Gentlemen—The Statements herewith submitted have been framed to give all essential particulars with respect to the Debt Service charges, viz., the Interest on the City's bonded debt and the Appropriations for Redemption and Amortization of such Debt, which must be provided in the tax budget of 1918:

These Statements consists of

Table—summarizing the total amount of bonds maturing in 1918, and showing—

(1) The amount of said bonds which are redeemable from appropriations to be provided in the tax budget of 1918; (2) The amounts redeemable from water revenues; (3) From assessments, and (4) The Amount of bonds maturing in 1918 which are redeemable through the sinking funds. The amount of all bonds maturing in 1918 which are held by the public and the amount thereof which is now held by the sinking funds are also shown. The Table concludes with the annual amortization installment to be provided in the 1918 budget for the Sinking Fund of the City of New York and the appropriation for redemption in 1918 of special revenue bonds. The purpose of this Table, as may be noted, is to place before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a comprehensive view of all the bonded

debt maturing in 1918, classified according to political division (the new City and the former municipalities), and segregated to show the sources from which the debt is redeemable.

Table "A"—summarizing the total interest payable in 1918 on the entire bonded debt of the City, arranged according to political division, and showing the totals of such interest which have to be raised by taxation and the amounts to be derived from other sources; also showing the totals of interest payable in 1918 to the public and the amounts thereof which will flow into the sinking funds as interest on the City's securities held by them.

Table "B"—summarizing the interest payable in 1918 on the City's bonded indebtedness as of September 30, 1917, classified according to (1) the new city and the former separate municipalities, and (2) according to the general purposes for which bonds were issued, viz., rapid transit; water supply; docks; bridges; schools and sites; colleges; public buildings and offices, etc. This Table also classifies the sources from which the interest is to be derived and the amounts payable to the public and to the sinking funds, under the same principle of segregation as obtains in Table "A."

Table "C"—summarizing the interest payable in 1918 on the City's bonded debt under the same general plan with respect to political division and general purpose for which bonds were issued as obtains in Table "B," giving further particulars with respect to the latter; and also classifies the debt and the interest payable thereon according to the several rates of interest which the bonds bear.

Table "D"—summarizing the interest payable in 1918 on the bonded debt of the City, segregated to show the total amount thereof which is payable at each specific rate of interest which the bonds bear, irrespective of general purpose for which bonds were issued.

The concluding statement consists of a comparative Table summarizing the appropriations for debt service in the budget of 1917 and the appropriations for similar purposes which will require to be included in the budget of 1918, together with the increases or decreases of each group total to be included in the latter budget compared with the corresponding appropriations in the budget of 1917. To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—I herewith submit statements upon which the Board may predicate its action in complying with the requirements of Section 248 of the Greater New York Charter as amended by Chapter 220 of the Laws of 1917, and Sec. 237 as amended by Chapter 220, Laws of 1917, in determining the appropriation for deficiencies in taxes to be included in the budget of 1918.

The statements herewith submitted consist of the following:

Table "A"—Balance sheet, setting forth the status of the tax levies of the years 1905 to 1916, inclusive, as at the opening of business January 1, 1917.

Table "B"—Amplifying Table "A" by giving the totals of discounts, cancellations, etc., against each year's tax levy, and similarly showing the amounts added to each year's tax levy or budget to cover deficiencies in the product of taxes since January 1, 1905, thus supporting and giving all essential particulars with respect to the totals of losses and gains on Table "A."

Table "C"—Operating Statement, summarizing the financing of the annual budgets of 1905 to 1916, inclusive, to December 31, 1916, showing—

- (1) the total budget appropriations for these years;
- (2) the total payments from said budgets to December 31, 1916, inclusive;
- (3) grand aggregate of tax levies of 1905 to 1916, inclusive;
- (4) total collections therefrom to December 31, 1916;
- (5) losses by discount and cancellation; also deductions under Section 48 of the Tax Law;
- (6) the uncollected amount as of December 31, 1916;
- (7) the net amount appropriated from the General Fund to finance the budgets of 1905 to 1916; and
- (8) the cash used for budget purposes borrowed on the revenue bonds and bills outstanding December 31, 1916.

Table "D"—Balance sheet as at December 31, 1916, showing the status, of the budget appropriations of 1905 to 1916 inclusive.

The purpose of this series of correlated statements is to show, by two methods of procedure, the accuracy of the conclusions reached, viz.: That on the first day of January of the present year (1917) there was a deficiency of \$4,534,176.81 in the product of taxes theretofore levied (since January 1, 1905), and deemed to be uncollectible.

Savings in Budget Appropriations.

The amendment to Sections 237 and 248 of the Charter, which was effected by Ch. 220, Laws of 1917, provides that all unexpended balances of budget appropriations which are unencumbered shall not later than one year after the expiration of the year for which such appropriations were made be transferred and credited to a "tax and appropriation surplus and deficiency account" created by said amendment to the Charter. This account is to be debited or charged with all discounts and cancellations or remission of taxes, and it shall be further charged with a sum equal to so much of the deficiency on the preceding first day of January, in the product of taxes theretofore levied and deemed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to be uncollectible, as shall not have been previously provided for.

In accordance with these provisions of the Charter there is \$1,431,680.94 unencumbered balances of budget appropriations of years prior to 1917 which have been transferred to and are now available for transfer by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the "tax and appropriation surplus and deficiency account" which will offset to that extent the \$4,534,176.81 of deficiencies in taxes shown in the "Operating Statement" and "Balance Sheets" relating to the tax levies of 1905-1916 and thus reduce the tax deficiency to be carried in the budget of 1918 and its related tax levy to \$3,102,495.87 or an even sum of \$3,100,000.

Losses and Gains in Tax Levies.

The first statement, viz., Table "A," deals with the subject by stating the losses

and gains of the tax levies since January 1, 1905, dividing these into the smallest number of significant elements:

The losses of a tax levy consist of discounts; cancellations; the amount of taxes which may subsequently be found to be on City property and which therefore must be provided for as a deficiency, and the amount of taxes still outstanding which are deemed to be uncollectible; in brief, are uncollectible.

The gains of a tax levy consist of the amounts which, before 1907, were added directly to the tax levy, and which, since 1907, have been added to the annual tax levies through appropriations in the annual budgets. Small additional gains also come from increases which attach to the many thousands of separate items on the rolls whereby, through an even tax rate of dollars and cents, a sum is extended on the tax rolls which produces an aggregate over and above the gross total of the theoretical tax levy.

Table "B" is merely for the purpose of amplifying and supporting the totals on Table "A" by showing the action affecting each year's levy with respect to losses and gains.

Financing Tax Budgets and Resultant Deficit.

Tables "C" and "D" are designed for the purpose of showing the operations from the budget point of view; in other words, to show that in the financing up to December 31, 1916, of the annual budgets of 1905 to 1916 inclusive, there is a resultant deficit as shown by the Balance Sheet (Table "D") of \$4,534,176.81, which exactly corresponds with the deficit as shown on Table "A" (the Balance Sheet dealing with the losses and gains in the tax levies), less the sum of \$1,431,680.94, unencumbered balances of budget appropriations, thus leaving a net deficit of \$3,102,495.87.

As the tax deficit to be provided in the budget of any year must necessarily be predicated on (1) actual losses and (2) on estimates of amounts of taxes outstanding but deemed to be uncollectible, it would be sufficient, to carry out the requirements of the law, to place an even sum of \$3,100,000 in the budget of 1918 to provide for deficiencies in taxes. To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: Gentlemen—The Tables herewith presented classify the estimated receipts, aligned with the actual receipts, to the "General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation" during 1915 and 1916; and also show the estimated revenue receipts for 1917 and the actual receipts from January 1, 1917, to August 31, 1917. These revenues are classified according to the general character or source whence they are derived. They also include the total amount of surplus revenues of the "Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, No. 1," which, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 103, Laws of 1903, are transferable from said Sinking Fund and are payable into the "General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation."

Table "A" summarizes, under a group classification, these revenue receipts of the General Fund, and the supporting Statements amplify, under a more detailed subdivision, the amounts of the various elements of revenue receipts which enter into and constitute each group total shown on Table "A." The general sources and amounts which constitute the surplus revenues of Sinking Fund, No. 1, which are annually transferable therefrom and payable into the "General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation," are shown on two separate Statements; one showing the revenue receipts which, in accordance with law, are pledged to and payable into the Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest, and the other showing the revenues of Sinking Fund, No. 1, which are not required for the redemption of debt payable from said Sinking Fund, and therefore constitute a surplus which, in accordance with Chapter 103, Laws of 1903, are transferred to the General Fund and used in the reduction of current taxation.

The surplus revenues of Sinking Fund, No. 1, consist (a) of the surplus revenues transferable from the Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest, to Sinking Fund No. 1; (b) of the surplus revenues per se of Sinking Fund No. 1, and (c) of the interest on General Fund bonds which, in accordance with law, must be paid from the "General Fund" into Sinking Fund No. 1, and which comes back again to the General Fund in the form of "surplus revenues of Sinking Fund No. 1." To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the City of New York:
Gentlemen—In accordance with section 174 of the Tax Law, the State Comptroller has transmitted to this department for payment, a statement of the proportion of the direct state tax for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1917, imposed against the five counties comprising the City of New York, as follows:

This tax is imposed by chapter 762 of the Laws of 1917, which provides for the imposition of a tax of 1.08 mills on each dollar of real and personal property of the state, subject to taxation on July 1, 1917. It is levied chiefly to provide for the amortization and redemption of the state debt and for interest thereon, as required by law. Based on the aggregate assessed valuations of the taxable real and personal property of the state for the year 1916, this mill-rate will produce a direct tax to the state aggregating \$13,058,752.65, of which New York City's share is 64.81 per cent., or as is shown in the following table.

In 1915, and since that time, this department has sought to secure for the City of New York the adoption, by the State Board of Equalization, of an equitable equalization table, on the basis of which there would be apportioned to the city a fair and just share of the direct state taxes.

As your honorable board will doubtless recall, the state in 1915 levied a direct tax of over \$20,500,000, the largest in its history. Computations based on the preceding year's state equalization or apportionment table indicated that New York City's share of this tax would be approximately 69 per cent. As this phase of the state's financial operations had received very little, if any, attention from the fiscal authorities of the city, an investigation was begun in May, 1915, at my direction, by the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, of this department, for the purpose of determining the nature of the data on which the equalization or apportionment table was based.

This investigation showed, among other things, that aside from the fact that there was then no division or bureau of the State Tax Department properly organized to collect and compile assessment data for use in connection with the preparation of the annual equalization table, much of the data used as a basis for establishing rates of equalization in the table for the year 1914 was unreliable, if not useless, for the purpose of equalization. Taken as a whole, the results indicated that many up-state counties had received ratings on the equalization table much higher than they merited, that as a result, the assessed valuations, as equalized, of up-state counties did not bear a just relation to the equalized valuations of the counties comprising the City of New York, as required by law, and that New York City had undoubtedly paid in preceding years more than its just share of direct state taxes.

In order, therefore, to determine and clearly establish the rates of equalization to which the several up-state counties were entitled on the basis of existing assessment standards, this department undertook, in co-operation with the newly created State Tax Commission, the work of collecting, analyzing and compiling assessment data in six large counties of the state, outside of the City of New York. The following year, 1916, this work was extended to embrace nine large counties, and the investigations made by the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics this year covered sixteen counties. Each year, the results of the inquiry have been submitted to the State Board of Equalization as evidence of the actual rates at which real property was assessed in the counties under review, and for the information and guidance of the members of the board in fixing the rates of equalization for the several counties examined.

As a direct result of the equalization work done for the past three years by the Department of Finance through its Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, the city's share of the direct state tax has been reduced from 69.27 per cent. in 1914 to 64.81 per cent. in 1917, a decrease of 4.46 per cent., which expressed in dollars and cents, means a reduction in the city's share of the present direct tax of over \$500,000. In other words, had the 1917 direct state tax been apportioned on the basis of the 1914 apportionment table, New York City's share would have been \$9,000,000 instead of approximately \$8,500,000.

This work has been carried on under the immediate supervision and direction of Mr. Robert B. McIntyre, Supervising Statistician and Examiner of the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, and his report covering in detail the scope of the several examinations made, the methods employed in the collection and compilation of the data submitted annually to the State Board of Equalization, and the results attained, is submitted herewith for your information. Dear Sir—In accordance with your instructions, I have prepared and submit herewith a report summarizing the work of the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics in connection with the preparation of the state equalization tables for the years 1915, 1916 and 1917.

Introduction. Summary of the Results Achieved.

This work, the primary purpose of which is to guard the City's interests in connection with the preparation of the annual equalization table on the basis of which the direct state tax is apportioned among the sixty-two counties of the state, was begun in May, 1915, at your direction. The results attained and the savings effected in connection with the apportionment of the direct state tax may best be measured by a comparison of the percentage of the direct tax now paid by the city with the proportion prevailing before the City of New York, through its Department of Finance, began to take an active interest in the preparation of the annual equalization tables.

On the basis of the equalization or apportionment table for the year 1914, New York City's proportion of the direct state tax would have been 69.27 per cent. The table for 1914 has been selected as a basis for comparison because it was the last equalization table in connection with which no active part was taken by this bureau. On the basis of the 1917 equalization table, as adopted by the State Board of Equalization on September 18, 1917, on which the direct state tax for 1917-18 has been apportioned, New York City's share is fixed at 64.81 per cent, a reduction of nearly 4½ per cent., as compared with the proportion of 1914.

Measured in dollars and cents, this reduction in the share of the state tax to be paid by the City of New York means that, had the 1914 rate of apportionment, viz., 69.27 per cent., obtained in 1917, New York City would have had to pay over \$9,000,000 as its share of this year's direct state tax instead of \$8,500,000, or 64.81 per cent., the rate for 1917. This is a difference of \$500,000 in the city's favor, and it is doubtful whether this substantial saving would have been effected had not the city, through the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, of the Department of Finance, persisted for the past three years in its efforts to secure for itself an equitable apportionment of the direct state tax. The share fixed by the 1917 equalization table, is the smallest portion of the direct state tax borne by the City of New York since 1900, in which year 64.67 per cent. of such tax was paid here.

For the success attained by the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics in its various investigations of assessment standards during the past three years credit must be shared with the State Tax Commission, which has heartily co-operated with this bureau in its efforts to secure an equitable equalization table. In furthering these efforts the President, Mr. Martin Saxe, has taken an especially active part. The commission organized, soon after its appointment, a Bureau of Local Assessments, Equalization and Statistics and has worked to develop and maintain it as an organization qualified to cope intelligently with the vexatious problems of equalization. Many improvements have been effected in the administration of the tax law, including marked advances in the supervision of local assessments.

The scope of the several investigations conducted by the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, the methods employed and the results attained in connection with the preparation of the 1915, 1916 and 1917 equalization tables are described in detail in the following report.

Conditions Before the City Entered the Field as an Independent Investigator.

That for many years the City of New York has had to bear more than its just share of the direct state tax because of the methods employed in the apportionment of the direct state tax, is a well-known fact. The equalization tables adopted by the State Board of Equalization have from year to year fixed high rates of equalization for up-state counties where, in reality, real property was actually assessed from 10 to 30 points lower than such rates. On the other hand, although New York City, since 1903, has made strong efforts to carry out the law requiring the assessment of property at full value, it has had to content itself with a rate of equalization much lower than that merited by the high standard employed by it in the assessment of property.

Nor could this situation be said to be due to the lack of information by the State Board of Equalization as to assessment conditions in New York City. Year after year, representatives from the City's Department of Taxes and Assessments appeared before the board at its annual meetings, with data indicating a virtual compliance with the provisions of the tax law requiring assessment at full value; and each year the State Board of Equalization disregarded this full obedience to the law, ignored the evidence presented, and continued to fix low rates of equalization for New York City's counties.

From 1900 to 1903 the rate of equalization fixed by the State Board of Equalization for the New York City counties averaged about 67.60 per cent. In 1904, in recognition of the large increase in New York City's assessments, aggregating nearly 43 per cent., the purpose of which was to bring the city's assessments to substantially full value, the State Board of Equalization fixed the average rate of equalization for New York City counties at 89 per cent., an increase in rating, as compared with 1903, of not quite 32 per cent. From 1904 to 1910 the assessments of real property in the City of New York increased from \$4,751,532,826 to \$6,807,179,704, or more than 43 per cent., but the rates of equalization for the New York City counties remained practically stationary during this entire period.

In 1911 a member of the State Board of Equalization from New York City declined for several days to subscribe to the state equalization table, for the reason that neither the State Tax Board nor the State Board of Equalization had any assessment data or other statistical information upon which to base intelligent judgment as to assessment conditions in the several counties of the state, and further, because it was generally recognized by those familiar with the assessment situation in the state, that the rates of equalization previously fixed for the up-state counties were in most instances too high to bear a just relation to the rates fixed for the counties comprising the City of New York. When the 1911 equalization table was finally adopted the rates of equalization for New York and Kings counties were fixed at 91 per cent., an increase of two points over the preceding year's rates. This brought the average rate of equalization for the New York City counties up to 90.88 per cent., or nearly two points higher than the average rate for 1910 and the years immediately preceding it.

There was no increase in the rates of equalization fixed for New York City counties in 1912, although the equalization table for that year was ostensibly based on 1911 assessed valuations, which had been increased more than \$800,000,000 over the aggregate valuations for the year 1910. There were no further concessions to New York City until 1915, when this city for the first time became interested in analyzing and compiling assessment data affecting real property located in up-state counties, for the purpose of determining independently the relation which actual assessment conditions bore to the rates of equalization which had been heretofore or would be hereafter fixed for such counties.

Necessity for New York City's Taking an Active Part in the Preparation of Equalization Data.

In the spring of 1915 the state levied a large direct tax, over \$20,500,000. According to the preceding year's equalization or apportionment table, that of 1914, the city's share would be 69.27 per cent., or approximately \$14,200,000. The magnitude of this sum and the further fact that in the apportionment of it among the several counties of the state, each per cent. of increase in the city's share meant an additional tax burden of over \$200,000, invited the serious consideration of the city's fiscal authorities.

In obedience, therefore, to the imperative necessity of carefully guarding the city's interests an examination of the records and files of the State Tax Commission was made at your direction by this bureau soon after the present State Tax Commission took office, early in 1915. In brief, it was found that although the law requires the State Board of Equalization, of which the three State Tax Commissioners are members, to prepare and adopt annually a table on the basis of which the direct state tax shall be apportioned among the several counties of the state, no systematic scheme or plan was in operation for procuring reliable information relating to the average rate at which real property was assessed in such counties. Not only were the assessment data found insufficient in volume to afford a proper basis for an equalization table, but

much of the data on file was, on examination, determined to be useless for the purposes of equalization.

Investigation of 1915 and the Results Attained Through it.

Convinced that the city's interests would best be served by entering the field as an independent investigator of assessment conditions in up-state counties, and further, in order to assist the new State Tax Commission to secure reliable information concerning average rates of assessment in the several counties of the state, this bureau undertook, in May, 1915, to compile assessment data in the six counties outside the City of New York having the largest assessed valuations, as follows:

The combined assessed valuations of these six counties aggregated nearly 50 per cent. of the total for all the up-state counties.

This examination, the results of which consisted chiefly of rates of assessment determined by a comparison of the 1914 tax valuations with appraisals of property mortgaged to savings banks, trust companies and insurance companies, was completed in co-operation with the State Tax Commission's Bureau of Local Assessment, Equalization and Statistics. This bureau was organized, as has been explained, by the new tax commission for the express purpose of creating a division able to cope effectively with the problems involved in the exercise of certain statutory functions given by a recent law to the new commission, the most important of which was the function of equalizing special franchise assessments and collecting and compiling data to be used in connection with the preparation of the annual equalization table.

The present State Tax Commission, composed of Martin Saxe, of New York; Walter H. Knapp, of Canandaigua, and Ralph W. Thomas, of Hamilton, took office on April 15, 1915, after the former State Tax Board had been retired from office by an amendment to the tax law creating the present State Tax Department, with the State Tax Commission as its head.

Owing to the short time that intervened between the date of taking office and that of the annual meeting of the State Board of Equalization in September, 1915, the Tax Commission was unable to secure sufficient reliable assessment data in all the counties of the State to serve as the basis for the fixing of the component rates of equalization in the equalization table for the year 1915.

A comparison of the results obtained through the examination made by the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics with the rates of equalization fixed both for the preceding year, 1914, and the rates fixed for the year 1915, by the State Board of Equalization, to whom these results were submitted, is contained in the subjoined table:

Thus, while no important rectification of the rates fixed for the up-state counties was obtained as a direct result of the data gathered by the bureau, fairly substantial increases were secured in the rates of equalization fixed for the New York City counties. The State Board of Equalization, although apparently unwilling to inaugurate a drastic change in the level of previous rates for the up-state counties, gave recognition to the work that had been done by this bureau and sought to correct in some degree the relation between the assessments of New York City and the up-state counties by increasing New York county's rating by two points and giving an increase of one point each to Kings and The Bronx.

These increases for the New York City counties and the decreases, ranging from one to six points in the rates of equalization fixed for twenty-two up-state counties, had the ultimate effect of reducing New York City's share of the direct state tax for 1915 to 68.10 per cent. as compared with 69.27 per cent., the rate fixed in 1914. Had the 1915 direct state tax been apportioned on the basis of the 1914 equalization table, New York City's share of that tax would have been approximately \$250,000 greater than the portion finally fixed by the 1915 equalization table.

The Investigation of 1916 and its Results.

The examination for the year 1916 included in addition to the six counties embraced in the 1915 investigation, the counties of Niagara, Rensselaer and Schenectady, making a total of nine counties, with an aggregate assessed valuation equal to more than 50 per cent. of the total valuations of the up-state counties.

Inasmuch as no direct state tax was imposed by the Legislature of 1916, that year was deemed to be an opportune time to make a strong effort to secure substantial reductions in the inflated rates of equalization fixed for up-state counties in previous years. Another feature of the situation which favored an extension of the work of examining into the actual rates of assessments in those counties was the creation of a new source of reliable information concerning current selling prices, which resulted indirectly from the enactment of the Federal Emergency War Tax Act, in December, 1914.

The practical effect of the act was to require all conveyances to bear revenue stamps at the rate of fifty cents for each \$500, or fractional part, of the equity conveyed in the transfer of real property. The amount of the equity so conveyed was easily approximated from the value of the stamps affixed to the conveyance; and by adding to the sum so obtained, the amount of the mortgages and other encumbrances outstanding against the subject matter of the sale the full consideration could be determined with reasonable accuracy. A comparison of this sum with the current assessed valuation furnished a fair indication of the rate at which real property in the vicinity was assessed. Thus, for the first time in many years, reliable data concerning current selling prices in practically every section of the state where real property was bought and sold became available.

An investigation of assessment conditions, including the analysis of sales and other data for the purpose of determining average rates of assessment, was carried on in practically every county of the state, either by the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics or by the Bureau of Local Assessment, Equalization and Statistics of the State Tax Commission. The results of these investigations furnished a formidable mass of reliable information and statistics relating to actual assessment conditions. In some of these counties examinations were made by both bureaus. It is interesting to mention in this connection that the results and conclusions reached by these two independent investigations were substantially in agreement.

The State Tax Commission was thus, by reason of the work done by its own bureau and the additional data gathered by the city's Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, able, for the first time, to place before the State Board of Equalization, for adoption at its annual meeting, a tentative equalization table based on complete data, carefully and accurately compiled from the best and most reliable sources available.

Viewed from the standpoint of efficiency and the desire to perform a statutory function faithfully, the situation marked a distinct advance and made new and better methods in connection with the preparation of the annual equalization table fully available.

The results of these investigations indicated that every county but one, where data had been collected outside of New York City, had been given on the previous year's equalization table, that of 1915, a higher rate of equalization than the actual assessment of its real property would justify. The full details were presented at the annual meeting of the State Board of Equalization in 1916, and, at the executive session that followed, the State Tax Commission, following the custom of previous years, submitted a tentative equalization table. The com-

ponent rates of equalization advocated for the several counties of the state were based entirely on the facts ascertained by the special agents of the State Tax Commission and the assessment data relating to nine large counties compiled by the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics. This tentative table fixed New York City's proportion at 64.29 per cent., or nearly four per cent. lower than the rate fixed for 1915, the preceding year.

The State Board of Equalization held several executive sessions between the date of the annual meeting in September and the date when the equalization table was adopted. Finally, on October 26, 1916, nearly seven weeks after the date of its annual meeting, the board adopted the equalization table for 1916. The recommendation of the Tax Commission for increased ratings for three counties within the City of New York, viz: Bronx, Kings and New York counties, was followed to the extent of an increase of one point in the rate of equalization and substantial decreases were made with respect to the ratings fixed for many up-state counties, though the explicit ratios advised by the Commission, were substantially ignored.

Comparing the 1916 ratings with those of 1915, we find that out of a total of fifty-seven up-state counties, three were given higher ratings than in the preceding year, four remained unchanged while fifty were reduced.

The table as adopted by the majority of the State Board of Equalization fixed New York City's proportion at 66.19 per cent., or nearly two per cent. greater than the proportion fixed in the table proposed by the President of the State Tax Commission, Mr. Martin Saxe.

The action of the majority of the State Board of Equalization in disregarding the proposed equalization table, based on actual investigation and inspired by an honest effort to fulfil statutory functions, called forth a strong protest from the minority, headed by Mr. Saxe, who insisted that his plea for the adoption of a table based on the evidence presented to the Equalization Board be incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, together with a copy of the proposed table.

Thus, while the action of the State Board of Equalization was not all that could be desired, it did result in a further improvement in New York City's position on the equalization table.

The 1917 Investigations.

While the last two years had seen steady improvement in New York City's position on equalization tables, a comparison of the rates fixed for many up-state counties with the actual rates of assessment determined through investigation made it clear that there was still room for much improvement. The reductions, with few exceptions, were hardly drastic enough to produce a just relation between the rates of many up-state counties and those fixed for the counties of the City of New York.

This is shown perhaps more clearly in the following table, in which are summarized the results obtained through investigations made by this bureau in 1915 and 1916, and the rates fixed by the State Board of Equalization for the same years.

In accordance, therefore, with the determination to secure a further improvement in the matter of ratings the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics undertook to secure assessment data in eighteen counties of the State. But it was found impossible to make satisfactory arrangements for the carrying on of this work in two of the counties, viz., Chautauqua and Oswego. The compilation of the assessments data undertaken in the remaining sixteen counties was successfully completed and submitted to the State Tax Commission and to the State Board of Equalization, in ample time for consideration by the several members of that board.

The results of this investigation, probably the most comprehensive ever undertaken by a municipality, are briefly summarized in the subjoined table, in which are shown, in connection with each county included in the survey, (1) the rate of equalization fixed in the 1916 equalization table, (2) the average rate of assessment determined by the results of the examination made in each county, and (3) the number of points by which the 1916 rate of equalization, as fixed by the State Board of Equalization, exceeds the rate indicated by this investigation:

Scope of the Examination.

The examination dealt with two classes of assessment data, viz., sales and appraisals. The results of the examination included 15,382 sales items and 5,877 mortgage appraisals, a total of 21,259 items. The inquiry embraced all the cities and at least six of the large towns in each of the sixteen counties mentioned in the preceding paragraph. Moreover, the aggregate assessed valuations of the several tax districts in each of the counties covered by this investigation were, in every case, equal to at least 80 per cent. of the total assessed valuations of the entire county.

The sales data, comprising in all 15,382 sales of real property recorded during the year 1916, were compiled from the records of the several county clerks' offices, and were based on a comparison of the consideration, as expressed in the recorded deed, or determined from the value of the stamps attached thereto, with the assessed valuation of such property for the year 1916. The appraisal data consisted of 5,877 appraisals of property mortgaged to savings banks and trust companies during 1915 and 1916. These appraisals, made by the officers of these banks as a basis for mortgage loans, were obtained through the courtesy of the State Tax Commission from the official reports on file in the Albany office of the State Banking Department.

Method of Compiling Data.

The Federal Emergency War Tax Act was repealed on September 8, 1916. Therefore, the sales data included in this inquiry covered the period from January 1, 1916, to September 8, 1916, the last day on which transfers of real property required the affixing of revenue stamps under the provisions of the War Tax Act.

The total consideration involved in a particular transfer was determined by computation in the manner and according to the rules promulgated on page 75 of the State Tax Department "Manual for the Instruction of Assessors," the amount of the equity conveyed being approximately determined from the value of the stamps affixed to the conveyance and the approximate value of the property being deduced by adding to the sum so obtained the amount of the mortgages and other encumbrances outstanding against it.

The compilation of the sales data and the ascertainment of the related assessed valuations were done by experienced resident title searchers and title companies who secured the sales data from the records on file in the several county clerks' offices. When completed, this work was carefully examined and all data based on sales between members of the same family, forced sales, executors' sales and sales to the state or to municipalities were excluded. In other instances, where the disparity between the consideration and the related assessed valuation was found to be greater than the normal difference, such items were marked for further investigation, and the data returned to the field worker for re-examination and additional investigation. In this way, many mortgages and other encumbrances not recited in the conveyances were discovered. Where a portion of a large property was sold, the 1917 assessment was used if it represented the assessment for the part sold. Data obviously incomplete were excluded from the final computations. Typical examples of such instances follow: where the assessed valuation as compared with the consideration was so low as to indicate the omission of an important factor, as, for example, a building unfinished at the time the assessment was made, but whose completed value was reflected in the amount of consideration as determined by computation from the value of the stamps, mortgages, etc., or where the assessed valuation so greatly exceeded the amount of the consideration as to indicate that the property assessed was of greater extent than that conveyed by the deed in question. Transfers involving the sale of suburban development property, where clearly indicated, were also excluded from the final computations, in accordance with the State Tax Commission's regulations.

The Adoption of the 1917 Table.

Opposition by a majority of the State Board of Equalization to the adoption of an equitable equalization table was again encountered in 1917. On September 4, 1917, the date of the annual meeting of the State Board of Equalization, the State Tax Commission, unanimously recommended for adoption, as in preceding years, a tentative table based on the facts and statistics secured through investigations made by agents of the Commission during the year, together with the sales and appraisal data covering sixteen large counties which had been compiled and submitted by the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics. This tentative table recommended an increase of one point each in the ratings to be fixed for New York and Kings counties, and thereby fixed New York City's proportion of the direct state tax at 63.82 per cent., as compared with 66.19 per cent. for 1916.

Nine members of the State Board of Equalization were present and voted at an adjourned session of an executive meeting of the board, held in Albany on September 18, 1917. State Tax Commissioner Thomas was absent. The vote favoring the adoption of the table recommended by the State Tax Commission was very close, 4 to 5. But the up-state members of the board, other than the Tax Commissioners, being in a majority, again determined the final action of the board, and there was adopted for the year 1917 an equalization table which fixed New York City's proportion of the direct state tax at 64.81 per cent., or approximately one per cent. higher than the proportion recommended in the tentative table prepared by the State Tax Commission.

The members of the State Board of Equalization who voted for the adoption of the tentative equalization table recommended by the State Tax Commission were: President of the Tax Commission, Martin Saxe, State Tax Commissioner Walter H. Knapp, State Treasurer James L. Wells, and State Comptroller Eugene M. Travis.

Those who voted in favor of the table as adopted, imposing on this City a greater proportion of the direct state tax than that unanimously recommended by the State Tax Commission were: Lieutenant-Governor Edward Schoeneck, of Syracuse; Secretary of State Francis M. Hugo, of Watertown; Attorney-General Merton E. Lewis, of Rochester; State Engineer and Surveyor Frank M. Williams, of Goshen, and Speaker of the Assembly, Thaddeus C. Sweet, of Phoenix. It is interesting to conjecture what might have been the result had State Tax Commissioner Thomas been present. He had indorsed the tentative table as a member of the State Tax Commission and would undoubtedly have supported its adoption at the executive session of the Equalization Board. His vote would then have resulted in a vote of 5 to 5.

It cannot, however, be said that the table as adopted did not improve the city's position with respect to the apportionment of the direct state tax. Although the increased rates recommended for two New York City counties were not granted by the State Board of Equalization, substantial decreases in the rates of equalization fixed for many up-state counties had practically the same effect.

Because of the reductions in the rates of equalization fixed for up-state counties and the resulting adjustments in the aggregate equalized valuations, the counties comprising the City of New York received greater credit on the 1917 equalization table than in the preceding year, so that the apportionment as finally determined fixed New York City's share of the direct state tax for the year 1917 at 64.81 per cent., or a decrease of 1.29 per cent., as compared with 1916.

Suggested Legislation to Effect a Change in the Membership of State Board of Equalization.

At the 1917 session of the Legislature the State Tax Commission caused a bill to be introduced providing for a reduction in the membership of the State Board of Equalization from ten to three members, by eliminating the six elected officials of the state, other than the Governor and the Speaker of the Assembly. In advancing the claim that a more equitable and scientific equalization table would result were the responsibility for its preparation to rest solely in the hands of the State Tax Commission, that body pointed out that

"The tax commissioners are appointive officers, whereas the other members of the State Board of Equalization are elective, necessitating their running for office every two years. It is an unfair burden to impose upon elective officials to charge them with judicial duties in respect of the equalization of taxable values throughout the state when they must necessarily engage in frequent political campaigns. By imposing the duty of making the state equalization upon the tax commission undoubtedly a more equitable and scientific result can be obtained."

Experience indicated that this would be a step in the right direction and this bill accordingly received not only your endorsement, but the newspapers were urged to support it. The several members of the Legislature composing the committees to which the bill had been referred were addressed relative to the advantages to be gained through the proposed law, but for some reason or other the bill was never reported out of the committee.

Provision for a Source of Reliable Equalization Data.

It is of the utmost importance to the taxpayers of the City of New York that the direct tax be equitably apportioned. The first essential to the preparation of a just equalization table is reliable data concerning the average ratios of assessment in the several counties; but any one who has ever seriously tried it will admit that the task of determining existing ratios of assessed valuations of real estate to actual values is not an exact science. Data based on comparisons of assessments with current selling prices and appraisals are those most often used. The revenue stamps formerly affixed to deeds were another fruitful source of information already mentioned.

The State Tax Commission, which, as has been pointed out, has accomplished much toward securing an equitable equalization table, realized that, unless some new source were provided to replace that which had been abolished by the repeal of the War Tax Act, which afforded, at a reasonable cost in time and money, a sufficient supply of assessment data to enable the State Tax Commission to perform efficiently its statutory functions relating to the equalization of assessments, the administration of this requirement of the tax law, would be seriously hampered. In order, therefore, to provide a new source of equalization data, the need for which became imperative in view of the fact that an important former source had passed out of existence by the repeal of the War Tax Act, there was introduced at the last session of the Legislature a bill which, in addition to imposing a nominal registration fee, provided that

where the consideration expressed in the conveyance was nominal, the amount of the actual consideration must be incorporated in a sworn statement to be filed at the time of the filing of the conveyance, such sworn statement to be accessible to the State Tax Commission, or its duly authorized representatives, in the performance of its duties as prescribed by law.

Yet, although those best informed on the questions and problems concerning the difficulties of securing reliable equalization data agreed that continuation of the good work for equitable equalization absolutely demanded a substitute for the equalization data formerly deduced from the revenue stamps affixed to conveyances, the taxpayers, whose interests this bill was intended to conserve and protect, neglected to lend it their support and it failed of passage.

The Importance of Fixing Accurate Ratios.

The public service corporations give close attention to the workings of the State Board of Equalization, and with good reason.

Large corporate interests owning public franchises are represented at the yearly meetings in Albany, demanding that lower rates be fixed for the City of New York. They contend that real estate in New York, Bronx and Kings counties is now assessed at average rates approximating 84 per cent. of the real value and their representatives produce sales data and other selected assessment information to prove their contention. On the other hand, the representative of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, New York City, last year submitted sales data indicating an average rate of assessment of 103 per cent. But the rates fixed by the State Board of Equalization for the year 1916 were as follows:

Although the law requires that special franchises shall be assessed on the basis of full value, the courts long ago ruled that such franchises could not be assessed for the purposes of taxation at a greater ratio to true value than that at which other property in the vicinity was assessed. Thus, special-franchise-owning corporations in New York County pay a tax on approximately 94 per cent. of the full value of the special franchise, and enjoy a reduction in the assessment of their franchises to the extent that the State Board of Equalization fixes the rates of equalization below 100 per cent. In the several counties comprising the City of New York, corporations owning special franchises are allowed the following percentages from the full value of such franchises:

The full value of the franchises included on the 1917 tax roll aggregated \$494,231,250, whereas the equalized value of these same franchises, to which the current tax rate was applied, aggregated \$461,567,645, a reduction of \$32,663,605. At the current tax rates this reduction in assessments is equal to a reduction in taxes of \$667,614.47, or 6½ per cent. of a special franchise tax levy product based on full value assessments. This substantial saving to the public service corporations is quite just if based upon proper ratios. If the rates of equalization are too low then the owner of ordinary real estate contributes more than his fair share of city taxes and the corporations enjoy illegal exemptions to the same extent.

Another Phase of Equalization Work.

Among the difficulties encountered by this bureau in its efforts to secure a just and equitable equalization table there stand out most prominently the several attempts made before the State Board of Equalization to show that full value assessments of real property in New York City are more apparent than real. This was particularly true at the 1916 meeting of the State Board of Equalization, where a list of several hundred items garnered from the reports of New York City corporations was presented as evidence to controvert the contention that New York City assesses real property at approximately full value.

These circumstances were brought to my attention by the deputy in charge of the Corporation Tax Bureau, who maintained that his files contained ample evidence to show that the law relating to full value assessments did not receive full obedience here in New York City.

In order to set these rumors and charges at rest and to determine finally whether they contained any truth, request was made, under your direction, for permission to transcribe the details of such reports as, it was contended, bore on the question of under-valuations of real property in New York City. The instances, numbering about two thousand, were carefully compiled and submitted to Mr. Lawson Purdy, President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, for further investigation. He, in turn, has sought to clear up the matter by referring these discrepancies directly to the corporations whose real estate, judging from their book values, appears to be under-assessed.

At the present writing, this examination has not been completed. But a survey of approximately six hundred properties, with respect to which a complete return has been made by the respective corporations, indicates that, except in a few isolated cases, the disparity between the "book values" and the assessed valuations may be explained by the fact that these book values represent original cost plus additional charges, such as organization expenses, etc., which have added practically nothing to the value of the property in question, and that in numerous instances no provision has been made for depreciation.

Conclusion.

Although the average rate of assessment for property throughout the state was fixed by the 1917 equalization table at 84.80 per cent., about one point lower than the average rate fixed by the 1914 table, there has, nevertheless, been effected a decided change in the relation which the city's assessments, as equalized, bear to the equalized assessments of the up-state counties, as will be noted from the following table

From the above table it will be seen that, on the whole, the counties comprising the City of New York have been given since 1914 an increased rating in equalization equal to 2.44 points, while the average rate of equalization for the up-state counties during the same period has been reduced from 74.55 per cent. to 69.51 per cent., a decrease of 5.04 points, all of which has had the ultimate effect of reducing New York City's share of a direct state tax from 69.27 per cent. in 1914 to 64.81 per cent. in 1917, a net decrease of 4.46 per cent. ADDENDUM I.

EQUALIZATION IN THEORY AND PRACTICE.

Imposition and Apportionment of a Direct State Tax.

The state undertakes to perform certain functions for the general good of its people. Other functions are cared for by the county and still others are performed by

the local government, such as the city or town. Each division requires certain revenues to support and maintain it. The state secures large revenues through indirect taxation, and the subdivisions of the state, such as the counties, the cities and towns, also secure revenues from indirect sources, but not to the same extent, perhaps, as does the state.

When it has been determined that the indirect taxes and other miscellaneous revenues of the state will be insufficient to meet the estimated expenditures for the fiscal period under review, as evidenced by the aggregate of the appropriations made by the Legislature for the support and maintenance of the state government, such deficiency in the estimated revenues is raised by the imposition of what is commonly known as a direct state tax.

Since the ownership of property, under the general property system of taxation now in use throughout the country, is considered the best indication of ability to contribute towards the expenses of government, the custom has generally grown up of apportioning the expenses of government on the basis of the valuations of property. The state, however, does not attempt to collect its tax from each separate property owner, but apportions it among the sixty-two counties. Theoretically, at least, the share to be paid by each county is proportioned to the value that the taxable property in such county bears to the total value of the general property taxable in the state.

The county government combines its allotment of the state tax with the sums to be raised for county expenses, and apportions the combined sums among the several tax districts within its limits, on the same basis on which the state apportions its tax, namely, by the proportion which the aggregate valuations of property in each district bears to the total aggregate valuations of all the property in such county.

Standards of Assessments.

But the true value of the taxable property within a given county is rarely disclosed by the aggregate of its assessed valuations as determined from the tax rolls. Although the law requires that all property be assessed at full or true value, it is common knowledge that few localities, outside the City of New York, make any pretense of obeying the law.

Disobedience of the law requiring full value assessments does not always work injustices as among the different taxpayers of the same tax district, that is, the same town or city, since, if each is assessed for the same ratio of the full value of his property, the principle of uniformity of assessment and equality in the distribution of the tax burden is not violated, as among such taxpayers. The tax rate is but a device to facilitate the distribution of the expenses of government, and if the assessments are uniform, this element, which is an important factor in the determination of the tax rate, will give a tax rate that, when applied to the uniform assessments, will produce an equitable distribution of the tax burden.

County Equalization.

Long before the middle of the last century the attention of the lawmakers was directed to the injustice which resulted from an apportionment of county expenses on the basis of assessed valuations made at varying ratios throughout the several tax districts of the county. In order to bear as small a proportion of the county expenses as possible, assessors deliberately assessed property in their districts for fractions of the true value, since the smaller the sum of the aggregate valuations returned by a tax district, the smaller was the share of county expenses apportioned to it. To check and correct this abuse, laws were enacted giving power to the county boards of supervisors to adjust assessed valuations as returned to the boards, so that the aggregate assessed valuations of each tax district would bear a just relation to the combined valuations of all the tax districts of the county, and the board was accordingly empowered to increase or diminish the aggregate assessed valuations of the several tax districts in order to obtain the desired result.

For the purpose of establishing an equitable basis for the apportionment of state and county expenses it is the duty of the county board of supervisors to equalize the assessments of the several towns and cities included within the limits of their county by ascertaining the average rate at which property in such county is assessed, and then increasing or decreasing the aggregate valuations of the several tax districts, depending upon whether the valuations of a particular town have been made at a greater or less rate than the average rate for the county, these increases or decreases in assessed valuations being made so as to produce a just and equitable relation in the valuations of one district to another.

But the power possessed by the county supervisors was often used to work injustice and even more often as a cloak for grave abuses in connection with the apportionment of the county expenses. In many counties the discrimination practiced in connection with the apportionment of the county charges led to so serious an abuse of power that the towns and cities adversely affected rebelled against the inequitable apportionment of the county expenses adopted by the ruling faction of the county board and appealed to the State Tax Department and even to the courts for relief. The equalization of local valuations for the purpose of establishing a just and proper basis for the apportionment of county expenses, has, in many counties, been hardly more than a farce, in which the will of the majority was supreme and political expediency a greater factor than justice.

In many of the counties discrimination in the apportionment of county expenses has been practiced without abatement for many years. The official records of the Tax Department contain numerous instances of appeal from the oppression and tyranny of a majority of the members of the county board of supervisors, who had combined for the express purpose of securing for the tax districts they represented advantages in the apportionment of county charges. Where one or more cities are contained within the limits of the county, with a minority representation on the county board, it is not unusual to find instances of gross discrimination. The supervisors representing the towns and having a majority power, often prepared and adopted an equalization table which totally ignored actual conditions and failed to establish just relations between the valuations of the several districts contained therein as required by law. A desire to gain advantages at another's expense impelled them to the adoption of an inequitable apportionment and compelled the cities to bear more than a fair share of the county expenses.

In 1911 it was sought to check and correct in so far as it was possible abuse of the power possessed by supervisors, by the enactment of a law compelling the county board of supervisors to use in the preparation of the equalization and apportionment table a uniform method of equalization based on an exact mathematical formula. But many boards either failed or refused to carry out the provisions of the new law and continued to apportion the county expenses in the same fashion that prevailed before the enactment of the law of 1911. When the powers of the State Tax Commission were somewhat enlarged by amendments to the tax law made by the Legislature of 1915 the power to enforce the use of proper methods in connection with the equalization of local assessments was extended. Later, the statutes relating to this phase of the administration of the tax law were further amended by the requirement that county boards of supervisors not only employ the method of equalization defined in the law, but also file with the Tax Commission the several bases and evidence used in the compilation of the equalization table.

Many counties now apportion their expenses on tables that are substantially equitable, and credit for this improvement is due entirely to the efforts of the State Tax Commission. Because of the complex nature of the problem continuous alertness on the part of those charged with the function of supervising these matters is absolutely essential.

State Equalization.

It was not until 1859 that equalization was extended to include the adjustment of aggregate county valuations in connection with the apportionment of the direct State tax. In that year the State Board of Equalization was created, which is composed of the three members of the State Tax Commission, the six elected officials of the state, other than the Governor, and the Speaker of the Assembly. It is required by law to meet in Albany on the first Tuesday in September in each year, "for the purpose of examining and revising the valuations of real and personal property of the several counties as returned to the State Tax Commission, and * * * fix the aggregate amount of assessment for each county, upon which the comptroller shall compute the state tax." This section of the tax law also empowers the State Board of Equalization to "increase or diminish the aggregate valuations of real property in any county by adding or deducting such sum as in its opinion may be just and necessary to produce a just relation between the valuations of real property in the state."

The State Board of Equalization accordingly meets annually and adopts an "equalization table" on the basis of which any direct state tax is apportioned among

the sixty-two counties of the state, and upon which the state comptroller is enabled to compute each county's share of such tax. This equalization table, a copy of which for the year 1917 is shown in Appendix I, is based upon "rates of equalization" fixed by the State Board of Equalization. These rates reflect the opinion of the members of the State Board as to the average rate of assessment for the respective counties. By means of these rates the "full value" of the real property in the several counties is determined by computation and the full value, so computed, practically determines the proportion of the direct state tax to be borne by each county. Although different in amount the "equalized values," on the basis of which the direct state tax is actually paid, bear to each other practically the same relation that the full values of each county bear to one another. It is clear, therefore, that the fixing or adoption of these rates of equalization is the most important function performed by the State Board of Equalization.

The Equalization Table.

True equalization requires that the tax burden shall be so apportioned that the share to be borne by each district shall bear a just relation to the full or true value of the taxable property located therein.

It is clear that if the rates of equalization employed in the preparation of the annual equalization table are based on reliable data and reflect actual assessment conditions, the inequalities resulting from the employment by the several counties of different bases in the assessment of real property may, in a large measure, be corrected and an equitable apportionment of the direct state tax attained. But an equalization table that is composed of rates many of which are based on no concrete facts, but compiled solely with a view to the political or other expediency of the several rates of equalization to be fixed, works an injustice, because it compels the honest county that is attempting to assess its real property at a fair valuation to suffer by paying more than its fair share of the state tax burden.

Reliable Data for Equalization Purposes.

Without an accurate knowledge of the rate at which real property is assessed during a given period it is difficult to determine the full or true value of such property. Real equalization must be based on reliable data concerning the actual rates at which real property is assessed in the several districts the valuations of which it is proposed to equalize. It is generally admitted that the determination of existing rates of assessment is not an exact science. It is likewise true that the results obtained from different sources, if accurately compiled, do not vary widely. But the point that is here made is that it is not always possible to state accurately the rate at which property covering a large area, such as a town or city, is assessed.

Sales prices are usually fair indices of the value of property, but, until recently, but few reliable valuations based on this source have been available, because of the prevailing practice among real estate men and others of hiding the true price under the cover of a nominal consideration. Expert appraisals have also been employed, but their use is costly, and unless they have been prepared under conditions that are free from bias, the results obtained are open to question. Thus, the difficulty of securing reliable information concerning average rates of assessment has contributed in a large measure toward permitting discrimination in the apportionment of the tax burden to go so long unchecked.

The Importance of Accurate Rates of Equalization.

As a fair example of the power possessed by the State Board of Equalization, and the simplicity with which this important power may be used to work grave injustice in connection with the apportionment of the direct state tax, the following illustration is given. Let us assume that the aggregate assessed valuations for a certain county, as fixed by the local assessing authorities, total \$60,000,000. If, in the opinion of the State Board of Equalization, the average rate at which real property in this county is assessed is 50 per cent, then the rate of equalization will be 50 per cent. Obviously, the aggregate full or true value of this county's real property will be fixed at \$120,000,000, and such county will, therefore, pay a proportion of the direct state tax that will be equal approximately to the ratio which such full value bears to the full value of all the taxable property in the state as determined in the same manner. In other words, excluding a consideration of its personal property, which is not equalized, this particular county would pay a proportion of the direct state tax based on a sum twice the amount of its reported assessed valuations. Let us suppose, however, that the rate of assessment for such county is fixed at 75 per cent, or, in other words, that in the opinion of the board, the reported assessed valuations represent 75 per cent of the full value of the taxable property of such county. Then the aggregate full value would be fixed at \$80,000,000, or only \$20,000,000 more than the reported assessed valuations, as against twice the sum of its reported assessed valuations in the instance where the rate was fixed at 50 per cent.

From the foregoing explanation it is obvious that the fixing by the State Board of Equalization of a rate of equalization higher than that merited by a county has the immediate effect of reducing the aggregate full value of the taxable real property and an ultimate and corresponding effect of reducing the amount of the equalized valuations on the basis of which its proportion of the direct state tax would be computed and determined.

Concrete Illustration of the Influence of an Inflated Rate of Equalization.

A concrete example may better illustrate the inequality which results from the fixing of a higher ratio than is merited. Although assessing real property at a comparatively low ratio to true value, Oneida County, like many other up-state counties, has always succeeded in securing a relatively high rating on the annual equalization tables. For many years prior to 1914 the rate for Oneida County was fixed at 81 per cent. In 1914 and 1915 the rate was reduced to 75 per cent. In 1916 it was fixed at 71 per cent, although the results of an investigation made by the Department of Finance in 1916 showed that real property was being assessed at approximately 50 per cent of its true value. Another investigation made this year, 1917, corroborates the results obtained in 1916 and indicates that real property is assessed at approximately 48 per cent. In fixing the county rate, however, for the equalization table for 1917 the State Board of Equalization gave Oneida County a ratio of 60 per cent, a reduced rate which is still too high.

Let us measure the effect of rate-fixing in connection with this actual case. The assessed valuations for Oneida County for 1916, as reported, aggregate \$85,331,000. This county was rated by the State Board of Equalization as assessing its real property at 60 per cent of its true value, and the full value of such property, for the purposes of equalization, was accordingly fixed at \$142,218,000. Had the State Board of Equalization fixed Oneida County's rate in accordance with the 48 per cent rate as determined by the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics the resulting full value of the property would have been \$177,773,000, or \$92,442,000 more than the valuations reported by the local assessing officials.

In other words, in order that the aggregate assessed valuations of the several counties may bear a just relation to one another for the purpose of equitably apportioning the direct state tax, the reported assessed valuations of Oneida County should have been increased \$92,442,000, instead of only \$56,887,000, a difference of \$35,555,000, in the process of determining the full value of the real property located in the several counties of the state; and the equalized value of real property on which Oneida County should have paid its proportion of the direct state tax should have been at least \$30,000,000 more than the amount fixed in the table on the basis of the 60 per cent rate actually fixed.

Conclusion.

What is true of Oneida County is likewise true of the majority of the up-state counties. The reported assessed valuations are based on comparatively low rates of assessment which the State Board of Equalization has been unwilling to recognize or act upon in spite of the data presented for its information and guidance. As has been explained in another place there has been attained considerable improvement in connection with the proportion of the direct state tax to be paid by the City of New York. But in the face of the mass of evidence that has been adduced pointing out the very low standard of assessment conditions obtaining in many of the up-state counties it is difficult to escape the conclusion that political expediency, coupled with a desire to shift the burdens of taxation from the up-state counties to the City of New York, mark the unwillingness of the State Board of Equalization to fix the ratios for up-state counties in accordance with the facts submitted to it, so that they will bear a just relation to the rates fixed for New York City counties as required by law and justice.

The Comptroller presented the following:

BUDGET FOR 1918.

ACT OF APPROPRIATION.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this, the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eighteen, the total amount appropriated being:

Two hundred and forty million, five hundred and nineteen thousand, eight hundred and fifty-eight dollars and eighteen cents (\$240,519,858.18).

First—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business, and to meet the debt charges of said City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eighteen:

Two hundred and twenty-one million, five hundred and fifty-five thousand, five hundred and sixty-seven dollars and seventy cents (\$221,555,567.70).

Second—The amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1917, in the product of taxes heretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, as amended by chapter 220, Laws of 1917, being section 248 of the Greater New York Charter:

Three million and one hundred thousand dollars (\$3,100,000.00).

Third—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Bronx, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the year one thousand nine hundred and eighteen:

Seven million, four hundred thousand, five hundred and thirty-four dollars and ten cents (\$7,400,534.10).

Fourth—The amount of state tax levied in pursuance of section 174, chapter 62 of the Consolidated Laws of 1909 and chapter 762 of the Laws of 1917:

Eight million, four hundred and sixty-three thousand, seven hundred and fifty-six dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$8,463,756.38).

TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

Resolved, That this, the Budget of The City of New York, as hereby made in pursuance of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions, to be changed only by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment unless otherwise specifically stipulated hereinafter:

- First—
- (a) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries Regular Employees," to any appropriation or schedule other than "Salaries Regular Employees."
- (b) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries Temporary Employees," to any appropriation or schedule other than "Salaries Temporary Employees."
- (c) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages Regular Employees," to any appropriation or schedule other than "Wages Regular Employees."
- (d) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages Temporary Employees," to any appropriation or schedule other than "Wages Temporary Employees."
- (e) That no transfers shall be made from or to appropriations classified as "Hire of Horses and Vehicle with Drivers," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers" or "Hire of Automobiles," except to or from an appropriation classified as "Hire of Horses and Vehicles with Drivers," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers" or "Hire of Automobiles," except where the work to be done and paid for from the account to which the transfer is made is a substitute for work or service intended to have been done and paid for from the account from which the transfer is made.
- (f) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Fees and Commissions" to any appropriation or schedule other than "Fees and Commissions."
- (g) That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein under any classification other than "Personal Service" to any appropriation classified as "Personal Service," except in cases where the title of appropriation specifically provides for transfers herein forbidden, or in cases where appropriations were made under the classification of "General Repairs," if, upon the written statement of the Department Head, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment finds that the repair work can be done more economically by departmental labor.
- (h) That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein under any classification where the appropriation is made under conditions which prohibit such transfer or when the appropriation is made for the purchase of some stated article or articles or for the payment of taxes, although otherwise the transfer might be proper under the budget resolutions in the budget for 1918.

Second—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County Governments in the schedules of "Salaries Regular Employees," "Salaries Temporary Employees," "Wages Regular Employees," "Wages Temporary Employees," "Fees and Commissions," herein contained, except when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that no requests for changes shall be considered except as follows:

- (a) In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Salaries Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any month to more than one-twelfth of the total amount herein appropriated for "Salaries Regular Employees."
- (b) In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Wages Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any week to more than the pro rata of the number of working days in such week to the total number of working days provided for such schedule line for the whole year.

(c) That vacancies existing on January 1, 1918, or occurring thereafter in schedules supporting appropriations in this budget for "Salaries Regular Employees," or for "Salaries Temporary Employees," excepting uniformed forces of the Departments of Police, Fire, and Street Cleaning, positions in the labor class and where emergency conditions exist in either of the following cases, i. e.:

- Custodial forces in penal and correctional institutions,
 - Nurses in Hospitals,
 - Institutional helpers, and
 - Positions involving the actual operation of machinery or mechanical plants,
- shall be filled only after certificate by the Committee on Salaries and Grades of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

- (1) That the position is required;
- (2) That the title and compensation for such vacant position conform to the standard titles, work specifications and compensation grades fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment where there has been such fixation; or
- (3) In the event of there having been no such fixation by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that the title and compensation for such vacant position are apparently proper.

Provided that in the cases where an appointment is made pursuant to the exceptions hereinbefore set forth, permitting an appointment where emergency conditions exist, in the custodial forces in penal and correctional institutions, nurses in hospitals, institutional helpers, and positions involving the actual operation of machinery or mechanical plants, it shall only be made where it shall be impracticable to obtain a certificate as herein provided with such expedition as not to interfere with the public interest.

(d) That appointments to vacant positions, for which standard titles and compensations have been fixed by this Board shall be made at the lowest rate within the standard grade for such position unless this requirement is specifically waived by resolution of the Board.

The procedure under this section is subject to revision by a majority vote of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

(e) That no modification of any schedule supporting an appropriation for "Salaries, Regular Employees," or "Salaries, Temporary Employees," in the Budget of The City of New York for the year 1918 which affects the compensation of any position included in the budget as passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, shall be made except when authorized by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in conformity with standard titles, work specifications and compensation grades which may be or have been approved by said Board.

The procedure under this section is subject to revision by a majority vote of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

(f) There shall be credited to the "Funds for Salary and Wage Accruals from Schedule-supported Appropriations to be Expended as Provided in the Budget Resolutions Herewith," established in this budget for The City of New York and for each of the five counties therein, as soon as practicable after the expiration of each salary or wage period the accruals during such period of "Salaries, Regular Employees," and "Wages, Regular Employees," but these credits shall be made only upon the submission of reports thereon by the Comptroller to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to section 237 of the Greater New York Charter.

Transfers from the credits so set up shall be made only to the divisions of government (the City and the respective counties) from which the credits were originally transferred, and only by the unanimous vote of all the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Subject to these conditions such transfers may be made for any tax-budget purpose.

(g) Salary and wage accruals during the year 1918 resulting from deductions made from the regular rates of salary and wages provided herein for employees of the City and Counties on war service, corresponding to the amounts received by said employes as compensation for such war service, shall be reported by the Comptroller monthly to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for transfer, as provided in Section 237 of the Charter, to the "Fund for the Compensation of Substitutes for City Employes on War Service, who, under the provisions of the State Military Law, continue in the City employment and are carried on the payrolls for the excess of their civil salaries over their military salaries," established in this budget for the City of New York and for each of the five counties therein.

Third—That in case of modifications of schedules or transfers within appropriations classified as "Personal Service," where one of the appropriations is a Tax Levy Part appropriation, the full amount of cash necessary to pay the total salaries or wages of the incumbents transferred for the balance of the year 1918 shall be transferred to the appropriation to which the incumbents are transferred.

Fourth—

(a) That the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance, in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules entitled "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Fees and Commissions," or in case these items have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the items of the schedules as changed, and that no payroll shall be passed by the Department of Finance unless the incumbents and the rate of individual compensation shall not exceed but may be less than such schedule lines as originally adopted or as hereafter modified by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, provided the lesser salary or wage grade has been approved, pursuant to section 56 of the Charter. Upon the issuance of the certificate authorizing the filling of vacant positions, as provided in the second section, subdivision (c) of this resolution, the Committee on Salaries and Grades of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall submit to the said Board a modification of the salary schedule to conform to the payroll condition as modified by the filling of such vacancies.

(b) That each payroll of any Department, in addition to any other departmental number, shall be numbered during the year serially, beginning with number one for each specific account, and such payroll shall bear a certificate signed by a person cognizant of the fact, stating that the recapitulation attached thereto is the correct recapitulation for the payroll bearing said number.

(c) That on all payrolls against schedules entitled, "Salaries Regular Employees," and "Wages Regular Employees," there shall be set forth the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules, or in case the items on such schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules as changed.

(d) That there shall be affixed to all payrolls a certificate made by the person preparing such payroll to the effect that there is a time record on file in said Board, Office, Bureau or Department, certified by the person or persons having knowledge of the facts, showing the character of service and the exact time of employment of such person or persons, except heads of departments, and excepting bureau and division heads relieved by the head of their department from the duty of keeping such record on said payrolls, and that the distribution or division of the time of such person or persons as shown on such payrolls is in accordance with such time record.

(e) Before advertising for proposals for work to be performed under contract and chargeable to the 1918 budget, where the cost thereof is estimated to be one thousand dollars (\$1,000) or more, the proposed contract and specifications shall be submitted for approval to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Fifth—
—Be it further

Resolved, That all appropriations under a classification other than "Personal Service," to any Board, Office, Bureau or Department of the City or County Governments, made in this Budget, be made under the following conditions:

(a) That, in so far as practicable, all contracts and open market orders for purchases to be charged against such appropriation shall be based upon specifications which are definite and certain as to character and quality, and which conform with

standard specifications for the various classes of supplies, materials, fuel and forage already approved or hereafter to be approved by this Board.

(b) That, in so far as such standard specifications may be established by this Board, the Comptroller at the time of certifying to the sufficiency of appropriations out of which such contracts are to be paid shall also certify that the specifications for such supplies or materials, fuel or forage or other articles for which standard specifications have been prescribed, are in conformance with such standard specifications.

(c) That all open market orders issued by any Department for supplies and materials, for which standard specifications shall have been prescribed, shall contain a description of the goods ordered, conforming with such standard specifications.

(d) That the Comptroller shall, in auditing claims for goods delivered on open market orders, determine, through inspection or otherwise, whether the goods delivered conform to such standard specifications.

Sixth—
—Be it further

Resolved, That all departments of City and County Governments for which appropriations for food supplies have been made in the Budget for 1918, shall make an inventory on January 1, 1918, to determine the number of units of each article of food in stock, either in stores or in the institution, and the cost value thereof, and shall thereafter keep an accurate record showing the cost price per unit, the number of units purchased, and the total cost of all articles of food purchased in each month; that such departments shall keep an accurate record of the quantities of food supplies consumed by patients or inmates, such record to be entirely separate and distinct from the consumption of food supplies by employees or persons other than patients and inmates; and such departments shall keep an accurate record of the number of units of food supplies and the cost thereof consumed by the employees, such record to be entirely distinct from the record of food consumption by patients and inmates, and such departments are directed to submit to the Comptroller at the first of each quarter, a statement on budget accounting forms to be submitted by the Comptroller showing the stock on hand at the beginning of the preceding quarter, the number of units and price per unit and cost amount of the supplies delivered to the department within the preceding quarter, the number of units and cost amount of food supplies consumed by patients or inmates within the preceding quarter, the number of units and cost amount of food supplies consumed by employees within the preceding quarter, the aggregate number of patient or inmate days within the preceding quarter, the aggregate number of employee days within the preceding quarter, the daily per capita consumption of food supplies in pounds and the cost amount thereof by patients or inmates in the preceding quarter, the daily, per capita, consumption of food supplies in pounds and the cost thereof by employees in the preceding quarter, and the total number of units consumed and the cost thereof within the preceding quarter, the stock on hand at the end of the quarter and such other information as may be required upon the budget accounting forms, provided, however, that this resolution shall not apply to administrative departments to which food supply appropriations have been made to be used in payment for meals of employees properly entitled to such meals by reason of overtime work.

FIXATION OF SALARIES PURSUANT TO SECTION 56 OF THE CITY CHARTER.

—Be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with section 56 of Greater New York Charter:

First—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules under the classification, "Personal Service," and entitled "Salaries Regular Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eighteen be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments for the number of incumbents shown in said schedules, except that in all cases where a position or grade of position has previously been established for an unlimited number of incumbents, or for a number of incumbents greater than the number shown in said schedule, nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to reduce the number of incumbents previously authorized.

Second—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules under the classification "Personal Service," and entitled "Wages Regular Employees," "Salaries Temporary Employees," "Wages Temporary Employees" and "Fees and Commissions," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eighteen be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments.

Third—Nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to nullify or abolish any position or grade of position in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments which has been previously established, but which does not appear in the schedules entitled "Salaries Regular Employees," "Salaries Temporary Employees," "Wages Regular Employees," "Wages Temporary Employees," and "Fees and Commissions," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eighteen.

—Be it further

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board is hereby directed to send certified copies of the preceding resolutions to each Department, Board, Office and Bureau of the City and County Governments.

PAYMENTS TO CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Fixed Charges and Contributions—
Care of Dependents in Private Institutions—
Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

Preamble.
All appropriations made in this budget to charitable institutions are hereby declared to be subject to the following regulations:
1. The accounts and records of all such institutions shall be kept so

as to show their receipts and expenditures pertaining to all institutional activities, and a record shall be maintained in which their expenses shall be recorded under the following classifications:

- A. Expenses incurred in the operation of institution, as follows:
 - a. Food stuffs.
 - b. Clothing.
 - c. Linen and bedding
 - d. Fuel.
 - e. Magazines and newspapers.
 - f. Education (Instruction and Educational Supplies).
 - g. Other supplies.
 - h. Salaries and wages.
 - i. Professional services.
 - j. Light.
 - k. Forage and care of animals.
 - l. Telephone.
 - m. Printing, stationery and advertising.
 - n. Postage and telegrams.
 - o. Hospital and sanitarium charges.
 - p. Funerals.
 - q. Recreation expense.
 - r. Miscellaneous expenses.
 - s. Expense for boarden-out children.
- B. Expenses incurred in the maintenance of plant and equipment, as follows:
 - a. Repairs and renewals of plant and fixed equipment.
 - b. Repairs and renewals of furniture and movable equipment.
 - c. Interest on bonds and mortgages on corporate real estate used exclusively for the charitable purposes of the institution, taxes and water rates, if any, thereon, fire insurance premiums on buildings on such real estate, together with their contents.

In all other respects such accounts and records shall be in the form required by the Comptroller of The City of New York, and as far as practicable such accounts shall be kept on an income and expense basis.
2. All payments made to charitable institutions in pursuance of the said appropriations shall be used by such institutions only for expenses incurred by the institution for the care, support, maintenance and education of inmates duly committed by the courts or the Commissioner of Charities or accepted by said Commissioner as public charges, but they shall not include any expense for improvements or additions to plant or equipment, except as stated, or any payments on account of principal of mortgages. Expenses for education shall be taken to mean expenses incurred in providing suitable education for properly committed or accepted inmates, and shall include the salaries of instructors and expenses incurred for supplies for use in instruction.

3. All institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York and their books of record and account, so far as they relate to institutional activities, shall be open at reasonable times to the visitation, inspection and examination of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Department of Finance and the Department of Public Charities, by their duly authorized Commissioners, officers or inspectors, excepting, however, that the accounts pertaining to the activities of any religious order which may be in charge of any such institution shall be segregated from the other accounts and shall not be subject to this regulation.

4. All such institutions shall prepare and file with the Department of Finance as of a date to be fixed by said department, a report of the condition of the institution and its operations during the previous calendar year upon forms prescribed and furnished for the purpose under the provisions of these regulations by the Department of Finance.
5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments out of any appropriation made to any charitable institution, he may, in his discretion, withhold the same, immediately giving written notice thereof to such institution and of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease further payments. Upon the determination of said board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment from any such appropriation shall thereupon end.

6. The names and ages of inmates with a statement of the period for which payment is claimed must be placed on all bills rendered by such institutions for their care, support and maintenance prior to the presentation of such account for payment to the Department of Finance. The certificate of the Commissioner of Public Charities under regulation two hereof must also be attached to such bills. Except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Public Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in the public hospitals.

7. The City shall not be liable for any claim by any charitable institution which shall be in excess of the amount apportioned to such institution in this budget, notwithstanding the acceptance of the Commissioner of Public Charities or any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for various classes of inmates thereof.

8. No money shall be paid to any institution which
pays any salary to,
gives any consideration for services (financial or otherwise) by,
has any business dealing with, or
secures goods or merchandise (directly or indirectly) from
any officer or trustee or member of its board of managers or where any such person otherwise receives any pecuniary profit from the operation of such institution.

9. Child-caring institutions not sending their inmates to the public schools, and not sharing in the corporate school fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institution for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day for five (5) school days in the week, for each child of five years of age and over receiving such instruction except that for abnormal or atypical children, a special rate in excess of this amount may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving a per capita allowance for the education of their inmates shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, provided in Section 1154 of the Charter of The City of New York.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money shall be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children and being under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and which has been placed in this budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

11. The Department of Health shall maintain in all child-caring institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York for each inmate accepted as a public charge under the rules of the State Board of Charities, and as herein provided, a complete physical and health record in which shall be recorded the name, age, sex, height and weight, time of admission, general physical condition, including the presence or absence of defects in eyesight, breathing, teeth, or any organic defect, in a manner to conform as nearly as practicable with the records maintained by the Department of Health for children in the public schools in the City of New York. It shall also record the dietary actually employed in such institutions for the feeding of its inmates. Such statistics and records shall be made and revised by the Board of Health once in each six months.

12. Each institution is to notify the Commissioner of Public Charities in writing on the forms prescribed by him of the reception or discharge of any person for whose care city or county funds are to be paid. This notice must be given within twenty-four hours thereafter, and no claim shall be paid for such service unless this rule is strictly complied with.

13. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specifically provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows: Provided that where the Comptroller finds, after proper investigation, that any per capita rate hereinafter stated is too high, he is hereby authorized, on the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to reduce such per capita rate for any or all institutions.

PAYMENTS TO CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Fixed Charges and Contributions—
 Care of Dependents in Private Institutions—
 Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.
 Preamble.
 All appropriations made in this budget to charitable institutions are hereby declared to be subject to the following regulations:
 1. The accounts and records of all such institutions shall be kept so as to show their receipts and expenditures pertaining to all institutional activities, and a record shall be maintained in which their expenses shall be recorded under the following classifications:

*Note—For such amounts as will accrue in Code No. 2342. Regular boardman schedule lines.

- A. Expenses incurred in the operation of institution, as follows:
- a. Food stuffs.
 - b. Clothing.
 - c. Linen and bedding.
 - d. Fuel.
 - e. Magazines and newspapers.
 - f. Education (Instruction and Educational Supplies).
 - g. Other supplies.
 - h. Salaries and wages.
 - i. Professional services.
 - j. Light.
 - k. Forage and care of animals.
 - l. Telephone.
 - m. Printing, stationery and advertising.
 - n. Postage and telegrams.
 - o. Hospital and sanitarium charges.
 - p. Funerals.
 - q. Recreation expense.
 - r. Miscellaneous expenses.
 - s. Expense for boarded-out children.

- B. Expenses incurred in the maintenance of plant and equipment, as follows:
- a. Repairs and renewals of plant and fixed equipment.
 - b. Repairs and renewals of furniture and movable equipment.
 - c. Interest on bonds and mortgages on corporate real estate used exclusively for the charitable purposes of the institution, taxes and water rates, if any, thereon, fire insurance premiums on buildings on such real estate, together with their contents.

In all other respects such accounts and records shall be in the form required by the Comptroller of The City of New York, and as far as practicable such accounts shall be kept on an income and expense basis.

2. All payments made to charitable institutions in pursuance of the said appropriations shall be used by such institutions only for expenses incurred by the institution for the care, support, maintenance and education of inmates duly committed by the courts or the Commissioner of Charities or accepted by said Commissioner as public charges, but they shall not include any expense for improvements or additions to plant or equipment, except as stated, or any payments on account of principal of mortgages. Expenses for education shall be taken to mean expenses incurred in providing suitable education for properly committed or accepted inmates, and shall include the salaries of instructors and expenses incurred for supplies for use in instruction.

3. All institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York and their books of record and account, so far as they relate to institutional activities, shall be open at reasonable times to the visitation, inspection and examination of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Department of Finance and the Department of Public Charities, by their duly authorized Commissioners, officers or inspectors, excepting, however, that the accounts pertaining to the activities of any religious order which may be in charge of any such institution shall be segregated from the other accounts and shall not be subject to this regulation.

4. All such institutions shall prepare and file with the Department of Finance as of a date to be fixed by said department, a report of the condition of the institution and its operations during the previous calendar year upon forms prescribed and furnished for the purpose under the provisions of these regulations by the Department of Finance.

5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments out of any appropriation made to any charitable institution, he may, in his discretion, withhold the same, immediately giving written notice thereof to such institution and of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease further payments. Upon the determination of said board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment from any such appropriation shall thereupon end.

6. The names and ages of inmates with a statement of the period for which payment is claimed must be placed on all bills rendered by such institutions for their care, support and maintenance prior to the presentation of such account for payment to the Department of Finance. The certificate of the Commissioner of Public Charities under regulation two hereof must also be attached to such bills. Except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Public Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in the public hospitals.

7. The City shall not be liable for any claim by any charitable institution which shall be in excess of the amount apportioned to such institution in this budget, notwithstanding the acceptance of the Commissioner of Public Charities or any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for various classes of inmates thereof.

8. No money shall be paid to any institution which pays any salary to, gives any consideration for services (financial or otherwise) by, has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise (directly or indirectly) from any officer or trustee or member of its board of managers or where any such person otherwise receives any pecuniary profit from the operation of such institution.

9. Child-caring institutions not sending their inmates to the public schools, and not sharing in the corporate school fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institution for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day for five (5) school days in the week, for each child of five years of age and over receiving such instruction except that for abnormals or atypical children, a special rate in excess of this amount may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving a per capita allowance for the education of their inmates shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, provided in Section 1154 of the Charter of The City of New York.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money shall be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children and being under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and which has been placed in this budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

11. The Department of Health shall maintain in all child-caring institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York for each inmate accepted as a public charge under the rules of the State Board of Charities, and as herein provided, a complete physical and health record in which shall be recorded the name, age, sex, height and weight, time of admission, general physical condition, including the presence or absence of defects in eyesight, breathing, teeth, or any organic defect, in a manner to conform as nearly as practicable with the records maintained by the Department of Health for children in the public schools in the City of New York. It shall also record the dietary actually employed in such institutions for the feeding of its inmates. Such statistics and records shall be made and revised by the Board of Health once in each six months.

12. Each institution is to notify the Commissioner of Public Charities in writing on the forms prescribed by him of the reception or discharge of any person for whose care city or county funds are to be paid. This notice must be given within twenty-four hours thereafter, and no claim shall be paid for such service unless this rule is strictly complied with.

13. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specifically provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows: Provided that where the Comptroller finds, after proper investigation, that any per capita rate hereinafter-stated is too high,

he is hereby authorized, on the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to reduce such per capita rate for any or all institutions.

Regulations Governing Preparation and Keeping of Efficiency Records.

Sec. 1. For purpose of classification and orderly consideration for advancement as warranted by their efficiency and ability, all employees in the competitive service are divided, upon a basis of monthly compensation, into the following grades and sub-grades:

Sec. 2. A definite number of positions in each sub-grade will be provided for, from time to time, in the budget, and vacancies will be filled as provided in Section 3.

Sec. 3. All appointments in any grade will be made at the salary fixed for the minimum sub-grade, vacancies in the intermediate and maximum sub-grades to be filled, as hereinafter provided, by promotion, reinstatement or demotion. All intra-grade promotions will be by progressive sub-grades. In inter-grade promotions the increase will be to the minimum sub-grade, except that an employee being advanced from the maximum sub-grade may be promoted to the intermediate sub-grade where this does not involve his passing over employees already in the minimum sub-grade of the next higher grade and qualified under these rules for advancement. Reinstatements will be made, where practicable, at the sub-grade reached by the employee when he left the service, where this does not operate to affect an intra-grade or inter-grade promotion.

Sec. 4. All intra-grade promotions will be upon the basis of the efficiency points accumulated under the following provisions, subject to the condition that an employee will not be eligible for promotion within the grade until he has completed at least six months' continuous service in the sub-grade and has added at least five points to the base mark at which he started in such sub-grade.

Sec. 5. For efficiency record purposes, when an employee enters a sub-grade, either by appointment, promotion, reinstatement, demotion or transfer, he will be given an efficiency base mark, effective as of the beginning of the calendar quarter first succeeding such entrance, such mark being 60 for the minimum sub-grade, 65 for the intermediate sub-grade and 70 for the maximum sub-grade.

Sec. 6. At the close of each calendar quarter, each employee in a sub-grade at the beginning of such quarter will be given a rating by his bureau, division or department head in "efficiency" and "ability," "efficiency" being the measure by which is judged the quality of the work done by each employee during the period covered, punctuality, willingness to perform extra work, including overtime and readiness to grasp instructions and to carry them out without constant oversight, being appropriate factors for consideration in this respect, and "ability" being the measure by which is judged, from his efforts during a certain period, an employee's capacity to do additional or more responsible work, including the power of initiative and administrative or executive ability.

Sec. 7. Each employee who has served the required period in the sub-grade will be given one of the following ratings at the end of each quarter:

- Exceptional
- Far above average
- Very good
- Above average
- Average
- Below average
- Poor
- Far below average
- Very poor

Sec. 8. For each ten employees of the same title in a sub-grade, the department, bureau or division head may mark not more than one employee "exceptional," not more than one employee "far above average," not more than one employee "very good" and not more than one employee "above average," provided the circumstances so warrant, but in every such case a detailed statement must be made on the back of the efficiency card as to the reasons for such special marking. Where there are less than ten employees of the same title in a sub-grade, the "exceptional" mark will not be used and where there are less than five employees of the same title in a sub-grade neither the "exceptional" nor the "far above average" marks will be used. Where the allowance of special marks is exceeded, it will be adjusted to conform to these rules, preference being given to those who have been longest in the sub-grade. In all cases where a below average rating is given, a detailed statement will be given on the reverse side of the efficiency card as to the reasons therefor. Special inquiry will be instituted in every case where an employee's accumulated efficiency mark drops below 50.

Sec. 9. Where an employee is transferred from one bureau, division or department to another, the mark for the quarter in which such transfer occurs will be given by the head of the bureau, division or department to which the transfer is made.

Sec. 10. To or from the base mark provided for in Section 5, there will be added or deducted, as below indicated, the following points upon the basis of the ratings given as provided in Section 6:

Sec. 11. That the appropriate advantage may be afforded to those who are regular in attendance, for each day's absence during a quarter deductions will be made from an employee's accumulated efficiency mark as follows:

Absence on leave with pay.....	.044 of 1 point
Absence without leave.....	.50 of 1 point
Absence under suspension.....	1 point
Absence on leave without pay....	.022 of 1 point

Sec. 12. No deductions will be made for absences on Sundays or holidays, where an employee works the preceding and succeeding days.

Sec. 13. Efficiency marks will become non-cumulative upon reaching 100.

Sec. 14. Except where otherwise allowed by the civil service rules, all promotions from the sixth to seventh grades, from the eighth to the ninth grades, and from the tenth to the eleventh grades will be based upon eligible lists established as the result of written examinations held from time to time by the State Civil Service Commission while at other points such increases will be based on eligible lists made up from time to time on the basis of the accumulated efficiency marks of those who have completed six months' service in the lower grade.

Sec. 15. For purposes of co-ordination with the system prescribed herein, the present ratings of all employees will be averaged for the quarters ended September 30, 1914, December 31, 1914, March 31, 1915, June 30, 1915, and September 30, 1915, plus an "average" mark for each quarter so served, and from such average 5, 10 or 15 points will be deducted, according to whether such employee is at present employed in the maximum, intermediate or minimum sub-grade.

Sec. 16. All ratings are considered as strictly confidential and must be transmitted by the department head under sealed cover to the Secretary.

Sec. 17. Since promotions will be made in accordance with these rules, employees are advised against attempting to use outside influence in their behalf.

Sec. 18. Increase of salary of employees holding exempt positions are considered individually.

Sec. 19. In passing from the sixth grade to the seventh grade, from the eighth grade to the ninth grade, and from the tenth grade to the eleventh grade, employees holding field titles are given an opportunity to qualify for promotion to drafting and designing positions, and, contrariwise, employees in the designing branch are given an opportunity to cross over into field work, thus affording two lines of promotion at these points for those properly qualified.

Sec. 20. In view of the liberal opportunity for regular and substantial promotion afforded to such of its employees as are worthy thereof, the Commission will not favor the appointment of such employees to higher salaried positions as the result of open competitive examinations taken by them prior or subsequent to their entering the service of the Commission.

Sec. 21. The foregoing regulations apply to all employees in the competitive class except that Inspectors of Masonry will continue to be appointed at \$0.5625 per hour, and be eligible for increase to \$0.625 per hour, after having completed three years' continuous and satisfactory service, to \$0.656 per hour, after having completed six years' continuous and satisfactory service and to \$0.688 per hour, after having completed nine years' continuous and satisfactory service.

Sec. 22. The foregoing memorandum is furnished as an indication of the general policy of the Commission in the handling of appointments and promotions and is subject to change as circumstance may warrant and as may be necessary to conform to the rules and regulations of the State Civil Service Commission from time to time amended.

Sec. 23. The foregoing regulations will become effective with the quarter ending December 31, 1915.

Amendment to Efficiency and Promotion Rules Approved September 27, 1916.

In the cases of men employed under compressed air the rules as to intra-grade promotions are suspended. On this work original appointments will continue to be made at \$75.08 per month. At the end of the first six months such appointees will be eligible for increase to \$80.00 per month, provided their services are satisfactory and to \$5 per month increase thereafter for each month that their services continue satisfactory until they reach a maximum of \$100 per month, all such increases to be made upon the personal recommendation of the engineer of subway construction and the division engineer in charge of compressed air. Such special arrangement also applies to junior engineers receiving \$1,201 per annum to a maximum of \$1,800 per annum.

However, such deviation from the rules will not apply in the case of the office work as distinguished from the field force; such increases will not be given to any man who has been physically disqualified for work under compressed air; such increases will not be given any employee who has been absent more than half the month following which they are made, and they will only apply to men who have worked under compressed air during a substantial portion of the previous month.

Amendment to Efficiency and Promotion Rules Approved September 27, 1917.

On compressed air work appointments will be made at \$75.08 per month with an increase at \$90 per month upon the completion of three months' satisfactory and continuous service, after which the \$5 per month increase already provided for will apply.

WHEREAS, THE DIVISION OF FACTORY INSPECTION has submitted the following appeals from orders issued by said Division of Factory Inspection by the parties named below against the premises cited, the granting of which would necessitate a variation of law:

Whereas, the said Division of Factory Inspection has had a reinspection made in each case, and, according to the report submitted, recommends as follows:

Premises affected, (1) Amsterdam, 26 Elk st.; appellant, Meyer Raphael. 7—Bars or other vertical enclosure 3 1/2 feet high, 12 inches from hoist line, on all sides, all floors of elevator shaftway. 8—Safety devices on elevator car.

Two-story building with one man employed at sorting metals and rags; elevator has trap door which lifts up by hand, not automatic, used for hauling rags to 2nd floor and then replacing them on 1st floor when they are to be sold. Has a good cable and large rope in addition and is not loaded with more than 500 lbs.

Recommendation: Enclose east side of elevator shaft, both floors, to a height of 6 feet, same to be constructed with not more than 1 1/2 inch openings in same, with self-closing gates at each floor, same to be set back 1 foot from hoist line and to be 3 1/2 feet high. Waive order for safety devices.

Premises affected, (2) Buffalo, 202 Main st.; appellant, L. S. Hawley. Prohibit occupancy; properly enclose stairs with fire-resisting partitions; cease manufacturing above 2d floor.

Six-story nonfireproof building erected previous to Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; no sprinklers; no fire alarm; combustibles carried; 50 in building; 13 factory employees; above the 1st floor, 27; above the 2d floor, 24; exits, one unenclosed interior stairway and one exterior screened stairway, openings on course of which are fireproof; no egress from roof.

Recommendation: Waive of orders inasmuch as there are but 13 factory employees above the 2d floor.

Occupancy—1st floor: Building F, 8 males; Building E, 2 males, 1 female; Building D, 2 males; Building B, none regularly; Building A, 9 males; Building C, 10 males, 5 females. 2d floor: Building A, 3 males; Building B, 0; Building C, 12 males, 52 females; Building D, 2 males; Building E, 1 male; Building F, 1 male; Building G, 24 females; Building H, 1 male, 7 females. 3d floor: Building A, 10 males; Building B, 0; Building C, 10 males, 109 females; Building D, 0; Building E, 5 males; Building F, 4 males, 3 females; Building G, 12 females, 6 males; Building H, 10 males. Total, Building A, 5 males; Building C, 22 males, 161 females; Building D, 2 males; Building E, 6 males; Building F, 5 males, 3 females; Building G, 36 females, 6 males; Building H, 11 males, 7 females. Exits (2d floor)—Buildings A and B: Occupied by Glen Wagon & Car Corp.; in Building A a stairway from 1st to 3d floors, and stairway adjoining fire wall at northeast corner, from 3d to 2d floors; wooden bridge to Building D, open and structurally safe; at 2d floor level Building B is a doorway to roof of one-story extension. Building F: Occupied by Glen Wagon & Car Corp.; stairway from 1st to 3d floors located at west-end of building, also stairway at east end from 1st to 3d floors, which has no opening leading to 2d floor; doorway to Building E.

Buildings H and G: Cortlandt Wall Paper Co. and Tionghinoga Silk Co. Along northerly wall Building H stairway from 1st to 3d floors; also stairway to Building G, door to which is sometimes locked; in Building G there are also two stairways from 1st to 3d floors in portion occupied by Silk Company. Building C: Occupied by the Miller Corset Co.; has two stairways from 1st to 3d floors. Exits (3d floor)—Building E: Occupied by Miller Corset Co. No legal exits from this building;

there is a doorway leading to 3d floor of Building H; also to 3d floor of Building F, which floors are occupied by different tenants; were locked; wooden bridge to 3d floor of Building C, occupied by same firm, and opening in fire wall leading to Building D, in which latter building there are no stairways whatever. Buildings D and A: Occupied by the Glen Wagon & Car Corp. Opening in fire wall from Building D and E, but stairway in Building E does not extend to 3d floor, bridge from Buildings D to A, which bridge is unsafe in that the timbers are rotted and sill sunk about 6 inches on west side; 3d floor Building D used for storage only. Along northeast corner of fire wall in Building A is a stairway from 3d to 2d floors.

Buildings equipped with automatic sprinkler. A fire alarm system installed which is unapproved. Recommendation: Accept the two stairways in Building C; Building H 1st floor doorway at northwest corner to be kept unlocked when anyone in building; Building G door in fire wall to be made self-closing 1st floor; 2d floor Buildings A and B, stairways to be provided from roof of one-story extension to ground, same to lead out from building; 2d floor Building D provide doorway at 2d floor, leading to stairway, same to be permitted to swing in as it would block stairway if swung outwardly. 2d floor Buildings G and H, exit stairway at west end of building G to be accepted on condition that the door between the portion occupied by the Cortlandt Wall Paper Co. and the Tionghinoga Silk Co. be kept open at all times when any one is at work in building above the 1st floor. 3d floor Building E provide stairway along the westerly side of Building E from 3d to 2d floors, or fireproof bottom and sides of bridge to Building C to a height of 5 feet. 3d floor, Buildings D and A, if present bridge be torn down and a substantial wooden bridge erected same will be accepted while 3d floor of Building D is used for storage only; if used for factory purposes then same will have to be fireproofed. 3d floor Building G, east end occupied by the Tionghinoga Silk Co., the west end by the Cortlandt Wall Paper Co. The door in fire wall between portion occupied by these two firms was locked, giving but one means of exit, door must be kept unfastened or additional exit provided for each tenant. 3d floor Building G has wooden bridge unused and door locked, not to be treated as exit.

Recommendation: Accept openings in fire walls with but one door if same be made self-closing. Premises affected, (4) Little Falls; appellant, Little Falls Foundry & Machine Works. Provide running hot water in factory for use of employees. Less than five people employed. Owner requests permission to install stove with hot water tank for use of employees.

Recommendation: Accept stove with hot water tank on condition that not more than five be employed. Premises affected, (5) New York City, 425 E. 45th st.; appellant, Wilson & Co. 1—Provide water closet. 2—Provide wash sink. Master Mechanic's Department. A few machines installed for repairing pipe cutting purposes, etc., not used continually; men generally work in other parts of plant; other water closet facilities available, but wash sink and running water should be provided. Nine employed.

Recommendation: Waive order No. 1 while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged. Order No. 2 to be complied with. Premises affected, (6) New York City, 409-413 E. 45th st.; appellant, Wilson & Co. (Slaughter House, Refrigerating Plant). 1—Provide three water closets. 2—Provide three wash sinks. Slaughter house, refrigerating plant and storage of hides. Men work in room where no heat is provided. The Federal Government prohibits heating this plant; ample water closet facilities across the street.

Wager. 1—Organize and maintain monthly fire drills. 2—Fire alarm system. Three-story nonfireproof building with open lofts; no sprinkler; combustibles carried; no fire alarm system; occupancy of building, 49; factory occupancy, 37; total, 49; above the 1st floor, 37; above the 2d floor, 25. Exits: Two unenclosed interior stairways; horizontal exits on all floors.

Recommendation: Fire alarm system to be installed, but in view of low occupancy and capacity of exits, accept Class B system. AND it appearing that there are practical difficulties and unnecessary hardships in complying with the strict provisions of law and the rules and regulations of the Industrial Code on the premises noted above, and that in granting the variations recommended in each case, the spirit of the law and of the rules and regulations will be complied with and public safety secured.

And it further appearing that each of the appellants herein has been notified that he would be given an opportunity to be heard at this time and place if he desired to appear, and such of the appellants who appeared having been heard by the Commission, therefore



TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the pur-

chase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, or the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate. The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures.
