Schumacher to place and keep a post, surmounted by a clock, on the sidewalk near the curb in front of his premises, No. 709 Columbus avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, provided the dimensions of the post shall not exceed eighteen inches square at the base, and that neither said clock nor post shall be used for advertising purposes, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly.

Whereas, The Honorable Lyman J. Gage, Secretary of the Treasury of the United States of America, has submitted to the Municipal Assembly, dated April 3, 1900, a plan for the preparation of the designs for the construction of the new Custom-house to be erected on what is known as Bowling Green site, in the City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, and are being bounded by Bowling Green, Whitehall, Bridge and State streets, that the architectural design of the building can be more suitably embellished and of better proportions if certain projections beyond the now existing building lines are permitted; therefore be it

Resolved, That permission and authority be and the same is hereby given to the United States of America to extend the said proposed new Custom-house, to be erected on what is known as the Bowling Green site in the City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, and site being bounded by Bowling Green, Whitehall, Bridge and State streets, beyond the now existing building lines and within the area lines as shown upon the attached diagram marked "A," the work to be done at the expense of the United States of America, under the direction of the Department of Buildings of the City of New York.

Whereas, The Ocean Electric Railway Company has presented to the Municipal Assembly of the City of New York its application in writing for a grant of the franchise or right to use certain streets, avenues and highways in Far Rockaway, in the Fifth Ward of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, for street railway purposes, and for the construction, maintenance and operation of an extension of its double-track street surface railroad through and upon the surface of said streets, and that the local authorities of said city give public notice thereof and of the time and place when and where it will be first considered; it is

Resolved, That if the Board of Aldermen consent, that Monday, the 30th day of July, 1900, at two o'clock in the afternoon, at the Chamber of the Council, in the City Hall of the City of New York, be, and they hereby are, designated as the time and place when and where the said application of the Ocean Electric Railway Company to the Municipal Assembly of the City of New York for a grant of the right or franchise to use certain streets, avenues and highways in Far Rockaway, in the Fifth Ward of the Borough of Queens, in said city, for street railway purposes, and for the construction, maintenance and operation of a double-track street surface railroad upon and along the surface of the said streets, avenues and highways in said application mentioned, in the proposed and to be particularly set forth in said application and therein described, will be first considered, and that the City Clerk shall cause public notice thereof to be published for at least fourteen days, in two of the daily newspapers published in the City of New York, to be designated or writing therefor by his Honor the Mayor, according to the provisions of the laws in such cases made and provided, such notice to be published at the expense of the applicant.

Resolved, further, that the notice to be published by said City Clerk shall be substantially in form and manner as follows:

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN, the day of 1900.

The Ocean Electric Railway Company having filed its application in writing to the Municipal Assembly of the City of New York, dated the 10th day of May, 1900, for a grant of the right or franchise to use certain streets, avenues and highways in Far Rockaway, in the Fifth Ward of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, hereinafter mentioned, for street railway purposes, and for the construction, maintenance and operation of an extension of its double-track street surface railroad through and upon the surface of the following streets, avenues and highways, to-wit:

Through, upon and along South street, from the intersection of the Turnpike or Broadway to Grand View avenue, and from thence along Grand View avenue to the Atlantic Ocean.

Now, therefore, pursuant to the directions and resolutions of both houses of the Municipal Assembly of the City of New York, which was adopted by the Council and concurred in by the Board of Aldermen on the day of 1900, and approved by his Honor the Mayor of said city on the day of 1900, public notice of such application is hereby given, and that, at the Councilman's Chamber, in the City Hall, in the Borough of Manhattan and the City of New York, on the day of 1900, at o'clock in the noon, such application of said railway company will be first considered and a public hearing had thereon.

Section 1. The Municipal Assembly hereby concurs in and approves of a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted February 1, 1900, as amended May 1, 1900, reading as follows:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of three million five hundred thousand dollars (\$3,500,000), to provide means for the payment of the following expenses to be incurred by the Board of Education:

For constructing, equipping and improving school buildings in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (including \$300,000 for sites).....	\$1,000,000 00
For constructing, equipping and improving school buildings and acquiring sites therefor in the Borough of Brooklyn.....	1,200,000 00
For constructing, equipping and improving school buildings and acquiring sites therefor in the Borough of Queens.....	250,000 00
For constructing, equipping and improving school buildings and acquiring sites therefor in the Borough of Richmond.....	\$150,000 00
Total.....	\$3,500,000 00

—and that the Comptroller be authorized, when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Municipal Assembly, to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding three million five hundred thousand dollars (\$3,500,000), the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

Sec. 2. Pursuant to the authority conferred upon the Municipal Assembly by section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, the Comptroller of The City of New York is hereby authorized to issue from time to time, as may be required, Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of three million five hundred thousand dollars (\$3,500,000), bearing interest at a rate not exceeding four per cent. per annum, and redeemable in not less than ten nor more than fifty years from the date of issue, the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the payment of expenses authorized to be incurred by the first section of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. The proceeds of the bonds authorized to be issued by the second section of this ordinance shall be paid into the following funds created on the books of the Corporation by the ordinance of the Municipal Assembly, approved by the Mayor, March 7, 1899:

"School Building Fund—Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx;"

"School Building Fund—Borough of Brooklyn;"

"School Building Fund—Borough of Queens;"

"School Building Fund—Borough of Richmond;"

—as and when such proceeds may be, in the judgment of the Comptroller, required to provide for the liabilities to be incurred chargeable against said funds as in the next section provided; the aggregate amount of such proceeds to be credited to the said funds not to exceed, however, the amounts respectively set forth in the first section of this ordinance.

Sec. 4. Whenever the Board of Education, by resolutions adopted in conformity with law and the by-laws of said Board, shall make requisition on the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the application of the proceeds of such sales of bonds to purposes set forth in said resolutions, and said requisitions shall be approved by a majority of the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the manner provided by chapter 740 of the Laws of 1897, the said amounts shall be deemed appropriated to the purposes described in said requisitions, and the said Board of Education shall thereupon become authorized to incur liability for and on behalf of The City of New York, in respect to such purposes; provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to limit or affect the provisions of section 149 of the Greater New York Charter relating to the certification of contracts by the Comptroller of The City of New York.
