

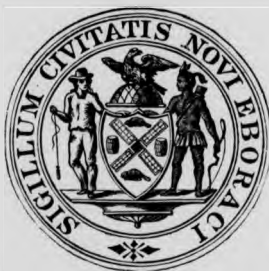

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated upon lot No. 94 James street, rear, has become dangerous to life, by reason of want of repair, and is unfit for human habitation, because of defects in the drainage thereof.

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated on lot No. 94 James street, rear, be required to vacate said building on or before August 6, 1888, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life by reason of want of repair, and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing thereof; and further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front and in said building, and be served as the law requires, under the direction of Dr. Walter De F. Day, the Sanitary Superintendent; and further, that said building be not again used as a human habitation without a written permit from this Board.

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated on lot No. 220 West Sixty-second street be required to vacate said building on or before August 1, 1888, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life, by reason of want of repair, and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing thereof; and further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of and in said building, and be served as the law requires, under the direction of Dr. Walter De F. Day, the Sanitary Superintendent; and further, that said building be not again used as a human habitation without a written permit from this Board.

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated on lot No. 222 West Sixty-second street has become dangerous to life, by reason of want of air, and is unfit for human habitation, because of defects in the plumbing thereof.

The 963 deaths represent a death-rate of 32.76, as against one of 35.30 in the previous week, and of 32.75 in the corresponding week of 1887.

The decrease of 74 in the number of deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 5 in diphtheria, 71 in diarrhoeal diseases, 13 in phthisis, 5 in pneumonia, 10 in Bright's disease, and 6 accidents, partially offset by an increase of 5 deaths from enteric fever, 6 scarlet fever, 10 whooping-cough, 6 cancer, 6 meningitis, 9 bronchitis, and 6 cirrhosis and hepatitis.

The decrease of diarrhoeal diseases was most marked in the Tenth, Eleventh, Twenty-first and Twenty-second Wards, there being a slight increase in the Fourth and Eighteenth Wards.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, NO. 301 MOTT STREET,

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, January 27, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 18 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows: Sec. 18. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbside on the street, nor of the floor, nor of the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms elevated above the sidewalk, and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.
