QUARTERLY REPORT ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1898.

To the Board of Docks:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of the work under my charge and supervision during the quarter ending December 31, 1898:

WORK OF CONSTRUCTION.

NORTH RIVER.

Barclay Street Section (Extended).

Old structures on the line of the work were removed and substantial progress has been made in the building of this section. The section is being built by the Department at the cost and expense of F. W. Rhinelander and others.

The filling is being placed by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, under the supervision of this Department.

Park Place Section.

About 40 feet of this section has been completed and the coping set. The wall is being built for and at the expense of William Rhinelander and others.

The filling is being done by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, under the supervision of this Department.

Murray Street Section.

About 86 feet of this wall has been completed on the coping-stone during the quarter, and filling-in is being placed behind the wall. The inner end of Pier, new No. 18, is being rebuilt. The wall at this section is being built for the use of the Old Colony Steamboat Company for and at the expense of F. W. Rhinelander and others.

Warren Street Section.

Some work of maintenance has been done at this section and a small amount of filling placed in rear of the wall.

Desbrosses Street Section.

Work on this section is in progress. The work is being done by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, under a permit from the Board of Docks.

Watts Street Section.

Dredging for this section has been completed; the cobble and rip-rap have been placed and piling has been done during the quarter.

South Canal Street Section.

A section of the bulkhead-wall is being built south of the Canal street section by The New Jersey Steamboat Company, under permit from the Board of Docks. The inner end of Pier, old 41, was removed to make way for the wall, and a temporary approach was built to the Pier.

Improvement of Water Front, between West Eleventh and Gansevoort Streets.

Substantial progress has been made in the improvement of the water front at Gansevoort section, extending from West Eleventh street to Gansevoort street; 10 concrete blocks have been set in the wall. About 1,261 feet of granite have been set during the quarter, making a total quantity of granite set on this section of about 6,147 feet. About 475 feet of coping was set during the quarter, making a total of about 748 feet of wall actually completed on this section. Earth filling is being placed behind the wall.

This section embraces new piers at West Eleventh, Bank, Bethune, Jane and Gansevoort streets; of these, the Piers at Bethune and Jane streets were finished, so far as the actual pier work was concerned, during the quarter, the others having been previously completed.

Sheds are being erected on all these piers.

Oyster Basin.

The work of constructing a new temporary oyster basin in the vicinity of Bloomfield street is in progress. A new pier is in course of construction, and Pier, old 56½, has been extended.

West Thirty-third Street Section.

A small amount of work in placing backing-log has been done on this section.

West Thirty-fourth Street Section.

Some work has been done in placing backing-log at this section; earth filling is being placed and a box drain placed through the earth filling.

Pier at West Thirty-fourth Street, N. R.

A new pier was built at the foot of the street by Department labor, and the pier completed during the quarter.

Pier at West Fiftieth Street, N. R.

A recreation structure is being built on the Pier under Contract No. 621.

Pier at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth Street, N. R.

The work of extending and repairing the pier was completed during the quarter and the work of preparing for and erecting a passenger and freight shed under Contract No. 625 was begun.

Between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh Streets, N. R.

The building of a crib-bulkhead between these streets was completed during the quarter under Contract No. 630, and filling-in is being placed. A box drain was carried through the filling.

Recreation Buildings, N. R.

The recreation building on Pier, new 43, North river, has been maintained.

EAST RIVER.

Pier at Twentieth Street.

A new pier is being built at the foot of the street by the force of the Department and is nearly completed.

East Ninety-first Street Section.

Some slight work was done at this section, in building a retaining-wall to retain earth filling.

East Ninety-ninth Street Section.

The New York and College Point Ferry Company having removed their ferry to the new location, work was resumed on this section by pumping the mud from the gap in the wall between East Ninety-ninth and One Hundredth streets.

Pier at East One Hundred and Twelfth Street, H. R.

A recreation structure was erected on the pier under Contract No. 604 and finished during the quarter.

Recreation Buildings, E. R.—East Third, Twenty-fourth and One Hundred and Twelfth Streets.

The recreation buildings at Third, Twenty-fourth and One Hundred and Twelfth streets have been taken care of and maintained.

One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street West of Gerard Avenue, H. R.

Filling is being deposited by John Cromwell, under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Forty-fourth Street, Easterly side of H. R.

Filling is being deposited by Jordan L. Mott, under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Forty-sixth Street, Cheever Place, H. R.

The area in rear of crib-bulkhead recently erected was filled in to grade by John F. Allen, under permit from the Board.

Westchester Avenue, Bronx River.

A bridge is being constructed across these premises by the Department of Street Improvements, under permit from the Board.

A crib-bulkhead was erected at West Farms, at above premises, adjoining the property of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, by Olin J. Stephens, under permit from the Board.

WALLABOUT IMPROVEMENT, BROOKLYN.

A bulkhead-wall is being constructed at the Wallabout Basin by Augustin Walsh, under contract with the former City of Brooklyn, and substantial progress towards completion has been made.

TIMBER BASIN, N. R.

At the timber basin, timber received under various contracts and Treasurer's Orders has been received, cared for and issued as required.

DEPARTMENT YARDS AT WEST FIFTY-SEVENTH AND EAST TWENTY-FOURTH STREETS.

At the Department Yards, the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of material and the issuance of supplies for various pieces of work.

The yards have been maintained in good order and condition.

FLOATING PROPERTY.

All the Floating Property of the Department has been in use during the quarter and has been repaired from time to time.

SURVEYING PARTY.

Surveys of the water front and the structures thereon on the North, East and Harlem rivers, in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, have been made.

An extensive survey of the water fronts of the boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond is in progress.

All the lines, levels, grades, surveys, soundings and examinations have been made and given as required.

DREDGING.

All the dredging has been supervised, whether done by the Department or by private parties.

REPAIRS.

Repairs other than dredging have been made at various places, under order of the Board. Among the principal of these were the extending of Pier 48, East river, and the repairs to Pier 44 and Pier at Eleventh street, East river.

Repairs, alterations and other pieces of work by private parties under order or permit of the Board of Docks have been supervised during the quarter.

Among which are the extending of the ferry-rack at Barclay street, North river; the extending of Piers, old 25 and 27, North river; the erection of shed on the extension to Piers, new 20 and 21, North river, and the erection of a second story on the shed on Pier, new 22, North river.

PAVING MARGINAL STREET, N. R.

Pier, new 42, N. R.

Temporary pavement was laid on the newly made land around the opening made by the Hudson Tunnel Railroad Company's tunnel near Pier, new 42.

Gansevoort Street.

Pavement is being laid on the newly made land at Gansevoort street by John M. Sheehan, under Treasurer's Order No. 19696.

Horatio Street, N. R.

Pavement is being laid on the newly made land at Horatio street by John M. Sheehan, under Treasurer's Order No. 19735.

Piers, new 55, 56 and 57, N. R.

Pavement is being laid on the newly made land in the vicinity of these piers by the New York Sand and Gravel Company, under Treasurer's Order No. 19538.

Between Seventy-eighth and Seventy-ninth Streets, N. R.

Temporary pavement was laid in the vicinity of these streets by George W. Plunkitt, under Treasurer's Order No. 19740.

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief, the draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work, plans for the improvement of the water-front, plans and specifications for new piers and repairs, change of lines, examination of plans submitted by private parties, solar printing and general office work.

Various pieces of work by private parties, under order or permit from the Board of Docks, have been supervised during the quarter in addition to the ones heretofore enumerated.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounted to 8,400 linear feet, the net wharfage room made being 8,100 feet. The area of the piers owned by the city has been increased by 286,700 square feet. The total increase in wharfage room by private parties has been 1,600 linear feet, the net increase being 1,030 linear feet.
