## HEALTH DEPARTMENT

#### Milk Inspection.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, No. 301 MOTT STREET, NEW YORK, February I, 1880.

WALTER DEF. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent:

Sir.—I have the honor to report that agreeably to directions from President Chandler, I have visited several of the largest and best-known dairies of New Haven and of Hartford Counties, Connecticut, in order to test the correctness of the specific gravity standard which has been adopted by the Board of Health of the City of New York and others, as representing the minimum gravity of milk obtained from healthy and well-fed cows, when unadulterated with water or any other abnormal ingredient, as well as to test the accuracy of the lactometer, which has been selected by the Board of Health of the City of New York for determining such specific gravities.

Expressed more briefly, an inspection was made to ascertain, so far as possible, the answers to the following questions:

the following questions:

1. Does any cow in ordinary flow secrete milk which, at a temperature of 60° Fahrenheit, exhibits a lower specific gravity than 1029?

2. Does any milk, at a temperature of 60° Fahrenheit, cause the lactometer to float below the 100th line of its scale?

Inasmuch as the fatty principles which are represented in part by the cream, are those principles of the milk whose specific gravity tends to lower the specific gravity of the milk as a whole, most of the physical analyses of milk contained in this report were made at Farmington Connecticut, where one of the oldest and most successful creameries or laboratories for making butter is situated, and about which are found the purest breeds of foreign stock, which have been imported with special reference to their butter-making capacity.

Farmington is also the place which others who have attempted to nullify the standards which have been adopted by your Board, have selected as calculated to verify their erroneous conclusions.

be lighter.

This small quantity of milk taken from the cow at noon is simply a fraction of the milk which would come at a milking, and its specific gravity is of no consequence in considering the questions under discussion.

Commercial milk is either all of the milk at a morning's milking, or all of the milk at an evening's milking

1. That the specific gravity standard of 1.029, which has been adopted by the Health Department of the Board of Health of the City of New York, as the minimum for pure milk at a temperature of 60° Fahrenheit is nearly 10 per cent below the average standard of milk as obtained by these tests, and discriminates in favor of fraudulent dealers to this percentage extent.

2. No sample of milk tested caused the lactometer to float at a lower level than that indicated by the 100th line of its scale.

SIR—We have the honor to report that, in accordance with your directions, we have visited certain dairies in Westchester County for the purpose of testing the accuracy of the standard adopted by the Department for the lactometer.

Each cow being well milked, a portion, after thoroughly incorporating the contents of each pail, was removed for the purpose of testing, which was done by cooling said portion to 60° Fahr. and examining its specific gravity by means of the lactometer adopted by the Department, whose O point is 1.000 and 100° is 1.029 at 60° Fahr. The age of the cow, breed, number of calves, and time of birth of the last calf, were recorded at the same time. In many cases the data on these points could only be given approximately, as none of the farmers, whose cows were examined, keep a herd book in which such matters are recorded.

In no instance was the lactometer found to stand below 103 on its scale, equal to a specific gravity of 1.02987, the average of 100 samples being 109°.3, or a specific gravity of 1.03169.

From this we conclude that the standard, adopted by the Board of Health on the lactometer for pure milk, is at least three degrees on its scale below the poorest milk from healthy cows, and that the average of a dairy is at least six degrees above said standard; and that brewers' grains, when fed properly to cows, that is, in a good condition, with proper admixture of meal, give good milk, as is shown by the above analysis of one of the poorer specimens.
