POLICE DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, 300 MULBERRY STREET NEW YORK, October 12, 1882.

The Hon. Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I am directed by the Board of Police to state that it has come to their knowledge that his Honor the Mayor vetoed the resolution, passed by the Board of Aldermen, granting permis-

sion for this Board to cause the erection of foundation walls for the new station-house building in Old Slip, for the First Police Precinct, without advertisement for competing bids.

The Comptroller is aware that the appropriation for building the station-house entire is insufficient, as appeared at the time when proposals were asked, and the estimate-box being opened in his presence, it disclosed the fact that no bids for the work had been received, the advertisement having restricted bidders to the amount named in the appropriation (\$60,000\$). Experts having informed the Board of the difficulties to be encountered in estimating for piling and the construction of a proper foundation, it was deemed to be an economical measure for the Department to employ the best talent and perform the work.

The action of the Mayor seems to make it necessary that proposals should be asked for the

The action of the Mayor seems to make it necessary that proposals should be asked for the "construction of the foundation" only, by advertising for competing bids.

Inasmuch as the \$60,000 was appropriated to build the entire structure, it is suggested that there may be some legal objection to the action of the Board of Police in applying any portion of that amount to the construction of the foundation walls only, without the consent of the Board of Estimate and Appearitments. and Apportionment.

In that view the Board have this day adopted the following resolution:

The Board of Police therefore respectfully request that early action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may be taken.
