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## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock a. m., on Wednesday, February 21, 1906.

Present at roll call—George B. McClellan, Mayor; N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy Comptroller; Patrick Keenan, Chamberlain, and Patrick F. McGowan, President Board of Aldermen. The Comptroller and the Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, appeared later (see note).

The minutes of the meeting held February 5, 1906, were approved as printed.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to a lease of Pier 10, East river, to the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line:

NEW YORK, January 31, 1906.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—I beg to advise that, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, I have agreed to lease to the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line, Pier 10, East river, for a term of ten (10) years, with the privilege of one renewal term of ten (10) years. The rental for the first term to be \$30,000 per annum, and the rental for the renewal term to be at an advance of 10 per cent. over the rental charged for the first term.

I respectfully request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve the proposed lease, to begin on the first day of the month following the date upon which the pier shall be completed and ready for occupation, the lessee to have the privilege of erecting a shed on the pier, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department and in accordance with plans and specifications to be first approved by him, such shed to revert to and become the property of the City at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease or renewal thereof.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now in use by this Department.

In connection therewith the Deputy Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

February 8, 1906.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. J. A. Bense, Commissioner, Department of Docks and Ferries, in communication under date of January 31, 1906, advises the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, that, subject to the approval of the Commissioners, he has agreed to lease to the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line Pier 10, East river, for a term of ten (10) years, with the privilege of one renewal term of ten (10) years at an advance of 10 per cent. on the rental, and to have the privilege of erecting a shed on the pier.

I would report I see no objections to the terms proposed in this lease. For your information I would note that Pier, new 10 will, when completed, contain an area of 33,319 square feet.

The lease for Pier, new 9, containing 33,690 square feet, adjoining half bulkhead, at a rental of \$30,000 per annum, was approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on December 27, 1905. The terms proposed for the lease of this pier are similar to those in the lease of Pier, new 9.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line, of Pier 10, East river, for a term of ten years from the first day of the month following the date upon which the pier is completed and ready for occupation, with the privilege of one renewal term of ten years, the rental for the first term to be thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) per annum and the rental for the renewal term to be at an advance of 10 per cent. over the rental charged for the first term, the lessee to have the privilege of erecting a shed on the pier under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and in accordance with plans and specifications to be first approved by him, such shed to revert to and become the property of the City, free from all incumbrances, at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease or renewal thereof, the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now in use by the Department of Docks and Ferries, and as recommended by the Commissioner of Docks in communication dated January 31, 1906.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to a lease of Pier 8, East river, with the half bulkhead easterly thereof, to the Compania Trasatlantica (Spanish Line):

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—I beg to advise that, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, I have agreed to lease to the Compania Trasatlantica (Spanish Line), Emilio Tomasi, agent, Pier 8, East river, with the half bulkhead easterly thereof for a term of ten (10) years, at a rental of \$30,000 per annum, the lessee to have the privilege of one renewal term of ten years at an advance of 10 per cent. on the rental and to have the privilege of erecting a shed on the pier, such shed to be erected under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, in accordance with plans and specifications to be first approved by him, and to revert to and become the property of the City free from all incumbrances at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease or renewal thereof.

I respectfully request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve the proposed lease, to be begun on the 1st day of the month following the date on which the leased property shall be completed and ready for occupation.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now in use by this Department.

In connection therewith the Deputy Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. J. A. Bense, Commissioner, Department of Docks and Ferries, in communication under date of January 31, 1906, advises the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that, subject to the approval of the Commissioners, he has agreed to lease to the Compania Trasatlantica (Spanish Line), Emilio Tomasi, agent, Pier 8, East river, with the half bulkhead easterly thereof for a term of ten (10) years at a rental of \$30,000 per annum, the lessee to have the privilege of one renewal term of ten (10) years at an advance of 10 per cent. on the rental, and to have the privilege of erecting a shed on the pier.

I would report: I see no objections to the terms proposed for this lease. For your information I would note that Pier 8 will, when completed, contain an area of 34,245 square feet; the half bulkhead easterly thereof will be 77½ feet in length.

The lease for Pier 9, containing 33,690 square feet, with the adjoining half bulkhead, at a rental of \$30,000 per annum, was approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on December 27, 1905; the terms proposed for the lease of this pier are similar in all respects with those in the lease of Pier 9.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to the Compania Trasatlantica (Spanish Line), Emilio Tomasi, agent, of Pier No. 8, East river, with the half-bulkhead easterly thereof, for a term of ten years from the first day of the month following the date on which the leased property shall be completed and ready for occupation, at an annual rental of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000); the lessee to have the privilege of one renewal term of ten years at an advance of 10 per cent. in the rental, and to have the privilege of erecting a shed on the pier under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and in accordance with plans and specifications to be first approved by him, and to revert to and become the property of the City, free from all incumbrances, at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease, or renewal thereof; the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now in use by the Department of Docks and Ferries, and as recommended by the Commissioner of Docks in communication dated January 31, 1906.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to a lease of the pier at the foot of East Twenty-second street, East river, Borough of Manhattan, to the New England Navigation Company, which was referred back to the Commissioner with a request that he furnish the Board with a comparison of the rental with that of adjoining piers.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to a lease of 265 feet of the south half of the pier at the foot of East Twenty-first street, East river, to the Henry B. Turner Coal Company, which was referred back to the Commissioner with a request that he furnish the Board with a comparison of the rental with that of adjoining properties.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to a new plan for the improvement of the water front between Eighth and Fourteenth streets, East river, Borough of Manhattan:

NEW YORK, January 29, 1906.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., *Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

SIR—I beg to submit herewith map showing new plan layout between Eighth and Fourteenth streets, on the East river, with technical description for same, for approval by the Sinking Fund Commission.

In this connection I would call attention to the fact that if this plan is adopted it will make it impossible for the City to purchase the necessary water front property and to erect thereon, through the Street Cleaning Department, a proper plant for the disposal of refuse near the foot of Fourteenth street, East river. This location is especially adaptable for an improvement of this kind, as it will not only enable the City to benefit in a sanitary way by disposing of refuse by incineration, but will also make it possible to light the hospital buildings near the foot of Seventeenth street, under the control of the Health Department, with power calculated to be furnished by incinerating the refuse near the foot of Fourteenth street.

The locality in question is one that can in no way be affected by this improvement except beneficially.

*Description of Proposed New Plan Between East Eighth and East Fourteenth Streets, East River.*

The new plan submitted herewith for improving the water front between East Eighth and East Fourteenth streets comprises:

First—The adoption of a bulkhead line extending from the point in the northerly line of East Eighth street, where the bulkhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1890 intersects the same, and running thence northerly in a straight line to a point in the southerly line of East Twelfth street, where the bulkhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1890 intersects the same.

Thence northwesterly in a straight line along the bulkhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1890 until it intersects a line drawn parallel with and 20 feet southerly from the southerly line of East Thirteenth street.

Thence westerly and along said parallel line to a line drawn parallel with and distant 150 feet easterly from the easterly line of Avenue D.

Thence northerly and along said parallel line 236.5 feet to a line drawn parallel with and distant 50 feet southerly from the southerly line of East Fourteenth street.

Thence easterly and along said parallel line 346.94 feet to the bulkhead line, as modified by the Secretary of War in 1903.

Thence northerly and along said modified bulkhead line to the southerly line of East Fourteenth street.

Second—The adoption of a marginal street along the said described bulkhead line 175 feet in width, extending from the northerly line of East Eighth street to the centre of the block between East Twelfth and East Thirteenth streets.

Thence, with a width of 83.5 feet, extending westerly to within 150 feet of the easterly line of Avenue D.

Thence, with a width of 150 feet between the centre line of the block, between East Twelfth and East Thirteenth streets and the southerly line of East Fourteenth street.

Thence easterly, with a width of 50 feet, adjacent to the southerly line of East Fourteenth street, to the bulkhead line, as modified by the Secretary of War in 1903.

Third—The adoption of a pier 60 feet in width, extending from the hereinbefore described bulkhead line easterly to the pierhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1890, at the foot of East Ninth, East Tenth, East Eleventh and East Twelfth streets; also a pier 50 feet wide, extending from the hereinbefore described bulkhead line to the pierhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1890, 20 feet southerly from the southerly line of East Thirteenth street prolonged; also a pier 40 feet wide, extending from the hereinbefore described bulkhead line to the pierhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1890, distant 120 feet southerly from the southerly line of East Fourteenth street; also a pier 50 feet wide, extending from the bulkhead line, as modified by the Secretary of War in 1903, to the pierhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1890, and located with its northerly side on the southerly line of East Fourteenth street prolonged.

In connection therewith the Deputy Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, *Comptroller:*

SIR—Hon. J. A. Benschel, Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, in communication under date of January 29, 1906, transmits for approval by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, a new plan for the improvement of the water front on the East river, between Eighth and Fourteenth streets; said plan having been adopted by the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries on January 29, 1906.

I would report that the portion of the proposed layout between Eighth street and the centre line of the block, between Twelfth and Thirteenth streets, is a continuation of the layout adopted and established by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on December 19, 1888. The establishment of this layout will give a continuous marginal street, 175 feet in width, from Grand street to the centre line of the block, between Twelfth and Thirteenth streets.

The proposed basin between the centre line of the block between Twelfth and Thirteenth streets, and Fourteenth street, will permit of the erection by the Street Cleaning Department of a proper plant for the disposal of refuse, consisting of covered dumping boards.

The plan as adopted and submitted by the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval, for the improvement and layout, between Eighth and Fourteenth streets, on the East river, appears to me judiciously conceived, and I would recommend its approval by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the plan for improving the water front and harbor of The City of New York, on the East river, between East Eighth and East Fourteenth streets, Borough of Manhattan, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law January 29, 1906, and submitted with communication dated January 29, 1906.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks requesting that he be authorized to make and serve upon the owners of land under water in the vicinity of Fordham road and Harlem river, Borough of The Bronx, an offer of \$17,000 for the purchase of same:

NEW YORK, February 5, 1906.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., *Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

SIR—Under date of March 28, 1905, a new plan was adopted by this Department for the improvement of the water front in the vicinity of Fordham road, Harlem river, Borough of The Bronx, which new plan was approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on April 5, 1905.

The Department of Bridges, in connection with the construction of the University Heights Bridge, acquired property south of Fordham road, but did not acquire the title to the land under water shown in red on the inclosed map, extending from the present bulkhead-line to the pier and bulkhead-line approved by the Secretary of War in 1890. An effort was made at the time to have the Department of Bridges include the additional area of land under water, but the Commissioner of Bridges stated that he could not see his way clear to making the necessary amendment to the bridge plans.

In a communication to this Department, under date of December 31, 1904, the Corporation Counsel stated that he was unable to say whether the entire parcel was owned by private individuals or whether a portion of the property was vested in the City under letters patent from the State in 1871 and 1888, to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, that from letters patent from the State to the Cammann estate it would appear that the title of the State to the land under water between high-water mark and the easterly line of improvement of the Harlem river, proposed by the United States Government, was conveyed to such estate, and that the estate claimed to be the owners of the entire parcel.

I understand that, according to the public press, the area of land under water, which was not acquired by the Bridge Department, was purchased by L. D. Dean on May 31, 1905, at public auction for \$95,800. The Department of Taxes and Assessments states that the property is known as Lot No. 100 on Block 3242, Section 11, and is assessed for 1906 at \$17,000.

This Department desires to acquire the land under water in question so that it may improve the property in accordance with the new plan adopted and approved, and I would respectfully request that a resolution be adopted authorizing me as Commissioner of Docks to make and serve upon the owner or owners an offer of \$17,000, the assessed valuation.

I see no objection to making the offer for the property, notwithstanding the statement made by the Corporation Counsel as to the doubt in the ownership of the property, inasmuch as no money would be paid by the City unless the title to the property is shown to the satisfaction of the Corporation Counsel to be not now vested in the City.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, *Comptroller:*

SIR—Hon. John A. Benschel, Commissioner, Department of Docks and Ferries, in communication under date of February 5, 1906, states that he desires to acquire the land under water for the improvement of the water front in the vicinity of Fordham road and Harlem river, Borough of The Bronx, which new plan was adopted by the Department of Docks and Ferries on March 28, 1905, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on April 5, 1905. He also requests that a resolution be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, authorizing him to make and serve upon the owner or owners an offer of \$17,000 for the purchase of same. I would report:

In the communication of the Commissioner he states that the Department of Docks and Ferries, under date of December 31, 1904, received from the Corporation Counsel a statement that he was unable to say whether the entire parcel was owned by private individuals, or whether a portion of the property was vested in the City under letters patent from the State in 1871 and 1888, to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York.

If there is any doubt in the mind of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries as to the ownership of the land in question, I think it inadvisable to make any offer for the purchase of same to any private party who may claim ownership, but would suggest that the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries refer the matter to the Corporation Counsel for a definite opinion as to the ownership, or, if none can be given without a search of the title, that the Commissioner request the Corporation Counsel for an opinion as to the proper procedure for him to follow in acquiring the premises in question.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, relative to a lease of the land under water extending from the outer end of Pier, new 32, near the foot of Canal street, North river, outshore to the pierhead line, to the Hudson Navigation Company (People's Evening Line of steamers):

NEW YORK, February 1, 1906.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., *Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

SIR—I beg to advise that, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, I have this day agreed to lease to the Hudson Navigation Company (People's Evening Line of steamers), the land under water extending from the outer end of Pier, new 32, near the foot of Canal street, North river, outshore to the pierhead line as established by the Secretary of War in 1897, with the privilege of erecting and maintaining an extension to the pier over such land under water, and of shedding such extension.

The extension in question will be about 125 feet long by about 65 feet wide. I respectfully request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve a lease of the land under water in question for a term of ten (10) years, with the privilege of a renewal term of ten years, the lessee to have the privilege of constructing an extension to the existing pier over the said land under water, and of shedding such extension at its own cost and expense, all work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department and in accordance with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by him; the extension and shed thereon to remain during the term of the lease or renewal thereof and rental to be paid therefor to the City quarter-yearly in advance at the rate of 25 cents per square foot per annum for the area occupied; the lease to begin on the date when the lease is dated, which date shall be within sixty days after the adoption of resolution by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approving the same, and the rental for the renewal term to be at an advance of 10 per cent. over the rental for the first term.

The lease to contain a stipulation expressly providing that the lessee will not at any time during the term of the lease or renewal thereof use the northerly side of the extension for berthing or tying-up purposes in any manner whatsoever, but that the City may use the north side of such extension for berthing or tying-up purposes only whenever it may see fit so to do.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now in use by this Department.

In connection therewith the Deputy Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

February 15, 1906.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, *Comptroller:*

SIR—Hon. John A. Benschel, Commissioner, Department of Docks and Ferries, in communication under date of February 1, 1906, states:

"That subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund I have this day agreed to lease to the Hudson Navigation Company (People's Evening Line of Steamers), the land under water extending from the outer end of Pier, new 32, near the foot of Canal street, North river, outshore to the pierhead line as established by the Secretary of War in 1897, with the privilege of erecting and maintaining an extension of the pier over such land under water and of shedding such extension."

I would report that the present Pier, new 32 (old 41), is owned by private parties.

By resolutions adopted by the Board of Docks May 14, 1897, the Board and the owners of Pier, new 32 (old 41), agreed that the owner of the pier and bulkhead was to relinquish to the City all its right in and to the said bulkhead and pier, between the established bulkhead line and the old bulkhead line, or the westerly side of old West street, and the City is to grant and convey to the corporation or owner of the pier and bulkhead in lieu and in exchange of said relinquished premises, the same rights of wharfage and other emoluments in the new bulkhead and in that portion of said pier heretofore extended under permit from the Department of Docks, provided the owner of said pier shall pay the City the sum of \$1,000 per annum for the excess of area in square feet of land under water covered by the extension of said pier beyond that covered by the portion of the pier lying between the westerly side of old West street and the westerly side of West street as widened.

The present proposed lease of land under water is for a further extension of this pier to the new pierhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1897.

The rate proposed, 25 cents per square foot per annum, is the usual rental for land under water, and I see no objections to the lease as proposed, and think the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly approve the action of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to the Hudson Navigation Company (People's Evening Line of Steamers), of land under water extending from the outer end of Pier, new 32, near the foot of Canal street, North river, outshore to the pierhead line, as established by the Secretary of War in 1897, for a term of ten years from the date of the lease, which date shall be within sixty days after the adoption of this resolution, at a rental at the rate of twenty-five cents (25c.) per square foot per annum for the area occupied, with the privilege of a renewal term of ten years, at a rental of 10 per cent. in advance over the rental for the first term; the lessee to have the privilege of constructing an extension to the existing pier over the said land under water, and of shedding such extension at its own cost and expense; all work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and in accordance with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by him. The lease to contain a stipulation expressly providing that the lessee will not at any time during the term of the lease, or renewal thereof, use the north side of the extension for berthing or tying-up purposes in any manner whatsoever, but that the City may use the north side of such extension for berthing or tying-up purposes whenever it may see fit to do so. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now in use by the Department of Docks and Ferries and as recommended by the Commissioner of Docks in communication dated February 1, 1906.

The following was received from the Board of Education relative to a lease of St. Veronica's School on Leroy street, between Hudson and Greenwich streets, Borough of Manhattan:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Buildings respectfully reports that the City Superintendent of Schools has urged that the parochial school of St. Veronica's Church, on the south side of Leroy street, between Hudson and Greenwich streets, Manhattan, be leased for the purpose of relieving the congestion prevailing in the Ninth District, which action is also urgently recommended by the Local School Board of said district. The Departments of Health and Buildings certify that the sanitary and structural conditions thereat are satisfactory.

The following resolution is submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they are hereby requested to authorize a lease of St. Veronica's School, on the south side of Leroy street, between Hudson and Greenwich streets, Borough of Manhattan, as an annex to Public School 3, for a period of one year from February 1, 1906, with the privilege of renewal for one year, at an annual rental of \$4,000 and taxes, payable quarterly; the owners, Church of St. Veronica, Incorporated, Rev. Joseph F. Flannelly, Secretary, No. 657 Washington street, Manhattan, to keep the roof in repair; the Board of Education to make interior repairs and alterations and furnish light, heat and janitor's service.

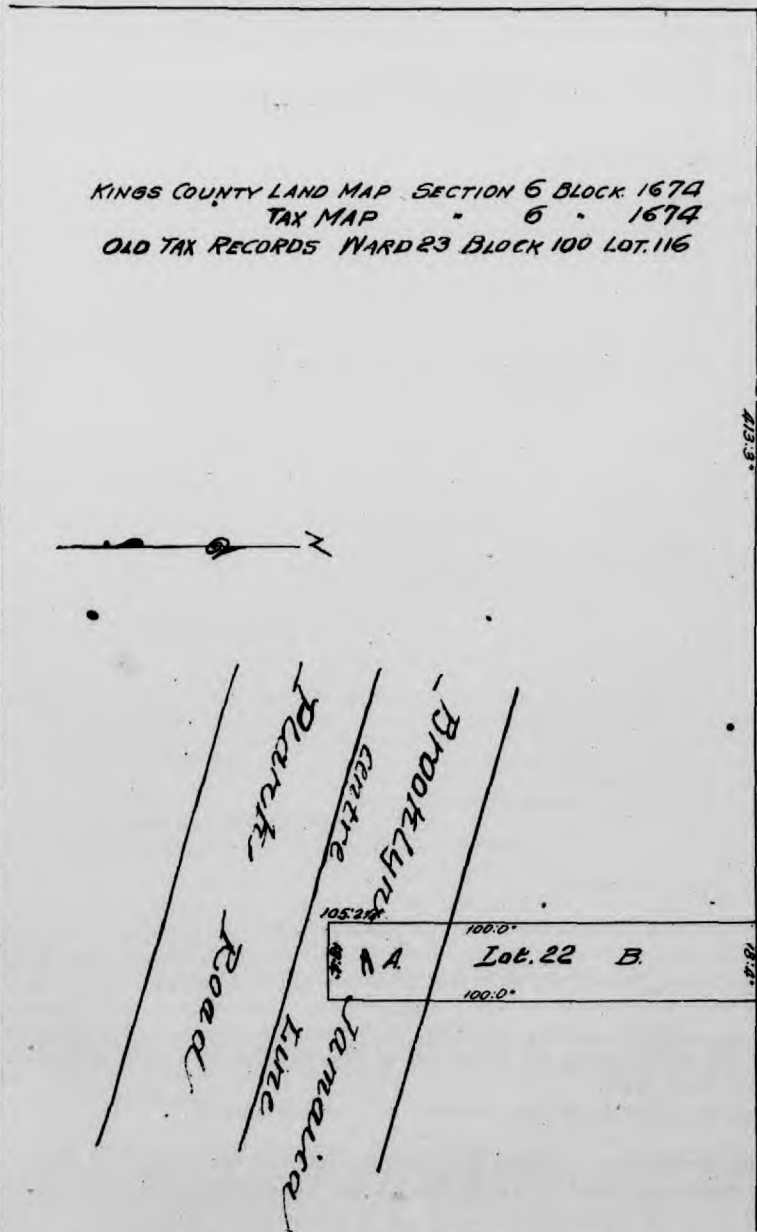

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report with opinion of the Corporation Counsel and offered the following resolution:

February 5, 1906.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—W. Wallace Howland, in a verified petition under date of January 31, 1906, addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, which is hereto attached and forms part of this report, requests a release of the City's interest to all that portion of the lands of the Brooklyn and Jamaica Plank road, within the area of property owned by him, located in the Borough of Brooklyn. The said land is shown on the diagram annexed to the petition and consists of two parcels, which are respectively designated thereon by the letters "A" and "B." The property is located in the Twenty-third Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, and is designated on the land and tax map of the County of Kings as Lot No. 22 in Section 6, Block 1674, and on the old tax records as Ward 23, Lot No. 116, Block 100.

The petitioner states that a portion of the said tract of land marked "A" on said diagram lies in the bed of the old Brooklyn and Jamaica Plank road, which was formerly a public highway; that many years ago the said Brooklyn and Jamaica Plank road was closed and ceased to be a public highway, and the lands which lie within the boundary of said road were fenced in and occupied by adjoining owners, and houses and buildings erected thereon, and that when the said road was so discontinued the petitioner states that he is informed and believes that the adjoining owners went into possession of such part of said road as lay in front of their respective land, and further, the petitioner states that he has a perfect record title to the balance of the said tract marked "B" on the diagram annexed to the petition, and also deeds of conveyance to him of all of the lands marked "A" on said diagram, lying in that portion of the old Brooklyn and Jamaica Plank road abutting his property from the former owners of the abutting property; that the portion of the old road has been included in the annual assessment roll and taxes have been levied thereon, and that the petitioner and his predecessors in title have paid taxes on this portion of the old road ever since the same was abandoned as a highway and for about thirty years last past.

The question as to whether the interest of the City in this old road was material or nominal has been passed upon by the Corporation Counsel many times in opinions written by him, in which he held that the interest of the City therein was merely nominal, and more particularly in the matter of the application of Samuel J. Hughes, as executor of John Hughes, which was presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at their meeting held June 27, 1900 (see Minutes, Sinking Fund, 1900, page 289), the Corporation Counsel stated in an opinion under date of April 27, 1900.

"I would say that the interest of the City of Brooklyn in the old Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike was never claimed to be by that city more than nominal. Quite-claim deeds were given, from time to time, by resolution of the Common Council, at the request of property-owners who desired thus to remove any possible cloud that might rest upon their property by reason of the former use thereof as a turnpike. The consideration asked for these deeds was nominal, and no proper application was refused. The title to the land covered by this road was passed upon by the Court of Appeals in the case of Dunham vs. Williams (37 N. Y., 251), and it appears by the opinion in that case that the land, although formerly owned by the government, was subsequently condemned for use as a turnpike, and damages were assessed in favor of the corporate authorities of Brooklyn and Flatbush as claimants of the fee in the roadbed. The land was subsequently transferred to the Brooklyn and Jamaica Road Company, and was afterwards sold by that corporation, under legislative authority, to other parties. My answer to your \* \* \* question is, that the interest of The City of New York in the property described in the petition submitted with your communication is merely nominal."

I would respectfully recommend that the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to whether the interest of the City is material or nominal and merely a cloud upon the title of a private owner. If he should certify that the interest of the City is nominal and a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter, may properly authorize a release or quit-claim for a nominal consideration to W. Wallace Howland of all the right, title and interest of The City of New York in and to all that portion of the old Brooklyn and Jamaica Plank road lying within the area of the following-described property:

All that certain lot, piece or parcel of land situate, lying and being in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the southerly side of McDonough street distant 413 feet 3 inches easterly from the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly side of McDonough street with the easterly side of Sumner avenue; running thence southerly parallel with Sumner avenue and part of the distance through a party wall 100 feet; thence easterly parallel with McDonough street 18 feet 4 inches; thence northerly parallel with Sumner avenue and part of the distance through a party wall 100 feet to the southerly side of McDonough street; thence westerly along said southerly side of McDonough street 18 feet 4 inches to the point or place of beginning.

—upon the condition that the petitioner shall produce evidence that all the taxes, assessments and water rates now a lien upon said premises or any portion thereof, or any sale for the non-payment of taxes, assessments or water rates upon said property or any portion thereof, shall have been paid before receiving such release from the City. I would also recommend that if the Corporation Counsel shall decide that the interest of the City is not material and purely a cloud upon the title, that the interest of the City be appraised at the nominal sum of \$1, and that the expense and cost of such release, examination, etc., be fixed at \$100, to be paid by the said petitioner before the delivery of such release.

SIR—I have your communication of February 5, 1906, transmitting for my consideration an application made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by W. Wallace Howland for a release of a portion of the old Brooklyn and Jamaica Plank road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, together with a report made to you on the subject by the Bureau of Real Estate and Department of Finance. You request me to advise you whether the interest of The City of New York in this piece of property is material or simply a cloud upon the title of a private owner, and if the latter, so to certify that the matter may be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter.

The status of this old road in the Borough of Brooklyn has been the subject of many communications from the Corporation Counsel to the Comptroller. It is one of those highways in the City of Brooklyn which have been long since closed to public travel and have passed under private control. Municipal taxes have been imposed upon this property. It has been subject to assessments for local improve-

ments, and the municipality has exercised no other jurisdiction over it than it has exercised over other private property in the City.

I advise you that the interest of The City of New York in that portion of the old Brooklyn and Jamaica Plank road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, lying within the area of the property hereinafter described, is a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner. Said property is bounded and described as follows:

All that certain lot, piece or parcel of land, situate, lying and being in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the southerly side of McDonough street, distant 413 feet 3 inches easterly from the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly side of McDonough street with the easterly side of Sumner avenue; running thence southerly parallel with Sumner avenue and part of the distance through a party wall 100 feet; thence easterly parallel with McDonough street 18 feet 4 inches; thence northerly parallel with Sumner avenue and part of the distance through a party wall 100 feet to the southerly side of McDonough street; thence westerly along said southerly side of McDonough street, 18 feet 4 inches to the point or place of beginning.

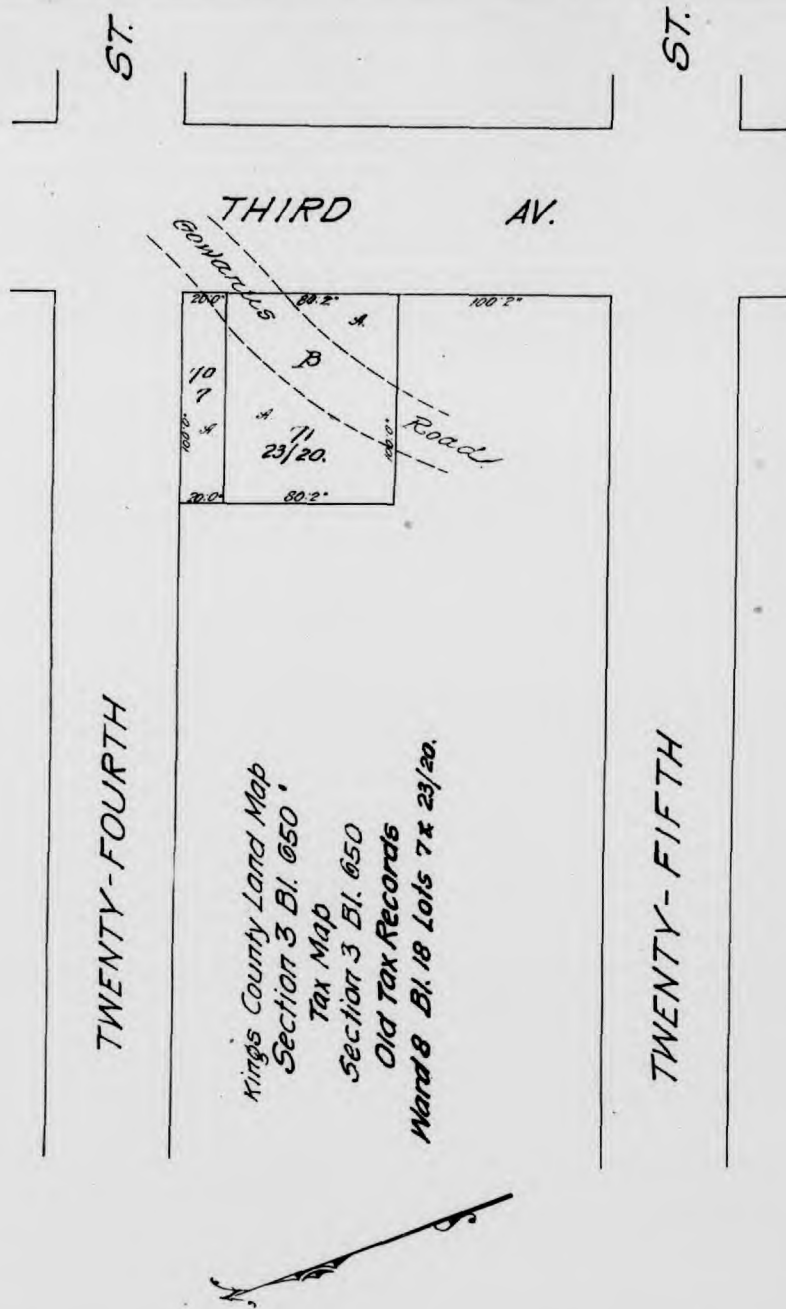

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Alexander M. White, in a verified petition addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of January 17, 1906, which is hereto annexed and forms part of this report, requests a release of the City's interest to all that portion of the old Gowanus road, which premises are part of property owned by him, shown on the diagram annexed to the petition, consists of two parcels which are respectively designated thereon by letters "A" and "B," the property being located in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn and designated on the land map of the County of Kings as Lots Nos. 70 and 71, Section 3, Block 650, and that the portion of the said tract marked "B" on the diagram lies in the bed of the old Gowanus road.

The petitioner states that he has a perfect record title to the parcel marked "A" on the diagram, and also deeds of conveyance to him of all the land marked "B" on the diagram attached to the petition, lying in this portion of the old Gowanus road from the former owners of the property, and that the petitioner has been in possession of the whole of said plot and his predecessors in title for years have been in possession of the same, it having been inclosed and buildings erected thereon, and that the portion of the old Gowanus road in question has been included in the annual assessment roll and taxes have been paid thereon, and that your petitioner and his predecessors in title have paid taxes on the old road ever since the same was abandoned as a highway for more than thirty years last past.

The statements made in the petition have been confirmed by this Bureau, and "in view of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel frequently expressed in previous cases that the old Gowanus road was a Dutch road and upon its abandonment title to the same reverted to the Government; that the interest of the City in the land included within the limits is very slight and in no way substantial, and that a nominal sum would be sufficient for a quit-claim deed, and in view of the fact that similar releases to the one above requested and made by the City of Brooklyn under resolutions of the Common Council and since consolidation, by The City of New York by resolutions of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, have been made for a nominal consideration," it would appear to me that there is no objection to granting the application of Alexander M. White in this instance. (See Minutes, Sinking Fund, 1901, page 419.)

I would respectfully recommend that the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to whether the interest of the City in the premises is material or merely nominal and a cloud upon the title of a private owner, and if he should certify that the interest of the City is merely nominal and a cloud upon the title of a private owner, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter may properly authorize a quit-claim for a nominal consideration to Alexander M. White of all the right, title and interest of The City of New York to all that portion of the old Gowanus road within the lines of the following-described property:

All that certain lot, piece or parcel of land, situate, lying and being in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, County of Kings, and State of New York, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the southwesterly corner of Third avenue and Twenty-fourth street; running thence southerly along the westerly side of Third avenue 100 feet 2 inches; thence westerly parallel with Twenty-fourth street 100 feet; thence northerly parallel with Third avenue 100 feet 2 inches to Twenty-fourth street; thence easterly along the southerly side of Twenty-fourth street 100 feet to the point or place of beginning,—upon the condition that the petitioner shall produce evidence that all the taxes, assessments and water rates now a lien upon said premises, or any portion thereof, or any sale for the non-payment of taxes, assessments and water rates, have been paid before receiving such release from the City.

I would further recommend that if the Corporation Counsel shall decide that the interest of the City in this property is not material and purely a cloud upon the title of a private owner, that the interest of the City be appraised at the nominal sum of

\$1 and that the expense of such release, examination, etc., be fixed at the sum of \$100, to be paid by the petitioner before the delivery of such release.

SIR—I have received your communication of January 31, 1906, transmitting for my consideration an application made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by Alexander M. White for a release of a portion of the old Gowanus road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, together with a report made to you on the subject by the Bureau of Real Estate, in the Department of Finance, and I am asked to advise you whether the interest of The City of New York in this piece of property is material or simply nominal and a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner. If the latter, you ask me so to certify that the matter may be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter.

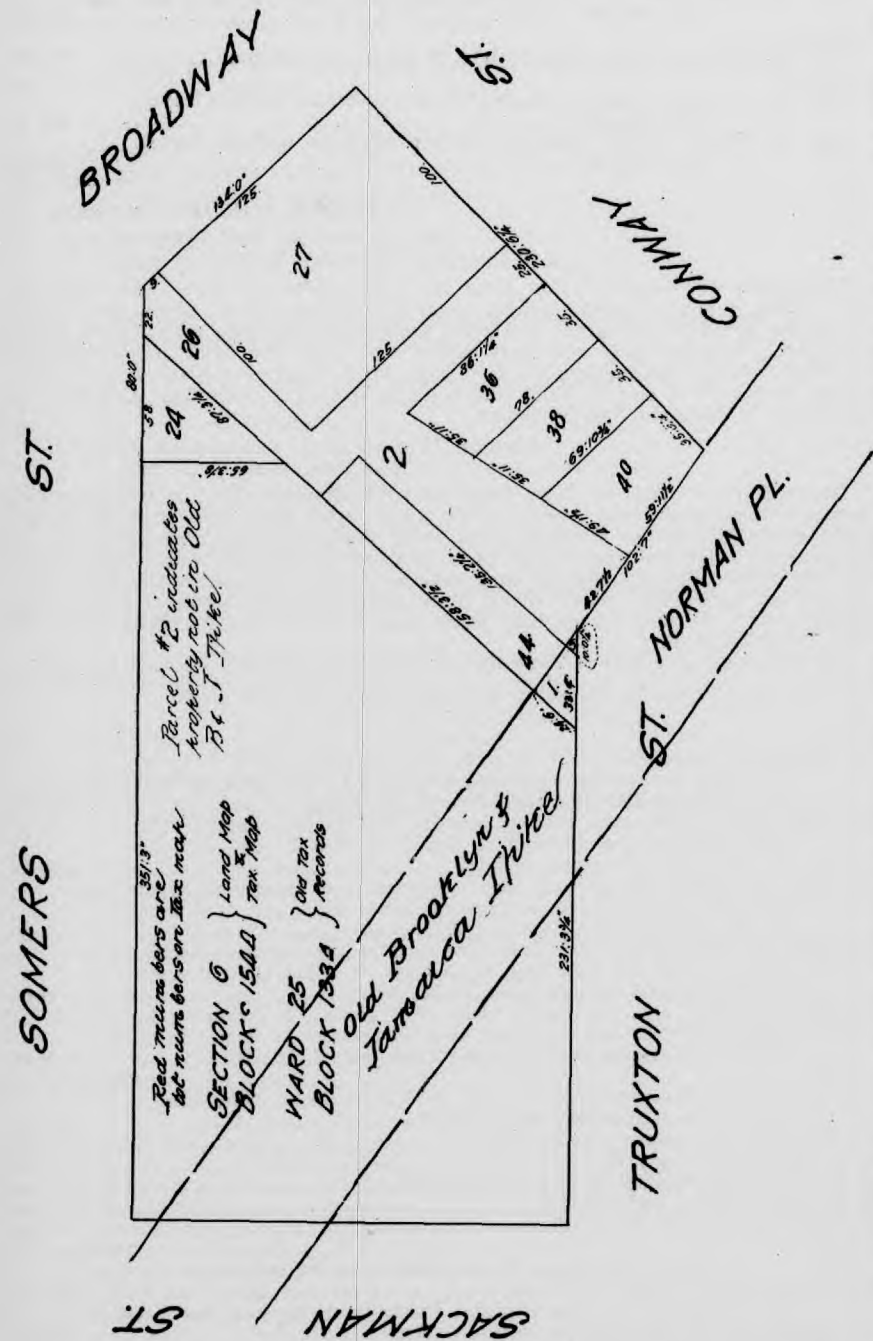

SIR—Wilhelmina Meyer, in a verified petition under date of December 19, 1905, addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requests a release or quit claim of all the right, title and interest of The City of New York in and to a portion of an old road, formerly known as the Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike, adjoining property owned by her at the junction of Norman place and Conway street, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The petitioner states that she is the owner or claims ownership of all that tract of land shown on the diagram hereto attached, consisting of three parcels, which are respectively designated thereon by the numbers 1, 2 and 3. That said property is located in the Twenty-fifth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn and is designated on the land and tax maps of the County of Kings as Lots Nos. 24, 26, 27, 36, 38, 40 and 44, in Section 6, Block 1544, and that the portion of said tract marked 1 and 3 on the diagram lies in the bed of the old Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike, which was formerly a public highway.

The petitioner further states that she has a perfect record title to the balance of the tract marked 2 on the annexed diagram, and also deeds of conveyance to her of all the lands marked 1 and 3 lying in the bed of the old Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike from the former owners of the abutting property. That a portion of the old road has been included in the annual assessment roll and taxes have been levied thereon, and that the petitioner and her predecessors in title have paid taxes on this portion of the old road ever since the same was abandoned as a highway.

The status of this old road has been passed upon by the Corporation Counsel many times and more particularly in the matter of the application of Samuel J. Hughes for a release of a portion of the old Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike, which was presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on June 27, 1900 (see minutes, Sinking Fund, 1900, page 287), stated:

"I would say that the interest of the City of Brooklyn in the old Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike was never claimed to be by that city more than nominal. Quit-claim deeds were given from time to time, by resolution of the Common Council, at the request of property owners, who desired thus to remove any possible cloud that might rest upon their property by reason of the former use thereof as a turnpike. The consideration asked for these deeds was nominal and no proper application was

refused. The title to the land covered by this road was passed upon by the Court of Appeals in the case of Dunham vs. Williams (37 N. Y., 251), and it appears by the opinion in that case that the land, although formerly owned by the Government, was subsequently demanded for use as a turnpike, and damages were assessed in favor of the corporate authorities of Brooklyn and Flatbush as claimants of the fee in the road beds. The land was subsequently transferred to the Brooklyn and Jamaica Road Company and was afterwards sold by that corporation under legislative authority to other parties. My answer to your first question is that the interest of The City of New York in the property described in the petition submitted with your communication is merely nominal."

I would respectfully recommend that this application be transmitted to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to whether the City's interest in the property is material or a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner, and if he should certify that the interest of The City of New York is not material and a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner, then, pursuant to section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly authorize a release or quit claim for a nominal consideration to Wilhelmina Meyer of all the right, title and interest of The City of New York in and to all that portion of the old Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike included within the lines of the following described property:

All that certain plot, piece or parcel of land, situate, lying and being in the Borough of Brooklyn, of The City of New York, County of Kings, and State of New York, bounded and described as follows, to wit:

Beginning at the corner formed by the intersection of the northerly side of Truxton street with the northeasterly side of Norman place; running thence westerly along the northerly side of Truxton street 43 feet 4 1/4 inches, more or less, to a point where said side of Truxton street would be intersected by a line drawn southwesterly in direct continuation of the southeasterly line of land of Mary Losee; thence northeasterly along said line drawn southwesterly in direct continuation of the southeasterly line of said land 24 feet 6 inches, more or less, to the northeasterly side of the old Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike; thence southeasterly along the northeasterly side of said turnpike to the northerly side of Truxton street, the point or place of beginning,

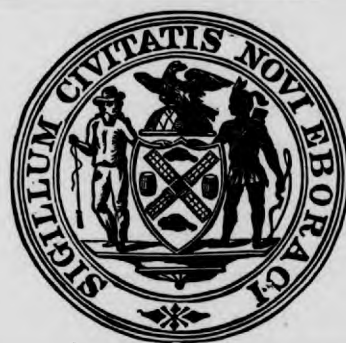

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Council, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. ## OFFICIAL JOURNAL OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

There shall be published daily, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, under a contract to be made as hereinafter provided, a paper to be known as the CITY RECORD. And said CITY RECORD, and the newspapers now by law designated as corporation newspapers in the present City of Brooklyn, shall be the only papers to be included within the term corporation newspapers, as the same is used anywhere in this act; . . . There shall be inserted in said CITY RECORD nothing aside from such official matters as are expressly authorized. . . . All advertising required to be done for the City, except as in this act otherwise specially provided, and all notices required by law or ordinance to be published in corporation papers, shall be inserted at the public expense only in the CITY RECORD, and the publication therein shall be a sufficient compliance with any law or ordinance requiring publication of such matters or notices. . . . The Comptroller shall cause a continuous series of the CITY RECORD to be bound as completed, quarterly, and to be deposited with his certificate thereon in the office of the Register of Deeds of the County of New York in the County Clerk's office of said County, and in the office of the City Clerk, and copies of the contents of any of the same, certified by such Register, County Clerk or City Clerk, shall be received in judicial proceedings as prima facie evidence of the truth of the contents thereof.—§1526. *Greater New York Charter.*
