

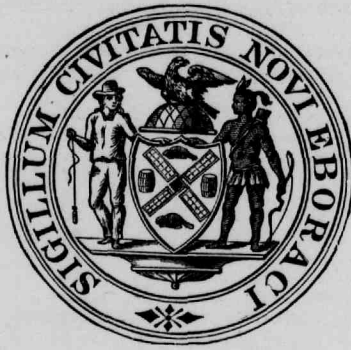

### POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Report for the Quarter ending March 31, 1880.

POLICE DEPARTMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK,

To the Honorable EDWARD COOPER,  
Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—Pursuant to section 27, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York, hereby respectfully submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending March 31, 1880.

#### REPORT.

On the 31st day of March, 1880, the number of members of the force of the several grades, including Surgeons, was 2,531.

#### SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the Police force, by reason of sickness, disability, and injuries, for the quarter ending March 31, 1880, and the details thereof, are shown in the annexed table, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the time lost was 7,622½ days.

All the old material taken from said Pier, old 37, and the sheds and buildings thereon, to be removed under this contract, will be relinquished to the contractor, and bidders must estimate the value of such material when considering the price for which they will do the work under the contract.
