





## Project Description For Team Up to Clean Up

Our students were excited to be participating in the Golden Apple Awards this year. Recycling is very important and children can learn so much about our world and our environment as they become aware of the issues involved with pollution and recycling. By participating in a project such as this, it becomes a clever way to introduce writing, math and science concepts in a realistic and meaningful manner.

The children were very eager to start, but what to do? It had to be something exciting, something original, something that would have lasting value. They came up with a great idea. Why not write a book about recycling so that other children could learn about the topic and see how important it is to recycle materials and create less waste.


The students began their project by going to the library and the internet to find information about New York City, pollution and recycling. The amount of information available was overwhelming. It was important for them to understand that even though pollution and garbage are big problems there are solutions and you can make a difference. The boys and girls spent several days sorting through the facts and organizing useful details. They were especially impressed by messy statistics like the fact that it takes one hundred years for a diaper to decay and yet one baby could go through as many as eight thousand diapers in its lifetime. One student vowed to invent a diaper that was really disposable! They were also shocked to learn that a big city like New York only recycles 18% of its garbage while a city like Seattle recycles more of its garbage. Reading and understanding informational materials is part of the New York State Learning Standards but the student were having too much fun to know this.

The next step was to develop a storyline and create characters. In our story three teenage children learn that they can make a difference by pitching in and doing community service. They begin their adventure by doing community service that has been assigned to them as a punishment. They have to clean their local park. In the park, the kids meet three "magical" animals who help them to understand who is affected by garbage, how it affects our environment and what they can do to help. The teens in the story are so enthused that they continue to do community service on a volunteer basis. They organize and sponsor a recycling awareness week in their school. They also publish a newsletter to inform their classmates about what kinds of things can be recycled in their homes and at school.

Art often imitates life. Our real life students did everything the characters did. Our students sponsored a recycling awareness week. They published a newsletter and created posters and artwork to teach kids how to reduce, reuse and recycle. They also volunteered to help clean and beautify our school garden. However, our real life students did something more. They created a book which will be shared with the sixth grade classes. A copy of the book will be given to each of the sixth grade teachers to keep in their class library. Our school is also going to publish a few copies to give to several elementary schools in the Dyker community.

Within our school the project has been very successful. Several teachers have requested copies of the newsletter to read with their science classes and special education classes. The sixth grade teachers have also requested that the eighth grade authors of the book come into the class to do an author read aloud for the children.

Overall, even if the students do not win this awards competition, they learned a great deal. We enjoyed putting this project together. Our hope is that you enjoy it too!



"What she's trying to say buddy" Shaun says putting his hand on Mike's shoulder "is that you and I will be long gone, but our unrecycled garbage will be around forever."


"Yeah, that's why we have to clean up and recycle."

Snappy turns to us sitting in the audience and says "I hope you liked our story. I know I enjoyed telling it."



## Is The City of Seattle Better Than The Big Apple? By Brian Fang



We recycle as much as much as we can, and use only the approved plastics. Is Seattle better than New York City? When it comes to recycling Seattle sets the nation wide standard. Seattle's plan was to recycle up to 60% of it's waste by 2008. This is a very tough goal.

Critics of the plan say that recycling costs too much money and does little for the environment overall. Just last summer, NYC stopped recycling glasses and plastics in order to cut the city's budget.

Starting January 1st of 2005 recycling will become mandatory for all resident of Seattle. This city throws out about 72,000 tons of recyclable papers each year. The amount of money spent on recycling is amazing. Seattle is projected to have a net cost of \$272,000 next year. On the other hand, by 2007 a net savings of \$2 million dollars is expected The more trash that gets recycled from the landfills, the more money the city will eventually save.

NYC produces 11,000 tons of garbage a day. We are running out of room to dump all this garbage. Our garbage sometimes travels as far as Pennsylvania and Virginia and we can't burn it because that will create air pollution. Yet we only recycle 18% of our garbage. We can definitely learn a lesson from Seattle. It will be expensive now but later it will be better for everyone.

#### Did you Know...

- That A stack of old newspaper
   3 feet tall can save one tree?
- New York creates enough garbage in one day to fill up the Empire State Building.
- An apple or banana peel takes 3-4 days to decay, a can will take 10 years, a diaper takes close to a hundred years to decay, but the worse is a glass bottle. This takes a million years to decay!
- It would take all the trees in Central Park to print one edition of the Sunday Times.


