COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF
THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office, at 12.30 o'clock P. M. on Monday, December 24, 1894.

Present—Thomas F. Gilroy, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Ashbel P. Fitch, Comptroller; and Joseph J. O'Donohue, Chamberlain.

The minutes of the meeting held December 21, 1894, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following statement and resolution, transferring surplus revenues of the Sinking Fund for the payment of Interest on the City Debt to the Redemption Fund:

I hereby certify that the cash balance in the City Treasury to credit of the Sinking Fund for the Payment of the Interest on the City Debt at the close of business Saturday, December 22, 1894, was \$511,898.06.

That the revenues of the said Interest Fund will be more than sufficient to meet all interest dividends payable therefrom before such interest shall have matured and become payable, and that the sum of \$150,000 of surplus revenue may be transferred to the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, pursuant to section 172 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, without in anywise impairing the obligations of the said Interest Fund.

Resolved, That a warrant payable from the Sinking Fund for the Payment of the Interest on the City Debt be drawn in favor of the Chamberlain for the sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000), to be deposited in the City Treasury to credit of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, thereby transferring this amount of surplus revenue of the Interest Fund to the Redemption Fund, pursuant to section 172 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

That no preparation of diphtheria antitoxine shall be offered or exposed for sale in this city unless the receptacle containing such preparation bear a label on which is placed a statement of the value of the contents in anti-toxine, as measured by some generally recognized standard and the name and the address of the producer and the date of production.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held; and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
