It shall be the duty of Inspectors, Captains of Precincts, and officers in command of squads, to require and enforce strict compliance with this Rule.

RULE 223.

"A." Pay-rolls of members of the force and employees shall be made in duplicate upon blanks furnished at the Central Department. They shall contain and show the name and rank of each person; the rate of compensation per annum, per month or per diem established by and in pursuance of law; the time for which each person is entitled to payment; the amount due and payable to each. The total amount of the pay-roll, and a receipt in full of all demands to date to be signed in duplicate by each person whose name is borne on the pay-roll.

"B." The Chief Clerk shall cause the pay-rolls to be examined, audited, verified, and certified,

The correctness of the names and the number of names carried on the roll shall be verified by comparison with the Force Books, and certified by the Clerk who keeps those books.

The correctness of the time of service credited to each person, and for which he is entitled to pay, shall be verified by comparison with the Time Books, and certified by the Clerk who keeps those

The extensions and footings shall be examined and corrected by two clerks in the Chief Clerk's office, and certified by them. The footings shall be verified by the Treasurer's bookkeeper; and the pay-roll thus audited and verified shall be certified by the Chief Clerk and presented to the Board of Police.

"C." Claims, bills, and demands for Police expenditure (other than pay-rolls) shall be made in duplicate and referred to the Committee through which the liability was incurred. The Committee will examine and audit such claims, bills, and demands, and cause them to be verified in pursuance of law and the rules and regulations of the Department, and report them to the Board of Police with a recommendation in relation to the payment thereof.

All other claims and demands will be submitted to and audited and disposed of by the Board.

"D." All payments of money on pay-rolls, or other claims, will be made in pursuance of the orders of the Board of Police. The Treasurer will make payments in pursuance of such orders by checks, upon duplicate vouchers, one copy to be filed in the office of the Treasurer, and one copy

ransmitted to the Finance Department.

"E." Captains shall attend (at the Central Department) in the examination of pay-rolls, and the Chief Clerk is instructed not to examine pay-rolls without the presence of the Captain, except in case of unavoidable absence.
