The 1,032 deaths represent a death-rate of 29.44 against 24.13 for the previous week, and 29.68

The 1,032 deaths represent a death-rate of 29.44 against 24.13 for the previous week, and 29.08 for the corresponding week of 1891.

The increase of 187 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 126 deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, but there was also an increase of 7 in the deaths from whooping-cough, of 10 from phthisis, of 15 from pneumonia, of 18 from diseases of the digestive organs and of 10 from violence, with a decrease of 5 in the deaths from measles, of 7 from scarlet fever, and of 4 from heart disease.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth Ward, from measles in the Twenty-fourth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Eleventh Ward.
