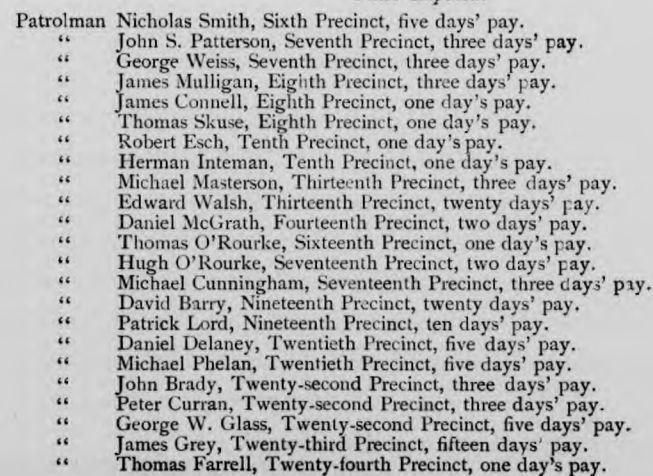

Abstract of proceedings for the week ending December 9, 1876.

MEETING, WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 6, 1876.

Proposals for lighting the lamps in the public parks, etc., under the control of the Department, from January 1, 1877, to April 30, 1877, inclusive, were received, as follows, viz.:

For the illuminating material for each lamp, and for the lighting, cleaning and relaying the same, and replacing the cocks, tubes, stand-pipes, burners and other appliances which may be used for a like purpose, and cross-heads, lamp-irons and lanterns thereto, and keeping each lamp and lamp-post in thorough repair:

The portions of the city included in the foregoing proposals are as follows:

## FIRST—THE NEW YORK GAS-LIGHT COMPANY.

The district lying south of the centre of Grand street, from the East river to Sullivan street, and Canal street to the North river.

## SECOND—THE MANHATTAN GAS-LIGHT COMPANY.

On the north by the centre line of Thirty-fourth street.

heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto  
liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or  
proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enroll-  
ment notice," requiring them to appear before me this  
year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be an-  
swered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under  
severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof  
of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving  
full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention  
paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called  
or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or  
interference permitted. The fines, received from those  
who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at  
the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and it  
unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of  
the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and  
secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their  
duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their  
clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt  
at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment.  
Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer  
absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and  
District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a mis-  
demeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer  
it is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or  
receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in re-  
lation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make  
any false statement, and every case will be fully prose-  
cuted.
