PROCLAMATION.

\$1,000 REWARD.

MAYOR'S OFFICE,
NEW YORK, September 6, 1875.

Whereas, JAMES H. NOE was brutally assaulted at his place of business, at No 275 Greenwich street, in this city, on the 22d day of August, 1875, by one or more persons attempting a burglarious entry of his premises, and died from the effect of the wounds then received, on the 26th day of August, 1875; now,

I, WILLIAM H. WICKHAM, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby offer a reward of one thousand dollars for the discovery and conviction of the party or parties who may have committed the deed, the said reward to be paid on the conviction of the said party or parties, and the certificate of the District Attorney that such conviction was had upon the testimony of the person or persons claiming the reward. But all claims not presented to the Mayor within twenty days after such conviction shall be disregarded.

The Board of Health met this day.

Orders.

493 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

Suits for Penalties.

The Attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 133 cases, and for violations of the Sanitary Code in 2 cases.

Reports referred to other Departments for the necessary action.

To the Department of Buildings: On condition of 101 Vandam street, 63 Attorney street, and 86 East Broadway.

To the Department of Public Works: On street pavement in Rivington street, between Forsyth and Eldridge streets; on street pavement in Second avenue, in front of Nos. 633 and 635; on street pavement in front of Nos. 96 and 98 Essex street; on street pavement at west side of Third avenue, between One Hundred and Ninth and One Hundred and Tenth streets; on street pavement in front of No. 116 Ludlow street; on unpaved street at Fifty-sixth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues; on street crossing at northeast corner of Tenth avenue and Sixty-fourth street.

Resolutions.

That the inspection of fruit be discontinued, and that the services of John McCauly, John H. Fowler, Francis Reilly, and Elisha Alvord, Fruit Inspectors, be and are hereby dispensed with from and after September 15, 1875.

That upon the report of the Sanitary Superintendent, to the effect that the process, apparatus, and implements of the New York Cleaning and Disinfecting Company, for the removal of night soil from privies, sinks, etc., are satisfactory for the purpose, and in accordance with the rules and regulations for scavengers, and the provisions of the Sanitary Code, the Board respectfully recommends to his Honor the Mayor that a license as scavenger be granted to said New York Cleaning and Disinfecting Company, for one year from September 1, 1875.

That the application to occupy the basement at 517 West Twenty-eighth street be referred to the Sanitary Committee.

That the contract with John D. & Thomas E. Crimmins, for filling in that portion of One Hundred and Sixth street, between Fourth and Madison avenues, be hereby approved, and that a copy be forwarded to the Comptroller.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be authorized and directed to grant a permit to M. C. Turner, to drive cows between the hours of 6 and 9 A. M., instead of 5 and 7 A. M., and to grant similar permits in like cases.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to discontinue the disinfection of privies, yards and cellars after this week, and discharge all foremen and laborers temporarily employed in such disinfection, except one foreman and two laborers, to be retained an additional week for the purpose of repairing the disinfecting apparatus and storing it for the winter.

That the complaint against Swift & White, contractors, with affidavits appended, be made the special order for Tuesday, September 21, at one o'clock, P. M., and that Swift & White be notified to be present.

That the application of Mills & Ambrose, for certificate that lots on north side of One Hundred and Seventh street, extending from Lexington avenue to Fourth avenue, and lots 125 feet on Third avenue and 275 feet on south side of One Hundred and Seventh street, have been filled two feet above the level of high water mark, be referred to the Sanitary Superintendent, with power.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau during the week ending September 11, 1875: The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 2,197, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 867 tenement houses, 196 private dwellings, 80 other dwellings, 10 manufacturing establishments and workshops, 16 stores and warehouses, 89 stables, 32 slaughter-houses, 5 fat-rendering establishments, 2 stumps, 2 rag houses, 48 sunken and vacant lots, 1 public sewer and drain, 1 manure dump, 76 yards, courts, and areas, 77 cellars and basements, 48 waste-pipes and drains, 149 privies and water-closets, 66 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 14 dangerous stairways, 7 cisterns and cesspools, 3 dangerous chimneys, 15 other nuisances, 1 violation of the Sanitary Code, and 11 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 779.
During the past week 93 complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

107 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of this Port.

162 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 35 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 33 houses, together with clothing, bedding, etc. They have also disinfected 2,603 privies, 879 yards, and 268 cellars.

30 cases of small-pox were removed to the Hospital, and 1 dead body to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending September 11, 1875: Typhus fever, 4; typhoid fever, 21; scarlet fever, 7; measles, 5; diphtheria, 56; small-pox, 40; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 3.

13 tanks and 3,144 cans of night-soil were removed by the night scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city, during the week ending September 11, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending September 11, 1875: Cattle, 1 carcass; hogs, 1 carcass; beef, 207 pounds; poultry, 417 pounds; and fish, 2,515 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending September 11, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 628 burial permits for city deaths, 628 for bodies *in transitu*, and 37 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 628 deaths, 142 marriages, 468 births, 37 still-births, 31 applications for transit permits, and 64 returns from Coroners. There were 36 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth record, 5 of marriage and 31 of death were issued from this Bureau.
