

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to the Department by citizens clausing reductions or rehates on bills or water supplied meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closest, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premise. The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Supplied the water wasted wasted to all turther applications for reduction of water rents, in all turther applications for reduction of water ends of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by treants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.
