SIR—In compliance with the requirements of section 110 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 516 of the Laws of 1884, we herewith transmit the results of our examination of the Chamberlain's and Comptroller's offices for the first quarter of 1895, and submit statements as follows:

The balance in the City Treasury, Sinking Funds and Miscellaneous Accounts on March 30, 1895, was \$3,449,624.65, which agrees with the balances as stated in the Chamberlain's books, and also with the certificates of the officers of the several depository banks of concurrent date.

The 763 deaths represent a death-rate of 21.06, against 21.60 for the previous week and 17.59 for the corresponding week of 1894.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever and typhoid fever being respectively 93, 38, 19 and 48, against 141, 60, 20 and 31 for the previous week, a total of 198 against 252. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Thirteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Seventh, Twelfth and Seventeenth Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Twelfth and Twenty-third Wards, and the decrease in the Tenth and Seventeenth Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Eleventh Ward, and the decrease in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards. Twenty-seven of the 48 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 11 were below Fourteenth street. No case of small-pox was reported.
