COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the meeting held June 29, 1880.

Present—Hon. Edward Cooper, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; and J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the requisition of the Commissioners of Docks, dated June 2, 1880, for the issue of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000), Dock Bonds of the City of New York, reported the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller, in accordance with subdivision 11 of section 6 of the act, chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, be and hereby is directed to prepare and issue, from time to time, as he may deem necessary to meet the requirements of the Dock Department, one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), Dock Bonds of the City of New York, for the purpose of raising moneys necessary to carry out the provisions of said act, relating to the Department of Docks, its powers and duties; the said amount being on account of the requisition of the Commissioners of Docks, dated June 2, 1880, for two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000).

The Comptroller submitted the application of the "American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals," for transfer of fines paid by George Brown, John O'Connor, and Mertha Redmond (\$25 each), for violation of act, chapter 16 of Laws of 1876, and returned by the Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions March 16, 1880, by mistake, as "Misdemeanors," instead of being credited to the aforesaid Society.

On motion, laid over to the next meeting.

The Comptroller submitted the application of Mutual Life Insurance Company for return of \$142.16; West Farms gas tax, paid in error, on property in Twenty-fourth Ward, for the year 1879; whereupon the following resolution was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That a warrant, payable from the Sinking Fund for Redemption of the City Debt, be drawn in favor of the Mutual Life Insurance Company for one hundred and forty-two 16-100 dollars (\$142.16), refunding this amount of "West Farms Gas Tax," paid by the said Company in error and deposited to credit of the said fund.

The Comptroller submitted the following report on the petition of Seligman H. Strouse and Joseph Strouse for "Deed of Confirmation," viz.:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, June 24, 1880.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Herewith I present the petition of Seligman H. Strouse and Joseph Strouse for a confirmatory deed of two lots of land, sold by the Corporation at public auction May 21, 1866, designated as Nos. 21 and 22 of Plot I. on the map of said sale. The terms of sale were complied with by the purchasers, and the whole amount of the purchase money has been paid into the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt. It is alleged, as a reason for the petition, that the deed from the Corporation of said property was not signed by the then Mayor of the City.

Resolved, That the petition of Seligman H. Strouse and Joseph Strouse, for a confirmatory deed of two lots of land sold by the Corporation at public auction May 21, 1866, designated as Nos. 21 and 22 of Plot I. on the map of said sale, be granted, and referred to the Counsel to the Corporation to prepare such deed or deeds as the facts may warrant and require, and that the Mayor and the Clerk of the Common Council be authorized and directed to execute such deed or deeds, when so prepared by him, and that the Comptroller be authorized to deliver the same, when duly executed and recorded in his office, to said petitioners or their attorney.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the matter of leasing No. 31 Chambers street, to be occupied for "City Offices," submitted the following report, viz.:

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, June 16, 1880.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—The Comptroller, to whom was referred the matter of leasing the premises No. 31 Chambers street, for the occupation of the Department of Public Works, to negotiate the terms of a lease, respectfully reports:

That the proposal of the owner of the building, which was presented at the last meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, has been considered. His agent has agreed to make such changes as were desired. The proposed lease of the premises is for five years, expiring May 1, 1885, at the yearly rent of \$12,500. Immediate possession is to be given and at the end of the lease the City will have option of renewal for the term of three or five years at a yearly rent of \$12,000. The boiler and heating apparatus are to belong to the City with the right of removal when the lease expires.

The owner further agrees to expend \$10,500 for heating apparatus, etc., in addition to the sum of \$8,000 originally proposed, making the sum of \$18,500 in all, to be expended for alterations of the building and furnishing fixtures required for the accommodation of the Department of Public Works, as specified by the Commissioner, and performed under his supervision. The owner undertakes the carpenter's risk during alterations of the premises, and will pay taxes and assessments; the city assumes Croton water rents, and will keep the interior of the premises in repair.

Resolved, That the terms and conditions of a proposed lease by the Corporation of the premises No. 31 Chambers street, for the use and occupation of the Department of Public Works, as proposed by the owner of the building and stated in the report thereon made by the Comptroller, be approved; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized, as provided by section 3 of chapter 461 of the Laws of 1880, to enter into and execute such lease in behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York.

The report was accepted, and, on motion, the resolution adopted.

The Comptroller presented draft of proposed lease of premises No. 31 Chambers street, submitted by George Peabody Wetmore, which was read; whereupon the following resolution, submitted by the Mayor, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the draft of a lease for the premises 31 Chambers street, submitted by the owner, be referred to the Commissioner of Public Works with the request, that he suggest any modifications which he may deem proper; and that the Comptroller request the Counsel to the Corporation to draw a lease, to be submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, embodying the suggestions of the Commissioner of Public Works and such other modifications of the lease, as the Comptroller or the Counsel to the Corporation may deem advisable.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1880.

CHAPTER 434.

AN ACT to authorize cities and incorporated villages to charge license fees to persons doing business on the canals of this state.

Passed May 27, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

Section 1. It shall hereafter be lawful for the common council of any city and the trustees of any incorporated village in this state to charge and collect a license fee from all persons doing a retail business in the sale of goods of any description, except products of the farm and unmanufactured products of the forest, from canal boats in the canals of this state, or from the lands by the side of said canals, and within the boundary lines thereof, within the limits of such cities or villages. The common council of such cities and the trustees of such villages shall have power to fix the amount to be charged for such licenses at such sum as in their discretion they may deem just. They shall also have power to enforce the collection of such license fees in the same manner as they are now severally authorized by law to enforce the collection of other license fees which they are authorized to impose. They shall also have power to adopt laws or ordinances to prevent any person making any such sale without first obtaining such license, and to punish any violation thereof by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars, the offender to be imprisoned in the county jail until such fine be paid, not exceeding six months.

Sec. 2. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this act contained shall be held or construed to conflict in any manner with the provisions of title four of chapter seventeen of part one of the Revised Statutes.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 22d day of June, 1880, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following amendment of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Resolved, That section 130 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 130. That every owner, lessee, tenant, and occupant of any stall, stable, or apartment in which any horse, cattle, or swine, or any other animal shall be kept, or of any place in which manure or any liquid discharge of such animals shall collect or accumulate, within the built-up portion of said city, shall cause said liquid and manure to be at once removed to some proper place, and shall at all times keep or cause to be kept such stalls, stables, and apartments, and the drainage, yard, and appurtenances thereof, in a cleanly and wholesome condition, so that no offensive smell detrimental to health shall be allowed to escape therefrom; and when within three hundred feet from any occupied dwelling-house, or of any manufactory where more than five persons are employed, the removal from the stables shall not be made, nor shall the manure or refuse from the stable be allowed to remain on any street or place near such stable, any time between 8 o'clock A. M. and 11 o'clock P. M., without a permit from this Board. Every such stall, stable, or apartment, where horses or cattle are kept, shall have an underground and properly covered manure vault of not less than sixty-four cubic feet capacity. But the Sanitary Superintendent is authorized to issue permits to be regularly reported to this Board, regulating such removal within said hours.

ARREARS OF TAXES.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of Real Estate in said city, that, as provided by chapter 123 of the Laws of 1880, they may now pay any arrears of taxes and Croton water rents levied prior to the year 1877, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum. If, however, such taxes and Croton water rents are not paid before the first day of October next, the property on which they are due will be sold for taxes immediately thereafter, with the addition of accrued interest thereon at the rate of 12 per cent. per annum from the respective dates on which they were levied.

CHAPTER 123.
AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.
The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such

payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
