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COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 2 o'clock p. m., Wednesday, March 31, 1909.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; James J. Martin, Chamberlain, and Patrick F. McGowan, President, Board of Aldermen.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to the assignment of premises at the northeast corner of Second avenue and First street, Borough of Manhattan, for the temporary use of the temporary additional part of the Court of Special Sessions:

March 27, 1909.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

Sir—The Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions, in a communication addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, states that he has been directed by the Justices of the Special Sessions Court of the First Division to request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to assign for the temporary use of said Court the court room formerly occupied as a municipal court, situated on the northeast corner of Second avenue and First street, Borough of Manhattan.

The purpose of the application was to enable the Justices to use said rooms for the holding of the extra part of the Court, as provided for by chapter 90 of the Laws of 1909. It is the desire of the Justices to open up this new part on the first Monday in April, and they therefore ask that this application be passed upon as soon as possible.

This court room is under a lease which began May 1, 1907, and which does not expire until May 1, 1912, and was surrendered by the Municipal Court during the year 1908.

This office is not in possession of chapter 90 of the Laws of 1909, as passed by the Legislature, and I assume that this is the same bill known as Assembly Bill 523, introductory number 499, introduced by C. F. Murphy February 8, 1909. The said bill so introduced states that on and after the passage of the act there will be a temporary additional part of the Court of Special Sessions, First Division, in the City of New York, to be held in like manner as the Court heretofore established in said Division, and with like jurisdiction. That said Court shall continue until the 30th day of November, 1909, unless it shall cease and determine before that date, as hereinafter provided. That within ten days after this act shall take effect the Mayor of the City of New York shall designate two City Magistrates of the First Division to sit in the Court of Special Sessions. * * * The Justices of the Court of Special Sessions of the First Division shall by rule assign the Justices and such City Magistrates as may be designated in accordance with the provisions of the law to sit in the several parts of the Court. The Justices of the Court of Special Sessions shall have power to appoint and remove a Deputy Clerk, a Stenographer, an Interpreter, two Clerks and three Process Servers and fix the salaries of the men so appointed. That the terms of the subordinates shall expire on the 30th day of November, 1909, unless sooner terminated as hereinafter provided. That if at any time prior to the 30th day of November,

1909, the Justices of the Court of Special Sessions shall certify to the Mayor that the number of bail cases awaiting trial in said Court has been reduced to 300, the Mayor shall withdraw the designation of the two Magistrates sitting in said Court, and the said temporary additional part of the Court shall cease and determine, also the employment of all subordinates.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall provide a suitable court room for the use of the temporary additional part. The officer, board, department * * * having such duties to perform shall provide suitable furniture, books, blanks, stationery * * *. The Comptroller of the City of New York, without the concurrence of any other board or body, shall make provision for the payment of the salaries by the sale of Special Revenue Bonds; such salaries shall be paid in the same manner as salaries of other subordinates, and the Comptroller shall in like manner provide for the necessary expenses of such additional part. The act shall take effect immediately.

The court room having already been provided heretofore by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and, as I understand, the seats and judicial bench and all other paraphernalia necessary to open proceedings are already in the building, there will be necessity only for the Comptroller to provide Revenue Bonds for a slight additional alteration, and the officer, board or department to provide furniture other than books, blanks, stationery and other articles necessary for the use of the Court.

The said court room on the northeast corner of Second avenue and First street having been turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund assign the rooms formerly occupied by the Municipal Court, on the northeast corner of Second avenue and First street, Borough of Manhattan, for the temporary use of the temporary additional part of the Court of Special Sessions of the First Division in the City of New York, in accordance with chapter 90 of the Laws of 1909.

Section 205 of the Charter provides that the "Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may by resolution assign the places where the several municipal courts shall be held within their respective districts, and may assign such place in said City as may to it seem most conducive to the public convenience for the holding of the Courts of Special and General Sessions, and upon the application of the Board of City Magistrates may designate additional places for the holding of magistrates' or police courts and jail delivery to be held in and for the City, notice of any change of the places of holding such courts shall, before the same takes effect, be published in the City Record and the corporation newspapers for a period of not less than two weeks. Said publication shall be made under the direction of the Comptroller."

Section 205 of the Charter does not state whether the advertisement for two weeks shall be prior to the opening of the Court under the designation or whether the Court may be in session during the running of the advertisement.

The act as submitted in this matter does not provide for a repeal of any laws heretofore adopted conflicting with this law, and whether this being a new part and not an old one, it will be necessary to provide for a publication in a newspaper for a period of any less than two weeks, is a matter for the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to determine. I see no harm in the advertising in any event, and would recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the Comptroller to cause said advertisement to be immediately published in the newspapers.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

Sir—In reply to a communication from N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy Comptroller and Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, bearing date March 20, 1909. He makes reference to the newly enacted statute, chapter 90 of the Laws of 1909, whereby the Mayor is authorized to designate two City Magistrates to sit temporarily in the Court of Special Sessions, and the fact that application has been made to use a building at Second avenue and First street for a court house of the temporary additional part of the Court.

After reading the provisions of section 205 of the Charter, which authorize the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to assign a place for the holding of the Court of Special Sessions, and which states that "notice of any change of the places of holding such courts shall, before the same takes effect, be published in the City Record and the corporation newspapers for a period of not less than two weeks," he desires me to advise on the following questions:

"(a) Whether the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund can designate the Court while the advertisement is running in the newspapers.

"(b) Whether the advertisement shall run and be completed before the Court can sit and act on the cases that come before it.

"(c) Whether this being a new part only, any advertisement is necessary."

The Deputy Comptroller adds that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are to meet on March 30 for the purpose of making such designation.

It may be that section 5 of chapter 90 of the Laws of 1909 operates as a repeal by implication of the provisions contained in section 205 of the Charter, so far as advertisements are necessary. Without deciding this point, however, I think the safest course to pursue would be for the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to meet and designate such place as to them may seem most convenient for holding the temporary additional part of the Court, and that the notices be immediately published, and such publication continue for a period of two weeks.

Whether the Court shall deem it legal to hear cases prior to the expiration of that period is a question which I think can safely be left to the Court itself.

I accordingly answer your first question in the affirmative and leave your second and third questions for the consideration of the Court.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 364 of article 4 of chapter 7 of part 1 of the Code of Ordinances relating to "Stands within the stoop lines, etc."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 364 of article 4 of chapter 7 of part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relating to "Stands within the stoop lines, etc.," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 364. Every such stand must be strictly within the stoop line and shall not be an obstruction to the free use of the sidewalk by the public, and shall not exceed the space of 6 feet long by 4 feet wide, except that in the case of bootblack stands a space not more than 3 feet wide and 4 feet long may be occupied by this ordinance shall be at the expense of the applicant and under the direction of the President of the Borough in which said stand is located. No person shall be permitted to sleep in any portion of the structure or hold more than one license. The Mayor, or Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, shall have power to transfer a permit or license to another location for the period of its unexpired term provided, however, that the application for such transfer shall be accompanied by the consent of the owner of the premises to which the proposed transfer is to be made and by the consent of the Alderman of the district in which said premises are located.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

defraying the necessary cost of establishing vocational schools and industrial training in connection with the public school system.

Turning over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the site heretofore acquired for school purposes on West Houston and Clarkson streets, between Varick and Hudson streets, Borough of Manhattan, title to which vested in the City on January 8, 1906, the surrender of said site being conditioned upon action being taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the immediate acquisition of the site heretofore selected on Macdougall and Sullivan streets, between West Houston and Bleeker streets, Borough of Manhattan, and further advising the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the foregoing action and earnestly requesting to proceed without delay in the matter of the acquisition of said last mentioned site on Macdougall and Sullivan streets, between West Houston and Bleeker streets, Borough of Manhattan, which was duly selected as a site for school purposes by the Board of Education on May 27, 1908.

Promoting William Epstein, Clerk in the office of the City Superintendent of Schools from grade 2 (\$600 per annum) to grade 2-B (\$900 per annum), subject to the rules and regulations of the Municipal Civil Service Commission (the grades specified being those which appear in the schedules of salaries and grades adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 13, 1907), and granting authority for the appointment of two first grade Clerks, at a salary of \$300 per annum each, in the office of the City Superintendent of Schools.

Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Supplies in appointing Thomas J. A. Conolly, of No. 41 Third avenue, Rockaway Park, Borough of Queens, whose name appears upon an eligible list certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission, as Typewriting Copyist in the Bureau of Supplies, the appointment taking effect March 10, 1909, and the compensation to be at the rate of \$1,050 per annum.

Amending section 70 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education so as to read as follows:

Sec. 70. To be eligible for license as Kindergarten Teacher the applicant must have one of the following qualifications:

(a) Graduation from a high school or academy having a course of not less than four years approved by the State Commissioner of Education and the completion of a course of professional training of at least two years, one of which has been devoted to the principles and practice of the kindergarten.

(b) Graduation from a high school or academy having a course of not less than four years approved by the State Commissioner of Education or the passing prior to September 1, 1911, of an academic examination, and the completion of a course of professional training of at least one year in the principles and practice of the kindergarten, together with two years' successful experience in kindergarten teaching.

Amending section 102 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education by adding thereto the following:

(c) The holding of a license as Teacher in vacation playgrounds or the possession of the qualifications required therefor.

Amending section 110 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education by adding thereto the following:

(e) The holding of a license as Assistant Teacher in vacation playgrounds, together with three years' successful experience in teaching in vacation playgrounds under the jurisdiction of the Board of Education.

(d) For manual training branches, the holding of a license as Teacher in the vacation schools or the possession of the qualifications required therefor.

Disapproving of Assembly Bill No. 904, entitled "An Act to amend the public health law in relation to vaccination of school children," and authorizing the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation, on behalf of the Board of Education, to take such action as it deems necessary to secure the defeat of said bill.

Requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take such action as may be necessary to effect the acquisition of title to the property by The City of New York for educational purposes, at North Portland avenue, Auburn place and North Elliott place, New York.

Approving the following recommendation of the Board of Superintendents:

That Elementary School 52, Borough of Queens, be discontinued, to take effect upon the opening of new Public School 56 and new Public School 90, Borough of Queens, and that the building now occupied in part by Public School 52 be set aside for the exclusive use of the Richmond Hill High School.

Retiring the following named persons submitted by the Board of Retirement under date of February 19, 1909, pursuant to the provisions of section 1092 of the Revised Charter as amended, such retirement to take effect September 1, 1909, the annuity in each case to be one-half of the salary at date of retirement, unless otherwise provided by law, and directing the Auditor of the Board of Education to compute the amount of annuity to which each of such persons is entitled, respectively:

Transferring, in accordance with the recommendation of the Board of Superintendents, all classes of the seventh and eighth year grades in Public School 49, Borough of Manhattan, to neighboring schools, as soon as possible; and requesting the Committee on Buildings to carry out the recommendation of the Board of Superintendents relative to the removal of the five old buildings in the rear of Public School 49, Borough of Manhattan, and to grading the site of the same for playground purposes, and also to provide regular classroom furniture as soon as possible for the rooms in the new addition to Public School 27, Borough of Manhattan.

Accepting the offer of the Art League of the Public Education Association to award a number of medals for "Fine Craftsmanship," with the thanks of the Board of Education, and referring the matter of arranging the details for the awarding of said medals to the Board of Superintendents.

Approving the following report of the Committee on High Schools and Training Schools, and directing that the same shall be printed in the minutes.

"The attention of your Committee on High Schools and Training Schools has been directed to expressions of dissatisfaction arising in the Borough of Brooklyn with the assignment of high school pupils to buildings. Particular complaint has been made by persons whose children have been applicants for admission to the Manual Training High School.

"Attention is directed, first, to the fact that the high school population of the Borough of Brooklyn has increased rapidly in the past few years, and the attendance in the high schools in that Borough is now far beyond the capacity of the buildings which have been provided. In February, 1909, it became necessary to open other and additional rooms, and on the last day of that month there were 3,500 high school pupils registered in annexes. The increase in the high school registration in Brooklyn during the past five terms, over each preceding term, has been, in succession, to date, 1,363, 349, 1,810, 1,171, 1,416.

"The register of the Manual Training High School has increased by terms as follows, to date: 2,189, 2,602, 2,444, 2,670, 2,809, 3,074."

The maximum seating capacity of the building is about 2,400. It is quite evident, therefore, that a large number of persons who have been applicants for admission must be assigned to some other building. The Board of Education at a recent meeting authorized the use of a school building upon Prospect avenue as an annex to this school, and of rooms not needed for other purposes in Public School 154. To these two annexes girls in the first high school year have been assigned. The reason for this assignment is found in the fact that the Manual Training High School Building is elaborately equipped and furnished with workshops for the manual training course for boys. No manual training is offered for girls during the first year.

The course for boys is a strictly manual training course, in which shopwork, etc., are required from the beginning of the first year. Girls have an option between two courses. Beginning with the second year, they may elect along manual training lines, or they may make their elections from subjects offered in the regular course. About one-half the girls in the school have made elections along the lines of the regular course. If attendance in the school were confined solely to boys and girls making manual training electives, the present building would be adequate to accommodate all. It has become necessary to determine whether the school shall serve a specific purpose, just as the Stuyvesant and the Commercial do, or whether it shall be simply a regional school.

In accordance with this general plan, all the boys who have applied for the manual training course have been admitted, and the number of boys now at work in this course is about 1,500. Shops are in use eight periods per day.

The buildings occupied as annexes to this school are safe and comfortable. New furniture is about to be installed in the Prospect avenue building. An inquiry made on the 9th of March, in these annexes, disclosed the fact that no girls are obliged to pay two car fares to reach the buildings. Should it be necessary to accommodate girls of the second year in either of the two buildings named, it will be possible for them to do the manual work there, as the manual training work for the second year is sewing.

Approving the action of the Committee on Buildings in accepting the resignation of Russell E. Hart, Architectural Draughtsman (designer), taking effect March 3, 1909.

"The lamented death of Mr. Charles M. Babcock, Principal of Public School 3, Borough of The Bronx, occurred on February 27, 1909.

"Mr. Babcock was first appointed as a Teacher on March 15, 1892, and as a Principal in September, 1904. This position he held until his death, being identified with the public school system for upward of seventeen years; his record, both as a Teacher and as a Principal, being uniformly excellent.

"The Board of Education desires to place on record an expression of its sorrow at the death of Mr. Babcock and of appreciation of his long and faithful services."
