

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office, at 12.30 o'clock P. M. on Monday, December 24, 1894.

Present-Thomas F. Gilroy, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Ashbel P. Fitch, Comptroller; and Joseph J. O'Donohue, Chamberlain.

The minutes of the meeting held December 21, 1894, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following statement and resolution, transferring surplus revenues of the Sinking Fund for the payment of Interest on the City Debt to the Redemption Fund:

I hereby certify that the cash balance in the City Treasury to credit of the Sinking Fund for

Thereby certify that the cash balance in the City Treasury to credit of the Sinking Fund for the Payment of the Interest on the City Debt at the close of business Saturday, December 22, 1894, was \$511,898.06.

That the revenues of the said Interest Fund will be more than sufficient to meet all interest dividends payable therefrom before such interest shall have matured and become payable, and that the sum of \$150,000 of surplus revenue may be transferred to the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, pursuant to section 172 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, without in anywise impairing the obligations of the said Interest Fund.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT CHAPTER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT CHAPTER 697, Laws of 1894, authorizes the Commissioner of Street Cleaning to grant permits for the temporary occupancy of portions of the streets and public places in the City of New York, from 4 P. M. until 8 A. M., and on Sundays and legal holidays only, by unharnessed licensed trucks or other unharnessed licensed vehicles owned by residents of the City of New York who have the consent of the owner or lessee of the abutting property upon the condition that the owners of trucks or vehicles for which such permits are issued shall keep the street clean under and around said trucks or vehicles, and subject to such other rules and conditions as the said Commissioner may from time to time prescribe, which permits the said Commissioner may at any time revoke.

Such permits will not be granted for either side of a street contiguous to a public building of the City and County of New York, or a church, school-house, hospital, asylum or other incorporated benevolent institution, or a licensed place of amusement, or for the following-named streets and public places:
