REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan,

Hon. JOHN F. AHEARN, President, Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir—Pursuant to section 1544 of the charter, I submit the following report of the operations of this Department for the quarter ended December 31, 1906:

The following contracts were entered into:

Seven for regulating and grading, estimated cost, \$59,821.05; five for sewers, estimated cost, \$35,800; one for flagging, estimated cost, \$5,403.60; fourteen special contracts, estimated cost, \$3,732.53; four for miscellaneous works, estimated cost, \$47,727. Total, thirty-one contracts entered into, estimated cost, \$152,484.18.

Contracts were completed as follows:

Twenty-six for paving and repaving, cost, \$586,242.20; five for regulating and grading, cost, \$193,029.29; fourteen for sewers and receiving basins, cost, \$65,739.31; seventeen for flagging, cost, \$6,173.17; two for miscellaneous works, cost, \$26,651.44. Total, sixty-four completed at an aggregate cost of \$877,835.40.

The following are the principal items of work done under regulating and grading contracts, and on extension of Riverside drive:

Seventy-five thousand three hundred and forty cubic yards earth excavated, 19,315 cubic yards rock excavated, 31,239 cubic yards filling furnished, 6,588 linear feet curbstones furnished and set, 37,707 square feet flagging furnished and laid, 21,598 cubic feet hammer dressed granite used, 74,300 pounds steel beams used, and 109,200 pounds steel girders used.

New pavements were laid as follows: Sheet asphalt, 3.82 linear miles; asphalt blocks, 1.79 miles; wood blocks, 2.25 miles; granite blocks, .55 of a mile; belgian blocks, .05 of a mile, making a total of 8.46 miles.

The working force took up and relaid about 71,746 square yards of stone block pavement.

The following permits were issued:

To construct vaults, 74; to repair vaults, 31; to place guy posts, 12; to place tar kettles on streets, 196; to place boilers on streets, 135; to place banner poles, 30; to repair pavement at the expense of applicants, 4.

The receipts for vault permits amounted to \$84,523.49.

Openings to lay and repair electric, gas, steam, water and sewer pipes were made as follows:

To lay and overhaul electric mains, 439; to lay and overhaul gas mains, 17; to lay and overhaul steam mains, 1; to lay and overhaul water pipes, 745; to lay and overhaul sewers, 52; to lay and repair electric services, 3,201; to lay and repair gas services, 2,668; to lay and repair steam services, 108; to lay and repair water services, 559; to lay and repair sewer services, 271; to construct and repair railways, 1,805, and for other purposes, 20, making a total of 9,886.

The report of the Division of Roads gives an account of the maintenance of ten miles of macadamized roads, and twelve miles of dirt roads in the upper section of the borough. This work comprises the regulating and grading of roadways, repairing gutters to facilitate drainage, and other necessary work.

Five thousand nine hundred and fifty linear feet of new sewers were laid during the quarter.

There are now in the Borough of Manhattan 513.77 miles of sewers, with 6,203 receiving basins.

Work is now in progress under seventeen sewer contracts.

One hundred and fifty-five permits were issued for new sewer connections, and 258 permits for repairs.

The Bureau of Incumbrances received and attended to 632 complaints of obstructions; made 137 seizures and removals of obstructions; issued 1,074 permits to place building material on streets; 100 permits to cross sidewalks with horses and carts; 65 permits to erect temporary sheds over sidewalks; also removed 240 loads of dirt, stone and rubbish, as well as 19 fallen trees, dangerous stumps, etc.

The report of the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices gives a full statement of the work done in repairing and maintaining public buildings and offices, and furnishing necessary supplies.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER LOOMIS.

January 10, 1907.

Hon. WILLIAM DALTON, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—In compliance with instructions, I hand you herewith a report of the work done and in course of construction under my supervision for the quarter ending December 31, 1906, with a statement of work done by mechanics and laborers.

The present total length of the sewerage system in the Borough of Manhattan is 2,715,646 linear feet, or 513.77 miles, with 6,203 receiving basins, making the amount completed of new sewer during the quarter 5,950 linear feet.

The following sewers have been completed during the quarter:

Sewer in Audubon avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-fifth and One Hundred and Sixty-sixth streets.

Sewer in Convent avenue, west side, between One Hundred and Fifty-first and One Hundred and Fifty-second streets.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Fortieth street, between Riverside drive and Broadway.

Sewer in Lexington avenue, west side, between One Hundred and Twenty-third and One Hundred and Twenty-fourth streets.

Extension of sewer in One Hundredth street, between Harlem river and First avenue.

Outlet sewer in Two Hundred and Sixteenth street, between Harlem river and Broadway.

Reconstruction of sewer in Cedar street, between West and Greenwich streets.

Extension of sewer in East Ninety-sixth street, between Second and Third avenues.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Fifty-second street, between Eighth avenue and Macomb's Dam road.

Sewer in West One Hundred and Seventy-second street, between Amsterdam and St. Nicholas avenues.

Sewer in Scammel street, between Madison and Henry streets.

Sewer in Ninth avenue, between Two Hundred and Fifteenth and Two Hundred and Sixteenth streets; and in Two Hundred and Fifteenth street, between Ninth avenue and Broadway.

Reconstruction of receiving basins in Broadway, east and west sides, between One Hundred and Fifty-sixth and One Hundred and Fifty-ninth streets.

There are now in active progress 17 contracts payable from Street Improvement Fund, amounting to \$194,399.90. There are also 3 reconstruction contracts now in progress, payable from appropriation Reconstruction of Sewers, Borough of Manhattan, amounting to \$37,881.68. A detailed statement of the above works appears in schedule annexed.

The following contracts are contemplated, and when the necessary preliminary works of surveys and preparing plans are made, they will be advertised at public letting:

Sewer in One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, between Broadway and Claremont avenue.

Sewer in One Hundred and Ninety-first street, between Wadsworth and St. Nicholas avenues.

Receiving basins, southeast corner of Broadway and One Hundred and Forty-fourth and One Hundred and Forty-fifth streets.

Extension of sewer at Seventy-fourth street and East river.

Receiving basin on southwest corner of Seventh avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street.

Extension of sewer in Sixty-first street, between Broadway and Central Park West.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Fourteenth street, between Tenth avenue and Harlem river.

Rebuilding of sewer in Twenty-sixth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

Rebuilding of sewer in Liberty street, Greenwich to West street.

Rebuilding of sewer in Liberty street, between Nassau street and Maiden lane.

Rebuilding of sewer in John street, Broadway to Pearl street.

Rebuilding of sewer in Cedar street, between Broadway and Nassau street.

Receiving basin, south side of Fourth street, near East river.

Receiving basin on northeast corner of Avenue A and Twenty-second street.

Restoring outlets at Nineteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets, at Hudson river.

Sewer in Seaman avenue, between Academy and Emerson streets.

Sewer in One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, between Fort Washington and Haven avenues.

Extension of sewer in One Hundred and Twentieth street and East river.

Sewer in Fairview avenue, between Eleventh avenue and Broadway.

Sewer in One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, between Audubon and St. Nicholas avenues.

Basin, southwest corner One Hundred and Twentieth street and St. Nicholas avenue.

Basin, northwest corner One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street and Lenox avenue.

Basin, south side One Hundred and Eighteenth street, between Lenox and Fifth avenues.

Extension of sewer in Ninety-seventh street, between Park and Madison avenues.

Sewer in One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, between Edgecombe and St. Nicholas avenues.

The following work will be let at public letting as soon as the contracts are approved:

Sewer in East Tenth street, between East river and Avenue D.

Sewer in One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, between Broadway and Claremont avenue.

Receiving basin on the southeast corner of One Hundred and Forty-fourth street and Broadway.

Receiving basin on the southeast corner of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street and Broadway.

The foregoing covers in a brief manner the work of the Bureau during the past quarter, and, as will be seen, it is scattered in various parts of the borough, from the extreme north end of the same to the southerly part of the island.

The new work, as has been stated in various annual and quarterly reports, is mostly in the upper district. Several sewers have been completed in that section and there are a number of contracts now in operation. Authorization to build quite a number of sewers in that section has been given by the Board of Apportionment and the work will be commenced in the early spring. Proposition to close Two Hundred and Eighteenth street, between Broadway and Ninth avenue, and other streets in that vicinity, is now pending. Should this be decided upon, material alteration of the general plan of sewerage in that section will have to be made.

In the lower section of the borough work is now in progress for outlets at Twenty-first and Twenty-third streets and Hudson river. Plans are also being prepared for the drainage of the whole section, from Fourteenth street north, known as the Chelsea section. All these works are provided for by appropriation, since the Dock Department, in order to carry out their improvements, destroyed all the outlets then existing and the new ones for that reason are not assessable.

The Bureau has great difficulty in all work in the lower section of the borough on account of the terribly congested condition of underground works. The construction of rapid transit railroads, both on the north and south lines, and also several crossing the same, running east and west, have introduced so many changes into the sewer system that it is now becoming considerably complicated. Many other lines are projected and it is plain to me that the temporizing policy so far pursued, meaning simply the removal out of the way of these structures of the lines of sewers, should not be further followed. In a separate report and in my annual I intend to treat this matter more fully.

Sewer Permits.

One hundred and fifty-five permits issued for new connections and 258 permits issued for repairs.

Engineers' Fees.

Amount of Engineers' fees assessed on property benefited and charged to Street Improvement Fund was \$3,816.27.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

Hon. WILLIAM DALTON, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—In accordance with our instructions I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending December 31, 1906.

Hall of Records Building.

Cleaning supplies were furnished as required during the quarter to keep the building in good condition. Supplies were also furnished for use of the Engineering Department, consisting of oil, waste, etc. The work of removing the Finance Department, Department of Taxes and Assessments, Register's office, Surrogates' Court and the Corporation Counsel's office was continued. Two wardrobes, eighteen coir mats, two dozen baskets, ninety-six chairs, four additional wardrobes and small supplies for cleaning snow were delivered. The elevator gates were repaired and adjusted, also the locks of same. Bumpers were put on back of the gates and bars and window bars cut out. The piston and valves of elevators Nos. 3 and 4, were repacked, and the operating rope replaced on sheaves, the operating wheel and sheave pin of No. 1 elevator were renewed. The stuffing boxes repacked, the governor rope repaired, the governor spring renewed, one set of tilting sheaves renewed, keys of operating device renewed and the operating rope of No. 2 elevator adjusted. Additions were made to platform of the judges bench in the Surrogates' Court on the fifth floor under the directions of the architects, also for the use of the Corporation Counsel in the transportation of papers, books and documents two small dumb waiters were installed connecting the sixth, seventh and eighth floors. Thirty-four new cupboards for pedestals and roll top desk were furnished and made for the Department of Taxes and Assessments. The swing of the doors on thirty-four cupboards was changed, and seventeen mahogany bases for electric fixtures on tops of desks were furnished; also three mahogany map cases made and furnished. Galvanized iron drip pans were made and installed on the six elevators in the above building. Changes were made in telephone outlets of a slight nature to suit the requirements of the occupants of the building. An electric push button was installed on the sixth floor for elevator No. 5. A system of night bells for the elevators with push buttons for same was installed. A quantity of wooden boxes were furnished and used for the transportation of the books and records of the several Departments moved to this building.

Criminal Courts Building.

Cleaning supplies for the Janitor, consisting of soap powder, dusters, brooms, etc., and Engineer's supplies of oils, waste, tools, etc., were furnished for the proper care of the building during the quarter. Orders were issued as usual for the care of the plumbing system, also the gas and steam plants during the quarter.

Coroners' Office—Walls, ceilings and woodwork in the offices of Coroners Shady and Dooley, and the private halls were cleaned off, prepared and painted with four coats of oil paint.

Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions—The walls and ceilings of two rooms were cleaned off, prepared and painted, and the woodwork cleaned and varnished. The damaged portions in the corridor of these offices on the second mezzanine floor, one on the northwest, and the other on the southwest corner of the building were painted.

Clerk of the Court of General Sessions—The following office furniture was delivered for the equipment of this office. One golden oak 10 foot single standing desk, one golden oak 5 foot single standing desk, one golden oak 8 foot single standing desk, one golden oak 7 foot 6 inch single standing desk, one golden oak 8 foot double standing desk, one golden oak 10 foot double standing desk, eight golden oak high revolving chairs, one golden oak roll top desk, 6 foot; one golden oak roll top desk, 5 foot 6 inches, one revolving chair and one typewriter desk were furnished.

Judge Foster's Chambers—One quartered oak flat top desk was furnished.

Judge Rosalsky's Chambers—Bookcases were rearranged and altered, and one glass top furnished for desk.

District Attorney's Office—Four window ventilators were furnished and installed.

Record Room, Court of General Sessions—The ceilings were cleaned off, prepared and painted with four coats of oil paint. The railing running around balcony was painted with aluminum paint. About 41 yards of inlaid linoleum were furnished and laid in Coroner Shady's office.

County Court House.

Small supplies for cleaning purposes, including oils, dusters, soap, etc., were furnished for the use of the Janitor and Engineer. A supply of mineral water was also furnished for the Judge's Chambers. Contract for the electric lighting system has been completed, and the electric current is now in use for lighting the building. Extensive alterations were commenced during the latter part of December to equip the new offices and court rooms required for the accommodation of the additional Justices elected to the Supreme Court. Fifty thousand dollars were appropriated for this purpose, and contracts let for carpentry work, mason work, marble work and plumbing and steam fitting, also electrical work. The following painting work was also performed; the stone work in the rooms formerly occupied by the Surrogate on the first floor was cleaned off, prepared and painted with three coats of oil paint, and the radiators bronzed. The same work was done in rooms 2, 3 and 4, also in the new court room made in the southeast corner of the building, and the new court room adjoining same. Five 4-gas and 4-electric chandeliers and two 6-light chandeliers similar in design to those installed under contract were furnished for the new court room. Two desk standards, two portables and two rail standards were installed in three of the court rooms, conforming in design to those now in use. Ten fixtures were altered, rewired and reset in the new court room. About 325 feet of wire mesh brass railing, with all necessary hardware, locks, gates, etc., complete was furnished and erected in the new court rooms, together with four roll top desks and chairs for Part I, Special Term; one clock for the Judges library, one oak cabinet for use of the Supreme Court, forty dozen Vienna chairs for the new court rooms, together with a large supply of office furniture for equipment of the new court rooms, including carpets and linoleum were furnished, the detail of which will be given in the next quarterly report.

City Hall.

Small supplies of oil, cotton waste and cleaning supplies for Janitor and Engineer were furnished.

Brown Stone Building.

A supply of oil for the Engineer and cleaning supplies were furnished for the Janitor.

West Fifty-fourth Street Court House.

Cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished.

Harlem Court House.

Small quantities of Engineer's and Janitor's supplies were furnished.

East Fifty-seventh Street Court House.

Small quantities of Engineer's and Janitor's supplies were furnished.

Jefferson Market Court House.

Small quantities of Engineer's and Janitor's supplies were furnished.

Essex Market Court House.

Necessary supplies for janitor and engineer were furnished.

First District Municipal Court.

Necessary supplies were furnished for janitor and engineer.

Public Baths.

Rivington Street—Cleaning and engineer's supplies were furnished in small quantities.

A survey was furnished for proposed public bath at Nos. 5 and 7 Rutgers place. Allen Street—Engine oil and waste were furnished for use of engineer, and a small quantity of cleaning supplies.

East Eleventh Street—A 4-inch water meter with all street connections, gate valves, etc., complete, was furnished and installed, together with all piping required to give sufficient water pressure for the operation of showers on the upper floor. Two double-action shaking grates, cast from improved heavy pattern material, were furnished and installed under the boiler, so as to permit the burning of pea size coal instead of egg. This will result in large economy in the coal consumption for this building, because of the burning of a cheaper size coal.

West Forty-first Street Bath—The exposed water and steam pipes were covered with tar paper, felt and canvas and asbestos covering to protect the pipes from freezing. Small supplies were furnished for cleaning and for the engineer, as required.

New blow-off pipes from the boilers and tank were installed; also new steam pipes to hot water heaters and water columns. Repairs were made to steam leaks in boiler room and on the main steam line. New asbestos blow-off cocks, etc., were put in, together with new piping, elbowing, valves and other materials required.

West Sixtieth Street Bath—Small supplies for the engineer and for the janitor for maintaining the building were furnished as required, together with two barrels of alum to clear the plunge. One 3/4-inch trident water meter was installed on main. The cellar drainer was removed, and a street washer installed on sidewalk. The main house drain and sewer was cleared and back pressure valve and overflows from plunge installed. The Croton supply pipes to feed pumps were altered, and a gas lighting system and all piping and fixtures for the boiler and storage room in the basement were installed. The hose ends to stop sink faucets were altered.

East Seventy-sixth Street Bath—Small quantities of cleaning and engineer's supplies were furnished as usual. The steam plant was thoroughly examined and all repairs made to place same in good working order. Injectors were connected to house drain, new blow-off cocks were installed where required; alterations were made to the piping to make them work satisfactorily; test cocks were placed at water column, and marble slabs that obstructed the reading of the gauges were removed and placed in a new position. The hot water heater was removed, and the indirect heating coils and flanges were placed in working order. New gas fixtures were installed, together with all piping for a gas lighting system in the basement, and repairs made to the plumbing fixtures where required.

East One Hundred and Ninth Street—Small quantities of engineer's and cleaning supplies were furnished as usual. New parts were furnished for the Clow water heaters where required; the oil lubricator connected, and the engine placed in good working order, and all piping, unions, globe valves, packing, etc., required were furnished. Two circular grates arranged so that the front and back can be dumped as desired were furnished and installed under boiler. Cast iron registers were installed, and all masonry work connected with the work was done. This work was necessary to properly ventilate the engine room.

Free Floating Baths.

All necessary tugs, labor, rigging, etc., required to tow the baths to their winter quarters in the Erie Basin were furnished. The baths are all in good condition, and have been constantly cared for during the winter season. No accidents of any nature have been reported.

The Markets.

Small supplies for cleaning were furnished, as required, to all of the markets.

Fulton—The defective sheets of corrugated iron on the awnings on the Fulton street side were taken out and replaced with new material and the same painted with metallic paint. The leaders on the Beekman street side were connected by drainage to the sewer; all piping, bends and traps for same furnished. The old flooring and sleepers were taken up and replaced with new material at the following stands: Nos. 66, 68, 70, 9, 11, 13, 12, 14, 16, 227, 228, 18, 226, 230 to 234, 171, 175 and 54. The side walls of stand No. 20 were repaired. New floors were laid in Mullin's Restaurant on the South street side of market. New floors were laid and the side partitions that were in a dangerous condition were braced at stands 52 to 55 and 54.

Jefferson Market Court House—Fourteen radiators, of various dimensions, were furnished and installed in the Police Sergeant's room, passageway to prison pens, Judges' private room, examination room, janitor's room and ladies' toilet. All necessary connections and valves for same were furnished.

West Fifty-fourth Street Court House—The pistons operating the relief valves of the elevators in the above building were repacked. The traveling and sheave straps and the main and operating cables were examined, and 12 rubber stop-alls were furnished for same.

Twelfth District Municipal Court.

Thirty-six sectional bookcases with tops and bases were furnished and set in the above court.

Department of Finance.

About 51 yards of inlaid linoleum were furnished and laid in Room 141. One hat tree and one book rack for the Contract Clerk, two chairs for Room 1 and one glass top for Mr. Loser's desk were furnished. The following furniture was furnished for the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics: Five golden oak roll-top desks; five revolving chairs for same; two golden oak roll-top desks, 5 feet; two golden oak flat-top desks; two golden oak revolving chairs for same; four golden oak revolving chairs; one golden oak revolving bookcase; forty-eight golden oak bent-wood chairs; one golden oak roll-top desk; five golden oak revolving chairs; one hanging cabinet.

City Paymaster's Office.

Three window ventilators were furnished and installed on the Reade street side, second floor.

Receiver of Taxes.

All the carpenter work incidental to enlarging the office about 4 feet was performed, the entrance moved and new yellow pine flooring laid.

Bureau of Highways.

One chair for Room 1603 was furnished.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

Janitor's and engineer's supplies for cleaning were furnished as required from the store room and distributed to the various public buildings and offices. The order for the use of horse, wagon and driver for the Superintendent was renewed each month, and all the window cleaning done in the various public buildings during the quarter under contract. The following supplies were distributed as needed: Coal and wood for heating, ice, brooms, pails, soap, soap powder, waste paper baskets, sapolio, sponges, mop handles, feather dusters, scrubbing brushes, ash cans, etc. Among the many items of repair made to the various courts and offices not hereinbefore mentioned are plumbing, steamfitting, carpentering, roofing, plastering, mason work, painting, electrical work, repairs to safes, repairs to machinery, elevators and office furniture. The work mentioned was done under monthly orders as required. For the use of the mechanics in the employ of the Bureau supplies of lumber, hardware, paints, varnish, etc., were furnished.

From the Comptroller—

1 (71037). Requesting this Department to forward the bond furnished by the Sicilian Asphalt Paving Company for maintaining the asphalt on the deck of Pier 56, North river, under Contract No. 996. Bond sent as requested.

The matter of letting agreement for making experimental tunnels into the rock along the proposed Catskill Aqueduct, on the western slope of the Shawangunk Mountains, near High Falls, N. Y., was taken from the table; and on motion it was

- Item 8. For timber measured in place in tunnels, \$60 per 1,000 feet, B. M.
- Item 9. For each 100 pounds of dynamite used, \$22.

Commissioner Chadwick reported that, in answer to his letter to the Corporation Counsel dated February 18, in regard to publishing notices in reference to real estate, etc., the following reply was received:

"New York, February 20, 1907.

"Board of Water Supply:

"Gentlemen—I have received a letter from Commissioner Chadwick, dated February 18, 1907, in regard to the proposed notice to be published widely that the Board of Water Supply will agree with owners of and persons interested in any real estate laid down on maps for the acquiring of property for the construction of the Catskill Aqueduct and Reservoirs as to the compensation to be paid. The form of notice was inclosed. You request advice as to the advertising and publishing of this notice.

"I have made a few changes, as indicated, on the face of the notice. They do not, however, alter the general character of the notice.

"I inclose the draft forwarded and a copy with the changes incorporated, which I have approved as to form.

"The extent and manner of publishing this notice are questions that you can answer as well as any one. The only suggestion that I have to make is that it should be quite widely advertised by publication in newspapers and by sending copies to owners of the land, so far as they are known, and also, perhaps, by posting in the vicinity of the property which it is proposed to acquire.

On motion the matter of advertising the following notice was referred to Commissioner Chadwick, with power to have same advertised in such newspapers and in such manner as he deems advisable:

To Whom It May Concern.

The Board of Water Supply of the City of New York, under the provisions of chapter 724 of the Laws of 1905, as amended, hereby gives notice that it is prepared, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, to agree with owners of and persons interested in any real estate laid down on maps for the acquiring of property for the construction of the Catskill Aqueduct and Reservoirs, as to the amount of compensation to be paid to such owners or persons interested for taking or using and occupying such real estate.

The purpose of this notice is to inform parties interested that the Board of Water Supply is prepared to treat justly and fairly with every one who has a right which is affected by the occupation of his property in the construction of the aqueduct and reservoirs.

The Board of Water Supply sees no reason why agreements may not be reached in many cases through friendly negotiations. Only in the event of a failure to reach an agreement need an owner place his claim in the hands of a lawyer, and he should be a lawyer of standing and reputation.

Before property is to be taken maps will be prepared by the Engineering Department, after final surveys have been made. These maps will be submitted by the Board of Water Supply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval and by

that Board transmitted to the Corporation Counsel, who will file copies of these maps in the Register's or County Clerk's offices in the various counties where the land is situated. Notice of the taking of property will be advertised in the newspapers, and copies of such notice, in the form of hand bills, will be posted in conspicuous places on the line of the aqueduct or in the vicinity of the real estate so to be taken or affected.

The interest of the City and that of the owners of property affected, so far as the desirability of reaching an agreement is concerned, is identical. If a settlement is made the City will save the expense of condemnation proceedings and the owners will avoid delay and perhaps dissatisfaction resulting from an award which they may think too small. It is the purpose of the City to settle on a cash basis, if an agreement is promptly reached. In the event of no agreement, the compensation will have to be determined through the Commissioners of Appraisal by condemnation proceedings, in which event the matter will pass entirely beyond the control of the owner, with delay and uncertainty as to the amount of compensation and the time when the money will be paid.

The Board of Water Supply is prepared to receive all applications for settlement by agreement, at its office, No. 299 Broadway, New York City. These applications should be in writing and accompanied by such details as will enable the Board to identify the property and to form some impression as to the advisability of a settlement.

THE CITY OF NEW YORK (HEREIN after called the City) acting by its Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners (hereinafter called the Board) contemplates building a certain Rapid Transit Railroad, known as Route No. 9, in Centre street (Manhattan) and other streets in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, including ultimately Delancey street, Grand street, Desbrosses street, Canal street and William street in Manhattan, and Fulton street, Lafayette avenue and Broadway in Brooklyn.

By this advertisement, the City invites proposals to construct that part of said Railroad which is situated in Centre street between Pearl street and Canal street, and in Walker street and Canal street between Centre street and Chrystie street, in accordance with the detailed plans and specifications adopted therefor.

The general plan of construction calls for a subsurface railroad. There will be four tracks in Centre street and two tracks in Walker street and Canal street, and provisions for spurs turning west into Canal street.

A station between Leonard and White streets will be constructed, and suitable cross-overs, turn-outs and sidings are also to be provided, all as shown in the detailed plans of construction. The price stated for railroad construction is to include the furnishing of all materials and the performance of all labor requisite to the complete construction of that part of the pro-

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
