

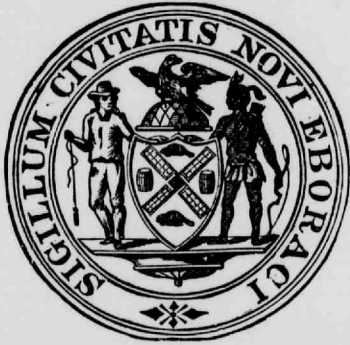

GAS COMMISSION.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Officers designated by section 73 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, and section 1 of chapter 125 of the Laws of 1878, to contract for lighting the streets, avenues, and places of the City of New York.

MONDAY, March 24, 1879.

The officers designated in section 73 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, and chapter 125 of the Laws of 1878, met in the office of the Commissioner of Public Works, at 12 M., Monday, March 24, 1879.

All were present, viz.:
 Hon. Edward Cooper, Mayor; Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller, and Hon. Allan Campbell, Commissioner of Public Works.

The Commissioner of Public Works stated that the existing contracts for furnishing the gas to and lighting the public lamps, would expire on the 30th April next, and that the meeting had been called for the purpose of adopting specifications and form of contracts for the year commencing May 1, 1879, and ending April 30, 1880.

A communication was received from the Department of Parks requesting that the lighting of the lamps on the public parks be included in the contracts to be made by the Gas Commission.

The Counsel to the Corporation having given an opinion to the Common Council, under date of March 11, 1879, wherein he stated that he did not think the Gas Commission had the right to contract for the lighting of the parks, the request of the Department of Parks was declined.

The Commissioner of Public Works submitted a form of specifications and contract, and moved that the number of hours during which the public lamps are to be kept lighted per annum be 4,000 hours.

Which was agreed to.

It is agreed, however, that the parties of the first part shall have the right to require that burners of a greater consuming capacity than three cubic feet per hour shall be furnished to the public lamps, or any portion of them, at any time during the aforesaid term of one year; provided that the parties of the first part will pay to the party of the second part, for the lamps so furnished, an additional compensation, equivalent to a pro rata increase of the compensation hereinafter allowed, after deducting from such compensation the sum of (\$4) four dollars per lamp, for the cost of lighting, extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, reglazing, and painting, and proportioned only to the increased amount of gas consumed by each burner over and above three cubic feet per hour.

Which was agreed to.

The Manhattan Gas-light Company bid for all the lamps situated north of the centre line of Grand street, and south of the centre line of Thirty-fourth street, at \$12 for each lamp, and was the lowest bidder for such lamps.

The Metropolitan Gas-light Company bid for all the lamps now lighted by said company, and which are situated north of the centre line of Thirty-fourth street, and south of the centre line of Seventy-ninth street, at \$18.28 for each lamp, and was the lowest bidder for such lamps.

The New York Mutual Gas-light Company bid for all the lamps now lighted by said company, and which are situated north of the centre line of Thirty-fourth street, and south of Sixty-fifth street, at \$19 for each lamp, and was the lowest bidder for such lamps.

The Municipal Gas-light Company bid for lamps on its mains on various streets between Canal street on the south, and Fifty-ninth street on the north, at \$20 for each lamp, and was the highest bidder for such lamps. This company came into competition with the New York, Manhattan, Metropolitan, and Mutual Companies.

The Harlem Gas-light Company bid for all the lamps situated north of the centre line of Seventy-ninth street, and south of Spuyten Duyvil creek and Harlem river, including the High Bridge, at \$17.70 for each lamp, and was the lowest bidder for such lamps.

The New York and New Jersey Globe Gas-light Company bid for the lamps now lighted by said company, and which are situated north of the centre line of Eighty-sixth street, south of the centre line of One Hundred and Fourteenth street, and east of the westerly side of Third avenue, being 510 in number, at \$19 for each lamp, and was the highest bidder for such lamps.

These lamps were included in the bid of the Harlem Gas Company.

510 lamps, at \$19 each. Globe Company's bid. \$9,690 00

510 lamps, at \$17.70 each. Harlem Company's bid. 9,027 00

Difference in favor of Harlem Gas Company. \$663 00

The Yonkers Gas-light Company bid for the lamps now lighted by said company, and which are situated in that part of the Twenty-fourth Ward, formerly known as Kingsbridge, now Riverdale, being but 72 in number, at \$30 for each lamp, and was the only bidder for such lamps.
