (\$9,912.55) is explained as follows:

Required for new positions, twenty-one hundred dollars (\$2,100).

Positions transferred from the per diem account to salary account, six thousand two hundred and twelve dollars and fifty-five cents (\$6,212.55).

Increase in salary, sixteen hundred dollars (\$1,600).

Of the latter amount one thousand dollars (\$1,000) is to be applied to the increase of the salary of the Superintendent from three thousand to four thousand dollars (\$3,000 to \$4,000) per annum; of the salary of the Chief Clerk, two thousand to twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,000 to \$2,500), which amount he was paid previous to 1902, and fifty dollars (\$50) each to restore the salaries of the Assistant Paymaster and the Property Clerk to what they were previous to 1902.

The salary of the Stenographer in 1903 was increased to twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200), while in fact only ten hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,050) is being paid, although the increase was granted by Commissioner Young in July, 1903.

To the President and Members of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Gentlemen—In a recent report of the Corporation Counsel in the matter of the defunct New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad Company he states, in answer to a question as to whether or not the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has any jurisdiction to inquire into the legal status of a corporation, that the reply must be found by an examination of section 74 of the present Charter.

Among others, the Corporation Counsel makes the statement that upon the introduction of an ordinance granting a franchise for the use of any street, avenue, water-way, parkway or highway it "shall, on its introduction and first reading, be referred by the Board of Aldermen to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, who shall make inquiry as to the money value, etc."

We are advised by competent legal counsel, and we hereby furthermore call your attention to the fact that the Corporation Counsel is entirely in error in his interpretation of the application for the right to cross streets over or under the grades thereof, as coming under the provisions of section 74 of the present Charter.

An application of this kind, as has been repeatedly pointed out, is not a franchise, but is an application made under section 11 of the general Railroad Law, which is very specific and clear in its conditions and provisions.

We have submitted this matter to a number of attorneys, and they all advise us that there is no doubt whatever but that an application of the kind which we are here discussing has no relation to any provision of the present Charter, but is entirely an application under the general Railroad Law.

We also call your attention to the opinion of Ex-Corporation Counsel George L. Rives, in the matter of the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, which opinion was made to the Railroad Committee of the last Board of Aldermen. In the accompanying opinion you will see that Mr. Rives holds that applications of this kind do not come under sections 71 to 77 of the provisions of the present Charter.

We submit to your Board the following axioms:

1. That any Board or body which has the power of determining or granting any application also has the power of refusing or rejecting the same application.

2. That any board or body deliberating upon any matter manifestly has the right or manifestly should inform itself of every detail relating to the matter under consideration.

3. That it is manifestly absurd and ridiculous for any municipal body to grant a right to any corporation which has no de facto legal existence or right to use a proposed grant, and that therefore the City authorities must inform themselves whether or not the applicant has a legal existence.

4. That it is the sworn duty of the City authorities to protect the property rights of the citizens and property owners of the city, and, consequently, that the City authorities shall not cloud property titles by recognizing an alleged corporation, the non-existence of which has been conclusively proved.

We desire to bring this entire matter to your attention and to point out that you not only have the right to inquire into the legal status, but that you are morally bound to do so.

It may not be out of place here to refer to a recent remark of Comptroller Grout, to the effect that "we have the right to grant a thing, and they can do nothing until we grant it, consequently they must conform to our conditions." We are quoting this from a newspaper interview which occurred some time ago, and do not claim to have it verbatim, but know that we have the sense of it.

We also inclose you copy of the opinion of the Hon. W. W. Niles, made to the Taxpayers' Alliance of the Borough of The Bronx, wherein Mr. Niles shows that the alleged Westchester and Boston has absolutely no existence or life, and that it could not use any grant or alleged right which it might obtain from the City. We call your attention to the fact that two of Mr. Niles' conclusions are as follows:

"My conclusion, therefore, on this point is that the railroad company is left a mere corporation divested of all its property and franchises constituting property, and so without ability to change the route or to locate a new one."

The result of this conclusion is that the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad is in no position to locate and build a railroad in the event that the consent for which they have applied to the Board of Aldermen should be granted.

As to the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, from the assumed facts it would appear that they have complied with all requirements of law and are in a position to locate and construct a road so soon as the consent for which they have applied to the Board of Aldermen is granted.

Trusting that you will take absolutely no action upon this matter until you give The Bronx an opportunity to be heard and state their wishes and desires and interests, thanking you, and awaiting notice of a hearing from your Board in this matter, we are,

Legal Opinion of Hon. William W. Niles to Taxpayers' Alliance of The Bronx on the Defunct New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad.

Hon. Adolph C. Hottenroth, President, Taxpayers' Alliance:

Dear Sir—In reply to your request for an opinion as to the legal status at the present time of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad Company and the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, I would advise you as follows:

I assume the following facts:

First—As to the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad Company.

That the company was incorporated in March, 1872.

That the articles of incorporation were defective in that they did not include the affidavit required in section 2 of the Railroad Law of 1850.

That in 1876 the company became insolvent and a receiver was appointed.

That in 1881 the receiver, acting under an order of the Court, sold all the rights, title and interest of the company to its roadbed, right of way and all real estate, tracks and fixtures, which rights, etc., were purchased at said sale by one Van Pelt, and which sale was afterwards confirmed by an order of the Supreme Court.

That Van Pelt subsequently conveyed whatever he purchased to a corporation known as the East River and Connecticut Railway Company.

That in 1903 the company applied to the Board of Aldermen for authority to cross certain streets in the Borough of The Bronx, and this application is now pending before the Board of Aldermen.

Second—As to the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company.

That this company was incorporated in April 1, 1901.

That it has applied to the Board of Railroad Commissioners for a certificate of public convenience and necessity and received such certificate.

That the action of the Board of Railroad Commissioners has been reviewed by the courts, and has been finally approved by the Court of Appeals.

That it has received the consent of the Common Council of New Rochelle and of the Common Council of Mount Vernon to cross the streets within the limits of these cities. By the order of the Supreme Court of Westchester County it has received authority to cross streets outside of the limits of cities within Westchester County.

That it has applied to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York for leave to cross streets in the Borough of The Bronx, which application is still pending before that Board.

Assuming that these facts are true, the question arises as to what is the conclusion to be drawn from them.

As to the failure of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad Company to attach the proper affidavit to its application, the defect might perhaps be cured by application to the Court, or, if the Court is without power, by a simple enabling act of the Legislature.

The receiver's sale of the corporate rights and property, however, presents a much more serious question.

The order under which the sale was made provided that the receiver should sell all the rights of said company, and all the rights, title and interest of the said company, legal or equitable, in and to the roadbed and right of way, and all its real estate, tracks and fixtures. It did not expressly specify its franchises. I understand that the railroad company attempts to make a distinction between the word "rights" and "franchises," and while admitting the sale of the former, claims that the latter did not pass by such sale. In my opinion, the distinction is a fine one and cannot be maintained. If, however, such a distinction does exist, it is not conclusive of this question.

The judgment under which the receiver was appointed decreed that he be appointed receiver of the rights, estates, franchises, credits and all the property of the said defendant of what nature or kind soever. These franchises undoubtedly passed to the receiver upon his appointment. Those here referred to are, of course, the franchises which constitute property and not the franchise to be a corporation, and the order, therefore, directing him to sell, and under which he did sell all the rights of the corporation, included all the franchises of the corporation constituting the property rights.

Among the rights which passed by such receiver's sale were the rights springing from the statutory location of the company's route, and since the sale the company, therefore, has no route and no change of its route could, therefore, be made, nor can it locate a new route under section 13 of the Railroad Law.

My conclusion, therefore, on this point is that the railroad company is left a mere corporation divested of all its property and franchises constituting property, and so without ability to change the route or to locate a new one.

The result of this conclusion is that the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad is in no position to locate and build a railroad, in the event that the consent for which they have applied to the Board of Aldermen should be granted.

As to the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, from the assumed facts it would appear that they have complied with all requirements of law, and are in a position to locate and construct a road as soon as the consent for which they have applied to the Board of Aldermen is granted.

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the said ordinance be amended as follows: By striking therefrom, in the 8th, 9th and 10th lines the words: "No building which, at the time of the passage of this Code, is not in actual use for theatrical or operatic purposes, and" and by striking therefrom, in the 5th line of section 2, "the words and figures "and on or before January 1, 1904"; also by inserting in the 4th line of section 2, between the words "purposes" and "for," the words "now erected or."

They therefore recommend that the ordinance, as so amended, be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to Amend Section One Hundred and Nine of the Building Code.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section one hundred and nine of the Building Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 109. Theatres and Places of Public Amusement.—Every theatre or opera house, or other building intended to be used for theatrical or operatic purposes, or for public entertainments of any kind, hereafter erected for the accommodation of more than three hundred persons shall be built to comply with the requirements of this section. [No building which, at the time of the passage of this Code is not in actual use for theatrical or operatic purposes, and] no building hereafter erected not in conformity with the requirements of this section, shall be used for theatrical or operatic purposes, or for public entertainments of any kind, until the same shall have been made to conform to the requirements of this section. And no building hereinbefore described shall be opened to the public for theatrical or operatic purposes, or for public entertainments of any kind, until the Department of Buildings and the Fire Commissioner shall have approved the same in writing as conforming to the requirements of this section. Every such building shall have at least one front on the street, and in such front there shall be suitable means of entrance and exit for the audience, not less than twenty-five feet in width. In addition to the aforesaid entrances and exits on the street there shall be reserved for service in case of an emergency an open court or space in the rear and on the side not bordering on the street, where said building is located on a corner lot; and in the rear and on both sides of said building, where there is but one frontage on the street as hereinafter provided. The width of such open court or courts shall be not less than (seven) ten feet where the seating capacity is not over one thousand people, above one thousand and not more than eighteen hundred people (eight) twelve feet in width, and above eighteen hundred people (ten) fourteen feet in width. Said open court or courts shall (begin on a line with or near the proscenium wall, and shall extend the length of the auditorium proper to or near the wall separating the same from the entrance lobby or vestibule) extend the full length and height of the building and across on each side and rear thereof where its sides or side does not abut on a street or alley, and shall be of the same width at all points, and exits hereinafter specified shall lead into such open courts. (A separate and distinct corridor shall continue to the street from each open court through such superstructure as may be built on the street side of the auditorium, with continuous walls of brick or fireproof materials on each side the entire length of said corridor or corridors, and the ceiling and floors shall be fireproof. Said corridor or corridors shall not be reduced in width to more than three feet less than the width of the open court or courts, and there shall be no projection in the same; the outer openings to be provided with doors or gates opening toward the street.) During the performance the doors or gates in the corridors shall be kept open by proper fastenings; at other times they may be closed and fastened by movable bolts or locks. The said open courts and corridors shall not be used for storage purposes, or for any purpose whatsoever except for exit and entrance from and to

the auditorium and stage, and must be kept free and clear during performances. The level of said corridors at the front entrance to the building shall be not greater than one step above the level of the sidewalk where they begin at the street entrance. The entrance of the main front of the building shall be not on a higher level from the sidewalk than four steps, unless approved by the Department of Buildings. To overcome any difference of level in and between courts, corridors, lobbies, passages and aisles on the ground floor, gradients shall be employed of not over one foot in twelve feet, with no perpendicular rises. From the auditorium opening into the said open courts or on the side street, there shall be not less than two exits on each side in each tier from and including the parquet and each and every gallery. Each exit shall be at least five feet in width in the clear and provided with doors of iron or wood; if of wood, the doors shall be constructed as hereinbefore in this code described. All of said doors shall open outward, and shall be fastened with movable bolts, the bolts to be kept drawn during performances. There shall be balconies not less than (four) six feet in width in the said open court or courts at each level or tier above the parquet, on each side of the auditorium, of sufficient length to embrace the two exits, and from said balconies there shall be staircases extending to the ground level, with a rise of not over eight and one-half inches to a step and not less than nine inches tread, exclusive of the nosing. The staircase from the upper balcony to the next below shall be not less than (thirty-six) forty-eight inches in width in the clear, and from the first balcony to the ground (three) four feet in width in the clear where the seating capacity of the auditorium is for one thousand people or less (three feet and six inches) four feet six inches in the clear where above one thousand and not more than eighteen hundred people, and five feet in the clear where above eighteen hundred people and not more than twenty-five hundred people, and not over five feet six inches in the clear where above twenty-five hundred people. All the before-mentioned balconies and staircases shall be constructed of iron throughout, including the floors, and of ample strength to sustain the load to be carried by them, and they shall be covered with a metal hood or awning, to be constructed in such manner as shall be approved by the Department of Buildings. Where one side of the building borders on the street, there shall be balconies and staircases of like capacity and kind, as before mentioned, carried to the ground. When located on a corner lot, that portion of the premises bordering on the side street and not required for the uses of the theatre may, if such portion be not more than twenty-five feet in width, be used for offices, stores or apartments, provided the walls separating this portion from the theatre proper are carried up solidly to and through the roof, and that a fireproof exit is provided for the theatre on each tier, equal to the combined width of exits opening on opposite sides in each tier, communicating with balconies and staircases leading to the street in manner provided elsewhere in this section; said exit passages shall be entirely cut off by brick walls from said offices, stores or apartments, and the floors and ceilings in each tier shall be fireproof. Nothing herein contained shall prevent a roof garden, art gallery or rooms for similar purposes being placed above a theatre or public building, provided the floor of the same forming the roof over such theatre or building shall be constructed of iron or steel and fireproof materials, and that said floor shall have no covering boards or sleepers of wood, but be of tile or cement. Every roof over said garden or rooms shall have all supports and rafters of iron or steel, and be covered with glass or fireproof materials, or both, but no such roof garden, art gallery or room for any public purpose shall be placed over or above that portion of any theatre or other building which is used as a stage. No workshop, storage or general property room shall be allowed above the auditorium or stage, or under the same, or in any of the fly galleries. All of said rooms or shops may be located in the rear or at the side of the stage, but in such cases they shall be separated from the stage by a brick wall, and the openings leading into said portions shall have fireproof doors on each side of the openings, hung to iron eyes built into the wall. No portion of any building hereafter erected or altered, used or intended to be used for theatrical or other purposes as in this section specified, shall be occupied or used as a hotel, boarding or lodging house, factory, workshop or manufactory, or for storage purposes, except as may be hereafter specially provided for. Said restriction relates not only to that portion of the building which contains the auditorium and the stage, but applies also to the entire structure in conjunction therewith. No store or room contained in the building, or the offices, stores or apartments adjoining, as aforesaid, shall be let or used for carrying on any business, dealing and articles designated as specially hazardous in the classification of the New York Board of Fire Underwriters, or for manufacturing purposes. No lodging accommodations shall be allowed in any part of the building communicating with the auditorium. Interior walls built of fireproofing materials shall separate the auditorium from the entrance vestibule, and from any room or rooms over the same, also from lobbies, corridors, refreshment or other rooms. All staircases for the use of the audience shall be inclosed with walls of brick, or of fireproof materials approved by the Department of Buildings, in the stories through which they pass, and the openings to said staircases from each tier shall be the full width of said staircase. No door shall open immediately upon a flight of stairs, but a landing at least the width of the door shall be provided between such stairs and such door. A firewall, built of brick, shall separate the auditorium from the stage. The same shall extend at least four feet above the stage roof, or the auditorium roof, if the latter be the higher, and shall be coped. Above the proscenium opening there shall be an iron girder of sufficient strength to safely support the load above, and the same shall be covered with fireproof materials to protect it from the heat. Should there be constructed an orchestra over the stage, above the proscenium opening, the said orchestra shall be placed on the auditorium side of the proscenium fire-wall, and shall be entered only from the auditorium side of said wall. The moulded frame around the proscenium opening shall be formed entirely of fire-proof materials; if metal be used, the metal shall be filled in solid with non-combustible material and securely anchored to the wall with iron. The proscenium opening shall be provided with a fire-proof metal curtain, or a curtain of asbestos or other fire-proof material approved by the Department of Buildings, sliding at each end within iron grooves, securely fastened to the brick wall and extending into such grooves to a depth not less than six inches on each side of the opening. Said fire-proof curtain shall be raised at the commencement of each performance and lowered at the close of said performance, and be operated by approved machinery for that purpose. The proscenium curtains shall be placed at least three feet distant from the footlights at the nearest point. No doorway or opening through the proscenium wall, from the auditorium, shall be allowed above the level of the first floor, and such first floor openings shall have fire-proof doors on each face of the wall, and the doors shall be hung so as to be opened from either side at all times. There shall be provided over the stage, metal skylights of an area or combined area of at least one-eighth the area of said stage, fitted up with sliding sash and glazed with double thick sheet glass not exceeding one-twelfth of an inch thick, and each pane thereof measuring not less than 300 square inches, and the whole of which sky-light shall be so constructed as to open instantly on the cutting or burning of a hempen cord, which shall be arranged to hold said sky-lights closed, or some other equally simple approved device for opening them may be provided. Immediately underneath the glass of said sky-lights there shall be wire netting, but wire glass shall not be used in lieu of this requirement. All that portion of the stage not comprised in the working of scenery, traps and other mechanical apparatus for the presentation of a scene, usually equal to the width of the proscenium opening, shall be built of iron or steel beams filled in between with fire-proof material, and all girders for the support of said beams shall be of wrought iron or rolled steel. The fly galleries entire, including pin rails, shall be constructed of iron or steel, and the floors of said galleries shall be composed of iron or steel beams, filled with fire-proof materials, and no wood boards or sleepers shall be used as covering over beams, but the said floors shall be entirely fire-proof. The rigging loft shall be fire-proof. All stage scenery, curtains and decorations made of combustible material, and all woodwork on or about the stage shall be painted or saturated with some non-combustible material, or otherwise rendered safe against fire, and the finishing coats of paint applied to all wood work through the entire building shall be of such kind as will resist fire to the satisfaction of the Department of Buildings. The roof over the auditorium and the entire main floor of the auditorium and vestibule, also the entire floor of the second story of the front superstructure over the entrance, lobby and corridors, and all galleries and supports for the same in the auditorium shall be constructed of iron or steel and fireproof materials, not excluding the use of wood floorboards and necessary sleepers to fasten the same to, but such sleepers shall not mean timbers of support, and the

space between the sleepers, excepting a portion under the stepping in the galleries, which shall be properly fire-stopped, shall be solidly filled with incombustible material up to under side of the floor boards. The fronts of each gallery shall be formed of fireproof materials, except the capping, which may be made of wood. The ceiling under each gallery shall be entirely formed of fireproof materials. The ceiling of the auditorium shall be formed of fireproof materials. All lathing, whenever used, shall be of wire or other metal. The partitions in that portion of the building which contains the auditorium, the entrance and vestibule and every room and passage devoted to the use of the audience shall be constructed of fireproof materials, including the furring of outside or other walls. None of the walls or ceilings shall be covered with wood sheathing, canvas or any combustible material. But this shall not exclude the use of wood wainscoting to a height not to exceed six feet, which shall be filled in solid between the wainscoting and the wall with fireproof materials. The walls separating the actors' dressing rooms from the stage and the partitions dividing the dressing rooms, together with the partitions of every passageway from the same to the stage, and all other partitions on or about the stage, shall be constructed of fireproof material approved by the Department of Buildings. All doors in any of said partitions shall be fireproof. All shelving and cupboards in each and every dressing room, property room or other storage rooms shall be constructed of metal, slate or some fireproof material. Dressing rooms may be placed in the fly galleries provided that proper exits are secured therefrom to the fire escapes in the open courts, and that the partitions and other matters pertaining to dressing rooms shall conform to the requirements herein contained, but the stairs leading to the same shall be fireproof. All dressing rooms shall have an independent exit leading directly into a court or street, and shall be ventilated by windows in the external walls; and no dressing room shall be (more than one story) below the street level. All windows shall be arranged to open, and none of the windows in outside walls shall have fixed sashes, iron grills or bars. All seats in the auditorium, excepting those contained in boxes, shall be not less than thirty-two inches from back to back, measured in a horizontal direction, and firmly secured to the floor. No seat in the auditorium shall have more than six seats intervening between it and an aisle on either side. No stool or seat shall be placed in any aisle. All platforms in galleries formed to receive the seats shall not be more than 21 inches in height of riser, nor less than 32 inches in width of platform. All aisles on the respective floors in the auditorium (having seats on both sides of same) shall be not less than three feet wide where they begin, and shall be increased in width towards the exits in a ratio of one and one-half inches to five running feet. (Aisles having seats on one side only shall be not less than two feet wide at their beginning and increased in width the same as aisles having seats on both sides.) The aggregate capacity of the foyers, lobbies, corridors, passages and rooms for the use of the audience, not including aisles spaced between seats, shall (on each floor or gallery, be sufficient to contain the entire number to be accommodated on said floor or gallery, in the ratio of one hundred and fifty superficial feet of floor room for every one hundred persons) on the first or main floor where the seating capacity exceeds 500 or more, be at least 16 feet clear, back of the last row of seats, and on each balcony or gallery at least 12 feet clear of the last row of seats. Gradients or inclined planes shall be employed instead of steps where possible to overcome slight difference of level in or between aisles, corridors and passages. Every theatre accommodating three hundred persons shall have at least two exits; when accommodating five hundred persons, at least three exits shall be provided; these exits not referring to or including the exits to the open court at the side of the theatre. Doorways of exit or entrance for the use of the public shall be not less than five feet in width, and for every additional one hundred persons or portions thereof to be accommodated, in excess of five hundred, an aggregate of twenty inches additional exit width must be allowed. All doors of exit or entrance shall open outwardly and be hung to swing in such a manner as not to become an obstruction in a passage or corridor, and no such doors shall be closed and locked during any representation, or when the building is open to the public. Distinct and separate places of exit and entrance shall be provided for each gallery above the first. A common place of exit and entrance may serve for the main floor of the auditorium and the first gallery, provided its capacity be equal to the aggregate capacity of the outlets from the main floor and the said gallery. No passage leading to any stairway communicating with any entrance or exit shall be less than four feet in width in any part thereof. All stairs within the building shall be constructed of fireproof material throughout. Stairs from balconies and galleries shall not communicate with the basement or cellar. All stairs shall have treads of uniform width and risers of uniform height throughout in each flight. Stairways serving for the exit of fifty people shall be at least four feet wide between railings or between walls, and for every additional fifty people to be accommodated six inches must be added to their width. The width of all stairs shall be measured in the clear between hand rails. In no case shall the risers of any stairs exceed seven and a half inches in height, nor shall the treads, exclusive of nosings, be less than ten and one-half inches wide in straight stairs. No circular or winding stairs for the use of the public shall be permitted. Where the seating capacity is for more than one thousand people, there shall be at least two independent staircases, with direct exterior outlets, provided for each gallery in the auditorium, where there are not more than two galleries, and the same shall be located on opposite sides of said galleries. Where there are more than two galleries one or more additional staircases shall be provided, the outlets from which shall communicate directly with the principal exit or other exterior outlets. All said staircases shall be of width proportionate to the seating capacity as elsewhere herein prescribed. Where the seating capacity is for one thousand people, or less, two direct lines of staircases only shall be required, located on opposite sides of the galleries, and in both cases shall extend from the sidewalk level to the upper gallery, with outlets from each gallery to each of said staircases. At least two independent staircases, with direct exterior outlets, shall also be provided for the service of the stage and shall be located on the opposite sides of the same. All inside stairways leading to the upper galleries of the auditorium shall be inclosed on both sides with walls of fireproof materials. Stairs leading to the first or lower gallery may be left open on one side, in which case they shall be constructed as herein provided for similar stairs leading from the entrance hall to the main floor of the auditorium. But in no case shall stairs leading to any gallery be left open on both sides. When straight stairs return directly on themselves, a landing of the full width of both flights, without any steps, shall be provided. The outer line of landings shall be curved to a radius of not less than two feet, to avoid square angles. Stairs turning at an angle shall have a proper landing without winders introduced at said turn. In stairs, when two side flights connect with one main flight, no winders shall be introduced, and the width of the main flight shall be at least equal to the aggregate width of the side flights. All stairs shall have proper landings introduced at convenient distances. All inclosed staircases shall have, on both sides, strong hand-rails firmly secured to the wall about three inches distant therefrom and about three feet above the stairs, but said hand-rails shall not run on level platforms and landings where the same is more in length than the width of the stairs. All staircases eight feet and over in width shall be provided with a centre hand-rail of metal, not less than two inches in diameter, placed at a height of about three feet above the centre of the treads, and supported on wrought metal or brass standards of sufficient strength, placed not nearer than four feet nor more than six feet apart, and securely bolted to the treads or risers of stairs, or both, and at the head of each flight of stairs, on each landing, the post or standard shall be at least six feet in height, to which the rail shall be secured. Every steam boiler which may be required for heating or other purposes shall be located outside of the building, and the space allotted to the same shall be inclosed by walls of masonry on all sides, and the ceiling of such space shall be constructed of fireproof materials. All doorways in said walls shall have fireproof doors. No floor register for heating shall be permitted. No coil or radiator shall be placed in any aisle or passageway used as an exit, but all said coils and radiators shall be placed in recesses formed in the wall or partition to receive the same. All supply, return or exhaust pipes shall be properly incased and protected where passing through floors or near woodwork. Standpipes four inches in diameter shall be provided with hose attachments on every floor and gallery, as follows, namely: One on each side of the auditorium in each tier, also on each side of the stage in each tier, and at least one in the property room and one in the carpenter's shop, if the same be contiguous to the building. All such

stand pipes shall be kept clear from obstruction. Said stand pipes shall be separate and distinct, receiving their supply of water direct from the power pump or pumps, and shall be fitted with the regulation couplings of the Fire Department, and shall be kept constantly filled with water by means of an automatic power pump or pumps, of sufficient capacity to supply all the lines of hose when operated simultaneously, and said pump or pumps shall be supplied from the street main and be ready for immediate use at all times during a performance in said building. In addition to the requirements contained in this section, the standpipes shall also conform to the requirements contained in section 102 of this Code. A separate and distinct system of automatic sprinklers, with fusible plugs, approved by the Department of Buildings, supplied with water from a tank located on the roof over the stage and not connected in any manner with the standpipes, shall be placed each side of the proscenium opening and on the ceiling or roof over the stage at such intervals as will protect every square foot of stage surface when said sprinklers are in operation. Automatic sprinklers shall also be placed, wherever practicable, in the dressing rooms, under the stage and in the carpenter shop, paint rooms, store rooms and property room. A proper and sufficient quantity of two and one-half inch hose, not less than one hundred feet in length, fitted with the regulation couplings of the Fire Department and with nozzles attached thereto, and with hose spanners at each outlet, shall always be kept attached to each hose attachment as the Fire Commissioner may direct. There shall also be kept in readiness for immediate use on the stage, at least four casks full of water, and two buckets to each cask. Said casks and buckets shall be painted red. There shall also be provided hand pumps or other portable fire extinguishing apparatus and at least four axes and two twenty-five-foot hooks, two fifteen-foot hooks, and two ten-foot hooks on each tier or floor of the stage. Every portion of the building devoted to the uses or accommodation of the public, also all outlets leading to the streets and including the open courts and corridors, shall be well and properly lighted during every performance, and the same shall remain lighted until the entire audience has left the premises. All gas or electric lights in the halls, corridors, lobby or any other part of said buildings used by the audience, except the auditorium, must be controlled by a separate shut-off, located in the lobby, and controlled only in that particular place. Gas mains supplying the building shall have independent connections for the auditorium and the stage, and provision shall be made for shutting off the gas from the outside of the building. When interior gas lights are not lighted by electricity other suitable appliances, to be approved by the Department of Buildings, shall be provided. All suspended or bracket lights surrounded by glass in the auditorium, or in any part of the building devoted to the public, shall be provided with proper wire-netting underneath. No gas or electric light shall be inserted in the walls, woodwork, ceilings, or in any part of the building, unless protected by fireproof materials. All lights in passages and corridors in said buildings, and wherever deemed necessary by the Department of Buildings, shall be protected with proper wire network. The footlights, in addition to the wire network, shall be protected with a strong wire guard and chain, placed not less than two feet distant from said footlights, and the trough containing said footlights shall be formed of and surrounded by fireproof materials. All border lights shall be constructed according to the best known methods, and subject to the approval of the Department of Buildings, and shall be suspended for ten feet by wire rope. All ducts or shafts used for conducting heated air from the main chandelier, or from any other light or lights, shall be constructed of metal and made double, with an air space between. All stage lights shall have strong metal wire guards or screens, not less than ten inches in diameter, so constructed that any material in contact therewith shall be out of reach of the flames of said stage lights and must be soldered to the fixture in all cases. The standpipes, gaspipes, electric wires, hose, footlights, and all apparatus for the extinguishing of fire or guarding against the same, as in this section specified, shall be in charge and under control of the Fire Department, and the Commissioner of said Department is hereby directed to see that the arrangements in respect thereto are carried out and enforced. A diagram or plan of each tier, gallery or floor, showing distinctly the exits therefrom, each occupying a space not less than fifteen square inches, shall be printed in black lines in a legible manner on the programme of the performance. Every exit shall have over the same on the inside the word "Exit" painted in legible letters not less than eight inches high.

Section 2. The provisions of the foregoing section shall not be construed to mean or made to apply to any theatre, opera house or building intended to be used for theatrical or operatic purposes, now erected or for which plans have heretofore (and on or before January 1, 1904) been approved by the Superintendent of Buildings.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they therefore recommend that the annexed substitute ordinance be adopted.

SUBSTITUTE REPORT.

AN ORDINANCE to Amend Section One Hundred and Nine of the Building Code.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section one hundred and nine of the Building Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 109. Theatres and Places of Public Amusement.—Every theatre or opera house, or other building intended to be used for theatrical or operatic purposes, or for public entertainment of any kind, hereafter erected for the accommodation of more than three hundred persons shall be built to comply with the requirements of this section. No building which, at the time of the passage of this Code is not in actual use for theatrical or operatic purposes, and no building hereafter erected not in conformity with the requirements of this section, shall be used for theatrical or operatic purposes, or for public entertainments of any kind, until the same shall have been made to conform to the requirements of this section. And no building hereinbefore described shall be opened to the public for theatrical or operatic purposes, or for public entertainments of any kind, until the Department of Buildings and the Fire Commissioner shall have approved the same in writing as conforming to the requirements of this section. Every such building shall have at least one front on the street, and in such front there shall be suitable means of entrance and exit for the audience, not less than twenty-five feet in width. In addition to the aforesaid entrances and exits on the street there shall be reserved for service in case of an emergency an open court or space in the rear and on the side not bordering on the street, where said building is located on a corner lot; and in the rear and on both sides of said building, where there is but one frontage on the street as hereinbefore provided. The width of such open court or courts shall be not less than (seven) ten feet where the seating capacity is not over one thousand people, above one thousand and not more than eighteen hundred people (eight) twelve feet in width, and above eighteen hundred people (ten) fourteen feet in width. Said open court or courts shall (begin on a line with or near the proscenium wall, and shall extend the length of the auditorium proper to or near the wall separating the same from the entrance lobby or vestibule) extend the full length and height of the building and across on each side and rear thereof where its sides or side does not abut on a street or alley, and shall be of the same width at all points, and exits hereafter specified shall lead into such open courts. (A separate and distinct corridor shall continue to the street from each open court through such superstructure as may be built on the street side of the auditorium, with continuous walls of brick or fireproof materials on each side the entire length of said corridor or corridors, and the ceiling and floors shall be fireproof. Said corridor or corridors shall not be reduced in width to more than three feet less than the width of the open court or courts, and there shall be no projection in the same; the outer openings to be provided with doors or gates opening toward the street.) During the performance the doors or gates in the corridors shall

be kept open by proper fastenings; at other times they may be closed and fastened by movable bolts or blocks. The said open courts and corridors shall not be used for storage purposes, or for any purpose whatsoever except for exit and entrance from and to the auditorium and stage, and must be kept free and clear during performances. The level of said corridors at the front entrance to the building shall be not greater than one step above the level of the sidewalk where they begin at the street entrance. The entrance of the main front of the building shall be not on a higher level from the sidewalk than four steps, unless approved by the Department of Buildings. To overcome any difference of level in and between courts, corridors, lobbies, passages and aisles on the ground floor, gradients shall be employed of not over one foot in twelve feet, with no perpendicular rises. From the auditorium opening into the said open courts or on the side street, there shall be not less than two exits on each side in each tier from and including the parquet and each and every gallery. Each exit shall be at least five feet in width in the clear and provided with doors of iron or wood; if of wood, the doors shall be constructed as hereinbefore in this code described. All of said doors shall open outwardly, and shall be fastened with movable bolts, the bolts to be kept drawn during performances. There shall be balconies not less than (four) six feet in width in the said open court or courts at each level or tier above the parquet, on each side of the auditorium, of sufficient length to embrace the two exits, and from said balconies there shall be staircases extending to the ground level, with a rise of not over eight and one-half inches to a step and not less than nine inches tread, exclusive of the nosing. The staircase from the upper balcony to the next below shall be not less than (thirty-six) forty-eight inches in width in the clear, and from the first balcony to the ground (three) four feet in width in the clear where the seating capacity of the auditorium is for one thousand people or less (three feet and six inches) four feet six inches in the clear where above one thousand and not more than eighteen hundred people, and five feet in the clear where above eighteen hundred people and not more than twenty-five hundred people, and not over five feet six inches in the clear where above twenty-five hundred people. All the before-mentioned balconies and staircases shall be constructed of iron throughout, including the floors, and of ample strength to sustain the load to be carried by them, and they shall be covered with a metal hood or awning, to be constructed in such manner as shall be approved by the Department of Buildings. Where one side of the building borders on the street, there shall be balconies and staircases of like capacity and kind, as before mentioned, carried to the ground. When located on a corner lot, that portion of the premises bordering on the side street and not required for the uses of the theatre may, if such portion be not more than twenty-five feet in width, be used for offices, stores or apartments, provided the walls separating this portion from the theatre proper are carried up solidly to and through the roof, and that a fireproof exit is provided for the theatre on each tier, equal to the combined width of exits opening on opposite sides in each tier, communicating with balconies and staircases leading to the street in manner provided elsewhere in this section; said exit passages shall be entirely cut off by brick walls from said offices, stores or apartments, and the floors and ceilings in each tier shall be fireproof. Nothing herein contained shall prevent a roof garden, art gallery or rooms for similar purposes being placed above a theatre or public building, provided the floor of the same forming the roof over such theatre or building shall be constructed of iron or steel and fireproof materials, and that said floor shall have no covering boards or sleepers of wood, but be of tile or cement. Every roof over said garden or rooms shall have all supports and rafters of iron or steel, and be covered with glass or fireproof materials, or both, but no such roof garden, art gallery or room for any public purpose shall be placed over or above that portion of any theatre or other building which is used as a stage. No workshop, storage or general property room shall be allowed above the auditorium or stage, or under the same or in any of the fly galleries. All of said rooms or shops may be located in the rear or at the side of the stage, but in such cases they shall be separated from the stage by a brick wall, and the openings leading into said portions shall have fireproof doors on each side of the openings, hung to iron eyes built into the wall. There shall be provided over the stage, metal skylights of an area or combined area of at least one-eighth the area of said stage, fitted up with sliding sash and glazed with double thick sheet glass not exceeding one-twelfth of an inch thick, and each pane thereof measuring not less than 300 square inches, and the whole of which skylight shall be so constructed as to open instantly on the cutting or burning of a hempen cord, which shall be arranged to hold said skylights closed, or some other equally simple approved device for opening them may be provided. Immediately underneath the glass of said skylights there shall be wire netting, but wire glass shall not be used in lieu of this requirement. All that portion of the stage not comprised in the working of scenery, traps and other mechanical apparatus for the presentation of a scene, usually equal to the width of the proscenium opening, shall be built of iron or steel beams filled in between with fire-proof material, and all girders for the support of said beams shall be of wrought iron or rolled steel. The fly galleries entire, including pin rails, shall be constructed of iron or steel, and the floors of said galleries shall be composed of iron or steel beams, filled with fire-proof materials, and no wood boards or sleepers shall be used as covering over beams, but the said floors shall be entirely fire-proof. The rigging loft shall be fire-proof. All stage scenery, curtains and decorations made of combustible material, and all wood-work on or about the stage shall be painted or saturated with some non-combustible material, or otherwise rendered safe against fire, and the finishing coats of paint applied to all wood work through the entire building shall be of such kind as will resist fire to the satisfaction of the Department of Buildings. The roof over the auditorium and the entire main floor of the auditorium and vestibule, also the entire floor of the second story of the front superstructure over the entrance, lobby and corridors, and all galleries and supports for the same in the auditorium shall be constructed of iron or steel and fire-proof materials, not excluding the use of wood floorboards and necessary sleepers to fasten the same to, but such sleepers

shall not mean timbers of support, and the space between the sleepers, excepting a portion under the stepping in the galleries, which shall be properly fire-stopped, shall be solidly filled with incombustible material up to under side of the floor boards. The fronts of each gallery shall be formed of fire-proof materials, except the capping, which may be made of wood. The ceiling under each gallery shall be entirely formed of fire-proof materials. All lathing, whenever used, shall be of wire or other metal. The partitions in that portion of the building which contains the auditorium, the entrance and vestibule and every room and passage devoted to the use of the audience shall be constructed of fire-proof materials, including the furring of outside or other walls. None of the walls or ceilings shall be covered with wood sheathing, canvas or any combustible material. But this shall not exclude the use of wood wainscoting to a height not to exceed six feet, which shall be filled in solid between the wainscoting and the wall with fire-proof materials. The walls separating the actors' dressing rooms from the stage and the partitions dividing the dressing rooms, together with the partitions of every passageway from the same to the stage, and all other partitions on or about the stage, shall be constructed of fire-proof material approved by the Department of Buildings. All doors in any of said partitions shall be fireproof. All shelving and cupboards in each and every dressing room, property room or other storage rooms shall be constructed of metal, slate or some fire-proof material. Dressing rooms may be placed in the fly galleries provided that proper exits are secured therefrom to the fire escapes in the open courts, and that the partitions and other matters pertaining to dressing rooms shall conform to the requirements herein contained, but the stairs leading to the same shall be fireproof. All dressing rooms shall have an independent exit leading directly into a court or street, and shall be ventilated by windows in the external walls; and no dressing room shall be (more than one story) below the street level. All windows shall be arranged to open, and none of the windows in outside walls shall have fixed sashes, iron grills or bars. All seats in the auditorium, excepting those contained in boxes, shall be not less than thirty-two inches from back to back, measured in a horizontal direction, and firmly secured to the floor. No seat in the auditorium shall have more than six seats intervening between it and an aisle on either side. No stool or seat shall be placed in any aisle. All platforms in galleries formed to receive the seats shall not be more than 21 inches in height of riser, nor less than 32 inches in width of platform. All aisles on the respective floors in the auditorium (having seats on both sides of same) shall be not less than three feet wide where they begin, and shall be increased in width towards the exits in a ratio of one and one-half inches to five running feet. (Aisles having seats on one side only shall be not less than two feet wide at their beginning and increased in width the same as aisles having seats on both sides.) The (aggregate capacity of the) foyers, lobbies, corridors, passages and rooms for the use of the audience, not including aisles spaced between seats, shall (on each floor or gallery, be sufficient to contain the entire number to be accommodated on said floor or gallery, in the ratio of one hundred and fifty superficial feet of floor room for every one hundred persons) on the first or main floor where the seating capacity exceeds 500 or more, be at least 16 feet clear, back of the last row of seats, and on each balcony or gallery at least 12 feet clear of the last row of seats. Gradients or inclined planes shall be employed instead of steps where possible to overcome slight difference of level in or between aisles, corridors and passages. Every theatre accommodating three hundred persons shall have at least two exits; when accommodating five hundred persons, at least three exits shall be provided; these exits not referring to or including the exits to the open court at the side of the theatre. Doorways of exit or entrance for the use of the public shall be not less than five feet in width, and for every additional one hundred persons or portions thereof to be accommodated, in excess of five hundred, an aggregate of twenty inches additional exit width must be allowed. All doors of exit or entrance shall open outwardly and be hung to swing in such a manner as not to become an obstruction in a passage or corridor, and no such doors shall be closed and locked during any representation, or when the building is open to the public. Distinct and separate places of exit and entrance shall be provided for each gallery above the first. A common place of exit and entrance may serve for the main floor of the auditorium and the first gallery, provided its capacity be equal to the aggregate capacity of the outlets from the main floor and the said gallery. No passage leading to any stairway communicating with any entrance or exit shall be less than four feet in width in any part thereof. All stairs within the building shall be constructed of fireproof material throughout. Stairs from balconies and galleries shall not communicate with the basement or cellar. All stairs shall have treads of uniform width and risers of uniform height throughout in each flight. Stairways serving for the exit of fifty people shall be at least four feet wide between railings or between walls, and for every additional fifty people to be accommodated six inches must be added to their width. The width of all stairs shall be measured in the clear between hand-rails. In no case shall the risers of any stairs exceed seven and a half inches in height, nor shall the treads, exclusive of nosings, be less than ten and one-half inches wide in straight stairs. No circular or winding stairs for the use of the public shall be permitted. Where the seating capacity is for more than one thousand people, there shall be at least two independent staircases, with direct exterior outlets, provided for each gallery in the auditorium, where there are not more than two galleries, and the same shall be located on opposite sides of said galleries. Where there are more than two galleries one or more additional staircases shall be provided, the outlets from which shall communicate directly with the principal exit or other exterior outlets. All said staircases shall be of width proportionate to the seating capacity as elsewhere herein prescribed. Where the seating capacity is for one thousand people, or less, two direct lines of staircases only shall be required, located on opposite sides of the galleries, and in both cases shall extend from the sidewalk level to the upper gallery, with outlets from each gallery to each of said staircases. At least two independent staircases, with direct exterior outlets, shall also be provided for the service of the stage and shall be located on the opposite sides of the same. All inside stairways leading to the upper galleries of the auditorium shall be inclosed on both sides with walls of fireproof materials. Stairs leading to the first or lower gallery may be left open on one side, in which case they shall be constructed as herein provided for similar stairs leading from the entrance hall to the main floor of the auditorium. But in no case shall stairs leading to any gallery be left open on both sides. When straight stairs return directly on themselves, a landing of the full width of both flights, without any steps, shall be provided. The outer line of landings shall be curved to a radius of not less than two feet, to avoid square angles. Stairs turning at an angle shall have a proper landing without winders introduced at said turn. In stairs, when two side flights connect with one main flight, no winders shall be introduced, and the width of the main flight shall be at least equal to the aggregate width of the side flights. All stairs shall have proper landings introduced at convenient distances. All inclosed staircases shall have, on both sides, strong hand-rails firmly secured to the wall about three inches distant therefrom and about three feet above the stairs, but said hand-rails shall not run on level platforms and landings where the same is more in length than the width of the stairs. All staircases eight feet and over in width shall be provided with a centre hand-rail of metal, not less than two inches in diameter, placed at a height of about three feet above the centre of the treads, and supported on wrought metal or brass standards of sufficient strength, placed not nearer than four feet nor more than six feet apart, and securely bolted to the treads or risers of stairs, or both, and at the head of each flight of stairs, on each landing, the post or standard shall be at least six feet in height, to which the rail shall be secured. Every steam boiler which may be required for heating or other purposes shall be located outside of the building, and the space allotted to the same shall be inclosed by walls of masonry on all sides, and the ceiling of such space shall be constructed of fireproof materials. All doorways in said walls shall have fireproof doors. No floor register for heating shall be permitted. No coil or radiator shall be placed in any aisle or passageway used as an exit, but all said coils and radiators shall be placed in recesses formed in the wall or partition to receive the same. All supply, return or exhaust pipes shall be properly incased and protected where passing through floors or near woodwork. Standpipes four inches in diameter shall be provided with hose attachments on every floor and gallery as follows, namely: One on each side of the auditorium in each tier, also on each side of the stage in each tier, and at least one in the property room and one in the carpenter's shop, if the same be contiguous to the building. All such stand pipes shall be kept clear from obstruction. Said stand pipes shall be separate and distinct, receiving their supply of water direct from the power pump or pumps, and shall be fitted with the regulation couplings of the Fire Department, and shall be kept constantly filled with water by means of an automatic power pump or pumps, of sufficient capacity to supply all the lines of hose when operated simul-

taneously, and said pump or pumps shall be supplied from the street main and be ready for immediate use at all times during the performance in said building. In addition to the requirements contained in this section, the standpipes shall also conform to the requirements contained in section 102 of this Code. A separate and distinct system of automatic sprinklers, with fusible plugs, approved by the Department of Buildings, supplied with water from a tank located on the roof over the stage and not connected in any manner with the standpipes, shall be placed each side of the proscenium opening and on the ceiling or roof over the stage at such intervals as will protect every square foot of stage surface when said sprinklers are in operation. Automatic sprinklers shall also be placed, wherever practicable, in the dressing rooms, under the stage and in the carpenter shop, paint rooms, store rooms and property room. A proper and sufficient quantity of two and one-half inch hose, not less than one hundred feet in length, fitted with the regulation couplings of the Fire Department and with nozzles attached thereto, and with hose spanners at each outlet, shall always be kept attached to each hose attachment as the Fire Commissioner may direct. There shall also be kept in readiness for immediate use on the stage, at least four casks full of water, and two buckets to each cask. Said casks and buckets shall be painted red. There shall also be provided hand pumps or other portable fire extinguishing apparatus and at least four axes and two twenty-five-foot hooks, two fifteen-foot hooks, and two ten-foot hooks on each tier or floor of the stage. Every portion of the building devoted to the uses or accommodation of the public, also all outlets leading to the streets and including the open courts or corridors, shall be well and properly lighted during every performance, and the same shall remain lighted until the entire audience has left the premises. All gas or electric lights in the halls, corridors, lobby or any other part of said buildings used by the audience, except the auditorium, must be controlled by a separate shut-off, located in the lobby and controlled only in that particular place. Gas mains supplying the building shall have independent connections for the auditorium and the stage, and provision shall be made for shutting off the gas from the outside of the building. When interior gas lights are not lighted by electricity other suitable appliances, to be approved by the Department of Buildings, shall be provided. All suspended or bracket lights surrounded by glass in the auditorium, or in any part of the building devoted to the public, shall be provided with proper wire-netting underneath. No gas or electric light shall be inserted in the walls, woodwork, ceilings, or in any part of the building, unless protected by fire-proof materials. All lights in passages and corridors in said buildings, and wherever deemed necessary by the Department of Buildings shall be protected with proper wire network. The footlights, in addition to the wire network, shall be protected with a strong wire guard and chain, placed not less than two feet distant from said footlights, and the trough containing said footlights shall be formed of and surrounded by fireproof materials. All border lights shall be constructed according to the best known methods, and subject to the approval of the Department of Buildings, and shall be suspended for ten feet by wire rope. All ducts or shafts used for conducting heated air from the main chandelier, or from any other light or lights, shall be constructed of metal and made double, with an air space between. All stage lights shall have strong metal wire guards or screens, not less than ten inches in diameter, so constructed that any material in contact therewith shall be out of reach of the flames of said stage lights and must be soldered to the fixture in all cases. The standpipes, gas pipes, electric wires, hose, footlights, and all apparatus for the extinguishing of fire or guarding against the same, as in this section specified, shall be in charge and under control of the Fire Department, and the Commissioner of said Department is hereby directed to see that the arrangements in respect thereto are carried out and enforced. A diagram or plan of each tier, gallery or floor, showing distinctly the exits therefrom, each occupying a space not less than fifteen square inches, shall be printed in black lines in a legible manner on the programme of the performance. Every exit shall have over the same on the inside the word "Exit" painted in legible letters not less than eight inches high.

Section 2. The provisions of the foregoing section shall not be construed to mean or made to apply to any theatre, opera house, or building intended to be used for theatrical or operatic purposes, now erected or for which plans have heretofore been approved by the Superintendent of Buildings.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.


