ELEVENTH.—The said contract of February 21, 1900, requires the lessee, the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, as assignee, to pay to the City as rental for the railroad—

(a) An annual sum equal to the annual interest payable by the City upon all bonds which shall be issued by it in order to provide means for construction. The amount of such interest shall be ascertained as of the time when the Railroad shall be declared by the Board to be ready for operation; but it shall be increased from time to time by the amount of the annual interest payable by the City for all bonds which, after the date when the Railroad shall be so declared to be ready for operation, shall be issued in order to provide means for construction. (b) A further annual sum which shall be equal to one per centum upon the whole amount of the said bonds (with the exceptions above mentioned). * * *

The rental shall begin as to each Section with the date of re-declaration of the Board that such Section is ready for operation and shall be payable at the end of each quarter on the first days of January, April, July and October.

Under the terms of said Contract No. 1, relating to rental, the City is receiving from the lessee annual sinking fund payments on..... \$46,631,066 09 and annual interest on..... \$46,685,207 93

The City is carrying and providing in its annual tax budget for interest and sinking fund installments on all of the bonds which have been issued to provide the costs of rights-of-way and easements under the rapid transit Contract dated February 21, 1900. TWELFTH.—As stated hereinbefore, the City has issued a grand aggregate of \$48,889,679 26 of rapid transit bonds, the proceeds of which, including the premiums thereon, have been applied to meet the obligations and the indebtedness incurred by the City under the provisions and requirements of the rapid transit Contract, dated February 21, 1900. Of this amount the lessee is paying annual interest on..... \$46,685,207 93 and amortization installments on a sum total of bonds aggregating \$46,631,066 09.

The balance of the par value of the bonds, viz. \$2,204,471 33 has been applied by the City towards meeting the cost of easements and rights-of-way necessary to be acquired to carry out the City's obligations under the Contract dated February 21, 1900, and the annual interest and amortization installments on this amount is provided for in the City's annual tax budget.

The interest on such amortization installments has been compounded annually at 3% per annum.

(b) Showing the actual interest on such bonds at the different rates of interest which such bonds carry, viz., 3, 3 1/4, 4, 4 1/4 and 4 1/2% per annum. These tables also set forth the offsets to the foregoing, consisting of—

(c) The annual amount received by the City from the lessee, to be applied as amortization installments towards the ultimate redemption of the bonds.

(d) The annual interest paid by the lessee to the City on rapid transit bonds issued under Contract No. 1.

The payments (c) and (d) by the lessee constitute the current net revenue received by the City from its investments under Contract No. 1, dated February 21, 1900, for the construction of the Manhattan-Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad.

(d) The annual interest received by the City from the lessee, to be applied by the City towards paying the interest on rapid transit bonds issued under the requirements of Contract No. 2.

TWELFTH.—In accordance with the foregoing principles, tables have been prepared:

(a) Computing the annual amortization requirements on each bond issued by the City of New York from the date of issue to date of maturity, the proceeds of which bonds have been applied to carry out the obligations of the City and liquidate indebtedness incurred by it under rapid transit Contract No. 2, dated July 21, 1902. The interest on such amortization installments has been compounded annually at 3 per cent. per annum.

(b) Showing the actual interest on such bonds at the different rates of interest which such bonds carry, viz., 3, 3 1/2, 4, 4 1/4 and 4 1/2 per cent. per annum.

These tables also set forth the offsets to the foregoing, consisting of—

(c) The annual amount received by the City from the lessee, to be applied as amortization installments towards the ultimate redemption of the bonds.

(d) The annual interest paid by the lessee to the City on rapid transit bonds issued under Contract No. 2.

The payments (c and d) by the lessee constitute the current net revenue received by the City from its investments under Contract No. 2 of July 21, 1902, for the construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad.







TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be deposited by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, exceeding the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property or date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale, or removal, and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walls, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of the said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from the demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers. Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furring, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls shall be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a sale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and bid it further.

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed
