Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to lay water-mains in Eighty-ninth street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues, pursuant to section 356 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 13, 1887.  
Approved by the Mayor, September 27, 1887.

Resolved, That One Hundred and Thirty-third street, from Sixth to Seventh avenue, be paved with granite-block pavement, and that crosswalks be laid at the terminating avenues, where not already laid, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

### BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,  
NEW YORK CITY, September 29, 1887.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 2 P.M., at the office of his Honor Mayor Hewitt.

Present—Acting Mayor H. R. Beekman, The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of the Public Works Department, and Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald.

No bids were received for the iron work of the Eighth Regiment Armory as advertised for. The Board decided to reject the bids of Moran & Armstrong, of Thomas Overington, of George Cody and of Baker, Smith & Co. for work on the same building, and the Secretary was directed to so notify the Comptroller, that their deposits may be returned to them.

The construction of the armory was then referred to the Committee on Plans to revise the plans and specification, and if possible reduce the expense of the building so as to come within the limit of the appropriation.

A communication was received and read from the Corporation Counsel, and ordered on file:

Hon. MICHAEL COLEMAN, Secretary of the Armory Board:

SIR—I have received your letter of the 17th instant, enclosing the resolution of your Board asking my opinion whether "under the law this Board must supply each regiment of the N.G.S.N.Y. in this city, with an armory, or whether there is any lawful impediment to assigning more than one regiment to an armory."

1. The power of the Armory Board is derived from the amendment to section 62 of the Military Code, embodied in chapter 487 of the Laws of 1886, as follows:

"In the City and County of New York the demands of commandants of regiments, battalions, batteries or troops for suitable armories, or for alterations, enlargements and furnishing of armories, as hereinbefore provided, shall be made to a board hereby created, consisting of the Mayor, the two senior ranking officers of the National Guard in said city and county, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments and the Commissioner of Public Works, who shall consider such applications, and if they approve shall make their recommendations to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, who, if they concur in such recommendations, shall specify the sums to be appropriated for such purchase, rental, erection, enlargement, alteration or furnishing of armories, including suitable accommodations for division and brigade headquarters, which sum shall be inserted by the Comptroller in his departmental estimate."

It follows, therefore, that the power to approve or disapprove the demand of commandants of regiments is vested in your Board, and it is authorized to exercise a legal discretion in relation thereto.

2. I find nothing in the Military Code, or in the act, chapter 330 of the Laws of 1887, in relation to the acquisition of armory sites, or any other statute, which provides that a separate building must be supplied for each regiment.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that there is no lawful impediment to assign more than one regiment to an armory.

A communication was received from Colonel G. D. Scott, of the Eighth Regiment, enclosing correspondence in relation to cleaning, repairing, calcimining, etc., the armory of that organization:

NEW YORK, September 28, 1887.

M. COLEMAN, Esq., Secretary Armory Board:

SIR—In compliance with instructions from General Newton, Commissioner of Public Works, I directed my Adjutant (J. O. Johnston) to address a letter to W. D. F. Manice, owner of the armory occupied by the Eighth Regiment, asking him to calcimine the drill-rooms, etc., and to put the water-closets in a sanitary condition. I enclose his reply, marked "A," from which you can see we have nothing to expect from him. Under these circumstances, I respectfully appeal to the Armory Board to take immediate action in the matter.

J. O. JOHNSTON, Esq., Adjutant:

DEAR SIR—I have received your communication of the 20th instant, informing me that you are directed by Colonel George D. Scott, commanding Eighth Regiment, and occupying the armory corner Thirty-fifth street and Broadway, to call my attention to certain repairs alleged to be necessary to be done to the building.

In answer, I would say that I have not undertaken, nor am I under any obligation as landlord, to do the repairs mentioned by you, nor have I during the many years the premises have been leased to the City for an armory ever done or been requested to do such repairs, except that I have, in my own interest only, at times caused some repairs to be done to and alterations made in the plumbing.

This was reported to me to be in good order in May last. Recently also I have directed my plumber to make some trifling repairs, and since receiving your communication I have directed him to examine and report to me what repairs, if any, may be needed. Permit me to say that more than ordinary care of the closets is requisite, where they are used by so many. They are properly constructed, and it has heretofore been because of the neglect of such care of them that any repairs have become necessary.

The Military Code, section 62, provides for the repairing of armories, including water-closets, etc.

## PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 520 and 521 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rates:

- 1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.
- 2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.
- 3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made at the Department of Public Works, and the tax levied by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.
- 4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties shall be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.
- 5th. Charges for called and returned water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

## NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens complaining reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or waste of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department, and that, unless this requirement is complied with, no reductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
