



NEW YORK, May 22, 1877.

The Board of Health met this day.

289 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

The Attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 14 cases, and for violation of the Sanitary Code in 40 cases.

Resolved, That Order No. 1,406 on premises foot of One Hundred and Sixth street, East river, be and is hereby modified so as to permit the storage of fertilizers, provided the business of manufacturing the same is discontinued.

Resolved, That the Fire Department be and is hereby respectfully requested to furnish this Department with two fire-hydrant keys for use of Disinfecting Corps.

#### Quarterly Report.

The Secretary presented the Quarterly Report for quarter ending March 31, 1877, which was approved and ordered forwarded to his Honor the Mayor.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending May 19, 1877:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,903, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 851 tenement houses, 172 private dwellings, 39 other dwellings, 15 manufactories and workshops, 24 stores and warehouses, 41 stables, 56 slaughter-houses, 27 milk inspections, 3 fat-rendering establishments, 5 manure dumps, 1 smoke-house, 18 sunken and vacant lots, 57 yards, courts, and areas, 57 cellars and basements, 125 waste-pipes and drains, 131 privies and water-closets, 40 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 7 dangerous stairways, 2 cisterns, 1 violation of the Code, 9 other nuisances, together with 20 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious and infectious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 588.

During the past week 149 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 107 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

155 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 61 premises, where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 52 houses, 52 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Ambulance Corps have removed to hospital, 1 case of small-pox and 2 of fever.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 2,049 privies and water-closets, 152 cellars and basements, 148 yards, courts, and areas, and 80 offensive garbage boxes. They have also disinfected 55½ miles of street gutters.

During the week ending Saturday, May 19, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 480 burial permits for city deaths, 16 for bodies in transitu, and 36 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 480 deaths, 188 marriages, 378 births, 36 still-births, 16 applications for transit permits, and 50 returns from coroners. There were 14 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and 0 transcripts of births, 0 of marriages, and 14 of deaths were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—480 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, May 19, 1877; this is an increase of 40 as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 3 less than were reported during the corresponding week of 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending May 12, 1877, was 425, which is 152.4 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 20.55 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,075,108.

The increase during the past compared with the previous week was from the following causes, viz.: Measles, 4; diphtheria, 11; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 1; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 3; inanition, 2; alcoholism, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 2; bronchitis, 6; diseases of the heart, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 14; meningitis and encephalitis, 12; convulsions, 3; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 18; cyanosis and atelectasis, 5; and a decrease of 1 death from scarlatina, 5 from membranous croup, 1 from erysipelas, 1 from typhoid fever, 9 from phthisis pulmonalis, 8 from pneumonia, 1 from aneurism, 1 from marasmus and scrofula, 4 from apoplexy, 4 from cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1 from enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 9 from Bright's disease and nephritis, 4 from premature and preterm birth, 4 from drowning, and 4 suicidal deaths.

During the week ending May 19, the temperature was 20.8 degrees Fahrenheit higher than that recorded for the preceding week, the deaths of children under 1 year increased 34, under 2 years 35, and under 5 years 44, and the number of deaths reported in tenement houses was 45 more than were reported in this class of dwellings in the preceding week.

Of the total number of deaths for the week, 87 were in institutions, 245 in tenement houses, 132 in houses containing 3 families and less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 11 in rivers, boats, streets, etc. 4 were on the basement floor, 87 on the first, 115 on the second, 95 on the third, 63 on the fourth, and 17 on the fifth. 477 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 3 non-residents. 43 were stated as single, 117 married, and 43 widowed, and the condition of 272 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 516 deaths and still-births, or 88.56 per cent. of the total reported, were in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish) 12, Calvary (Roman Catholic) 177, City (pauper burial ground, undenominational) 64, Greenwood (undenominational) 41, Lutheran (undenominational) 71, Cypress Hills (undenominational) 17, Evergreen (undenominational) 24, Woodlawn (undenominational) 24, St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal) 5, Union (Methodist Protestant) —, Holy Cross (Roman Catholic) 7, Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish) 7, St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic) 4, Washington (undenominational) 4.

The distribution of the deaths for the week ending May 12, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 13; Second, 1; Third, 4; Fourth, 10; Fifth, 4; Sixth, 3; Seventh, 14; Eighth, 14; Ninth, 17; Tenth, 21; Eleventh, 15; Twelfth, 43; Thirteenth, 12; Fourteenth, 12; Fifteenth, 12; Sixteenth, 20; Seventeenth, 26; Eighteenth, 17; Nineteenth, 64; Twentieth, 25; Twenty-first, 31; Twenty-second, 33; Twenty-third, 8, and Twenty-fourth, 6.

of the Health Department of the City of New York,  
held at its office on the twenty-fourth day of April, 1877,  
the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 55 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: On and after the fifth day of May, 1877, no cattle, swine, pigs, calves, or sheep shall be driven on or between Eleventh and Second avenues south of Sixtieth street, nor on any other streets or avenues, except as hereinafter mentioned.

1st. On First avenue, and the cross streets east of First avenue, between Forty-second and Forty-eighth streets, inclusive.

2d. On the cross streets west of Eleventh avenue, be-  
tween Thirty-ninth and Forty-third streets, inclusive.

3d. On the cross streets west of Eleventh avenue, be-  
tween Forty-fifth and Forty-ninth streets, inclusive.

4th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth avenue; thence through Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, Eighth avenue to Ninety-seventh street, Ninety-seventh street to Fifth avenue, Fifth avenue to One Hundred and Eighth street, One Hundred and Eighth street to Second avenue, Second avenue to One Hundred and Sixth street, One Hundred and Sixth street to the East river, between midnight and 6 o'clock A. M.

5th. From the cattle yards by the fourth route to second avenue, on Second avenue to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, on One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street to Third avenue, across Harlem Bridge, up Third avenue to the slaughter-houses in Morrisania, between midnight and 6 o'clock A. M.

6th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth avenue, on Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, on Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, on Eighth avenue to One Hundred and Twenty-first street, on St. Nicholas avenue and the Kingsbridge road to the slaughter-houses north of Spuyten Duyvil creek, between midnight and 6 o'clock A. M.

7th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street down Eleventh avenue to Thirty-ninth street, between midnight and 6 A. M.

8th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth avenue, on Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, on Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, on Eighth avenue to Sixty-fifth street, through Central Park by transverse road to Fifth avenue, on Fifth avenue to Sixty-seventh street, through Sixty-seventh street to Fourth avenue, on Fourth avenue to Sixty-eighth street, through Sixty-eighth street to First avenue and down First avenue to slaughter-houses, upon the express condition, however, that the cattle shall not leave the yards before midnight or after 5 o'clock A. M., that the drivers shall be orderly and quiet, and that the crosswalks shall be cleaned each morning before 8 o'clock. Permits under this subdivision shall be revoked by the Sanitary Superintendent on violation of any of the foregoing conditions.

9th. The Sanitary Superintendent may, in special cases, with the approval of the Board, give temporary permits to drive animals on other routes than those herein designated.
