OPINION OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION.

The power to lease Ferry Franchises in the City of New York is vested exclusively in the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

It is not necessary that leases of this description should be signed by the Mayor, although Leases and Deeds of Real Estate belonging to the Corporation should be signed by him.

Nor is it necessary that the lease of a Ferry Franchise should be signed by the Clerk of the Common Council, nor that the Seal of the Corporation should be affixed thereto, either with or without the authority of the Common Council itself.

To the Honorable the Board of Commissioners
of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—On the 31st day of March, ultimo, a communication was presented by the Comptroller to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in relation to the leases of certain Ferry Franchises and other property connected therewith. There was attached to the communication of the Comptroller, a letter from the Counsel to the Corporation to the Comptroller, dated December 31, 1874, in which was set forth the action taken by him in reference to the preparation of certain leases of such property. There was also attached to the Comptroller's communication, a letter from the Clerk of the Common Council, in which he declined to attach the Seal of the Corporation to a lease of the Grand and South Seventh street Ferry, to the New York and Brooklyn Ferry Company, upon the ground that no resolution authorizing him to affix such Seal had been adopted by the Common Council. This communication from the Comptroller, together with my own letter to him, and the letter from the Clerk of the Common Council, and the duplicate lease to the New York and Brooklyn Ferry Company, have all been transmitted to me, with a memorandum by the Clerk of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, that my opinion is desired by the Commissioners, upon the question whether it is necessary that leases of Ferry property should be signed by the Mayor; and whether the Clerk of the Common Council can affix the Seal of the Corporation to such leases, without the authority of an ordinance of the Common Council.

First. In my opinion it is not necessary that leases of this description should be signed by the Mayor. The Revised Ordinances of 1866 provide that Leases and Deeds of Real Estate belonging to the Corporation, shall be signed by the Mayor, but there is no provision of law or ordinance, so far as I am aware, that requires a lease of a Ferry Franchise to be signed by that officer.

Second. I do not think it necessary that a lease of a ferry franchise should be signed by the Clerk of the Common Council, nor that the seal of the corporation should be affixed thereto, either with or without the authority of the Common Council itself.

Neither by the common law nor by the general statutes of this State would it be necessary that a grant of a ferry franchise should be executed under seal. If the signature of the Clerk of the Common Council and the seal of the corporation are necessary to such a grant, it must be by virtue of some special statute relating to this city, or of some ordinance of the Common Council.

The authority of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to lease ferry franchises is derived from section 102, of the Charter of 1873. That section provides that "said Board shall have power to sell or lease, for the highest marketable price or rental, at public auction, or by sealed bids; and always after public advertisement and appraisal, under direction of said Board, any

city property, except wharves and piers." The 15th section of the charter declares that: "The Clerk of the Common Council shall keep the seal of the city, and his signature shall be necessary to all leases, grants, and other documents, as under existing laws." The question, therefore, resolves itself into this: At the time of the passage of the Charter of 1873, what were the provinces of existing laws in reference to the execution of leases, grants, and other documents?

I cannot discover that the Legislature has ever passed any laws declaring to what leases, grants, and other documents, the signature of the Clerk of the Common Council, or the seal of the corporation, should be necessary. Under the Montgomery Charter, the Clerk of the Common Council was common clerk of the city, whose duty it was "To act, and to do all those things within the city aforesaid, and the limits and jurisdiction thereof, which any common clerk of, or in, any city, borough, or town, incorporated any where in that part of our kingdom of Great Britain, called England, by virtue of his office, can or ought to do." Subsequently the Common Council was authorized to appoint its own separate clerk, who was to keep the seal of the city. (Chapter 75, of the Laws of 1807; chapter 86, of the Laws of 1813, section 167.)

The so-called amendments of the Charter, passed in 1830, 1849, and 1853, contain no provisions on the subject. The provision in the Charters of 1857 and 1870 are almost identical with the provision contained in section 15 of the Charter of 1873, above quoted.

It will thus be seen that we must look exclusively to the ordinances of the Common Council, in order to ascertain what provision has been made for the execution of leases, grants, and other documents.

The Revised Ordinances of 1834 declared that the Clerk of the Common Council should keep the seal of the Corporation, and should cause the same to be affixed to all grants, leases, and other documents made or executed by order of the Common Council, pursuant to the Charter of the city or any law of the State. A similar provision is contained in the Revised Ordinances of 1856, 1859, and 1866, except that in the three latter revisions it is declared that such seal shall be affixed to all instruments in writing, made or executed by order of the Common Council, pursuant to the Charter of the city or any law of the State. Under the Charter of 1873 this provision of the ordinance of 1866 is the one now in force.

It will thus be seen that it is only to those instruments in writing made or executed by order of the Common Council that the signature of the Clerk or the seal of the Corporation is necessary. As above stated, leases of ferry franchises by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are made by virtue of section 102 of the Charter of 1873. The powers of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in this respect are derived directly from the Charter and not from the Common Council. Formerly all leases of this description were made under and in pursuance of ordinances of the Common Council, and when so made, the signature of the Clerk and the seal of the Corporation were necessary to their proper execution. The Legislature has seen fit to take away all power from the Common Council in the matter and to devolve the same upon the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and there is no statute of the State, nor ordinance of the Common Council, which makes the signature of the Clerk or the seal of the Corporation necessary to the proper execution of such leases. It is for the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to determine how the leases are to be executed. The Commissioners, as I am informed, have no seal; and I would therefore respectfully recommend that a resolution should be adopted by the Board authorizing some one or more of its members to execute all such leases on its behalf.

I return herewith the communication of the Comptroller, and the various documents attached thereto, and also the duplicate lease proposed to be given to the New York and Brooklyn Ferry Company. It will be necessary that the form of this lease should be somewhat changed, and whenever the Commissioners shall have adopted a resolution declaring by what member or members of the Board the lease is to be executed, I shall be happy to modify the form of the lease so that it may be executed in accordance with such resolution.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At meetings of the Board governing this Department, held April 15th, 19th and 20th, present all the Commissioners, the following action was had:

Organization, Appointments, etc.

April 19th—Joseph Conway, appointed Inspector of Dredging, at a salary of \$500 per annum, to take effect from and after April 1st.

Applications for Leases, etc.

April 15—From James Gillies, for use of land under water owned by the city, at the foot of Fifty-fifth street, N. R., to be covered by temporary bulkhead. Granted, if terms and rent of \$1000 are agreed to.

April 15—From Murtagh & Burns, for a lease of pier foot of Thirty-seventh street, N. R. Denied; lease of said premises to be sold at public auction.

April 15—From Alexander Mason, for lease of 145 feet of inner end of Pier 19, E. R. Denied; lease of said premises to be sold at public auction.

April 15—John Nesbit, requested to inform the Board in writing whether he accepts or rejects the lease of the pier foot of One Hundred and Tenth street, Harlem river, purchased by him at public auction on March 31st.

April 15—Resolution offered by Commissioner Westervelt, that the leases of certain piers and bulkheads be offered at public auction. Laid on the table.

Applications for Permits, etc.

April 15—From Knickerbocker Ice Co., to place office on pier foot of Forty-third street, North river. Granted during the pleasure of the Board.

April 15—From Henry Nesmith, to insert a six-inch drain pipe in the bulkhead opposite No. 32 South street. Granted.

Repairs Ordered, etc.

April 15—Engineer-in-Chief directed to place on the upper corner of new Pier 45 North River, a round fender, consisting of strong slabs of wood bolted to the corner of the pier and extending as low as practicable towards the water, and cover the same with a plate of iron to protect all parts.

April 15—Engineer-in-Chief directed to report the cost of making the necessary repairs to Pier 46, East river.

April 15—Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare a list of piers that need to be repaired, the cost of which will exceed \$1000 each.

Dredging Ordered, etc.

April 15—Commissioner Wales appointed a committee to confer with the Board of Police as to dredging required at Ninety-sixth street, East river, with a view to having greater care exercised in the manner of loading scows, etc.

April 15—Engineer-in-Chief directed to dredge slip north side of pier foot of One Hundred and Thirty-first street, North river, and to deposit the material dredged on the dock, to be removed by the lessee.

April 15—Engineer in Chief directed to dredge slips adjoining Pier 42, new piers 44 and 45, N. R., and pier foot of Twenty-fifth street, E. R.

April 15—Board of Commissioners of Pilots requested to issue a permit to deposit material to be dredged from the Oyster basin.

April 15—Engineer in Chief directed to report quantity of material to be dredged from slip adjacent to Pier 46, E. R., to give a depth of ten feet at low water.

April 15—Commissioner Wales appointed a Committee to confer with the Commissioners of Pilots as to what arrangements can be made in obtaining permits to deposit material dredged by the Department.

April 19—Application made to the Board of Commissioners of Pilots, for a general permit to cover all dredging undertaken by the Department, the depositing of which shall be supervised by Joseph Conway, Inspector of Dredging.

Contracts, etc.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held April 21, 1875:

Present—Hon. Wm. H. Wickham, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. Andrew H. Green, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Magnus Gross, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller submitted the appraisal of real estate belonging to the Corporation of the City of New York, made by Samuel C. Holmes; and of the rent of the property to be sold at public auction, on a lease of two years, on the 23d of April, 1875, which, on motion, was adopted.

The Comptroller also submitted "Terms of sale" of real estate of the Corporation of the City of New York, to be leased at auction, April 23, 1875, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

TERMS OF SALE.

Twenty per cent. on the yearly rent bid for each parcel to be paid to the Collector of the City Revenue at the time and place of sale; and the successful bidder will be required, at the same time, to have an obligation executed by two sureties, to be approved by the Comptroller, for carrying into effect the terms of sale.

The twenty per cent., when paid, will be credited on the first quarter's rent; or forfeited, if the lessee does not execute the lease and bonds within fifteen days after the sale; and the Comptroller shall be authorized, at his option, to resell the premises bid off by those failing to comply with the terms as above; and the party so failing to comply to be liable for any deficiency that may result from such resale.

No person will be received as lessee or surety who is delinquent on any former lease from the Corporation. No bid will be accepted from any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as security or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation. (Sec. 99 of Charter of 1873.)

The leases will contain the usual covenants and conditions, reserving to the Corporation the right to cancel the lease whenever the premises may be required by them for public purposes.

All repairs will be made at the expense of the lessees, and no deduction whatever will be allowed for damage by reason of any sickness or epidemic that may prevail in this city during the continuance of the lease.

The lessees will be required to give a bond for double the amount of the annual rent, with two sureties, to be approved by the Comptroller, conditioned for the payment of the rent quarterly, and the fulfillment on their part of the covenants of the lease.

The leases, bonds, and revenue stamps to be at the expense of the lessees.

Should the Corporation sell, lease, rebuild, or remove any of the markets during the term for which the lease is granted, the leases of the property so sold, and of the cellars and other premises in or under the markets so sold, leased, rebuilt, or removed, are to be cancelled at the option of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and no deduction or award for damages will be made by the Corporation therefor.

On motion of the Comptroller, it was Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby authorize the sale of the leases of the property belonging to the Corporation of the City of New York, as advertised to take place on the 23d of April, 1875, to be carried into effect, on condition that no lease be sold for a less rent than the appraised value.

The Comptroller submitted a report on the application of the Board of Education for five lots of ground, north side of Sixty-seventh street, between Lexington and Third avenues, for Public School purposes, referred to him March 31, 1875, which was ordered on file.
