Adjourned meeting 4 p. m. Present-Commissioner Willcox, President Young. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. A communication was received from Thomas Cockerill & Son stating that a clerical error had been made in their proposal for the work of enlarging the building of the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences, presented on the 30th ult, by the inadvertent omission of a large item of cost and requesting to be allowed to withdraw their bid.

John F. Cockerill, of said firm, appeared and was heard in relation to the matter, which, on motion, was referred to Commissioner Young.

Commissioner Willcox offered the following:

Whereas, plans for the improvement of William H. Seward Park were prepared and adopted by this Department and forwarded on November 11, 1901, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the approval of that Board, with an estimate of the cost of construction and a request for a bond issue to provide funds for doing the work, and

Whereas, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 10, 1901, approved and authorized such expenditure, to be paid from the proceeds of a bond issue to the amount of \$136.371.95, which action did not, however, receive the concurrence

of the Municipal Assembly, as required by law; therefore

Resolved, that said plans for the improvement of William H. Seward Park be, and the same hereby are re-adopted and ordered forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the approval of said Board, with the request that an issue of bonds be authorized to the amount of \$136,371.95 to provide for the improvement of said park, according to said plans, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 293 of the Laws of 1895, as amended by chapter 676 of the Laws of 1897, or under the provisions of the New York Charter, as said Board may determine.

Resolved, that the Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond be, and he hereby is authorized to advertise for proposals for supplies required for parks in the Borough of Manhattan, as follows:

1. Grass sod. 2. Manure, 3. Garden mould. 4. Iron pipe fencing. 5. Lumber. 6. Paints, oils, etc. 7. Hardware. 8. Plumbers' materials. 9. Blacksmith and machinists' supplies.


