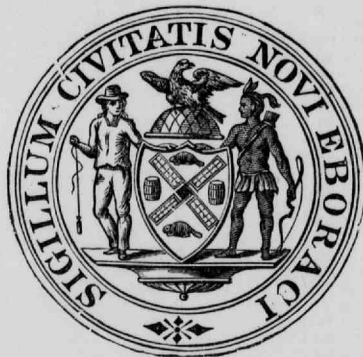

POLICE DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
No. 300 MULBERRY STREET, BUREAU OF ELECTIONS,
NEW YORK, October 5, 1891.

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, and by virtue of the authority therein conferred upon the Board of Police, the division of the several Assembly Districts in the City and County of New York into Election Districts and the boundaries of said Election Districts are hereby fixed by said Board, as follows:

First Assembly District.

The First Assembly District shall be divided into nineteen election districts, the extent and limits of which shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within William street, Old slip, East river, Whitehall street, and Beaver street.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within John street, Burling slip, East river, Old slip, William street, Beaver street, and Broadway.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spruce street, Gold street, Ferry street, Peck slip, East river, Burling slip, John street, Broadway, and Park row.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Broadway, Whitehall street, East river, Hudson or North river, Battery place, Greenwich street, and Governor's Island.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Morris street, Greenwich street, Battery place, and Washington street.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Carlisle street, Washington street, Battery place, Hudson or North river.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Carlisle street, Greenwich street, Morris street, and Washington street.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Vesey street, Broadway, Rector street, and Greenwich street.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Greenwich street, Carlisle street, and Hudson or North river.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Barclay street, Greenwich street, Liberty street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Reade street, Broadway, Vesey street, Greenwich street, Barclay street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Broadway, Reade street, Hudson street, Franklin street, Varick street, Beach street, and West Broadway.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Franklin street, Greenwich street, Harrison street, Hudson street, Reade street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Beach street, Hudson street, Harrison street, Greenwich street, Franklin street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fifteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Beach street, Varick street, Franklin street, and Hudson street.

The Sixteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Vestry street, Canal street, West Broadway, Beach street, and Hudson street.

The Seventeenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Laight street, Hudson street, Beach street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Desbrosses street, Canal street, Vestry street, Hudson street, Laight street, and Hudson or North river.

The Nineteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Canal street, Hudson street, Desbrosses street, and Hudson or North river.

Second Assembly District.

The Second Assembly District shall be divided into twenty-four election districts, the extent and limits of which shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Oak street, Catharine street, East river, and Oliver street.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Cherry street, Oliver street, East river, and Roosevelt street.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Oak street, Oliver street, Cherry street, and Roosevelt street.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Madison street, Catharine street, Oak street, and James street.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within New Bowery, Chatham square, Division street, Catharine street, Madison street, and James street.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within New Bowery, Madison street, James street, Oak street, and Roosevelt street.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Park row, Chatham square, New Bowery, James street, Madison street, and Roosevelt street.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (Chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as a paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
