Report for the Quarter ending March 31, 1911.

Report of the Secretary.

May 10, 1911.

Hon. MICHAEL J. DRUMMOND, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I herewith submit the report of the Secretary for the quarter ending March 31, 1911:

Census.

The average daily census of patients in the hospitals, schools for the feeble-minded, asylums, homes for the aged and infirm and other institutions of the Department for this quarter has been 11,024, as against 10,057 for the corresponding period of the preceding year.

The average daily census of employees in the Department during the quarter was 2,542, including therein the nurses of the different institutions, their average daily census being 351 during this period.

The following table shows the causes and number of changes among the employees during the quarter: Appointments, 1,077; promotions, 192; resignations, 392; transfers, 35; dismissals, 598; total, 2,294.

Administrative Improvements.

On Feb. 8, 1911, General Order No. 221 was issued re: Bureau of Mechanics putting said Bureau under the control and supervision of the Department Architects with authority to draw up any forms or orders necessary for the proper transaction of the business of this Bureau.

On March 15, 1911, General Order No. 223 was issued re: Property of discharged patients, being to the effect that all unclaimed money or articles belonging to patients discharged from the institutions under the jurisdiction of this Department and being in its care for a period of six months or longer be declared abandoned and inventoried every six months, during the months of June and December, and transferred to the custody of the Property Clerk of the Police Department pursuant to provisions of section 331 of the Greater New York Charter.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment

Request for amendment of corporate stock of Sea View Hospital.

On March 9, 1911, request was made for amending the corporate stock issues for the completion of the Sea View Hospital granted this Department on Nov. 19, 1909, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the sum of \$1,350,000.

The work of constructing these buildings is so interwoven that it is difficult, if not impossible, to determine with any degree of accuracy just how much would be properly chargeable against each of the subdivisions embodied in the original resolution. Therefore this amendment was requested to allow the construction of these buildings and the heating, lighting, etc., to complete six ward buildings under one general appropriation in the sum of \$1,350,000. No action was taken on this request during this quarter.

Proposed New General City Hospital.

On March 20, 1911, request was made for the issue of corporate stock in the sum of \$1,125,000 for the construction of a new general City Hospital to be a modern, complete and sensible plant and to be built on Blackwells Island. The plan contemplated is a hospital structure of four pavilions or buildings for ward purposes; eight wards and eight small rooms on a floor or forty wards and forty small rooms in the building which will be of ample proportions and five stories in height with proper roof gardens for outlook and sunshine. Fourteen beds to be in each ward and two in each small room, which gives a capacity of 640 beds, there being suitable offices, lavatories, elevators and operating rooms.

The plan complete to have nine buildings, the capacity of each proportionate to its work in relation to the patients in the main structure. There will be a nurses' home, lodgings for help, administration building, pathological bureau and laundry building. The cost per bed is about \$1,757, and is a low cost record for buildings for this purpose, the whole to be completed by Christmas day, 1912.

No action was taken on this request this quarter.

Board of Aldermen.

Auto ambulance for East 70th street, Emergency Hospital Station.

On January 30, 1911, request was made for authority to purchase without public letting an automobile ambulance for the use of this Department at the new East 70th Street Emergency Hospital Station, at a price not to exceed \$2,500.

This station is to be opened May 1, 1911, and will be a great benefit to the east side as there is no public hospital on the Island of Manhattan between Bellevue Hospital (26th street and 1st avenue) and Harlem Hospital (137th street and Lenox avenue) on the east side of Central Park.

This permission was granted by the adoption of a resolution by the Board of Aldermen on March 14, 1911.

Additional Help.

On February 11, 1911, request was made for the issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$1,237.50 to pay for the employment of additional help needed in the Bureau of Dependent Adults and the Children's Bureau, all boroughs, which was approved by the Board of Aldermen on February 21, 1911, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment after March 31, 1911.

In General.

Russell Sage Institute of Pathology.

On January 3, 1911, special order No. 267 was issued re. this institution reading as follows:

"Re: Russell Sage Institute of Pathology, Blackwells Island.

"Ordered, That in so far as the Russell Sage Institute of Pathology acts as a City laboratory, that its work be placed under the supervision of the Medical Board of the City Hospital, and that a committee of the said Board composed of Dr. H. S. Stearns, Dr. Harlow Brooks and Dr. D. S. Dougherty, be designated to confer with the trustees of the Russell Sage Institute of Pathology, with the idea of continuing the future pathological work of the Institute under such conditions as will be satisfactory to all concerned.

(Signed) M. J. DRUMMOND, Commissioner.

It is the intention of the Russell Sage Institute of Pathology to sever its connection with the Department of Public Charities on Blackwells Island, as far as its co-operation is concerned with the Department, as previously agreed upon between the directors and this Department, the City taking over the pathological work among the City institutions on Blackwells Island.

Changing Name of Blackwells Island.

On January 21, 1911, the following letter was sent to His Honor the Mayor re: "Changing the name of Blackwells Island" to "Hospital Park":

"Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor:

"Sir—Having given the matter considerable thought since I have been Commissioner of Public Charities, I would respectfully request that the necessary steps be taken to have the name of Blackwells Island changed to Hospital Park, a name suggestive of the uses to which the island is devoted.

"My reason for this request is that the name of Blackwells suggests the penitentiary and workhouse, and people in general think that if you are going or have been to Blackwells you are disgraced or have been a criminal.

"The City pays to semi-private hospitals about \$45,000 a year for the care of maternity cases which are proper public charges, while most of them could be cared for on the island. The name of Blackwells Island to many mothers is odious and they do not like to think or feel that their children may be born on Blackwells Island. Could this prejudice be removed, and I think perhaps by changing the name it can be in time, the respectable poor would have no objection to going to hospitals under the jurisdiction of this Department now situated on Blackwells Island, where ample provision is made for their reception and care.

"There has been made by a well known architect a sketch and scheme for the Hospital Park development of Blackwells Island when the correctional institutions shall have been removed therefrom. These correctional institutions, the workhouse and penitentiary, it is expected will be removed from the island inside of five or six years. The Home for the Aged and Infirm will also be removed from Blackwells Island, leaving nothing but hospitals on the island within the next ten years.

"This plan has had the approval of the Art Commission, and I strongly feel that if the name of Blackwells could be eliminated it would be advantageous to the Department and to the sick and infirm poor of the City, who depend on the bounty of the City when they require, for any cause, hospital treatment.

"The effect of the change of the name may not be apparent for some time. The name of Blackwells having been so long associated with the island, it will require time before it is entirely eradicated from the minds of the people, but the sooner it is changed and the sooner we begin to educate people to call it something else besides Blackwells, the sooner the effect will become apparent and the sooner the Department and the people will be benefited.

"Trusting that I may have your co-operation and advice in this matter, I am,

"Respectfully yours, (Signed) M. J. DRUMMOND, Commissioner."

We are now awaiting further advice from His Honor and upon his approval of the plan to change the name of Blackwells Island, the necessary steps will be taken to present the contemplated change of name in the form of a bill before the Legislature for approval.

New German Chapel.

On February 3, 1911, an agreement was signed by Commissioner Michael J. Drummond of the Department of Public Charities, and the officers of the Association for the Relief of Indigent Germans, allowing the erection on Blackwells Island of a chapel for the use of the employees of the City of New York and the inmates of the various City buildings upon said Blackwells Island who follow the Lutheran faith.

The site upon which such chapel may be erected is in the field on Blackwells Island, bounded in general on the north by the road leading directly west from the Protestant Episcopal Chapel, on the east by the road running about north and south in front of the Episcopal Chapel and the female barracks building of the City Home; and on the west by the East River and about opposite the building known as the sewing room; at such particular point and facing such direction as may hereafter be more particularly staked out or designated by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities.

The size of the proposed chapel will be about 40 feet wide by about 95 feet long and about 40 feet high, and its architecture, construction, furnishing and decoration shall be subject to the approval of the Commissioner of Public Charities.

Burial of the Unidentified Victims of the Asch Building Fire.

The fire that swept the eighth, ninth and tenth floors of the Asch Building, 23 Washington place, on Saturday afternoon, March 25, 1911, in which 146 souls were lost, had its sequel in the funeral held on Wednesday afternoon, April 5, 1911, at 2 p. m., from the City morgue, foot of East 26th street.

Of the total number (146) lost, all but seven were identified. These were laid out, each in a separate casket of broadcloth, with silver handles and a silver plate, inscribed as follows:

No. Unknown Victim of Asch Building Fire, March 25, 1911.

There was an eighth casket in which was placed all the fragments of bones found after the catastrophe. Whether these fragments belonged to one or to several bodies no one can tell, so they were buried together in this casket.

The funeral cortege was led by a cordon of Mounted Police. Immediately behind was an open carriage with flowers, wreaths and garlands. Upon each casket rested a wreath of roses entwined with orchids.

This carriage was followed by the eight hearses, four on each side. The rear of the cortege was brought up by two automobiles of the Department of Public Charities, containing Commissioner Michael J. Drummond, his son Walter, Deputy Commissioner Frank J. Goodwin, Dr. Walter H. Conley and Mr. William Flanagan, the Department Architect.

The funeral cortege wended its way to the foot of East 23d street, where it crossed by ferry to Greenpoint, and thence to "The Evergreens Cemetery," East New York. The bodies were reverently interred in a large plot of ground owned by the City since 1859. Mr. Flanagan, the Department Architect, kept a record and prepared a diagram showing exactly where each coffin was placed, so that should any remains be identified by the property or clothing found on it, and now in possession of the Coroner's office, it could be disinterred with absolute accuracy.

At the side of the plot, in which the bodies were to be buried, was erected a tent, as the rain was pouring down in torrents.

Unmindful of the rain, a sad assemblage hemmed in the little enclosure. Commissioner Drummond advanced forward and told of the sorrow of the City at the awful calamity. He was followed by Right Reverend Monsignor William J. White, of Brooklyn, who read the Catholic service over one body, assisted by Reverend William B. Farrell, of the Church of Saints Peter and Paul. The Episcopal service was read over another body by Reverend William Morrison of St. Ann's Protestant Episcopal Church. Rabbi J. L. Manges, Temple Emanuel, officiated over the remaining bodies, as the majority of the victims were of the Jewish faith.

The services were brought to a close by the Elks' Quartet, Lodge No. 22, rendering "Abide With Me," and "Nearer My God to Thee."

During this quarter, 3,245 letters were written and sent out by this office (of which 785 were signed by the Commissioner, and 157 by the First Deputy Commissioner), covering the business transactions of this Department, with other City Departments, the public, private and charitable societies and institutions, hospitals and the State.

There were six general and seventeen special orders issued during this period, and seventeen propositions accepted and awarded, for work costing not over \$1,000 in each case. On March 6, 1911, the quarterly report for the period ending December 31, 1910, was sent to his Honor the Mayor and published in the City Record of April 1, 1911.

Grading: The eastern side of the new Female Dormitory No. 2 has been graded during the quarter.

Painting: Exterior of garden cottage; two rooms in storehouse (2 coats), and bakery, one coat; two carriages and eight farm implements; chairs, tables and other articles of furniture, painted and varnished as required; hallways and bathrooms in Employees' Dormitory painted.

Steam Heating in Cottages: The old hot air furnaces in Cottages B and C have been taken out and steam heaters have been installed.

Storeroom: New flooring, metal ceiling, shelving in one room; two rooms painted and woodwork varnished.

Miscellaneous: A harness room was erected during the quarter; the Recreation room in the basement of the Female Dormitory No. 2 was fitted up as a chapel; a bone machine has been purchased to pulverize bones which are to be used as a fertilizer, and soap is made of the surplus fat of the meats; the room formerly used for a chapel has been fitted up and is at the present time used as a sewing room; a blacksmith shop has been erected a short distance from the carpenter shop; two hundred young maple trees have been planted in different parts of the institution; a clothes room where the personal effects of inmates can be properly taken care of has been fitted up in the basement of the Male Dormitory, and a barber shop fitted up in the room adjacent.

Vegetable Cellar: Foundation for a vegetable cellar 34 by 68 feet has been excavated.

New Buildings: The contract for fixtures in the new Male and Female Dormitories is near completion; contract for sewers and water connections for the new buildings has also been awarded.

Needs: It is necessary to have a laundry built as soon as possible.

Regular and special requisitions for medical and surgical supplies have been filled for the following institutions, viz.:

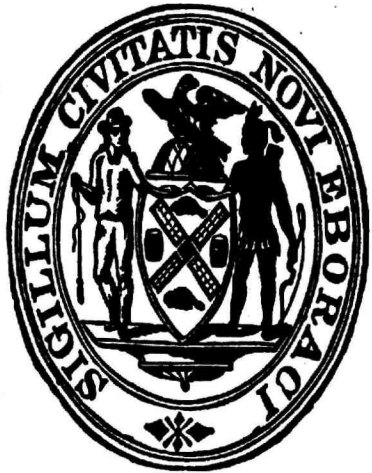

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
