Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending February 20, 1875, respectively.

Resolved, That the resolution recently passed, appointing Andrew J. Dowd a Commissioner of Deeds, be amended so as to read "Andrew Dowd," and, as amended, the same be adopted.

§ 15. The owner or occupant, or person having charge of each house or other building, or lot or lots of ground in the City of New York, shall, within the first four hours after every fall of snow, or hail, or rain, which shall freeze on the sidewalks and in the gutters, cause the same to be removed and in the gutters, cause the same to be removed entirely from off the sidewalks opposite such house, entirely from off the sidewalks opposite such house, building, lot, or land, under the penalty of three dollars for every such neglect, to be paid by the said owner, occupant, or person having charge, everally and respectively.

§ 16. In case the ice or snow shall be so congealed that it cannot be removed without injury to the payement, the owner occupant, or person

to the pavement, the owner, occupant, or person having charge of any building, lot, or land as aforesaid, shall, within the first four hours after every fall thereof, cause the sidewalks opposite the particular of the company of th his, her, or their premises to be strewed with ashes or sand, under the penalty of one dollar, to be paid by the owner or occupant, or person having charge thereof, severally and respec-

Alderman Gilon moved to amend the resolution by striking out, after the words "straighten South street," the words "and to allow the Police Department to fill in the inner portion of said slip with ashes and other filling; "also by striking out the word "such" after the word "prevent," and by adding to the resolution the following: "And the Police Department is hereby directed and authorized to supply ashes and other proper material to the Dock Department for the purpose of filling in said slips to the proposed temporary bulkhead, the work of filling to be done under the direction and at the expense of the Department of Docks."

SIR-Your letter to me of the 27th of January ultimo requests my opinion upon

First. Assuming that the Board of Police have tried a member of the force on charges, found him guilty, pronounced or rendered found him guilty, pronounced or rendered judgment against him of dismissal from the force, and thereby removed him from his office, which judgment is filed and recorded, and is in form and substance according to law and the rules and regulations of the Department,—you desire to know whether the Board has the power to set aside, vacate, reconsider, or otherwise annul said judgment, and thus restore the member to his office. I do not think the Board has this power.

When it has once taken action, and tried a member of the force and dismissed him, its power is exhausted so far as relates to the judgment of dismissal. The only method by which a member of the force who has thus been dismissed can be restored is that provided in section 3 of chapter 755 of the Laws of 1873. Under the statute, any member of the force not otherwise disqualified, who has resigned or been dismissed therefrom, may be reappointed by the concurring vote of all the Commissioners comprising the Board, to be taken by "yeas" and "nays," and recorded in the minutes.

Second. You state that a grave charge was made against Patrolman William H. Shaw, and that he was suspended from duty of the 24th of June, 1874; that he was tried on the charge, and dismissed from the force on the 23d of October, 1874—a period of 120 days having elapsed between the date of suspension and the dismissal, during which 120 days he did no duty; that on or about the 1st day of July, 1874, said Shaw was arrested on the charge of larceny, and committed to the Tombs; that he was detained in that prison from July 2 to August 11, a term of 40 days, being a July 2 to August 11, a term of 40 days, being a part of the term of suspension above mentioned. You state that Shaw makes claim for pay for the whole term of the suspension, and you ask to be advised whether he is entitled to pay for the time he was in the Tombs, and also whether he is entitled to pay for any part of the time during which he was suspended and did no duty.

I have carefully examined all the laws relating to the Police Department which I suppose to be now in force, including the Charter of 1873, chapter 755 of the laws of that year; also the various laws relating to the old Metropolitan Police, and the Department of Police, created by the Charter of 1870; and also the rules and regulations of the of 1870; and also the rules and regulations of the present Department of Police;—but I do not find in the statutes, nor in the rules, any express provision whatever in relation to the matter of the suspension of Patrolmen from duty. There can be no doubt that the Board governing the Department of Police have authority, under the general powers vested in it, to suspend a Patrolman from duty that is, they may prevent his performing the ordinary duties of a Policeman; but, after a carefu examination, I do not find any provision of the statutes expressly authorizing the Board to deprive statutes expressly authorizing the board to deprive a Patrolman of pay during the period of such suspension; nor do I find anywhere among the very elaborate and carefully prepared rules and regulations any such provision. Section 55 of the regulations any such provision. Section 55 of the Charter of 1873 authorizes the Board, in its discretion, on the conviction of a member of the force of certain offenses, to punish the offending party by reprimand—forfeiting and withholding pay a specified time—or dismissal from the force; but it is expressly declared that no more than thirty days' pay shall be forfeited for any offense. The powers of the Board to make general rules and regulations for the government of the force are of the most ample character; and it may be that the Board, if it thought such a regulation wise, could adopt a general rule declaring that whenever a Patrolman was suspended from duty he should forfeit his pay during the period of such he should forfeit his pay during the period of such suspension. It is not, however, clear, in view of suspension. It is not, nowever, clear, in view of the limitation of power above mentioned, contained in section 55 of the Charter, that the Board could forfeit the pay of a Patrolman for more than thirty days. This question has not been submitted to me, and it is not at present necessary to pass upon it. As above stated, there is nothing in any statute relating to the Police force declaring that a member thereof the Police force declaring that a member thereof suspended from duty shall forfeit his pay, nor has any general rule or regulation, so far as I am informed, ever been adopted to that effect. In the absence of such provision in the statutes, and in the rules and regulations, I do not think that the mere suspension of a Patrolman operates to deprive him of his pay.

I have had considerable doubt as to whether

Patrolman Shaw could be paid for the period during which he was detained in the Tombs. during which he was detained in the Tombs. I learn, upon inquiry, that the indictment found against him was finally nolle pros'd by the District Attorney. I do not find anything in the statutes, nor in the regulations, which covers such a case as this. Very good reasons can be given why he should not be paid; and some, perhaps, equally good, why he should be. In the absence of any provision of the statutes and of any general rule or regulation on the subject, I have concluded finally to advise you in this case to allow pay for the entire period from the time Shaw was suspended to the time he was finally dismissed suspended to the time he was finally dismissed from the force, including the forty days during which he was detained in the Tombs. You also state, in your communication to me,

that Charles J. Sheehy was suspended on the 29th of May, 1874, and remained suspended until July 21, 1874, a term of fifty-three days, when he was dismissed from the force; that he petitions to be restored by vacating the judgment, and also de-mands from the Board payment for the fifty-three

days of suspension during which he did no duty.
In accordance with the views above expressed,
I advise you that the judgment of dismissal in
Sheehy's case cannot be vacated, and that he can only be restored by the concurrent vote of all the Commissioners in the manner provided by section 3 of chapter 755 of the Laws of 1873.

I also advise you that he is entitled to be paid

for the fifty-three days during which he was suspended from duty.
