Shoe Polishers' Union of Greater New York,  
New York, February 25, 1905.

President, Board of Aldermen, Aldermanic Chamber, City Hall, New York, N. Y.:

Dear Sir—The above organization, in conjunction with the Bootblacks' Protective League, appeals to you to use your good office in regard to bootblacks carrying boxes.

We have appealed to the Gerry Society, and they are in favor of its passage, as it is the only remedy to keep those boys off the streets in their tender age.

We have received the indorsement of the Central Federated Union and they have sent a letter to your Honorable Board, urging them to pass the same for the

welfare of young boys. These facts ought to be sufficient to prove that it is a good measure and should pass.

We may also call your attention to the fact that there are about 3,000 citizens in the bootblacking trade, and are paying \$30,000 annually to the City as license fees, while there are just as many men and boys peddling in the streets without licenses or otherwise. Furthermore, there are two men who control the privilege in the boats, who are earning thousands of dollars yearly, and no one takes the trouble to collect licenses, while we are being closed up if our license is one day over due. What we wish is justice, and as citizens, we hope to get it.

To the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The undersigned hereby claims from The City of New York the sum of six hundred and ten dollars and seventy-three cents (\$610.73), with interest thereon from August 21, 1899, and asks that your Board direct a refund to him of the amount paid as hereinafter set forth. Said claim is based upon the following facts:

In the year 1896 a tax was levied by the Town of Hempstead upon certain premises in the portion of said town, now part of The City of New York, which tax appears upon the assessment roll of said town for said year, as follows:

Name of owner, Ward, Jessie L., Judson L., Twenty-first Election District; description: North by Jamaica Bay, south by ocean, east by Jamieson and Bond, west by Myers and others; 18 acres; real estate value, \$12,000; personal value; State and County tax, \$278.40; road tax, \$48; electric light, \$120; water and fire, \$36; total amount, \$482.40.

A warrant for the collection of said tax was issued to the Receiver of Taxes for the said town, but the amount of said tax was not paid to the said Receiver, and on August 25, 1897, he returned said tax as unpaid to the Treasurer of the County of Queens, together with the fees allowed him by law, amounting to twenty-eight dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$28.98). Said tax remained in the hands of the said County Treasurer uncollected and without further action being taken in relation thereto until August 23, 1898. On that day said County Treasurer, assuming to act under chapter 515 of the Laws of 1898, held a sale of lands for the payment of taxes, and at such sale the premises described in said assessment as above set forth, were sold by him and bid in by him in the name of the Town of Hempstead, for the sum of five hundred and forty-five dollars and thirty cents (\$545.30), and a certificate of sale, numbered 339, issued by him, which certificate purported to be a lien upon the lands of the undersigned, and to draw interest upon said sum at the rate of twelve per cent. per annum. Thereafter, on August 21, 1899, the undersigned, being then the owner of the lands described or intended to be described in said certificate, paid to the said County Treasurer, on behalf of said City, the sum of six hundred and ten dollars and seventy-three cents to redeem the said property from said tax sale. Said sum was thereafter paid by the said County Treasurer to said City. Said payment was made supposing said sale to be a valid sale, and because said amount was demanded by said City and appeared by its books to be a lien on said premises, and because claimant was informed by said County Treasurer that such amount was due, and because it was necessary for claimant to pay the said tax in order to clear the title to the said property. Thereafter the undersigned learned that said sale was not a valid sale and that said City was entitled to receive in payment of said tax no more than the sum of four hundred and eighty-two dollars and forty cents (\$482.40), with interest from August 25, 1897, at the rate of two per cent. per annum, making an excess paid to said City of one hundred and nine dollars and four cents (\$109.04) above that amount necessary to discharge said tax under chapter 635, Laws of 1899, if said tax were a valid tax.

The undersigned further claims that said sale was not a valid sale because said tax was not reassessed in the year 1897 by the Supervisor of said town as a tax upon non-resident property, and thereafter returned to said County Treasurer or the Collector of Assessments and Arrears and sold by him, and because of various other defects in said proceedings. Also that said tax was not properly levied, in that the land was not owned or occupied by a resident of the tax district or county, and was not assessed as non-resident property and therefore was wholly void. Said amount was paid by claimant when he had become owner of the premises described or intended to be described. Said Jessie L. Ward, in the year 1896, resided, as claimant is informed and believes, in the City of Brooklyn, and Anna L. Judson resided at Oswego, N. Y. Dated New York, February 24, 1905.

The undersigned hereby claims from The City of New York the sum of five hundred and thirty-eight dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$538.77), with interest thereon from August 21, 1899, and asks that your Board direct a refund to him of the amount paid as hereinafter set forth. Said claim is based upon the following facts:

In the year 1896 a tax was levied by the Town of Hempstead upon certain premises in the portion of said town, now part of The City of New York, which tax appears upon the assessment roll of said town for said year as follows:

Name of owner, Phillip V. Myers; Twenty-first Election District; description: north by Jamaica Bay, south by Ocean, east land of Jessie Ward, west land of Charles Schilling; 8 acres; real estate value, \$9,000; personal value; State and County tax, \$208.80; road tax, \$36; electric light, \$96; water and fire, \$27; total amount, \$391.80; back school tax, \$63.

A warrant for the collection of said tax was issued to the Receiver of Taxes for the said town, but the amount of said tax was not paid to the said Receiver, and on August 25, 1897, he returned the said tax as unpaid to the Treasurer of the County of Queens, together with the fees allowed him by law, amounting to \$21.72. Said tax remained in the hands of said County Treasurer uncollected, and without further action being taken thereto in relation until August 23, 1898. On that day said County Treasurer, assuming to act under chapter 515 of the Laws of 1898, held a sale of lands for the payment of taxes, and at such sale the premises described in said assessment as above set forth were sold by him and bid in by him in the name of the Town of Hempstead for the sum of four hundred and eighty-one dollars and five cents (\$481.05), and a certificate of sale numbered 204 issued by him which certificate purported to be a lien upon the lands of the undersigned and to draw interest upon said sum at the rate of twelve per cent. per annum. Thereafter on August 21, 1899, the undersigned, being then the owner of the lands described or intended to be described



in said certificate paid to the said County Treasurer on behalf of the said City, the sum of five hundred and thirty-eight dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$538.77), to redeem the said property from said tax sale. Said sum was thereafter paid by said County Treasurer to said City. Said payment was made supposing said sale to be a valid sale and because said amount was demanded by said City and appeared by its books to be a lien on said premises and because claimant was informed by said County Treasurer that such amount was due, and because it was necessary for claimant to pay the said tax in order to clear the title to the said property. Thereafter the undersigned learned that said act had been repealed and said sale was not a valid sale and that said City was entitled to receive in payment of said tax no more than four hundred and forty-four dollars and eighty cents (\$444.80), with interest from August 25, 1897, at the rate of two per cent. per annum (\$17.79), making an excess paid to said City of seventy-six dollars and eighteen cents (\$76.18), above the amount necessary to discharge the said tax under chapter 635, Laws of 1899.

The undersigned further claims that said sale was not a valid sale because said tax was not reassessed in the year 1897 by the Supervisor of said town as a tax upon non-resident property, and thereafter returned to said County Treasurer or the Collector of Assessments and Arrears and sold by him, and because of various other defects in said proceedings.

Said Myers was not a resident of the County of Queens at the time said tax was assessed and the undersigned claims that the said tax was invalid and void because improperly assessed to him and not as a tax upon non-resident property.

To the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The undersigned hereby claims from The City of New York the sum of two hundred and thirty-seven dollars and ninety-six cents (\$237.96), with interest from December 28, 1903, and asks that your Board direct a refund to him of the said amount paid for taxes as hereinafter set forth. The facts are as follows:

In the year 1895 the Town of Hempstead levied a tax which was described on the assessment roll of said town for said year as follows:

"Name, Remington Vernam; Election District, 21; description, north, Jamaica Bay; east, meadow land of Downing estate; south, by Long Island Railroad; acres, 40; valuation, \$40,000." Said property was not assessed as resident property. A warrant for the collection of said tax was issued, but said tax was not paid to the said Receiver and was returned by him as unpaid to the Treasurer of the County of Queens, and on April 15, 1897, the premises therein described was sold by said County Treasurer and bid in by him in the name of the Town of Hempstead for one hundred and thirty-one dollars and thirty-seven cents (\$131.37), and a certificate of sale No. 300, issued by him, said premises at the time of said assessment were vacant and unoccupied. Said Remington Vernam was neither the owner nor the occupant thereof.

Premises referred to in said assessment as land of Benjamin Downing, were premises conveyed to said Downing by one McCarthy by deed of August 25, 1881, in Liber 581 of Conveyances, page 224, conveying certain premises at Edgemere, bounded west by Lucia avenue, as now laid out.

In the said year, 1895, another tax was levied by said Town of Hempstead which appears upon said assessment roll as follows:

Name of owner, P. J. Gleason; description, bounded north by Jamaica Bay, east and south by ocean, west by F. C. Norton; District, 21; acres, 8; said tax was not paid and thereafter said premises were sold by the County Treasurer of Queens County for said tax for fifty dollars and forty-one cents (\$50.41), and were bid in by the Town of Hempstead, and a certificate No. 85 issued. Thereafter the premises were duly redeemed from said tax and the amount thereof paid to the Collector of Assessments and Arrears for The City of New York. Said land of P. J. Gleason was the same premises conveyed to him by deed of Samuel Williams, dated September 8, 1888, recorded June 15, 1890, in Liber 806 of Conveyances, page 122; said land is bounded east by said land of Downing above referred to and is the same premises assessed to Remington Vernam as above set forth.

In the same year, certain other taxes were levied by said Town of Hempstead and appears upon said assessment roll as follows:

Name of owner, Franklin C. Norton; description, bounded north by the boulevard, east by P. J. Gleason, south by the Atlantic Ocean, west by John Flower and others; 20 acres; value, \$1,400; amount, \$42.56; also meadow land bounded south by the above described lands; 15 acres; value, \$450; amount, \$13.68. Said taxes were duly paid as appears by said assessment roll.

Said Gleason and Norton tracts covered the same premises described in the first assessment with other lands. The Long Island Railroad ran through said last-mentioned lands somewhat north of the ocean.

On or before December 28, 1903, the Ocean and Bay Front Improvement Company paid the amount of said first-mentioned tax to the Title Guarantee and Trust Company in order that a loan might be obtained on certain premises owned by it west of Lucia avenue, at Edgemere, affected or claimed to be affected by said tax and, on or about said day the said sum of two hundred and thirty-seven dollars and ninety-six cents (\$237.96) was paid by said Title Guarantee and Trust Company on behalf of the petitioner to the Collector of Assessments and Arrears of The City of New York in satisfaction of said tax and redemption of said premises from said tax sale. Said payment was made without the knowledge of petitioners and was not a voluntary payment, but was made on behalf of petitioner after a sale of said premises had been had for said tax, which might have entitled the holder of said certificate to a tax lease.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Police Department:

No. 1564.

Police Department of The City of New York,  
No. 300 Mulberry Street,  
New York, March 1, 1905.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—The following proceedings were this day directed by Police Commissioner McAdoo:

Whereas, On December 2, 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the following resolution in the matter of the selection of a site for the Nineteenth Precinct station-house:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves the action of the Commissioner of the Police Department in the matter of the selection of the following described lands and premises in the Borough of Manhattan as a site for the Nineteenth Precinct station:

Beginning at a point on the southerly side of West Thirtieth street distant 263 feet easterly from the southeasterly corner of West Thirtieth street and Seventh avenue; running thence southerly and parallel with Seventh avenue 76 feet 5 inches; thence easterly 6 feet; thence again southerly, or nearly so, 23 feet 5 inches to the centre line of the block between West Twenty-ninth street and West Thirtieth street; thence easterly along the centre line of said block and parallel with West Thirtieth street 91 feet; thence northerly and again parallel with Seventh avenue 98 feet 9 inches to the southerly side of West Thirtieth street, and thence westerly along the southerly side of West Thirtieth street 100 feet 7 inches to the point or place of beginning, together with all the right, title and interest of the owners of said premises of, in and to the streets and avenues in front thereof to the centre thereof, premises being known by Nos. 134 to 138 West Thirtieth street. Assessed valuation for the year 1904 is \$65,500.

—and the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is authorized to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of all the parcels of land within the area of the above described premises.

Nothing in this resolution contained shall be construed as preventing the Comptroller of The City of New York from entering into contracts for the acquisition of any portion of the above described property at private sale.

And, Whereas, December 9, 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the issue of Corporate Stock in the amount of \$115,000 to provide means for the acquisition of such site, as follows:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding one hundred and fifteen thousand dollars (\$115,000) to provide means for the acquisition of a site for the Nineteenth Precinct Station-house of the Police Department, located at Nos. 134 to 138 West Thirtieth street, Borough of Manhattan, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding one hundred and fifteen thousand dollars (\$115,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purpose aforesaid.

And, Whereas, The Board of Aldermen, at a meeting held January 17, 1905, rejected an ordinance providing for the issue of such Corporate Stock, as will appear by copy of proceedings herewith attached, as follows:

"The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on December 13, 1904 (Minutes, page 875), the annexed ordinance in favor of an issue of Corporate Stock to provide means for the acquisition of a site for the Nineteenth Precinct Station-house of the Department of Police, at Nos. 134 to 138 West Thirtieth street, Borough of Manhattan, respectfully

#### REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the price proposed to be paid for the property named in the said ordinance to be exorbitant. The Third Deputy Police Commissioner was in attendance at the session of the Committee at which the proposition was considered, and because of a failure to elicit from him any information respecting the subject, they recommend that the said ordinance be rejected.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of one hundred and fifteen thousand dollars (\$115,000), to provide means for the acquisition of a site for the Nineteenth Precinct Station-house of the Police Department, located at Nos. 134 to 138 West Thirtieth street, Manhattan.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment December 9, 1904, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to an amount not exceeding one hundred and fifteen thousand dollars (\$115,000), to provide means for the acquisition of a site for the Nineteenth Precinct Station-house of the Police Department, located at Nos. 134 to 138 West Thirtieth street, Borough of Manhattan, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding one hundred and fifteen thousand dollars (\$115,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

And it appearing that at a meeting of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen, held February 28, 1905, one of the Deputy Commissioners of the Police Department satisfactorily represented to such committee the necessity for the adoption of such ordinance,

Ordered, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to approve the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to an amount not exceeding \$115,000, to provide means for the acquisition of a site for the Nineteenth Precinct Station-house of the Police Department of The City of New York, located at Nos. 134 to 138 West Thirtieth street, Borough of Manhattan.

Sir—In compliance with your instructions to report upon amount of Corporate Stock that should be issued to properly carry out the work of the preparation of maps or plans in each borough, I would report:

**Borough of Manhattan.**

No topographical work is being done in this borough at present, and no appropriation was allowed in the Budget for the year 1905 for this work, hence no additional money is required.

**Borough of Brooklyn.**

The appropriation for 1904 was \$54,944, and the records of the Finance Department show that \$51,522.41 has been expended. Probably the total appropriation has been spent, but the bills have not been forwarded to this office for payment.

In the Budget of 1905 \$55,697.50 was allowed. This, I think, will be sufficient, and unless some special work is to be done, the money for which can be provided for later.

**Borough of The Bronx.**

In the Budget for 1904, considering transfers, etc., \$62,500 was allowed, divided as follows:

Monumenting .....	\$15,000 00
Surveying, laying out maps, plans, etc.....	45,500 00
Contingencies .....	2,000 00

Total..... \$62,500 00

Against this amount \$62,382.50 has been charged to date, but it is probable that all the bills have not been forwarded, hence it is safe to assume that all of the appropriation has been expended. During the year 1904, \$50,000 of Corporate Stock was authorized, but only \$16,856.24 of this amount has been expended to March 1, 1905, making a total expenditure from January 1, 1904, to March 1, 1905, of \$79,356.24.

In the Budget for 1905, \$65,000 has been appropriated, leaving a deficiency of about \$15,000 to be provided for by the issue of Corporate Stock, and I would advise that this amount be allowed.

**Borough of Queens.**

Taking into consideration transfers, etc., \$44,852.50 was appropriated in the Budget of 1904. The books show that most of this amount has been expended, and I think it safe to assume that it will all be used up when all the bills are in.

Corporate Stock to the amount of \$100,000 was also authorized and issued during 1904 for this purpose, and the records of this office show that \$97,551.77 has been expended to March 1, 1905, making the total expenditure of \$142,404.27 from January 1, 1904, to March 1, 1905.

The force has been increased in this borough, say about one-third, which would bring this amount up to \$191,000 for the period from January 1, 1905, to March 1, 1906; and, as \$64,852.50 has been appropriated in the Budget of 1905, there will be a deficiency of about \$125,000, which amount, I think, should be provided for by the issue of Corporate Stock.

**Borough of Richmond.**

In the year 1904 there was available for this purpose, in addition to the Budget appropriation of \$43,920, a Corporate Stock issue of \$75,000; the \$43,800 appropriation account is probably used up, and \$49,833.68 of the \$75,000 of Corporate Stock has been expended to March 1, 1905, making the total expenditure from January 1, 1904, to March 1, 1905, of \$93,813.16.

The force has been increased, and the work demands that it be enlarged during the coming year.

Taking into consideration the present force, salary of which amounts to \$120,000, and the increased force, the salary of which will be about \$170,000, I estimate that it will take \$150,000 to carry on the work from January 1, 1905, to March 1, 1906. Of the \$75,000 Corporate Stock issued in 1904 there is an unexpended balance of \$25,000, and, as \$15,000 has been allowed in the Budget for 1905, there is about \$40,000 available for this purpose, leaving a deficiency of about \$110,000, which I would advise be provided for by the issue of Corporate Stock.

**Summary.**

Hereafter any person, persons, estate, estates, corporation or corporations owning or having vested title to any lot or building or buildings within the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, shall cause to be removed within twenty-four hours from the sidewalk, or walks in front of any such lot or lots, building or buildings, all falling of snow or forming of ice on such sidewalk or walks, in front of any lot, lots, building or buildings.

Sec. 2. Hereafter any person or persons, estate or estates, corporation or corporations owning or having vested title to any land, lands, building or buildings, failing to remove the falling of any snow, or the forming of any ice on the sidewalk or walks in front of any lot or lots, building or buildings, within twenty-four hours, shall be subject to the penalty of the sum of five dollars for each and every day said snow or ice remains on such sidewalk or walks, in front of any lot, lots, building or buildings.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Street Cleaning Department of The City of New York to cause all sidewalks in front of any lot or lots, building or buildings to be cleaned of all snow and ice twenty-four hours after the falling of any snow or the forming of any ice on said sidewalk or walks, in front of any lot, lots, building or buildings, within the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the Street Cleaning Department to cause to be made a list of the names of the owner or owners, or if the names of the owners cannot be ascertained, the street number, if any, or in case there is no street number the block and section number, or an accurate description by street or avenues on which said lot, lots, building or buildings are located, said list shall immediately be sent to the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York.

Sec. 5. The Corporation Counsel of The City of New York shall immediately cause to be filed in the Department of Taxes and Arrears a statement showing the amount due and costs of the penalty for the violation of this ordinance; and it shall be the duty of the Collector of Taxes of The City of New York to collect said penalty and costs against each and every owner of any lot, lots, building or buildings within the boroughs hereinbefore mentioned.

Sec. 6. The amount due for the penalty and costs for the violations of this ordinance shall remain a lien on any lot, lots, building or buildings until paid; any streets and avenues not opened according to law and title thereto vested in the Corporation of The City of New York, shall be affected by this ordinance.

Sec. 7. All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Section 1. No licensed peddler, vender, hawker or huckster shall ply his trade or sell or exhibit for sale his goods or wares in The City of New York, unless such trade be plied or such goods or wares are offered for exhibit or sale in such streets, avenues and thoroughfares as shall be officially designated therefor by the Local Board of Improvements of the district having jurisdiction thereover, and no street, avenue or thoroughfare in which two sets of car tracks are laid and cars operated thereon shall be designated for such purpose. Nothing herein contained shall be construed as in any way affecting or impairing the powers now held by the Street Cleaning Department, the Health Department, the Police Department, or any other public authorities now having any jurisdiction in the premises.

Sec. 2. For each and every violation of any of the provisions of the foregoing section the person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and be fined, upon conviction thereof, by any Magistrate, in a sum not less than two dollars (\$2) and not more than ten dollars (\$10).

Sec. 3. No person shall be licensed to peddle, vend or hawk in The City of New York except a resident therein and a citizen of the United States.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

#### SUBSTITUTE.

AN ORDINANCE in relation to peddling in the streets of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. No licensed peddler, vender, hawker or huckster shall ply his trade or sell or exhibit for sale his goods or wares in The City of New York, unless such trade be plied or such goods or wares are offered for exhibit or sale in such streets, avenues and thoroughfares as shall be officially designated therefor by the Alderman of the

district having jurisdiction thereover, and no street, avenue or thoroughfare in which two sets of car tracks are laid and cars operated thereon shall be designated for such purpose. Nothing herein contained shall be construed as in any way affecting or impairing the powers now held by the Street Cleaning Department, the Health Department, the Police Department, or any other public authorities now having any jurisdiction in the premises.

Sec. 2. For each and every violation of any of the provisions of the foregoing section the person so offending, upon conviction thereof by any Magistrate, shall be fined in a sum not more than two dollars (\$2).

Sec. 3. No person shall be licensed to peddle, vend or hawk in The City of New York except a resident therein and a citizen of the United States, or one who has legally declared his intentions to become a citizen, and who has first obtained written permission from the Alderman of the district in which such peddling, vending or hawking is to be conducted.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Quarterly Report Ending December 31, 1904.

To the Commissioner of Docks:

Sir—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge and supervision during the quarter ending December 31, 1904.

## NORTH RIVER.

## Battery Wall, North River.

The existing platform at this locality used for the landing of excursion steamers having proved inadequate for the purpose, a new platform 40 feet by 40 feet has been built on the northerly side of the old landing.

## Pier "A," North River.

A contract has been prepared and let for building an additional story on the inshore extension to the building on Pier "A" to accommodate the working force of the Department and work has been begun and is in progress.

## Rector Street Section, North River.

On the 16th of December, 1903, the former Commissioner of Docks authorized the construction of the bulkhead or river wall in this vicinity for and at the expense of the owner of the property to be improved. Considerable progress has been made in the work of building the wall proper and the granite is being set. Pier, old 6, has been removed and the work of building a new pier in place thereof, to be known as Pier, new 7, is being supervised.

## Cedar Street Section.

By action of the Commissioner of Docks of December 10, 1902, a section of the bulkhead or river wall was authorized in the vicinity of Cedar street, extending from the middle of the block between Carlisle and Albany streets northerly to a point 40 feet southerly of the northerly line of Cedar street. This work includes the removal of the old structures and of Piers, old 13 and 14, together with the sheds thereon. The outer portion of Piers 13 and 14 were removed during a prior quarter and during the present quarter the inner ends of the piers have been removed. The wall for this section is in progress and concrete blocks have been set along the bulkhead-line. Over the site of Pier, new 11, rip-rap has been deposited for the construction of a new pier, which it is intended to erect.

## Pier, New 27, North River.

An iron shed is in course of erection on the extension to this pier by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

## Pier, New 28, North River.

An iron shed is being erected on the extension to this pier recently completed by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company.

## Pier, New 46, North River.

An extension to this pier has been built by the force of the Department for the Citizens' Steamboat Company under B. O. 2350, and a shed is now in course of erection on the extension recently built by the Central Railroad Company, under permit from the Commissioner.

## Chelsea Section, North River.

On the 28th of December, 1900, the Board of Docks authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead-wall between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets. Large property interests in this vicinity have been acquired and extensive work done towards the construction of the wall. Factories and other buildings occupying the grounds recently condemned for the use of this Department, have been sold at public auction and have been removed by the purchasers. The actual construction of the wall has been pushed as rapidly as possible, and during the quarter 93.28 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made. At West Fourteenth street the ferry structures of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad are being removed. The Pier at West Seventeenth street is being removed; at West Nineteenth street an approach to the pier already built is being constructed; at West Twentieth street a sewer is being built; at West Twenty-first street a temporary approach to the pier is being constructed, and at West Twenty-second street the backing-log, etc., are being removed for the dump at that locality. The ferry structures of the Erie Railroad Company at West Twenty-third street are being removed. It having been found advantageous to construct the concrete blocks to be used on this section on the line of the work, the necessary platforms and plant have been placed during previous quarter and the work of fabricating concrete blocks has been done here.

## Bloomfield Street, No. 53.

The force of this Department is constructing a new pier at Bloomfield street which will include a portion of the pier formerly existing there.

## Pier 57, North River.

The work of constructing this pier was begun under Contract No. 874. The work has been temporarily suspended.

## Pier 58, North River.

The work of constructing this pier is in progress under Contract No. 875. A contract has been prepared and will shortly be let for covering the decks of Piers 53, 60 and 61, with asphalt.

## Temporary Approaches to Piers 60 and 61.

Temporary approaches to these piers have been built.

## Pier at West Forty-first Street.

A new pier, known as Pier, new 81, has been completed at the foot of West Forty-first street, under Contract No. 771—1,681 linear feet of new wharfage room being made in the pier proper and 100 linear feet in the approach to the pier.

## Forty-third Street Section Extended.

Resolution of Board September 2, 1898—Preparation has been made to raise the coping at the foot of West Forty-fourth street, and the pier at the foot of the street is being extended, widened and repaired under Contract No. 865. This pier will hereafter be known as Pier 84.

## Forty-eighth Street, North River.

The D. Grieme Coal Company are erecting coal handling apparatus in this locality, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. A sewer connection was laid to the building corner Forty-eighth street and Tenth avenue.

## West Fifty-ninth Street Section.

Resolution of Board, June 27, 1900—Some work along the wall at the foot of West Fifty-eighth street has been done during the quarter.

## West Seventy-ninth Street, North River.

A pier was started to be built at the foot of this street by the force of the Department, under C. O. 792. The work was suspended under that order, and the extension of the pier is being built under B. O. 2139, 660 linear feet of new wharfage room having been made thereby during the quarter.

## West Ninety-fifth Street, North River.

Curtis & Blaisdell have begun the erection of coal screening plant in rear of the bulkhead at this street.

## Between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh Streets.

Coal pockets and coal handling appliances are being erected in this locality by Weber-Bunke-Lange Coal Company.

## Claremont Section, North River.

The work at this section is being done under a resolution of the Board of Docks, passed November 16, 1900. Work has been in progress during the quarter on the bulkhead wall proper, and 178 linear feet of new wharfage room made. The approach to Pier at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street has been kept in repair, and the inner ends of Piers at One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets have been jacked up.

Between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second Streets, North River.

Filling has been placed at this location, while between One Hundred and Thirty-second and One Hundred and Thirty-third streets, North river, the actual work of constructing the bulkhead wall proper is in progress.

Between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Streets, North River.

Coal pockets are in course of erection in this locality by Robert Gordon, under a permit from this Department.

## One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, North River.

The Ryan & Parker Construction Company are constructing a sewer outlet at the foot of this street.

## Between Spuyten Duyvil and Mount St. Vincent.

A permit having been granted to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to do the work, the present railroad embankment at this locality is being widened and rip-rap deposited along the line of the widening.

## EAST RIVER.

Pier 9, East River—A test pile examination has been made to ascertain the nature of the river bottom, preparatory to the preparing of plans and specifications for a new pier.

Pier 10, East River—A test pile examination has been made to ascertain the nature of the river bottom, preparatory to the preparing of plans and specifications for a new pier.

Pier 11, East River—A test pile examination has been made to ascertain the nature of the river bottom, preparatory to the preparing of plans and specifications for a new pier.

Pier 14, East River—A test pile examination has been made to ascertain the nature of the river bottom, preparatory to the preparing of plans and specifications for a new pier.

Pier 15, East River—A test pile examination has been made to ascertain the nature of the river bottom, preparatory to the preparing of plans and specifications for a new pier.

Pier 18, East River—A test pile examination has been made to ascertain the nature of the river bottom, preparatory to the preparing of plans and specifications for a new pier.

## Fulton Section, East River.

A section of the bulkhead wall was authorized in this locality by a resolution of the Board, adopted April 26, 1901. This resolution was amended by action of the Commissioner on the 7th of December, 1904. During the quarter, coping was removed from a portion of the wall to permit the temporary removal of the Wholesale Fish Market, in order to make way for the construction of the remainder of the bulkhead wall at this section.

## Peck Slip Section.

Action of Commissioner January 17, 1903. B. O. 1000.

A section of the bulkhead wall in this vicinity was authorized by the Commissioner of Docks on the 14th of January, 1903. During the past quarter progress has been made on the bulkhead wall until, at the present time the wall is practically completed. 179.48 linear feet of new wharfage room having been made during the quarter. Earth filling is now being placed in rear of the bulkhead wall built. This section includes Piers, new 19 and 20, both of which were completed during the previous quarter.

## New Pier, Ninth Street, East River.

Test piles were driven to ascertain the nature of the river bottom, preparatory to preparing plans and specifications for the proposed new pier.

## New Bellevue Section.

It having been found advisable to build a new section of the bulkhead or river wall outshore of the Bellevue section formerly built at the request of the authorities of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, the Commissioner of Docks authorized the same under B. O. 1859, and extensive work has been done during the quarter. 170.91 linear feet of new wharfage room being made. The coping on the old wall has been removed and placed along the new wall. The work of filling in, the privilege for which had been awarded at the last quarter, is in progress in the rear of the wall already built.

## East Thirty-eighth Street Section.

The work at this section has been done under a resolution of the Board of Docks, passed May 4, 1900. The wall at this section is practically completed, and during the quarter coping has been set; the work of filling-in in rear of the wall already built is in progress.

## Pier at Thirty-ninth Street, East River.

The new pier, with appurtenances, is being constructed at the foot of this street, under Contract No. 856. This pier was practically completed during the quarter, only some finishing touches remaining to be made, and 360 linear feet of new wharfage room was made thereby.

## Yorkville Section.

The Commissioner of Docks, by action of 10th of October, 1904, authorized the construction of the bulkhead or river wall between the centre line of East Sixty-fourth street and the northerly line of East Eighty-first street. This portion of the waterfront has been divided into two sections, the first known as Yorkville Section, extending from the centre line of East Sixty-fourth street to the southerly line of East Seventy-fourth street, a distance of 2,648.22 feet.

This section embraces the work which is being done under Contract No. 844, entered into during a previous quarter with T. E. & T. Crimmins for excavating for a new marginal street between East Sixty-fourth and Eighty-first streets.

## Blackwell Section, East River.

By action of the Commissioner of October 10, 1904, B. O. 2756, the work of improving the water front, which was being done under resolution, for the East Seventy-fourth and East Seventy-fifth and East Seventy-seventh streets sections, was consolidated and the new section established as Blackwell's Section, beginning at the southerly line of East Seventy-fourth street and extending to the northerly line of East Eighty-first street, a distance of 1,958.03 feet. Base blocks have been set along this strip of the water front and concrete en masse placed. Some pieces of coping have been set along the wall and work is well under way over a large portion of the section. The portion of the section in the neighborhood of Seventy-fourth street was practically completed for quite a strip of wall during a previous quarter, and the work there has been suspended until the wall in the portion of this section makes a joint with it. Between Seventy-sixth and Seventy-eighth streets the work of excavating and removing the rock for the erection of the bulkhead wall is being done under Contract No. 841.

## Pier, Ninety-fifth Street.

This pier was extended outshore to the new pierhead line a distance of 85 feet, 231 linear feet of new wharfage room having been made thereby.



## Foot of One Hundred and Second Street.

Test piles are being driven to ascertain the nature of the river bottom preparatory to preparing plans and specifications for proposed new pier:

Similar work was done at the following places:

Foot of One Hundred and Seventh street.

Foot of One Hundred and Eighth street.

Foot of One Hundred and Ninth street.

Between Two Hundred and First and Two Hundred and Second Streets, Harlem River.

The Harlem Construction Company are building a pile platform, 40 by 80 feet long, in this locality, under permit from the Commissioner.

## Marble Hill, Kingsbridge, Harlem River.

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company are constructing a new roadbed in connection with the Marble Hill cut-off in the vicinity of Kingsbridge, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

## One Hundred and Sixty-seventh Street and Putnam Railroad Bridge.

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company are constructing a pile and timber trestle at this locality, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Between One Hundred and Forty-fifth and One Hundred and Forty-ninth Streets,

## Port Morris, East River.

At this locality the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company are building a concrete bulkhead, filling-in at same, and erecting an electric power station, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. The Harlem and Port Chester Railroad are filling in on the east side of the railroad approach in this locality, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

## Riker's Island.

A rip-rap embankment is being built on the easterly side of Riker's Island, under Contract No. 776.

## Pier 38, East River.

A steel freight shed has been constructed on this pier by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks, under B. O. 2670.

## Between Thirty-ninth and Fortieth Streets, East River.

Tracks have been placed along the bulkhead for a temporary loading and unloading derrick, and a movable tower dumping-board has been erected on the bulkhead; also a movable concrete mixing plant, with derrick, has been placed in the same locality. All this work was done by the New York Edison Company, under permits from the Commissioner of Docks.

Between One Hundred and Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Fiftieth Streets,

## Harlem River.

The work of filling in behind the retaining wall at this locality is in progress by the Rapid Transit Construction Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Between Two Hundred and Fifteenth and Two Hundred and Sixteenth Streets,

## Harlem River.

Under permit granted by the Commissioner of Docks a pile platform and coal pockets are being constructed in this locality by T. & W. Thorn.

## BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

## Hubbard Street, Bath Beach.

The Marube Basin Company is constructing a basin near the foot of Hubbard street in accordance with a permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

## West Eighth Street, Coney Island.

A pile structure for the Leap-Frog Railway is being erected by the Dreamland Company in the neighborhood in this vicinity, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

## Between Forty-third and Fifty-first Streets.

Five piers are in course of construction in this locality by the Bush Company, Limited, under permit from the Board of Docks and S. O. 21424.

## Degraw Street, Gowanus Canal.

A crib bulkhead is being built at the foot of this street under B. O. 1827.

## BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

## Jamaica Bay.

At Jamaica Bay the work of pumping mud from the bed of the bay and the depositing of same on the uplands owned by the West Rockaway Land Company, is in progress, and also the erection of a proper structure for retaining this filling and the erection of a temporary bulkhead for the landing of material. A "T" Shaped pier is being constructed in the vicinity of Eastern avenue by the Queens Borough Gas and Electric Company. A sheet pile bulkhead is being constructed between Vernam and Grand avenues, Arverne by Remington Vernam. Two new crib piers with crib bulkheads are being erected at Lawrence Point by the Astoria Light, Heat and Power Company. At North Beach, the Bowery Bay Building and Improvement Company are erecting a walkway platform. Alterations to the coal plant are being made and an automatic railway built at Steven street, Astoria, by Thomas Teasdale.

Coal pockets, sheds, etc., are being built by Elmer A. Keeler, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks, at Whitestone Landing, and at Jessica avenue, Arverne.

A pier is being erected and one-story structure placed thereon by the Halcyon Casino Company. In Flushing Creek A. N. Ryan is building a coal pocket under permit from the Commissioner. All these several pieces of work are being done in accordance with terms issued from time to time by the Commissioner of Docks.

## BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

A number of pieces of work have been done by private parties and supervised by the Department of Docks and Ferries. At Tompkinsville a wooden structure has been constructed at the foot of Arietta street by Jesse Thompson. A crib bulkhead is being erected at West New Brighton by J. B. King & Co. A crib and close pile bulkhead are being constructed near Van Name street, Mariner's Harbor, by the New Jersey Dock and Bridge Building Company. A pier is being constructed between Central and Van Pelt avenues, Mariner's Harbor by Henry Du Bois' Sons Company. A dock and building ways are being constructed between Union and Central avenue, Mariner's Harbor. A pile bulkhead is being constructed in the vicinity of the Amboy road and Hopping avenue, Tottenville, by A. B. Brown & Sons. The bulkhead and runway at Hugenot avenue, Hugenot Park, is in progress by Mrs. Charles F. Newman. Tracks are being laid on the pier near the foot of Andros street by the Burlee Dry Dock Company.

## Pavement on Marginal Street, North River.

Asphalt pavement has been laid at various places along the North river, where necessary to repair pavement already laid.

## Pavement on East River.

Pavement has been repaired along the East river water front as required.

## Timber Basin, North River.

At the timber basin timber has been received under Department orders and contracts, cared for and issued as required. The timber basin has been maintained in good order and condition.

## Pile Basin at Sherman's Creek.

The pile basin at Sherman's Creek, on the Harlem river, has been maintained in good order and condition.

## Basin for Storage of Old Material, Brooklyn.

At this basin old material has been rafted and cared for.

## Department Yards at West Fifty-seventh and East Twenty-fourth Streets.

At the Department Yards the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of materials and the issue of supplies for various pieces of work. The yards have been maintained in good order and condition.

## Floating Property.

All of the floating property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter, and repaired where necessary. The force of the Department has been engaged in constructing new deck scows, and the work of building a new deck scow and a new coal scow under Contract No. 863 is in progress.

## Dredging.

All the dredging has been supervised, whether done by the Department or private parties.

## Surveying Party.

All the necessary lines, levels, grades, soundings, surveys and examinations have been made and given. Work done by private parties has been supervised, automatic tide gauges have been attended to, and the daily and weekly reports have been made. The records of the anemometer weather vane, etc., have been compiled. An extensive survey of the water fronts of Richmond and Queens is in progress, and bench levels are being run along the water front between North Beach and College Point, in the Borough of Queens.

## Repairs.

Repairs other than dredging have been made at various places under order or permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Repairs, alterations and other pieces of work by private parties under order or permit from the Commissioner of Docks have been supervised during the quarter.

## New Staten Island Ferry Boats.

On the 10th of June, 1904, a contract was awarded to the Maryland Steel Company, of Sparrow's Point, Maryland, for the construction and delivery of five steel screw propelling ferry boats, with two two-cylinder compound engines each. Four of these boats are being built at Sparrow's Point, Maryland, and the fifth boat is being built by the Burlee Dry Dock Company, of Staten Island, to whom a portion of the contract was sublet. The work on these boats is being rapidly pushed.

## Draughtsmen.

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief the Draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work, plans for the improvement of the water front, plans and specifications for new piers and repairs, change of lines, examination of plans submitted by private parties, solar printing and general routine work.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounted to 3,968 linear feet. Wharfage room destroyed by the City in making way for new improvements, 2,208 linear feet. The area of the City's piers has been increased by 104,747 square feet.

The total increase in wharfage room made by private parties under permit from the Department of Docks and Ferries is 3,380 linear feet.

Wharfage room destroyed by private parties in preparing for new improvements is 380 linear feet.
