SIR—Pursuant to section 40, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby respectfully submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending June 30, 1886:

#### REPORT.

On the 30th day of June, 1886, the number of members of the force, of all grades, including Surgeons and Probationary Employees, was 2,951.

#### SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability, and injuries, for the quarter, and the details thereof, are shown in schedule annexed, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the time lost was 7,013½ days.

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the arrests for particular offenses on felony report and on general report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made up from the daily returns from the station-houses and the felony report from quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station-house, at the time the arrest is made, is liable to be and frequently is changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the magistrate.
