Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, January 13, 1915, at 10.30 o'clock A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President, and Commissioners Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Exempt Class, under the heading "Board of Estimate and Apportionment," the following: "Engineer" and "Consulting Sanitary Engineer."

Lewis H. Pounds, President of the Borough of Brooklyn and Chairman of the Committee on Sewer Plan of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and Nelson P. Lewis, Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. George T. Kyeas, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, opposed the exemption of the position of Engineer. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Commissioner of Accounts," the line "2 Stenographers to Commissioners." Leonard M. Wallstein, Commissioner of Accounts, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Labor Class, Part III, the title "Dock Carpenter." John H. Weinberger, Assistant Engineer, representing the President of the Borough of Manhattan, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. Francis J. Ryan, Assistant Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries, appeared in opposition. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Labor Class, Part II, the title "Window Cleaner." John C. Wolff, Assistant Engineer in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meetings held December 9, 10 and 15, 1914, were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same hereby is amended by including in the Exempt Class, under the heading "Board of Estimate and Apportionment," the following: "Consulting Sanitary Engineer."

On motion, the proposed amendment of the Classification by including in the Exempt Class, under the heading "Board of Estimate and Apportionment" the title "Engineer" was disapproved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same hereby is amended by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Commissioner of Accounts," the following: "2 Stenographers to Commissioners."

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same hereby is amended by including in the Labor Class, Part II, the title: Window Cleaner.

On motion, the proposed amendment of the Classification by including in the Labor Class, Part III, the title "Dock Carpenter," was laid over.

The following resolutions were adopted after a hearing of each of the candidates named therein:

Upon the recommendation of the First Assistant Chief Examiner in a report dated January 6, the request of the Fire Commissioner for an examination for promotion to the position of Assistant Fire Marshal in the Bureau of Fire Prevention was denied, and it was

Resolved, that the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to proceed with an open competitive examination for the position of Assistant Fire Marshal.

A report dated January 6 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner relative to the request of the Police Commissioner that the name of William J. Rafferty, a Deputy Clerk in his department, be certified from the eligible list of Stenographer and Typewriter, Third Grade, for appointment to a vacancy at \$1,200 per annum, if he were eligible for such certification. The Secretary was instructed to inform the Police Commissioner that the candidate was not eligible for certification or for transfer, his name appearing number 49 on the eligible list.

A report dated January 6 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner relative to the request of T. J. Vosburgh, M. D., to be informed "whether a man without a New York license would be eligible to a temporary appointment as Resident Physician (an \$1,800 a year position) pending the earliest time at which he might take the examinations for a license." The Secretary was instructed to inform Dr. Vosburgh that temporary appointment must fulfill the requirements of the position as set forth in the advertisement.

Reports (2) dated January 6 were presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner recommending that the following promotion examinations be ordered.

Action on the reports was deferred pending the settlement of the question raised by the State Commission as to the eligibility of employees in the Labor Class to compete in promotion examinations for the Competitive Class.

A report dated January 6 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner relative to the request of the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Queens, for authority to appoint the following-named persons as Watchmen pending the promulgation of a promotion list for that position: William Thomas, 16 Shaw Avenue, Woodhaven, N. Y.; Frederick Nicklaus, 93 Water Street, Woodhaven, N. Y.; Charles Werner, 44 Nichols Avenue, Glendale, N. Y.; James Jackson, 420 Hillside Avenue, Jamaica, N. Y.; John Schnell, 2510 Myrtle Avenue, Glendale, N. Y.; Henry Corbin, 400 Fourth Avenue, Long Island City, N. Y.; Joseph Utz, Magnolia Street, Forest Park, N. Y. The appointments were approved for a period of thirty days only under the provisions of clause 4 of Rule XII.

A report dated January 6 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner relative to the request of the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, for authority to assign Joseph Beere, Thomas F. Flanagan, John Locke, Thomas W. Kenney, Clifford M. Powell and Hugh W. Walsh, Climbers and Pruners, as Inspectors of Tree Complaints under the provisions of clauses 3 and 4 of Rule XII pending the promulgation of a promotion list for that position. The assignments were authorized for thirty days only under the provisions of clause 4 of Rule XII.

A report dated January 8 was presented from the Secretary to the Advisory Board recommending that the eligible list of Inspector of Supplies and Repairs, Grade 3, be certified to the Police Department as an appropriate list from which to appoint a Purchasing Agent at \$2,400 per annum. The Secretary was instructed to certify accordingly.

A report dated January 9 was presented from the Chief Clerk, transmitting a communication dated January 6 from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in which it was stated that the salary of Thomas E. Lynch, a Foreman of Laborers, had been reduced from \$1,800 to \$1,650 per annum, and that of Charles A. Thomas, a Topographical Draftsman, from \$1,800 to \$1,500 per annum, and requesting to be informed whether or not he should note the reductions on the records. The Secretary was instructed to inform the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that it would be necessary for him to forward the consents, in writing, of the said employees.

A report dated January 8 was presented from the Chief Clerk transmitting a communication from the Superintendent of Buildings, Borough of Manhattan, to the effect that the salaries of Thomas F. The Secretary was instructed to state that the Commission was without power to authorize the demotions without the written consent of the employees affected.

Y., in the amount of \$24 for expert services in connection with the examination for Gardener, and Miss Eva F. Auerbach and Miss Estelle J. Ellison, Examiners (per diem) in the office of the Commission, in the amount of \$250 each for overtime work during the month of December. The employment of Mr. Bradley as Expert Examiner in connection with the examination for Gardener was approved under clause 8 of Rule XII and the Secretary was instructed to approve the bills for all three examiners.

A report dated January 7 was presented from the Chief Clerk, requesting authority to assign Lawrence A. Byrne, Chief Payroll Clerk, as Fourth Grade Clerk under the provisions of clauses 3 and 4 of Rule XII pending the holding of a promotion examination for that position, and requesting instructions in the matter of the continued employment of Miss Elsie A. Rivola, Tabulator. The assignment of Mr. Byrne as Fourth Grade Clerk was approved for a period of thirty days from January 1, 1915, under the provisions of clause 4 of Rule XII, and the matter of the holding of a promotion examination for that position was referred to the First Assistant Chief Examiner for a report. The Secretary was instructed to attach a special certificate to the payroll of Miss Rivola pending the appointment of a candidate from the eligible list of Tabulator.

A report dated January 8 was presented from the Chief Clerk, requesting approval of the employment for an additional period of ten days of Harry Ettenson as emergency stenographer in connection with the oral test for Probation Officer. The additional employment was authorized under clause 4 of Rule XII.

A report dated January 8 was presented from the Chief Clerk relative to the services of Frank Gallagher, per diem Examiner. The Secretary was instructed to note on the records the reassignment of Mr. Gallagher as Per Diem Examiner as of January 1, 1914.

Upon the recommendation of the Certification Clerk in a report dated January 7, 1915, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to proceed with an examination for Driver, Department of Street Cleaning, Borough of Brooklyn.

A report dated January 5 was presented from the Certification Clerk requesting to be informed whether or not the appointment of Harry D. Gelenter in the position of Clerk, Second Grade, in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, effective January 4, 1915, from the list of Clerk, Second Grade, which expired December 31, 1914, should be recognized. The appointment was approved, the notice of same having been forwarded to the Commission before the termination of the old list.

Reports (2) dated January 9 were presented from the Certification Clerk requesting to be informed whether certain Climbers and Pruners who had been appointed in the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, and certain Laborers who had been appointed in the Fire Department, for a period of less than thirty days and who had been continued for a longer period, should be placed upon the preferred list for a period of one year from the date of their suspension from the department in which they were last employed or for a period of one year from the date of their original suspension. The Commission ruled that in all cases in the Labor Class the names of suspended employees should be placed upon the preferred list for a period of one year from the date of their suspension from the department in which they last served for more than thirty days.

A report (F-921) dated January 4 was presented from Leonhard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, relative to the keeping of efficiency records in the various city departments and recommending that the departments referred to in the report as having failed to file efficiency reports for the second quarter of 1914 be notified that if such reports were not submitted by January 31, the Commission would refuse to promulgate any eligible lists resulting from promotion examinations in those departments. The recommendation was adopted.

A report (2588) dated January 5 was presented from Leonhard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, relative to the keeping of efficiency records in the Department of Taxes and Assessments and recommending that the Commission forward the following suggestions to the department in connection therewith:

1. That the names of employees in the Exempt Class be omitted from the efficiency reports and the efficiency record books.
2. That the incorrect entries relative to C. A. Mulligan, George T. Waterson, Joseph J. Mahoney, John Leggett, H. Peterson and Peter O'Neill be corrected and that the Commission be informed when such corrections had been made.
3. That Benjamin Rasch, a Second Grade Clerk, who was dismissed from the service on September 16, 1914, be rated for the third quarter of 1914.

The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from the Chief of the Bureau of Medical and Physical Examinations, stating that Samuel A. Wishnik of 334 Cherry Street, New York City, had been rejected in a medical re-examination for the position of Sweeper, Department of Street Cleaning. The request of the candidate that his name be restored to the eligible list of Sweeper was, therefore, denied.

Reports (2) were presented from the Chief of the Bureau of Medical and Physical Examinations, stating that Salvatore Ferraro and Edward Nickerson, who had been rejected by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, had passed a medical re-examination for Driver, Department of Street Cleaning, on January 6 and January 8, respectively. The Secretary was instructed to return the two names to the Commissioner of Street Cleaning for appointment.

A report dated January 7 was presented from the Application Clerk, stating that the following-named persons, whose names appeared upon the list of persons disqualified for employment in the City service as a result of their dismissal from the Department of Street Cleaning during the strike in that department in 1911, had sworn to the affidavit prescribed by the Commission in cases where such persons desired to file applications for positions in the City service: Daniel Sullivan, 1508 Lexington Avenue, New York City; Edward Nickerson, 2240 Fifth Avenue, New York City; Thomas J. A report dated January 7 was presented from the Application Clerk, recommending that the Commission note the fact that application 56,694 for the position of Electrician's Helper, filed by Morris Spoon of 56 Sheriff Street, New York City, had been taken from the examination room by the candidate and destroyed by him, as stated in a communication from him dated December 23, 1914. The recommendation was adopted.

Reports (3) were presented from the Bureau of Medical and Physical Examinations, stating that John B. Jones, James Milligan and Frederick Savage, candidates for the position of Driver, had been rejected for physical disability in a medical re-examination. The Secretary was instructed to summon the candidates before the Commission to show cause why their names should not be removed from the eligible list for that position.

A report dated January 6 was presented from the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation recommending that candidates 11 to 14, inclusive, on the eligible list of Photographer be marked "Qualified" thereon. The recommendation was adopted.

Upon the recommendation of the Examiner in Charge of Investigations, in a report dated January 7, it was

Reports (3) dated January 6, January 12 and January 13, 1915, were presented from the Secretary, the First Assistant Chief Examiner and Leonhard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, as a Committee appointed to consider proposed changes in the rules affecting the Non-Competitive Class. The Secretary was instructed to arrange a conference with representatives of the departments concerned and to submit a further report from the committee at the next meeting of the Commission.

A communication dated January 9 was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission transmitting the following resolutions of the Municipal Commission, duly approved by the State Commission at its meeting held December 31, 1914: Increasing the limit of compensation fixed in the case of Louis Orner, serving as Fuel Expert and Efficiency Engineer in the office of the Commissioners of Accounts, to \$3,000. Increasing the limit of compensation of James J. Pearson, serving as Expert Investigator in the office of the Commissioners of Accounts, to \$2,250. The communication was ordered filed.

A communication dated January 11 was presented from the Assistant Secretary to the Mayor, returning, with the approval of the Mayor, the resolution of the Commission waiving the requirement of citizenship and residence in the State of New York in the case of Mr. Irwin S. Osborn of Toronto, Canada, to be employed as Expert on Refuse Disposal in the office of the Committee on Street Cleaning of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The communication was ordered filed.

The Secretary was instructed to note on the records the following reassignments to duty in accordance with notifications from the several departments under the dates specified: January 8, Henry F. L. Nicholson, Attendance Officer in the Department of Education; January 6, Charles W. Eagan, Marine Sounder in the Department of Docks and Ferries; Hugh Lackey, Laborer in the Department of Docks and Ferries; January 4, Rocco S. Cacciola, Driver in the Department of Street Cleaning; Michael Donahue, Sweeper in the Department of Street Cleaning; Richard E. 

Whereas, Engineer of Steamer, Seneca Larke, of Engine Company No. 20, Fire Department of The City of New York, while on duty at the Equitable Fire in The City of New York on January 9th, 1912, saved the lives of two men who were imprisoned in the vaults of the Mercantile Safe Deposit Company in the northwest corner of the building on the ground floor, under highly dangerous and almost impossible conditions, constituting one of the most heroic acts ever performed in the history of the Fire Department; and

Whereas, As a result thereof, said Engineer of Steamer, Seneca Larke suffered an almost total mental and physical breakdown from which he did not fully recover for fully eight months; and

Whereas, On February 26, 1912, a few weeks after this experience, said Engineer of Steamer, Seneca Larke, took the examination for promotion to Lieutenant of the Fire Department held by the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, and in said examination attained a rating of 65.60 per cent., resulting in his failure in said examination; and

Whereas, It appears that his failure was without doubt due to his physical condition; and

Whereas, Said Seneca Larke, in spite of these circumstances, could not be granted a special examination under the provisions of Rule VII, paragraph 11, which provides that "No candidate shall be granted a second or special examination or any second or special trial or test."

Unless it be shown to the satisfaction of the Commission that his failure to appear for or to gain admission to or to complete such examination or test was due to a manifest error or mistake for which the Commission is responsible, the nature of which shall be set forth in its Minutes, or that such failure was due to compulsory attendance before any Court or other public authority having the power to compel such attendance."

Whereas, Under the decision of Tormey vs. Polk, 134 App. Div., 939, had said Seneca Larke made application to a Medical Officer of the Fire Department for leave of absence due to illness caused by his experiences at the above mentioned fire, he would have been entitled to an examination when he recovered his health and returned to duty; and

Whereas, Seneca Larke failed to avail himself of the opportunity accorded him by this decision.

Therefore, Be it Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, the provisions of Rule VII, paragraph 11, of the Municipal Civil Service Rules be waived in the case of Seneca Larke and that he be given a special examination for promotion to the position of Lieutenant, Fire Department; provided, however, that this action shall in no wise constitute a precedent for waiving the said rule.
