Hon. HENRY S. KEARNY, Commissioner, Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies:

DEAR SIR—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending September 30, 1901:

CRIMINAL COURT BUILDING.

Plumber's and carpenter's supplies, supplies for cleaning purposes and engineer's and electrical supplies were furnished. An order to furnish electric current to above building was issued. Four barrels of cleaning compound and 4 barrels of soap polish for cleaning purposes, 2 barrels disinfectant and 1 barrel engine oil were furnished. Twelve attachment plugs; 1 spool No. 2 ampere fuse wire; 100 feet silk-covered flexible wire No. 16; 100 feet electrolier single conductor wire B. & S. gauge No. 16; 200 feet No. 16 new-code silk cord; 144 Edison key sockets; 50 extra screws for shade holders; 50 feet 3/4-inch flexible tubing; 12 attachment plugs; 12 Edison key receptacles; 6 Amp. P. D. snap switches; 100 1/2-inch by 12-inch solid inclosed arc carbons; 12 globes; 400 6-ampere fuse links; 1 roll 5-ampere fine wire; 400 10-ampere fuse links; 4 arch lamp shades; 1 alcohol blow-torch and 24 carbon brushes were furnished. Fifteen electric-fan motors throughout building were entirely overhauled and repaired. The clock system throughout the building was overhauled, repaired and put in first-class working order. A galvanized iron skylight, 9 by 10, with ventilator, glazed with 1/4-inch ribbed glass was furnished and put in place on the northwest corner of roof of above building. The galvanized-iron ventilating pipes in attic were overhauled and repaired. At entrance on Centre

street side the plastering was repaired, steam valves on Centre street and Elm street sides were reset and new discs furnished for same. The indirect heating stacks in central chamber on Franklin and White street sides were taken apart, cleaned and fitted with new gaskets and fittings. Two Nason traps, blow-off cocks, fittings from blow-off to mud drum of 4 boilers were furnished and 6 valves in high-pressure chamber were repaired. Eight Worthington pumps were overhauled and repaired. The following repairs were made to elevators in above building: Chains on automatic weights repaired, cut-off repaired, chain and key in cut-off valve renewed, valves packed, lifting cables and tilting sheave shaft adjusted and operating ropes repaired, and on Elevator No. 1 tilting sheaves rebushed and shaft of tilting sheaves renewed and new tiling laid on floor of car.

Elevator No. 2—New tiling laid on floor of car.

Elevator No. 3—Operating rope renewed.

Elevator No. 5—Automatic cut-offs repaired.

Elevator No. 6—Automatic cut-off repaired.

Matron's Room—Toilet cabinet, with a supply of clean towels weekly, was furnished.

Grand Jury Room—5 Lundell motor fans were furnished and put in place and 1 electric fan repaired. The windows on Centre street side were altered and reconstructed. Curtains and draperies were taken down, cleaned and rehung. Linoleum of the best quality was furnished and laid in above room, and 1 water-cooler and 1 stand was furnished.

Court of General Sessions—6 sets of the Laws of 1901 and one 5-foot oak roll-top desk furnished.

An extension desk set of telephone instruments connected with telephone was installed. Railings were altered and platform extended in Part II. of above court and in Part III. about 43 inches of iron railing 3 feet 2 inches high, made of $\frac{3}{8}$ No. 14 flat iron, 2-inch mesh, with polished oak-top rail, gate, hinges, lock, etc., all finished in gold bronze, was furnished and erected.

Judges' Chambers—Five toilet cabinets with a supply of clean towels weekly were furnished.

Clerk's Office—One toilet cabinet with a supply of clean towels weekly was furnished.

Supreme Court, Criminal Branch, Part I—About 300 yards of carpet was taken up, cleaned and relaid with best quality paper lining.

Judges' Chambers—Two toilet cabinets, with a supply of clean towels weekly, were furnished. Court Special Sessions—Three toilet cabinets, with a supply of clean towels weekly, were furnished.

Coroner's Office—A supply of clean towels (24) weekly were furnished.

District Attorney's Office—Five "Lundell" motor fans were furnished and installed, 2 oak roll-top desks, 1 flat-top desk and 3 revolving chairs were furnished. About 77 feet of bookcase, made of pine white wood, finished complete, was furnished and put up. The safe on the third floor in above office was moved to fifth floor.

COUNTY COURT-HOUSE.

The usual orders for a supply of steam were renewed; cleaning supplies, including soap, powder, etc., were furnished. Old and worn-out parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. Three barrels of soap polish, 3 barrels disinfectant, 3 barrels soap powder, 1 barrel cylinder oil, and one half dozen squeegees were furnished. About 150 yards of velvet carpet and 1,125 yards of Brussels carpet was taken up, cleaned and relaid throughout the building. Damaged steel on roof of above building was removed and replaced with No. 14 5-inch corrugated steel, old parts were scraped and all properly painted. The 4 iron water-tanks on upper floor were repaired, cleaned, scraped and painted. Two sets of excelsior lubricators were furnished and installed on elevators of above building; also hand ropes of same repaired.

Supreme Court—A case of toilet paper, two toilet-paper cabinets and 20 dozen cane-bottom chairs were furnished. "Law Journal" for second quarter bound, and in the 19 court-rooms, Judges' Chambers and Library, the curtains and draperies were taken down, cleaned and rehung. About 125 yards of linoleum was laid in Judges' dining-room, kitchen, toilet, entrance to library and private hallways. The two old closets in toilet room were removed and replaced by two syphon-jet closets, with cisterns, back air connections, etc., complete, together with all necessary marble work incident thereto.

Part I., Special Term—Walls and ceilings were washed off, ceilings and cornices were prepared, tinted and decorated, walls painted three coats and part painted in imitation walnut, blocked out in panels grained and varnished. Ironwork was washed off and painted two coats. Woodwork was cleaned off, bleached where necessary, touched up, varnished and finished in wax oil. Walls and ceiling of closet in above court-room were washed off, kalsomined and painted and chandeliers sized, painted and gilded with best quality gold leaf.

Part II., Special Term—Walls and ceiling of closet in above court-room were washed off, kalsomined and painted and chandeliers sized, painted and gilded with best quality gold leaf.

Part III., Trial Term—Outside of railing in above court-room 27 yards of linoleum was laid.

Part V., Trial Term—Walls and ceilings were washed off, ceilings and cornices were prepared, tinted and decorated, walls painted three coats and part painted in imitation walnut, blocked out in panels, grained and varnished. The walls and ceilings of closet in above court-room were washed off, kalsomined and painted and chandeliers sized, painted and gilded with best quality gold leaf.

Part V., Special Term—Walls and ceilings were washed off, ceilings and cornices were prepared, tinted and decorated, walls painted three coats and part painted in imitation walnut, blocked out in panels grained and varnished. All chandeliers were sized, painted and gilded with best quality gold leaf.

Part VI., Special Term—Walls and ceilings were washed off, ceilings and cornices were prepared, tinted and decorated, walls painted three coats and parts painted in imitation walnut, blocked out in panels, grained and varnished.

Part VII., Trial Term—Walls and ceilings were washed off, ceilings and cornices were prepared, tinted and decorated, walls painted three coats and parts tinted in imitation walnut, blocked out in panels, grained and varnished.

Part XI., Trial Term—Walls and ceilings were washed off, ceilings and cornices were prepared, tinted and decorated, walls painted three coats and parts painted in imitation walnut, blocked out in panels, grained and varnished.

Part XII., Trial Term—Walls and ceilings were washed off, ceilings and cornices were prepared, tinted and decorated, walls painted three coats and parts tinted in imitation walnut, blocked out in panels, grained and varnished.

ARMORIES.

Seventh Regiment—Old and worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. The electric gas-lighting apparatus was thoroughly overhauled and repaired. Five 10-gallon kegs disinfectant and 1 barrel raw linseed oil and 2 barrels of turpentine were furnished.

Eighth Regiment—All worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. The electrical gas-lighting apparatus was thoroughly overhauled and repaired. Brick arches and brick wall in boiler-room were taken down and rebuilt. Defective tin on roof of above armory was cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality painted bottom and top and the entire roof painted. Leaders were also repaired. Doors throughout armory were repaired, and in band-room and Hospital Corps room 28 double-cylinder Yale locks with master keys complete were furnished and put on; 54 yards of inlaid linoleum was furnished and laid in room adjoining Hospital Corps room; 500 pounds of Buffalo moth exterminator furnished. Saddle cases and oak table formerly in run at First Brigade Headquarters were removed and set up in above armory.

Ninth Regiment—All worn-out parts of Welsbach lamps were replaced with new parts. The electrical gas-lighting apparatus was thoroughly overhauled and repaired. Bridge walls and arches in boiler-room were taken down and rebuilt. Ashpit in boiler-room was lowered. Stone work on centie tower and walls adjacent thereto were pointed up. Brick handholes around traps were rebuilt and cement floor in toilet-room in basement was repaired. The gutter around lantern, galvanized-iron work of same and leaders of tower was repaired and painted. Sewer-pipes, soil-pipes and rain leaders were altered and repaired and new sewer valves put in. Sixty-ninth Regiment—All worn-out parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. Seventy-first Regiment—All worn-out parts of Welsbach lights were replaced with new parts. Electrical gas-lighting apparatus in above armory was entirely overhauled and repaired. The plastering of ceilings and sidewalls in the following rooms were repaired: Drum corps, band, boxing, gymnasium, bath, Colonel's, Adjutant's and toilet, and at stairway part of surface under company room, both sides of stairway from company rooms to drill-room and the vertical surfaces in front of company rooms.

General Office—Two toilet cabinets with a supply of clean towels weekly were furnished. 1 City Directory, 1 Business Directory and 1 Brooklyn Directory furnished.

Bureau of Lamps and Gas—One toilet cabinet with a supply of clean towels weekly and 1 City Directory was furnished.

Electrical Bureau—Four toilet cabinets with a supply of clean towels weekly were furnished. One City Directory, 2,000 printed copies of "Interpretations and Rules," 1 type K volt-meter, 0 to 125 volts, 1 Type K ammeter 0 to 50 amperes, and one portable ammeter 0 to 50 amperes.

Bureau of Assistant Engineer—One toilet cabinet with a supply of clean towels weekly was furnished. Four dozen drawing pencils, 1/2 dozen erasing shields, 1/2 dozen camel's-hair brushes, 2 boxes thumb tacks, 2 rolls tracing cloth, 1 roll tracing paper, 1 dozen crow-quill pens, 1 25-foot steel tape, 1 Hyde's Atlas of Borough of Queens, 1 platinum crucible, 1 1/4 inches in diameter, and 1 alcohol lamp for same, 1 2-pound No. 3 diaphragm burner test-meter with 4-inch dial fitted to index, 1 Dehler-McAllister portable photometer complete and 100 prints of maps and plans furnished. The typewriter in above office was entirely overhauled, repaired and put in first-class working order.

Bureau of Repairs and Supplies—Three toilet cabinets with a supply of clean towels weekly were furnished. Four nickel antiseptic mouth-pieces for telephones, 1/2-dozen door mats and a supply of rubber stamps were furnished. Typewriter in above office was entirely overhauled, repaired and put in first-class working order. One sanitary copying bath with 3 1/2 dozen cloths. Contract for cleaning all the glass in the various public buildings, courts and offices in the care of this department was made. A supply of coal and wood for heating, etc., and a supply of ice, sponges, soap, brooms, pails, dusters, mops, furniture polish, metal polish, matches, candles, toilet paper, etc., were furnished to the different public buildings, courts and offices in the care of this department. Orders for use of horse and wagon were renewed and orders for replacing worn-out and defective parts of Welsbach lights in the different buildings, courts and offices were renewed. Among the many items of repairs made not otherwise specially referred to are plumbing, steam-fitting, gas-fitting, masonwork, plastering, painting, carpentering, glazing, electrical work, iron work, repairs to furniture, etc., and for the use of mechanics in the employ of the Department, a supply of lumber, hardware, paints, varnish, etc., were furnished.

RIVINGTON STREET BATH.

Three dozen corn brooms, 4 dozen scrub brushes, 4 barrels soap polish, 5 gallons oxalic acid, 2 dozen boxes, 1 barrel kerosene oil, 1 gross 1/4-inch washers, 20 pounds sheet lead, 1 3/8-inch faucet, 1/2 dozen ashcans, 1 dozen galvanized iron pails, 1 12-inch screw wrench, 1 Stillson wrench 14 inch, 1 pair gas pliers 14 inch, 50 pounds white lead, 1 hack saw, 1 dozen hack-saw blades, 10 pounds sheet rubber packing, 5 pounds copper wire 1/8 inch, 6 sprays for shower 4 inch, 72 washers for same, 25 feet iron wire 3/8 inch, 6 pipe plugs 1/4 inch, 6 pipe plugs 3/8 inch, 6 pipe plugs 1/2 inch, 25 pounds putty, 3 hammer handles, 1 screw driver 8 inch, 1 screw driver 12 inch, 6 Jenkins discs, 1/4 inch, 3/8 inch, 1/2 inch, 3/4 inch, 1 inch, 1 1/4 inch, 1 1/2 inch, 2 inch, 2 1/2 inch, 3-inch, 3 1/2 inch and 4 inch, 6 gauge glasses 24 inches by 3/4 inch, 1 box coach candles (20 pounds), 12 bath plugs 1 1/2 inch, 5 pounds emery (fine), 5 pounds emery (medium), 2 water faucets 3/4 inch, with hose connection; 2 dozen basin cock washers, 2 dozen basin cock diaphragm washers, 130 boxes of soap cut in small pieces for use of bathers, 3 barrels of disinfectants, 100 feet of 3/4-inch rubber hose with couplings and nozzle complete. Defective plumbing and steam fitting was repaired, and 18 brass sieve-strainers, with necessary pipe connections, furnished. Four openings were cut and covered with wire window guards in brick wall in cellar of above building. Manhole was cut in water tank, coping-stone repaired and clamped and stoop railing braced. Lazy bar, hoe and plate for engineer furnished. Bench in waiting-room repaired, 3 map racks furnished and put in place. Inside doors of shower-bath rooms were removed, wardrobes were repaired, and about 4 dozen brass catches were furnished and placed on bath-room doors, as directed.

FREE FLOATING BATHS.

The usual orders for lumber and small supplies were renewed. Fire insurance policy was renewed. Flagpoles on baths where necessary were repaired and a United States flag made of best quality standard bunting with necessary halyards, etc., was furnished and placed on each of the 15 free floating baths; 9 window shades made of best quality Nonpareil shade cloth hung on Hartshorn spring rollers was furnished and put up on the baths located at East Eighth street, East Twenty-fourth street and East One Hundred and Twelfth street. For the purpose of making sundry repairs Bath No. 13 was moved from its berth at Thirty-fifth street and North river to Weehawken, N. J., same beached and after necessary repairs were made towed to old location. Old winter storage quarters were secured for this season. The anchors and chains of East One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, East Fifty-first street and Battery Baths were removed and stored in Corporation Yard. At the close of the bathing season the baths were towed from their respective berths on the East and North rivers to their winter quarters, where they will be overhauled and repaired for the forthcoming bathing season. The bathing season began June 21, 1901, and ended September 21, during which time 5,200,000 persons availed themselves of the bathing facilities.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

MUNICIPAL BUILDING.

Defective halyards on flagpole were renewed and new halyards properly reeved replaced same. Roof of above building was repaired. All open seams soldered and all new work received two coats of best quality paint.

The defective ceiling between main part and annex of above building was removed and recovered with galvanized corrugated iron. One 6-inch Rider engine with connections to tanks, fire lines, etc., was furnished and installed as directed in above building.

Carpets in above building were taken up, cleaned and relaid with best paper lining.

SECOND DISTRICT MUNICIPAL COURT.

Carpets were taken up, cleaned and relaid with new paper lining. 32 window shades, made of best quality Nonpareil shade cloth, hung on Hartshorn spring rollers, with necessary fixtures, etc., complete, were furnished and put up on above Court. The following law books were furnished, Court of Appeals Reports, Volumes 164 to 166 inclusive; Appellate Division Reports, Volumes 53 to 59 inclusive; Miscellaneous Reports, Volumes 32 and 33; Session Laws, 1901, three volumes; Amendments to the Codes (1901), pamphlet; Abbott's Trial Brief, second edition; Abbott's Trial Evidence.

CORONERS' OFFICE.

One toilet cabinet, with a supply of clean towels weekly, was furnished. The carpets in above office were taken up, cleaned and relaid with best paper lining.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

Two toilet cabinets, with a supply of clean towels weekly, were furnished.

PRESIDENT OF BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

One toilet cabinet, with a supply of clean towels weekly, was furnished.

DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

Two toilet cabinets, with a supply of clean towels weekly, were furnished.

RECEIVER OF TAXES.

SIR—I herewith submit a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx during the quarter ending September 30, 1901.

In Exhibit "A" will be found a statement showing the amount expended on vouchers for a supply of illuminating gas, etc., to the various public markets, court-rooms, offices, armories, etc., and for fitting up, lighting and maintaining the public lamps.

Exhibit "B" is a summary of the appropriation for "Lamps and Lighting, 1901," and this shows an expenditure during the quarter of three hundred and twenty thousand and eleven dollars and forty-seven cents (\$320,011.47), and for the nine months of the year of nine hundred and seventy-one thousand and three hundred and fifty-eight dollars and forty-two cents (\$971,358.42), with outstanding liabilities amounting to twelve hundred and forty-seven dollars and fifty cents.

Exhibit "C" is a summary of the Lamp Account, showing the number of new lamps lighted, old lamps relighted and lamps discontinued by each gas and electric light company during the quarter: 97 new gas lamps, 117 new naphtha lamps, 10 new Welsbach naphtha lamps and 41 new electric lamps have been lighted, 100 old gas lamps and 5 naphtha lamps have been relighted, 127 gas lamps, 46 naphtha lamps and 3 electric lamps have been discontinued. The total number of public lamps lighted September 30, 1901, was 23,534 gas, 1,587 ordinary naphtha, 759 Welsbach naphtha and 4,883 electric lamps, making a total of 30,763 lamps.

Exhibit "D" is a statement showing the average illuminating power of the gases supplied in the Borough of Manhattan by the various gas companies during the quarter.

The following statement showing the average amount of impurities found in the gases of such of the companies as have gas mains on the lines of our photometric stations, as determined by the analyses by Dr. E. G. Love, Ph.D., our Gas Examiner, in the Laboratories of the Bureau:

SIR—In accordance with your instructions I submit herewith a report of the transactions of this office for the quarter ending September 30, 1901.

Four men have been employed in the office, draughting-room, laboratory and general outside inspection of streets and buildings.

The work of compiling new maps of the Bronx and Queens boroughs has been completed.

The special portable photometer, which has been designed for a general comparison of the various types of street lamps now in use in the City, is ready for use and will afford a basis for a comparison of their relative efficiency.

Maps of the several boroughs have been corrected to September 30, 1901, and show the street lighting system of the city as given in Table "A" with a grand total of 61,028 lamps.

In the laboratory tests of Portland cement for the New Hall of Records have been in progress. Four carloads of cement have been accepted as conforming to the specifications. Further tests have been made of each lot of cement as delivered on the work. The average results of tests of cement which was accepted are given in Tables "B," "C" and "D."

Table "E" shows a saving during the quarter over the average of preceding years of over 1,200,000 cubic feet of gas, due to the use of Welsbach lights and gas governors in the principal public buildings which are lighted wholly by gas.

A saving is noted during the quarter of \$1,200 or about 30 per cent. in the cost of fuel at the Criminal Court-house, Harlem Court-house, and West Fifty-fourth Street Court-house, due to the substitution of buckwheat coal for egg, and a saving of \$5,800 due to changes and improvements previously recommended in the street lighting.

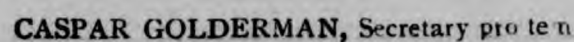

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, November 22, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—President Cram and Commissioner Meyer.

Absent—Commissioner Murphy.

The minutes of the meeting held November 15, 1901, were approved.

John E. Walsh appeared and requested a lease of the bulkhead at the foot of Degraw street, Borough of Brooklyn.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto John E. Walsh the bulkhead foot of Degraw street, Buttermilk Channel, Borough of Brooklyn, for a term of ten years from December 1, 1901, at a rental of one hundred and twenty dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said John E. Walsh shall within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof file in this Department his written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in the form of lease of wharf property used by this Department.

The communications from the Engineer-in-Chief submitting specifications and forms of contracts for furnishing manila rope, white-oak piles, and sand and broken stone, were tabled.

The following communications were tabled for one week:

From La Veloce Navigazione Italiana A Vapore, requesting a lease of the Wall street Pier, No. 12, East river.

From the President, recommending that the compensation to be charged the Old Dominion Steamship Company for the bulkheads adjoining Beach Street Pier, No. 26, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$7,000 per annum.

The application of John W. Sullivan for a renewal of the lease of the easterly half of the Jackson Street Pier West, together with the bulkhead between the Jackson Street Pier West, and the Jackson Street Pier East, East river, was referred to Commissioner Meyer.

The following permit was granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

George W. Beebe, to land the steamer "J. S. Warden" at the Battery landing, compensation to be charged therefor at the rate of \$4 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master.

Union Ferry Company, to place fog bells on the outer ends of the Wall Street Pier, No. 12, and Burling Slip Pier East, No. 16, East river.

Arthur Herring, to erect a temporary shed for the protection of a cat-boat during the winter season on his property on the shore of Flushing Bay, about 1,000 feet west of the mouth of Flushing creek, Borough of Queens.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Comptroller—

1st. Advising that his certificates have been indorsed upon Contracts Nos. 717 and 719, for furnishing granite and coal, respectively, and that same are now valid contracts.
2d. Transmitting extract from opinion of the Corporation Counsel suggesting that the various Departments pay the fees of persons whose services are required in the Department as notaries or commissioners of deeds.

On motion, the recommendation of the President that the Secretary be directed to designate some employee or employees of the Department of Docks and Ferries to take affidavits and acknowledgments, whenever necessary, their fees for the commission to be paid by the Department, and that each employee so designated be required to sign a written statement, to be filed with the Secretary, that no claim will be made for notarial services performed by him for the Department, was adopted.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving form of agreement as executed by the owners of the property for the sale to the City of the Wall Street Pier West, and adjoining bulkhead on the East river. Commissioners authorized to execute same.

2d. Requesting maps of Jefferson Street Pier East, East river, and adjoining bulkhead, owned by Mary Bell. Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare such maps.

From the President of the Borough of Queens—In relation to the maintenance of tracks on the pier at the foot of Broadway, Astoria, Borough of Queens. Action of the Secretary, in replying

that said tracks were placed thereat temporarily to facilitate the landing of materials to be used in asphaltting Flushing avenue, approved.

From the Department of Taxes and Assessments—Transmitting statement of assessed valuations of property owned by Persis G. Wellman, between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets, North river. Secretary directed to transmit same to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

From the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners—In relation to the construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit extension. Secretary directed to again state that the Department has no objection to the construction of such extension provided the top of the tunnel as planned be not less than 30 feet below mean low water where it is built within the lines of the jurisdiction of this Department.

From Patterson & Elder—Requesting a lease of the bulkhead at the foot of Fleeman street, Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto Patterson & Elder two hundred feet of the bulkhead along the westerly side of Fleeman avenue, measured north from the southerly end of Wallabout basin, Borough of Brooklyn, together with the right to maintain on said bulkhead an ice bridge, scales and tally-house for a term of ten years from December 1, 1901, at an annual rental of one thousand five hundred dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Patterson & Elder shall, within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof, file in this Department their written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in the form of lease of wharf property used by this Department.

From the Seaboard Contracting Company, requesting a lease of the West Fifty-sixth street Pier, No. 96, together with the bulkhead southerly thereof and the new-made land in rear of said bulkhead.

On motion, the application for a lease of the bulkhead southerly and of the new-made land in rear thereof, for a term of ten years, was denied, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto the Seaboard Contracting Company the southerly side and outer end of the West Fifty-sixth Street Pier, No. 96, together with the surface of said pier. The lessee shall have the use of the water for a distance of fifty feet on the northerly side of said pier, provided that the use of said water does not interfere with the operations, storage, etc., of the floating property of this Department or with the use of the Department yard at West Fifty-seventh street; and in case the Department yard at West Fifty-seventh street shall be removed from that locality then the restrictions relative to the use of the water on the north side of said pier shall be removed and the lessee shall have the same rights on the northerly side of said pier as are herein granted on the southerly side.

The lease of the premises above described, subject to the restriction mentioned, shall be for a term of ten years from December 1, 1901, at an annual rental of \$1,700, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; the lessee to have the privilege of a renewal for

a further term of ten years at an advance rental of five per cent. per annum; it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Seaboard Contracting Company shall, within ten days from receipt of a copy hereof, file in this Department its written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in the form of lease of wharf property now used by this Department.

From the President—

1st. Recommending that the Engineer-in-Chief be directed to prepare plans and specifications for asphalt paving the pavement along the northerly side of Gansevoort street Pier, Fo. 52, North river.

On motion the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to prepare plans and specifications, and that the Treasurer be and hereby is authorized to issue Treasurer's Order for necessary repairs to the pavement along the northerly side of Gansevoort Street Pier, No. 52 North river, so far as said pavement lies within the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries, the paved area to be about six hundred and eighty square yards and to consist of a-pavement on paving-block foundation.

2d. Recommending that the Dock Master be directed to collect wharfage at the Jackson Street Pier East, East river, the title to said pier having become vested in the City November 21, 1901; that the present occupants be directed to apply for temporary permits for the use of said pier, and that the Engineer-in-Chief be directed to remove the pier as soon as practicable. Recommendations adopted.

From Commissioner Meyer—

1st. Recommending that a lease of the bulkhead at the foot of East Forty-seventh street be granted Owens & Co. for a term of three years from December 1, 1901, at an annual rental of \$750.

On motion the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto Owens & Company the bulkhead at the foot of East Forty-seventh street, East river, for a term of three years from December 1, 1901, at an annual rental of seven hundred and fifty dollars, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department, provided that said Owens & Company shall file in this Department, within ten days from receipt hereof, their written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in leases of wharf property used in this Department.

2d. Recommending, as Treasurer pro tem., that a lease of the bulkhead between Seventy-ninth and Eightieth streets, East river, be granted Nathaniel Wise for a term of ten years, from December 1, 1901, at the same rental as is now being paid by him.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto Nathaniel Wise the bulkhead platform between East Seventy-ninth and East Eightieth streets, East river, for a period of ten years from December 1, 1901, at an annual rental of seven hundred and fifty dollars, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department, provided that the said Nathaniel Wise shall file in this Department within ten days from receipt hereof his written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions at present embodied in leases of wharf property used in this Department.

3d. Reporting that, as Treasurer pro tem., he has arranged with James Hurley for furnishing the filling required in rear of the bulkhead between the north side of West Ninety-fifth street and a point about 101 feet south from the south side of West Ninety-fifth street, North river, the sum of \$700 to be paid to the Department for the privilege; and that he has also arranged with Thomas J. McManus for furnishing the required filling in rear of the bulkhead-wall between the north side of East Thirty-ninth street and the centre line of the block between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, East river, the sum of \$2,000 to be paid to the Department for the privilege. Actions approved.
