No. 851.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 144.

City of New York—Office of the Mayor, }
July 26, 1904. }

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, without my approval, substitute ordinance passed June 28, 1904, entitled:

"An ordinance to amend section 105 of the Building Code, relative to fireproofing buildings."

The grounds upon which I base my failure to approve this ordinance are as follows:

First—So far as it affects windows which are over 150 feet above the ground, this ordinance instead of increasing the safety of the general public, actually has the effect of lessening such safety, for it enables the use of metal to be discontinued and fireproof wood (an admittedly inferior preventative of fire) to be substituted in place of the same.

Second—I am advised by a great many builders that the ability to furnish sufficient fireproofed wood is so slight that the building operations of the whole City could be very much embarrassed, if not absolutely held up, by the few fireproofing firms that have a monopoly of the patents.

Third—I am of the opinion that in a technical matter of this character I ought, as a question of expediency, to be influenced largely by the opinion of the City Departments concerned, and the Building Departments of Manhattan and Brooklyn represent to me that this ordinance is inexpedient and unwise, and should not be approved.

Fourth—I am advised by the Board of Fire Underwriters that this ordinance does not, in their opinion, have the effect of increasing the safety from fire of buildings in this City, and also that, in their opinion, it should not be approved.

The Committee on Buildings, to whom was committed on May 17, 1904 (Minutes, page 341), the annexed ordinance in relation to the height of buildings, with instructions to report it out within two weeks, as an amendment to the Building Code, respectfully

REPORT:

The annexed substitute ordinance for adoption.

(SUBSTITUTE.)

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 105 of the Building Code, relative to fireproofing buildings.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: That section 105 of the Building Code of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 105—Fireproof Buildings. Every building hereafter erected or altered to be used as a theatre, hotel, lodging house, school (theatre), jail, police station, hospital, asylum, institution for the (care) use or treatment of persons, the height of which exceeds thirty-five feet, excepting all buildings for which specifications and plans have been heretofore submitted to and approved by the (Department of Buildings) proper public authorities, and every other building the height of which exceeds seventy-five feet (, except as herein otherwise provided,) shall be built fireproof; that is to say (,) (they) They shall be constructed with walls of brick, stone, Portland cement, concrete, iron or steel, in which wooden beams or lintels shall not be placed (, and in which the floors and roofs shall be of materials provided for in section 106 of this Code). The stairs and staircase landings shall be built entirely of brick, stone, Portland cement, concrete, iron or steel. No wood work or other inflammable material shall be used in any of the partitions, furrings or ceilings in any such (fireproof) buildings, excepting, however, (that when the height of the building does not exceed twelve stories nor more than one hundred and fifty feet) the doors and windows and their frames (, the) and trims, the casings, the interior finish when filled solid at the back with fireproof material, and the floor boards and sleepers directly thereunder, may be of wood (, but the space between the sleepers shall be solidly filled with fireproof materials and extend up to the under side of the floor boards. When the height of a fireproof building exceeds twelve stories, or more than one hundred and fifty feet, the floor surfaces shall be of stone, cement, rock, asphalt, tiling or similar incombustible material, or the sleepers and floors may be of wood) treated by some process approved by the Board of Buildings, or other public authorities now having jurisdiction in such matters, to render the same fireproof (, All outside window frames and sash shall be of metal) or of wood covered with metal, but the space between the sleepers shall be solidly filled with fireproof materials and extend up to the under side of the floor boards. (The inside window frames and sash, doors, trim and other interior finish may be of wood covered with metal, or of wood treated by some process approved by the Board of Buildings, to render the same fireproof.)

All hall partitions or permanent partitions between rooms in fireproof buildings shall be built of fireproof material and shall not be started on wood sills, nor on wood floor boards, but be built upon the fireproof construction of the floor and extend to the fireproof beam filling above. The tops of all door and window openings in such partitions shall be at least twelve inches below the ceiling line.

REPORT:

They therefore recommend that the said ordinance be adopted.

ORIGINAL.

AN ORDINANCE relative to fireproofing buildings.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Every building hereafter erected or altered to be used as a theatre, hotel, lodging house, school, jail, police station, hospital, asylum, institution, for the use or treatment of persons, the height of which exceeds thirty-five feet, excepting all buildings for which specifications and plans have been heretofore submitted to and approved by the proper public authorities, and every other building the height of which exceeds seventy-five feet shall be built fireproof, that is to say: They shall be constructed with walls of brick stone, Portland cement, concrete, iron or steel, in which wooden beams or lintels shall not be placed. The stairs and staircase landing shall be built entirely of brick stone, Portland cement, concrete, iron or steel. No wood-work or other inflammable material shall be used in any of the partitions, furrings or ceilings in any such buildings, excepting, however, the doors and windows and their frames and trims, the casings, the interior finish when filled solid at the back with fireproof material, and the floor boards and sleepers directly thereunder may be of wood treated by some process approved by the Board of Buildings or other public authorities, now having jurisdiction in such matters, to render the same fireproof or of wood covered with metal, but the space between the sleepers shall be solidly filled with fireproof materials and extend up to the underside of the floor boards.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor, with resolution:

No. 852.
City of New York—Office of the Mayor, }
July 25, 1904. }

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I take this occasion to call your attention to the subject of grade crossings, and more particularly to the grade crossing of Broadway, near Van Cortlandt Station in Van Cortlandt Park, in the Borough of The Bronx. This grade crossing, which is a very dangerous one, can now be abolished at small expense to the City if your honorable Board is willing to join with me in the action which I am about to recommend.

The simplest way to accomplish this very desirable change seems to be to apply to the Board of Railroad Commissioners, under section 62 of the Railroad Law. That application must be made by a joint petition of the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen to the Board of Railroad Commissioners. I am prepared to sign such a petition, and respectfully urge upon your honorable Board that you adopt a resolution signifying your willingness to join therein. I inclose herewith a form of resolution which might be used for that purpose.

This matter is of special urgency, and accordingly I request that your Board waive the usual formalities for the consideration of such propositions, and act upon it at once.

Much has been done in recent years to eliminate grade-crossings in the State of New York and in neighboring States. Much has also been done in the same direction in The City of New York, and at the present time costly improvements having this object in view are under way or about to be begun. This is particularly the case in the boroughs of The Bronx and Brooklyn. When this work has been completed there will be, if I am not mistaken, no grade-crossings on the routes followed by trains leaving the Forty-second Street Station, except perhaps one or two little used in the vicinity of Spuyten Duyvil.

The work of eliminating the principal grade-crossings near Kingsbridge is about to be begun.

Since the inception of this administration, careful consideration has been given to the question of the abolition of graded crossings in this City. To a great extent the work must be gradually accomplished, but in a city of the size and importance of New York the problem should be speedily solved and a comprehensive plan should be determined upon. Many of the railroads entering the City constructed their roads before the outlying sections, which now form a part of the City, had been incorporated in it, and when, as a matter of fact, they were open country. Even yet, provision has not been made for the laying out of all the roads which may be necessary in these sections, and which will transect the lines for the present railroads, but a plan such as I have suggested should be established and thus provide for any changes which might occur in the future development of the City. When such general plans are matured, I shall have occasion to lay the matter before you.

Whereas, The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company is the lessee of, and engaged in the operation of a steam surface railroad for public use, known as the New York and Putnam Railroad, extending from One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, in The City of New York, northerly, to and beyond the limits of The City of New York; and

Whereas, The said railroad now crosses at grade a public street or highway known as Broadway, near its junction with Van Cortlandt avenue, at or near a place known as Van Cortlandt Station; and

Whereas, The said grade crossing is dangerous to the public safety, which requires that said grade crossing be eliminated, and that Broadway be carried underneath the tracks of the said railroad in the manner indicated upon a blue print or map attached hereto; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen join with the Mayor in a petition to the Board of Railroad Commissioners to the effect that public safety requires an alteration in the manner of said crossing; and as indicated on the map or blue print hereto attached; and it is

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is requested to prepare a proper petition to the Board of Railroad Commissioners, under section 62 of the Railroad Law, and that the Clerk of this Board be and he hereby is directed to attach a certified copy of this resolution to the said petition and to also sign the said petition on behalf of this Board.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 853—(G. O. No. 86).
City of New York—Office of the Mayor, }
July 25, 1904. }

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I thank you for your report on the question which I submitted recently for your decision, namely, whether or not it was the wish of the people of The City of New York that the Governor of the State should be requested to convene the Legislature in extra session in order to consider the repeal or modification of a certain measure recently passed, by which New York City is excluded from taking by condemnation, sources for its water supply in Dutchess County. In accordance with your suggestion I shall not ask for such extra session.

I thank your Board for the recommendations, which appear to you incidental to the question submitted, and which you have made to me in your report, and desire at this time to emphasize again certain of the purposes which I had in view in presenting this matter to you. One purpose was the direction of attention to the general question of water supply, so that public support might be given to any project in that direction which it might be advisable to undertake, and the other the allaying of the apprehensions of the residents of other sections of the State as to the intentions of the City, so that they might have the assurance that in enlarging the City's water supply there would exist neither desire, nor intention, to do any injustice to them.

I am convinced that it is absolutely necessary that New York City should be unrestrained in securing any available source of water, and especially should be free to enter Dutchess County for that purpose.

Our City has grown in the last twenty-five years at a rate which has not been paralleled by the history of any city, and there seems to be every assurance that within the next twenty-five or fifty years this rate of enlargement of territory and increase of population will continue, so that New York City will be a municipality larger than any that has ever existed in the history of the world. If this be true, there is no section of the State accessible to New York City from which we can afford to be excluded, and for that reason I dissent from your suggestion that Dutchess County is not now needed in the plan.

The Burr Commission has outlined an elaborate plan to supplement the present water system, and this plan involves the taking of water from streams in Dutchess County. For the time being it will not be feasible to progress in the work along the lines suggested by the Burr Commission, but it is my intention to inaugurate proceedings before the next Legislature, with a view to securing to the City the return of the right to avail itself of the waters of Dutchess County, and immediately thereafter to take up the consideration of the suggestions made by this Commission. But whether it shall appear wise to adopt this report or some of the other systems proposed, the necessity for access to the waters of Dutchess County remains as imperative as ever.

In thanking you for the consideration which has been given to this matter, I feel it incumbent upon me, on behalf of the City, to thank also the many public-spirited bodies and citizens who have given their time and attention, and who have appeared before you, or before me, to aid in the solution of the difficulties of this question.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—In view of the insufficiency of the school accommodations now existing in this City in respect not only to sites, but also to recreation centres, vacation schools and playgrounds, the equipment of kindergartens, cooking schools, workshops, lighting facilities, etc., I have the honor to call your attention to certain communications heretofore received by you and now in charge of your Committee on Finance, and request that the same be reported out and passed at the next meeting of your Honorable Body. The communications are these:

1. Resolution passed by the Board of Estimate authorizing the issue of Corporate Stock for \$5,000,000 for the purpose of improving sites owned by the Board of Education, said resolution having been received by the Board of Aldermen June 28, 1904.

2. Communication from the Board of Estimate recommending the issue of Special Revenue Bonds for \$140,000 in order to provide proper lighting facilities for schools, said communication having been received by the Board of Aldermen May 3, 1904.

3. Special Order No. 21, being resolution calling for the authorization of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$316,343.72 for recreation centres, vacation schools and playgrounds, equipment of kindergartens, cooking schools, workshops, etc., said resolution appearing in the minutes of the Board of Aldermen of July 5, 1904, and being a substitute for resolution received from the Board of Estimate, under date of May 3, 1904, for \$381,342.72.

The very apparent necessity of doing all in our power to remedy the school situation with which we are now confronted makes it unnecessary for me to impress upon you further the obligation which we are all under of putting at the disposition of the Board of Education the funds represented by these several proposed appropriations.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, N. Y.:

Dear Sir—On behalf of this organization I would most respectfully urge your Honorable Board to act favorably, at its next meeting, upon the application of the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company.

All through the Borough of The Bronx the demand for small houses and apartments exceeds the supply. Along the line of the extension of the City's Rapid Transit system on Westchester avenue and the Southern Boulevard to Bronx Park a remarkable building development is progressing, and this is in anticipation of the operation of the road, which will not commence running until September. From this it is easy to foresee the development which would follow the commencing of construction of the New York and Port Chester Railroad; and, as this road will develop a part of New York City and increase its taxable values, it ought especially to appeal to the New York Board of Aldermen. A failure to act will develop New Jersey and Long Island at the expense of New York City, for New York's increase of population must have homes.

We have endeavored to demonstrate to your satisfaction by convincing arguments at the numerous hearings, the emphatic public sentiment of our borough in support of what we ask and the urgency of the demand for additional transit facilities.

The fact that the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad Company now proposes to end its line at One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street instead of continuing to the Harlem river is the most convincing reason yet furnished, why that road should not be given the franchise it seeks, and why the New York and Port Chester Railroad, which unequivocally agrees to build to the Harlem, should be granted the right to do so. The section between the Harlem river and One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street is especially in need of transit facilities.

Trusting that your Board will recognize the wisdom of granting the relief asked for, I am

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on June 24, two communications were presented by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, one dated June 14, 1904, requesting the Board to provide under the provisions of chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, for the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$10,000, to permit him to complete sewerage plans; the other communication was dated June 16, 1904, and asked that the Board, under the same act, provide the sum of \$180,250 for topographical work in the Borough of The Bronx. Inasmuch as the preparation of sewerage plans is really topographical work, the two communications will be considered together. Accompanying the letter asking for an increased appropriation for topographical work there is a detailed statement showing that of this sum \$44,000 is required for surveying, laying out and street opening, \$109,950 for monumenting streets, and \$32,300 for completing the drainage plans of the Chester District and amending those of the Morrisania District. It will be seen, therefore, that the estimate for topographical work included that for making new drainage plans.

The appropriations made for the different boroughs for topographical work during the last three years are indicated by the following statement:

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment has recently made additional allowances to the boroughs of Queens and Richmond, so that their appropriations for the present year are, respectively, \$164,852.50 and \$124,980, both of which are greater than that allowed the Borough of The Bronx, although for years the last-named borough has received an allowance far greater than that of any other borough included in The City of New York.

In response to a request for more specific information as to the present balance in the appropriation and how the additional money would be expended, I am advised by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx that, owing to a number of increases in salaries, which have already been made, and which it will be necessary to make in order to prevent their men going to other boroughs, the appropriation now available is not sufficient to carry them through the year. The Sewer Bureau estimates that, on the basis of the present pay-roll, there will be a deficit at the end of the present year of about \$18,000, while an additional force is asked for at an estimated cost of \$8,000, so that some \$26,000 is said to be needed for the preparation of drainage plans. The estimated amount for topographical work, which is apparently, although not so stated, intended to be in addition to that which the present appropriation will allow, is divided as follows:

The Chief Engineer of the Borough estimated that one-half of this amount, or \$43,375, could be profitably expended this year.

It will be noticed that a very large increase in the present force is provided for, that several thousand monuments are to be purchased and set, and that it is desired to expend nearly \$10,000 for lithographed maps and almost a like amount for triangulation towers. It is expected that these towers will be occupied by the force now at work on the triangulation of the greater City, under the direction of this office. The

Chief Engineer of the Borough in his estimate has cut this in two, although he believes that the entire amount asked for the preparation of drainage plans is required, his total estimate being \$63,390.63.

It is true that the Borough of The Bronx has had very large appropriations in previous years for topographical work, although the end seems to be now in sight, while the liberal appropriations recently allowed the boroughs of Queens and Richmond will provide only for a beginning of such work in these boroughs. The President of the Borough of The Bronx has his general map prepared, and it will be advantageous to have the details completed as soon as possible, and I think that an additional allowance of \$50,000 could undoubtedly be used to advantage, and it is recommended that an issue of Corporate Stock for this amount be authorized.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—In the accompanying communication, dated June 28, 1904, the Commissioner of Bridges asks the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve of his plan for the removal of the present bridge over the Harlem River Ship Canal on the line of Broadway to the site of the proposed Fordham Heights Bridge connecting West Two Hundred and Seventh street, in the Borough of Manhattan, with East Two Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, and to authorize him to enter into a contract with Mr. John B. McDonald for the removal of the said Harlem River Ship Canal Bridge from its present position, and for its re-erection at the site of the Fordham Heights Bridge, for the sum of \$80,000.

Mr. McDonald's contract for the construction of the Rapid Transit Railroad includes the substitution of a new bridge for the present Ship Canal Bridge, the new structure to carry the tracks of the elevated portion of the Rapid Transit Railroad, the present bridge becoming the property of the contractor. Negotiations for the purchase of the old bridge from Mr. McDonald and its re-erection at Fordham Heights have been in progress for some time, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held on July 29, 1903, approved of the plan for building the Fordham Heights Bridge, and authorized an issue of \$250,000 of Corporate Stock for this purpose. This plan contemplated the removal of the Ship Canal Bridge, and its use as a part of the new bridge, and the pivot pier to support it now under construction.

The Harlem River Ship Canal Bridge was completed in 1895, at a cost of \$119,600. The new bridge which will be erected in its place will be wider and more substantial, and the New York City Railway Company and the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company are both contributing toward the increased cost of the new structure, the former in order that it may be so strengthened as to carry its tracks, and the latter on account of the lengthening of the northerly span to permit of the change in its lines at Kingsbridge. The present proposition to purchase this bridge for the sum of \$80,000, which includes its re-erection on the new site, is a much more favorable one than was first made by Mr. McDonald, and I am convinced that the City will acquire a new bridge on terms which it will be advantageous to accept.

It is therefore recommended that the resolution submitted by the Commissioner of Bridges, with this letter, which approves of the removal of the bridge, and which authorizes him to make a contract with Mr. McDonald, be approved, and that the issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$80,000 be authorized for this purpose.

Gentlemen—In order to carry the tracks provided for by the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission over the Harlem River Ship Canal it is necessary to rebuild the bridge now existing over this canal in line with the Kingsbridge road, and plans have been prepared by the Engineers of the Rapid Transit Commission for this structure. This will do away with the existing bridge over the Ship Canal at that point, and under the contract with the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company that bridge becomes the property of the contractor. The bridge is a modern bridge of recent construction and is in very good condition.

This Department is now building a bridge from West Two Hundred and Seventh street in the Borough of Manhattan to East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street in the Borough of The Bronx, known as the Fordham Heights Bridge, the pivot pier of which is now nearly completed.

In order to save some money for the City it is proposed to utilize the span to be removed from the Ship Canal to the site at Fordham Heights. A mutual understanding to this effect has been reached between the Rapid Transit Commission, the Subway Construction Company, and this Department, providing for this transfer and the erection of the old bridge at the new site; and the resolutions herewith presented, for which I ask your favorable consideration, have been drawn to cover the case.

The effect of the adoption of these resolutions will be to secure two excellent bridges at both the sites named, and a material saving to the City in both time and money.

Dear Sir—I beg to report that I have made a comprehensive investigation of the condition of the brownstone building in order to ascertain the work necessary to place the building in a sanitary condition, as recommended in the report of the Department of Health herewith attached, dated May 31, 1904; and also to determine what repairs and alterations would be required to place the building in proper shape.

The building has not received any painting in years; the walls and ceilings are dirty, and the whole building needs painting, including the Court-rooms and corridors. The mason-work outside is actually in a dangerous condition, and should receive immediate attention. The plumbing system is old and antiquated, and when it was tested it was found to be defective in every respect.

I would respectfully recommend that the system be removed and replaced with an entire new system of plumbing.

The following is a detailed estimate of the amounts required to do the necessary repairs to the building:

At a meeting of the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York, held July 20, 1904, the following preambles and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, It is necessary for the Department of Health to convey patients affected with contagious diseases from the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond to Riverside Hospital on North Brother Island, belonging to the Department of Health, by water; and

Whereas, The necessities of this service require a special steamboat or steamboats so constructed that cases of contagious disease may be segregated, in order that the patients affected with the various forms of such diseases will not come in contact with one another; and

Whereas, The steamboat "Franklin Edson," especially constructed for the use of the Department of Health, has been in the service of transporting patients affected with contagious diseases to and from the contagious disease hospitals of this Department continuously since May, 1885, and by reason of such continuous service has deteriorated to such an extent as to be unfit for further service, according to the report of the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department of Docks and Ferries of a recent survey of same; and

Whereas, In addition to the steamboats for the transportation of patients affected with contagious diseases already required, the needs of the contagious disease hospital known as Riverside Hospital, located as it is on North Brother Island in the East river, are such that the services of a suitable launch for the use of the physicians, nurses and other employees of said hospital and the transportation of the parents, relatives and friends of patients at said hospital are also required; therefore be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, the Board of Aldermen be and is hereby respectfully petitioned to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of ninety-two thousand dollars (\$92,000), for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses required to be incurred by the Board of Health in providing proper means for the transportation of patients affected with contagious diseases from the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond to the Riverside Hospital of the Department of Health, situated on North Brother Island, in the East river, Borough of The Bronx, and in the purchase of a launch for the use of the physicians, nurses and other employees of said hospital, and for the transportation of the parents, relatives and friends of patients in same, as follows:

To the Commissioner of Docks:

Sir—In obedience to the within order, I beg to report that I have had a survey made of the steamer "Franklin Edson," belonging to the City and used by the Department of Health, by Mr. Alfred J. Mickley, Mechanical Engineer in this Department, and in accordance with his report beg to submit the following:

The "Franklin Edson" is a single-decked, single-screw, wooden passenger-vessel of 112 gross tons, 63 net tons. The hull is of yellow pine with hackmatack frames and sheathed with copper. The boat was built in Brooklyn in the year 1895. Throughout the hull the bulkheads are of iron. There is a single condensing engine, built about the same time as the hull, and has steam furnished by a boiler which was probably placed in the boat when it was built in 1895, and which is allowed a working pressure of 120 pounds per square inch.

By a careful examination of the hull from the inside, I find that the clamps, knees, etc., are badly rotted, and the general condition of the boat above the level of the water-line is extremely bad. Through the forepeak a new bitt has been stepped down through

the deck; the deck beam support has also been found entirely rotted away. The forepeak hold seems to be in a fair condition below the water-line. The iron bulkhead which separates this forward compartment from the next compartment is in bad condition. As a matter of opinion, it might be stated that if, through collision, this forward compartment was flooded, the bulkhead would not have sufficient strength to perform the function for which it was installed and the boat would inevitably sink. In the compartment aft of the forward bulkhead there are two fresh-water tanks 4 feet in dimensions by 14 feet in length, supported by wooden cradles from the full-up, and wrought-iron straps from the deck-beams. These straps and the ceiling to which they are secured are entirely rotted away and the tanks are in a dangerous condition, inasmuch as these tanks, with their contents, weigh about 5 tons each and the continual shock and jar of the vessel in making landings is liable to start them from their position on their insecure foundation and they are liable to fall at any time.

The condition of the hull, below the water line under the boiler, cannot be described with any degree of certainty without the removal of the ash pans and boiler, which prevent access to that portion of the hull. The engine, foundations and keelsons, etc., appear to be in fair condition. The after engine-room bulkhead is entirely corroded away and is a menace rather than a safety device. The ceiling to which this bulkhead is secured by bolts is somewhat rotted, and in the compartment aft of this bulkhead are two fresh water tanks of about the same dimensions as those in the fore hold. On account of the location of these tanks it has been impossible to make an examination of the hull above the water line in this compartment.

The sheathing planking of the deck is rotten around the rail stanchions. The rail stanchions, with the exception of some few that were put in new about five years ago, are in most cases entirely rotted through.

The deck planking is comparatively new, having been laid some few years ago. The house combings are in a bad condition and are more or less rotted and in a bad condition and insecurely fastened, and as the strength of the superstructure of the vessel depends upon the strength of these combings it necessarily follows that the entire house has a swaying motion when the vessel is under way or when she strikes the pier in making a landing.

The deck house is built of pine and has been badly arranged. The wooden bulkheads are of a single thickness of board and where they have dried out have left gaps between the boards so that they are no longer effective partitions between the rooms they are supposed to separate.

The roof of the house leaks badly, so that in the operation of washing down or during a rain storm the occupants or contents of the rooms in the house are wet to some extent.

The boat is fitted with a hand steering gear, with manila rope on the drum, and in case of a fire in the forward end of the vessel the box through which the manila rope passes from the pilot house would form a flue and necessarily burn up the tiller rope.

From the examination made it may be assumed that the cost of placing this boat in a fair working condition would be from \$12,000 to \$18,000, and this would be merely one-half of the cost of the boat originally, and the City would not, with the completion of these repairs, have a boat which would seem to be at all adapted to the service which it is called upon to perform.

The two rooms forward of the stack are practically useless on account of their location over the boiler and of their small dimensions in height. The rooms in the after part of the boat are all that are available for use, and therefore the accommodations on this boat are extremely limited and incapable of enlargement.

The engine, boiler and machinery are apparently in a fair condition at the present time and adapted for the tug or vessel for which this boat is used, on account of the large amount of fresh water which needs to be carried in order to operate the jet condenser engine.

It would seem to be inadvisable for the Commissioner of the Department of Health to have any extensive repairs made to this boat, in view of her present condition, and to the fact that if repairs were made the boat would still not be proper for the service, and, while the question is not asked, I would state that in my opinion a boat could be built to do the work of the Health Department at a cost of about \$65,000.

Dear Sir—I beg to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an appropriation of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) and twenty-two hundred dollars (\$2,200), respectively, to cover the cost of absolutely necessary repairs to the Kings County Court House and the Brooklyn Borough Hall. The Supreme Court Judges and the County Court Judges, who occupy the major part of the Court House building have been urging upon me for some months to renovate the entire building, and to place new furnishings in the court rooms, and in their own and their clerk's offices. They have also requested me to include the cost of such supplies in my estimate of the amount of money needed for the permanent betterment of the building, stating that they have no available fund for such supplies. The Court House has been for some years, so far as the interior fixings are concerned, in a very undesirable condition. Except for the overhauling of the plumbing and ventilating systems, at a cost of about \$65,000 last year, this building has received very little attention since its erection in 1865. My Inspectors have gone very carefully over the question of the cost of the cleaning, painting and kalsomining of the building, and some new lighting fixtures and requested changes of construction in several of the court rooms and furnishings, and estimate same at fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000). The additional sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) is made absolutely necessary by unsafe condition of the building's big wooden-covered metal dome. This dome is mainly constructed of copper, and I understand that a new one in its stead has been meditated for several years. I know that a new one is badly needed. Several pieces of the outer covering have fallen off of late, precipitating a dangerous condition to passersby. Rust has eaten away the copper con-

struction, and parts of the metal have become dislodged. Its iron frame work requires wire-brushing and painting. The necessary improvements to this building could not be undertaken for less than the amount I have indicated, and I submit herewith an itemized statement showing in detail just what the twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) will be expended for.

The twenty-two hundred dollars (\$2,200) asked for—repairs to Borough Hall—is fully as urgent. Several times of late pieces of the building's coping have fallen, and, while temporary repairs have been made to prevent accidents, serious trouble may ensue if proper and permanent repairs are not realized. My Inspectors report that the coping on all sides of the building is in very bad condition. So far as I can learn this particular part of the structure has received no attention since the building was put up forty-five years ago. A large part of the overhanging stone work on all sides of the structure should be taken down (most of it is decayed and loose), and the drip part of the crown, or top of the cornice, should be cut off. A week or so ago, with the idea that these defects should be corrected without materially crippling the "Supplies and Repairs" account of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices for this year, estimates were solicited for the work in connection with carefully prepared specifications. The proposition requires the services of a stonecutter and of a mason, and of five firms who were requested to furnish bids, two were received—one from the stonecutter being \$1,550, and one from the mason being \$620, a total for both of \$2,170.

The repairs to these buildings must be made this summer and I would respectfully urge the Board to authorize the appropriation at the meeting to be held on Friday, the 22d inst.

Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Additions and Alterations to the Hall of Records (composed of the Surrogate, Register, County Clerk and Commissioner of Records of the County of Kings), held June 27, 1904, the following resolution was adopted: "Resolved, That an appropriation is respectfully asked to meet the requirements of the offices of the Surrogate, Register, County Clerk and Commissioner of Records of the County of Kings, occasioned by the removal of these departments into the new Hall of Records Building.

"The appropriation is needed for the purpose of defraying the expenses for the preliminary work in caring for the records of the respective departments in cleaning, overhauling, arranging and removing the same fully into the new quarters assigned to them.

"The estimates and requirements for this purpose, compiled by each of the respective departments, are hereto annexed.

"It is estimated that the work to be performed will require at least eighty (80) laborers, whose services can be procured at a compensation of sixty dollars (\$60) per month, making a gross sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000), the time required for the necessary work of these laborers being about six months.

"It is contemplated that the services of these laborers will be dispensed with as the different departments are housed."

In the different communications addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the estimate of the number of men required to perform the work in the respective offices is as follows:
Surrogate, 25 laborers.
Register, 35 laborers.
County Clerk, 25 laborers.
Commissioner of Records, 15 to 20 laborers.

I would report that the additions and alterations of the Kings County Hall of Records, now nearing completion, will necessitate the removal and rearrangement of the records of the Surrogate, Register, County Clerk and Commissioner of Records, and some means should be provided in order to have this work done properly.

The Board on Additions and Alterations to the Hall of Records (composed of the Surrogate, Register, County Clerk and Commissioner of Records), who have made application for the appropriation of \$30,000 to defray the expenses of this work, have no authority to make such a request. Pursuant to chapter 647 of the Laws of 1900, after the plans, specifications, etc., are prepared by the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, for additions, extensions, alterations and improvements to the Kings County Hall of Records, they shall be submitted to the Surrogate, Register, County Clerk and Commissioner of Records for their approval.

No mention is made of any Board composed of the said parties, hence the said Board, apparently self-constituted, have no authority except to approve plans, etc. The Surrogate, Register, County Clerk and Commissioner of Records in their communications to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, only give the number of men required as noted above, and the rate, \$60 per month, to be paid. None of them have asked the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for any specified amount, but taking the total, \$30,000, requested by the Board and comparing it with the estimates furnished by each Department, I calculate that it was the intention of the Board to apportion the \$30,000 as follows:

It has been suggested to me by some of the Board that it is their intention to use all of the men, at times, in one Department—that is, to use the men to the best advantage in overhauling, arranging and removing the records of all the Departments in the Hall of Records Building.

In my opinion this is the best disposition to make of the labor, since all of the Departments cannot move at once, on account of the alterations to the building; but I think eighty (80) men is a larger force than they will be able to handle for full time. Sixty (60) men for six (6) months, I think, will be a closer average, and if it is not necessary to have a definite application from each Department, which has not been made, I would suggest that the following amounts be appropriated to the respective Departments to defray the expenses of the preliminary work in caring for the records of said Departments, in cleaning, overhauling and removing the same finally in the new quarters assigned to them:

Sir—Complying with the request contained in your circular letter of July 16, 1904, we beg to state:

I. This institution does not receive any fixed appropriation from the City government.

II. It does receive from the City remuneration at the rate of \$2 per week for each child over the age of two years legally committed to it and 38 cents per day for every infant under that age while the same remains under its charge (see section 230, Charter of Greater New York, amended by chapter 196 of Laws of 1899).

III. For the year 1903 it received from the City, for the care of children so committed to it, \$49,665.40, but for the coming year we feel that this sum would be inadequate. Since the opening of our new institution for boys at Sparkill, Rockland County, N. Y., commitments to that institution have been more numerous. Our bill for June, at present in Finance Department, amounted to \$4,911.14, and that did not include the Borough of Richmond. Taking that for a basis it would be about \$61,000 for the entire year, Richmond included.

IV. As children are constantly being committed and discharged it would be impossible to say what amount should be paid the institution for the year 1905, but a safe conjecture would be that it should not be less than \$61,000.

V. According to a recent resolution finally adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and who give in their own buildings secular education to the children resident therein shall be paid at the rate of 35 cents per week for each child over four years receiving such instruction, to be given for ten months in the year. On a rough estimate \$800 per month would be needed here for that purpose, which would be \$8,000 for the ten months, that would make a total of \$69,000 for our institution.

VI. Regretting our inability to answer your inquiries more positively, and trusting that the foregoing may, to some extent, be of service to you and be what you desire, with every wish to furnish whatever further information may be in our power, we have the honor to remain,

Whereas, As appears from the communications hereto attached and made a part of this preamble and resolution such statement is without foundation in fact; and the said company is not in any manner engaged in the construction of such tunnel, has not entered upon such construction, and has no intention of beginning such construction until authorized by the City authorities; and

Whereas, The adoption of the resolution referred to has placed the said company in an unjust and false position before this Board and the entire community; therefore

Resolved, That it be and hereby is referred to the President of the Borough of Manhattan, and he is respectfully requested to ascertain and report to this Board whether or not the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company is or has been in any manner engaged in the construction of a vault or tunnel in connection with its premises on East Twenty-fourth street, to the end that if the charge as to the alleged action of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company be without foundation, all prejudice against said company may be removed, and its application for authority to construct such tunnel be entitled to due and proper consideration.

Dear Sir—I was greatly astonished to learn that a resolution was introduced yesterday in the Board of Aldermen which would indicate that there is an impression that we have started the work of constructing the tunnel connecting this building with the one we are building on the north side of Twenty-fourth street, and in connection with which you were kind enough to introduce for us a resolution in the Board of Aldermen granting permission to construct the same.

Permit me to assure you that there has been absolutely no work whatever done in the way of constructing this tunnel, not even any preliminary work other than the preparation of plans.

I cannot imagine what could give rise to such an impression, and assure you that under no circumstances would we undertake this construction without having permission from the municipal authorities.

I inclose a certificate signed by both our architects and builders certifying that no work has been done in the way of construction of the proposed tunnel.

I have not a copy of the resolution that was introduced in the Board on June 28, but if my understanding of it is correct, it would certainly put us in a false position. I trust you will present the facts as they are to His Honor the Mayor, and will be pleased to furnish you with any further certificates or affidavits that you might regard as desirable.

PROPOSED TERMS AND CONDITIONS GRANTING TO THE NEW YORK, WESTCHESTER AND BOSTON RAILWAY COMPANY THE RIGHT TO CROSS CERTAIN STREETS AND HIGHWAYS IN THE BOROUGH OF THE BRONX, AND TO CONSTRUCT AND OPERATE A FOUR-TRACK RAILWAY THEREON.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, having received from the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to a resolution of such Board adopted March 15, 1904, a proposed ordinance, granting to the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company the right to cross certain streets and highways for the purposes of constructing and operating a four-track railway, and having duly inquired into and considered the matter, does hereby, pursuant to the Greater New York Charter, fix the terms and

conditions of the proposed grant and the money value of the right proposed, for a period of 25 years from the date of the approval of the proposed ordinance by the Mayor, as follows:

I.—The New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, its successor and assigns, shall pay into the Treasury of The City of New York for this privilege the following sums of money: During the first ten years, commencing upon the date when the ordinance granting such right shall be approved by the Mayor, an annual sum of eight thousand (8,000) dollars, and during the succeeding fifteen years an annual sum of sixteen thousand (16,000) dollars. From the date of the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railway until the end of the first ten years of the proposed grant an additional sum of forty (40) cents per linear foot per annum for each line of single track railway within the lines of any street in use, legally opened street, or street for which proceedings to open have been initiated; and for the succeeding fifteen years an additional sum of eighty (80) cents per linear foot per annum, in lieu of said sum of forty (40) cents. The terms hereafter to be fixed for any renewal term of the proposed grant, shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually during the last year of the original grant, and no renewal of such grant shall provide for a further renewal.

II.—Upon the termination of the proposed grant, whether original or renewal, all rights and privileges to cross the said streets shall cease and determine, unless the said railway company, its successor or assigns, shall have previously procured a new grant from The City of New York.

III.—The ordinance granting such right or privilege should be in substance, as to the terms and conditions of such grant, in the words and figures following:

AN ORDINANCE granting to the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company the right to cross certain streets and highways and to construct and operate a four-track railway above or below said streets or highways of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right to cross certain streets and highways and the privilege to construct and operate a four-track railway, with all connections, turnouts, switches and cross-overs necessary for the accommodation and operation of said railway, by means of electricity, except the overhead trolley system, or by any other mechanical motive power which may be lawfully employed upon the same, except steam locomotive power; in, upon and across the following-named streets, avenues, parkways, highways and public places, and upon the following route, all situate in the Borough of The Bronx, City, County and State of New York, namely:

First—Main Line: Beginning at a point on the Harlem river, between Lincoln avenue and Third avenue, and then running northerly substantially parallel to Lincoln avenue and crossing the Southern Boulevard, One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, between Lincoln avenue and Third avenue; then crossing One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, at or near its intersection with Lincoln avenue; then crossing Lincoln avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street; then crossing One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, between Alexander avenue and Third avenue; then crossing Alexander avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-ninth and One Hundred and Fortieth streets; then running substantially parallel to One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, and crossing Willis avenue, Brook avenue and St. Ann's avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-ninth and One Hundred and Fortieth streets; then crossing One Hundred and Fortieth street, between St. Ann's avenue and Cypress avenue; then crossing Cypress avenue and One Hundred and Forty-first street at or near their intersection; then crossing Powers avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-first and One Hundred and Forty-second streets; then crossing Robbins avenue and One Hundred and Forty-second street, at or near their intersection; then crossing St. Mary's street, between Robbins and Concord avenues; then crossing Concord avenue, between St. Mary's and St. Joseph's streets, crossing St. Joseph's street, between Concord and Wales avenues; then crossing Wales avenue and Crane street at or near their intersection, and crossing Beach avenue and Dater street at or near their intersection; then crossing Union avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and the Southern Boulevard; then crossing One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, between Union avenue and the Southern Boulevard; then crossing Prospect avenue and St. John's avenue, between Fox street and the Southern Boulevard, and crossing Leggett avenue and Fox street at or near their intersection; then running substantially parallel with Fox street and crossing Craven street, Longwood avenue, Intervale avenue, Tiffany street and Barretto street, between Fox street and the Southern Boulevard; then crossing Dongan street at or near the intersection of Fox street; then crossing Southern Boulevard and Aldus street at or near their intersection; then crossing Hoe street and Guttenberg street at or near their intersection; then crossing Westchester avenue, between Faile street and Hoe street; then crossing One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, between Bryant street and West Farms road; then crossing Bryant street, between One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street and West Farms road; then crossing West Farms road at or near its intersection with Longfellow street, Home street and Freeman street; then crossing Jennings street, between Longfellow street and Boone street; then running substantially parallel with Longfellow street, and crossing One Hundred and Seventy-second street, One Hundred and Seventy-third street and One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, and One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, between Longfellow street and Boone street; then crossing Rodman place, between Longfellow street and West Farms road; then crossing West Farms road, between Rodman place and Boston road; then crossing the Bronx river, southerly from Tremont avenue or West Farms road, and running substantially parallel with West Farms road or Tremont avenue to or near the point of crossing the West Farms road, and crossing that road and Bronx Park avenue at or near their intersection; then crossing Lebanon street and One Hundred and Eightieth street, between Bronx Park avenue and Morris Park avenue; then running between Bronx Park and Morris Park avenue, and crossing old West Farms road; and then crossing Unionport road, between Mianna street and Birchall avenue; then crossing Oakley street, between Mianna and Sagamore streets; then crossing Brown avenue and Sagamore street at or near their intersection; then crossing Hunt avenue, between Mianna street and Bear Swamp road; then running substantially parallel with Morris Park avenue, and crossing Lincoln street, Jefferson street, Madison street and Bear Swamp road (Bronxdale avenue); then crossing Bronx and Pelham parkway and Williamsbridge road at or near their intersection; then crossing Saw Mill lane, between Williamsbridge road and Eastchester road; then crossing Eastchester road, between Kingston avenue and Syracuse avenue; then crossing Kingston avenue and Birch street at or near their intersection; then crossing Cedar street and Oak street, between Kingston avenue and Cornell avenue; then crossing Cornell avenue and Walnut street at or near their intersection; then crossing Chestnut street, between Cornell avenue and Boston road; then crossing Boston road and running approximately parallel with Boston road and crossing Schiefflin's lane, Fifth avenue, road to White Plains, and Fisher's Landing road, and continuing approximately parallel with Boston road to the northerly line of The City of New York. All as shown on maps entitled "Map and Profile of the Amended Route of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, Section 1," adopted by the Board of Directors of said company on the twentieth day of May, 1904, and signed by Wm. L. Bull, President; John Bogart, Engineer, and H. C. Winchester, Secretary, under seal, and "Map and Profile of the Amended Route of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, Section 2," adopted by the Board of Directors of said company on the seventh day of April, 1904, and signed by Wm. L. Bull, President; John Bogart, Engineer, and Thomas W. Baker, Secretary, under seal, and which maps and profiles were filed in the office of the County Clerk of the City and County of New York on the 23d day of June, 1904, or any lawful amendment thereof consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Second—Branch Line: Beginning at a point on the main line of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway at or near One Hundred and Eightieth street and running southerly, crossing One Hundred and Eightieth street, Lebanon street, West Farms road, One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street and One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, between Morris Park avenue and Bronx Park avenue (with a curved connection also joining the main line near One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street

which crosses One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Bronx Park avenue at or near their intersection); then crossing the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad and running southerly crossing Westchester avenue; thence running southeasterly and crossing the Clason Point road near Clason's Point and running substantially parallel with the United States bulkhead-lines, in the vicinity of Clason's Point; thence crossing Pugsley's creek and Westchester creek and Baxter creek, and thence running easterly along Throgs Neck and crossing Throgs Neck road with a terminal near the lines of the United States Reservation property. All as shown on a map entitled "Map and Profile of the Amended Route of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, Section 3," adopted by the Board of Directors of said company on the 5th day of May, 1904, and signed by Wm. L. Bull, President; John Bogart, Engineer, and H. C. Winchester, Secretary, under seal, and which maps and profiles were filed in the office of the County Clerk of the City and County of New York on the 23d day of June, 1904, or any lawful amendment thereof consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Third—General: And such other streets, avenues, highways, public places, etc. (named and unnamed), as may be hereafter opened or encountered in such routes or amended routes; and also such other streets, avenues, highways, public places, etc. (named and unnamed), now open or in use, or as may be hereafter opened or put in use, which it may be necessary for said railway to cross in order to make connections with any other railway within one thousand (1,000) feet of said routes; provided that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall first have given permission for such connection or connections, and provided further that such connections shall be limited to two in number.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—The provisions of section 6 of the Railroad Law shall be fully complied with, and in addition to the maps required to be filed with the Railroad Commissioners, it shall be incumbent upon the grantee to file with the Comptroller of The City of New York, and also with the President of the Borough of The Bronx, a map or maps showing the number of tracks and the length and direction of each crossing of all streets legally open, in use, or for which proceedings have been initiated to open, accurately determined by measurements to be taken after the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railway.

Second—The said right to cross the streets and the privilege to construct and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years from the date when this ordinance is approved by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of said right and privilege. Such revaluation shall be of the right and privilege to maintain and operate said railway across the said streets by itself, and not to include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the grantee, its successor or assigns.

If the railway company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal, it shall make application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the said Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this grant. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient, if agreed to in writing by the railway company and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or such other authority in its place. If the railway company and the Board, or such other authority in its place for the City, shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this grant, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five years shall be reasonable; and either the City (by the Board, or such other authority in its place) or the railway company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with such other authority fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable; and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railway company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railway company. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last year of the original grant. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this grant, then the railway company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate.

Third—Upon the termination of this grant, whether original or renewal, all rights and privileges hereby granted to cross the said streets shall cease and determine, unless the said railway company, its successor or assigns, shall have previously procured a new grant for the same from The City of New York.

Fourth—The New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, its successor or assigns, shall pay for this privilege to The City of New York the following sums of money: During the first ten years, commencing upon the day when this ordinance shall be approved by the Mayor, an annual sum of eight thousand (8,000) dollars, and during the succeeding fifteen years an annual sum of sixteen thousand (16,000) dollars. From the date of the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railway until the end of the first ten years of this grant, an additional sum of forty (40) cents per linear foot per annum for each line of single track railway within the lines of all streets in use, legally opened streets, or streets for which proceedings to open have been initiated, and for the succeeding fifteen years an additional sum of eighty (80) cents per linear foot per annum, in lieu of said sum of forty (40) cents. Such payments shall likewise apply to all streets hereafter opened during the terms of this grant, unless the land required for the opening of such street across the right of way of the railway company shall have been ceded free of cost to The City of New York. All such payments shall be made to the Comptroller of the City in equal payments at the end of each quarter year on the 1st day of January, April, July and October in each year. The terms hereafter to be fixed for any renewal term of this grant shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually during the last year of the original grant, and no renewal of such grant shall provide for a further renewal.

Fifth—The said annual charge or payment shall continue throughout the whole term of the privilege hereby granted, whether original or renewal, as hereinbefore provided, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway company providing for payments for railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sub-lease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sub-lease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant. Nothing herein contained shall apply to any mortgagee or mere lienor, but shall apply to any purchaser upon foreclosure or under or by virtue of any provision of a mortgage or lien.

Sixth—The rights and privileges granted hereby shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sub-let in any manner, nor shall title thereto or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, its successor or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents. This provision, however, shall not apply to the making of a mortgage, but shall apply to a sale under foreclosure.

Seventh—No street shall be crossed by the railway at grade, and all streets now open or in use, or streets hereafter opened crossing the line of said railway shall be carried over or under said railway by the grantee, at the sole cost and expense of the grantee. The costs of all approaches to said crossings and any damages to property incurred by such change of grade shall likewise be borne and paid by the grantee.

Eighth—All viaducts over streets and all tunnels under streets and all bridges necessary to carry the streets over an open cut, shall be constructed at the expense of the grantee, and in such manner as shall not interfere with the ordinary use of the street as a public highway. All viaducts over streets shall have a height of at least sixteen feet in the clear throughout, and in the case of arch construction not less than sixteen feet in the clear at the centre and ten feet in the clear on the building or side line of said street. In the case of tunnel construction under a street, there shall be at least four feet between the grade of the street and the exterior surface of the arch of said tunnel.

Ninth—Any superstructure of the railway crossing a street and having a length of seventy-five (75) feet or less, shall be constructed in a single span; if more than seventy-five (75) feet in length, intermediate columns to support the structure may be placed in the street in such manner as may be approved. The width of such superstructure of the railway shall not exceed sixty (60) feet when measured over all.

Tenth—The plans for all structures over or under any street must first be submitted to and approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and all such structures shall be constructed of either steel, concrete or masonry, or a combination of these materials.

Eleventh—The railway shall be constructed in the most modern and approved manner of railway construction. The roadbed shall be ballasted throughout its entire length within the limits of The City of New York, with a sufficient quantity of either blast furnace slag or broken trap rock of a hard and durable quality, and no dirt, sand, gravel or cinders shall be used in such ballast.

Twelfth—The roadbed within the limits of The City of New York shall be watered daily whenever the thermometer is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit. For any failure to comply herewith, the railway company shall be liable for a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day.

Thirteenth—The entire right of way of the company within the City limits shall be fenced throughout.

Fourteenth—All abutments or foundations for bridges, viaducts and stations and the stations proper, except intermediate supports for viaducts, as hereinbefore provided, shall be placed on the land of the company. There shall be constructed along the line of the route of the main line of the railway as proposed, for the accommodation of local passenger traffic, at least six (6) stations between the Harlem river and the Bronx river, and at least four (4) stations between the Bronx river and the northerly line of The City of New York as now fixed; provided, however, that if the railway is constructed only as far south as the intersection of the Southern Boulevard and Westchester avenue, then there shall be at least three (3) stations west of the Bronx river. On the branch line there shall be constructed at least three (3) stations east of Westchester avenue.

Fifteenth—The said railway may be operated by electrical power, except the overhead trolley system, or by any other mechanical motive power which may be lawfully employed upon the same, except locomotive steam power; provided, however, that steam locomotive power may be used for switching and shunting trains when specifically authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the said Board.

Sixteenth—No wires for the transmission of power shall be permitted except they be placed in conduits, and in any conduits laid by the company for the transmission of power for its own use, provision shall be made to carry three (3) cables for the use of the police, fire and ambulance service of the City without charge therefor.

Seventeenth—The railway company shall not carry power along its structure for any purpose except the operation of its railway, except as provided above.

Eighteenth—The railway company shall operate a train schedule on the main line of at least sixty (60) trains in either direction daily, stopping at all of the stations within the City limits, and at no time either day or night shall there be greater headway between such trains than thirty (30) minutes; provided, however, that said railway company during the first five years after the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railway shall not be required to operate its trains within the City limits between the hours of 1 o'clock and 4 o'clock A. M., each day, unless the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall determine, after a hearing had thereon, that public convenience requires the operation of its cars during such hours.

Nineteenth—All cars on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and any failure to keep the temperature of any of the cars of the company above 50 degrees Fahrenheit, shall make the company liable for a penalty of fifty (50) dollars per car per day for each offense.

Twentieth—All cars operated by the company shall be vestibuled and the system of lighting same shall be adequate and be made satisfactory to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Twenty-first—During the first twenty-five (25) years of this grant the rate of fare upon said railway within the limits of The City of New York as now fixed shall not exceed five (5) cents for any passenger. The said company shall not charge any passenger more than such sum for one continuous ride from any point on said railway or a line or branch operated in connection therewith and controlled by it, to any point thereof or of any such connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of The City of New York, as such limits now exist, during such term.

At the expiration of twenty-five years the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall be entitled, after due hearing and determination of the reasonableness thereof, to require for the term of the renewal of said grant that the fare for each passenger within the City limits, as they may then be constituted, shall not exceed five (5) cents.

The rates for the carrying of property upon the routes of the grantee within the limits of The City of New York shall in all cases be reasonable in amount and shall be subject to the control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice and hearing to the grantee, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon said grantee, its successor or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such service than provided for by it.

Twenty-second—The said railway company shall carry free within the limits of The City of New York during the existence of this grant or its renewal, all letter carriers of the United States Government, and members of the Police and Fire Departments of The City of New York, when such employees are in full uniform.

Twenty-third—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City.

Sec. 3. In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained this grant may be forfeited and avoided by The City of New York by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, provided, that in case of any such violation, breach or failure to comply with any of said provisions the said City shall cause notice in writing thereof to be served upon said company, and said company shall remedy such violation, breach or failure within ten (10) days thereafter, and in default thereof then, and not otherwise, said right of forfeiture shall accrue and may be enforced by the said City; provided, further, that if the said railway company, grantee hereunder, shall within said ten (10) days commence to remedy said violation, breach or failure and shall prosecute the work of completing such remedy with diligence and with the utmost practicable dispatch until the same shall be completed, then no right of forfeiture shall accrue.

Sec. 4. The grant of this privilege shall not affect in any way the right of The City of New York to grant a similar privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions to any other person or corporation.

Sec. 5. Said railway company shall commence actual construction within one year from the date of the signing of this ordinance by the Mayor, and shall complete a four-track railway upon the main line, from the northerly line of the City as far south as the intersection of the Southern Boulevard and Westchester avenue, within five years from such date, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Said railway company shall expend the sum of at least one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for construction within the limits of The City of New York within two years from the date of the signing of this ordinance, which sum shall be exclusive of any moneys expended for right of way.

A statement of the moneys so expended for construction shall be submitted to the Comptroller of The City of New York, who shall, after investigation, report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment his opinion as to whether such sums have been actually expended, and if in the opinion of the said Board the grantee has not proven an expenditure of the said sum within the time given, then said Board may declare that this grant has ceased and determined, and the said action of said Board shall be prima facie evidence of said forfeiture.

Any portion of the route covered by this grant which shall not be completed and in full operation within seven years from the date of the signing of this ordinance shall be deemed to have been abandoned, and all rights hereby granted in and to such portions of said railway shall cease and determine.

And in the event that the said railway company shall not, within the said seven years, construct its main line south of the intersection of the Southern Boulevard and Westchester avenue and to the Harlem river, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in office, may fix and finally determine such additional compensation as shall be imposed upon said railway company because of such failure.

A majority vote of the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall be prima facie evidence in regard to the forfeiture of any or all the rights under this grant, as provided for in this section. Before action is taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under the provisions of this section, the grantee shall have at least thirty (30) days' notice of the intention of said Board to take action, and at such time as is appointed, shall be allowed a hearing. In case any or all of the rights hereby granted are forfeited, it is a condition of this grant that all sums theretofore paid to The City of New York, together with the deposit of \$20,000, as provided for in section 14 of this ordinance, and all structures erected by said grantee, its successor or assigns, within the lines of any street, shall be forfeited to and become the property of The City of New York.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall have power to extend the time provided for in this section for the completion of the railway and for the work to be performed and expenditure to be made, as above, for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate two years, but such extension shall not be made unless the reasons given by the grantee for non-fulfillment are, in the opinion of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for causes over which the grantee had no control and was in nowise responsible.

Sec. 6. The grantee shall assume all liability by reason of the construction and operation of the railway and the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property by reason of its construction or operation.

As a condition of this grant, the grantee, its successor or assigns, hereby agrees to repay to the City any damages which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the railway company, its successor or assigns.

Sec. 7. Any portion of the right of way of the said railway company falling within the lines of a street now shown on the map of The City of New York, which it may be necessary for the City to subsequently acquire, shall be ceded to the City, without cost to it, subject to the company's easement therein.

Sec. 8. In case the City shall acquire the land necessary for a street across the grantee's right of way and such land for the street is not ceded by the said grantee, then the railway company shall pay the same rates for the privilege of crossing said street as are provided for in paragraph fourth of section 2 of this ordinance.

Sec. 9. In case any of the streets as now shown on the map of The City of New York and crossed by the said railway above grade are altered or widened after the grantee has completed its railway, and such widening requires the alteration of the superstructure of the railway, the grantee and The City of New York shall each pay one-half of the cost of such alteration as may be necessary.

Sec. 10. In case the route as laid out shall make it necessary in the opinion of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to change the map of The City of New York, in order to avoid unnecessary or undesirable crossings or for other reasons purely on account of the location of the railway, and by such change or alteration additional streets bounding the grantee's right of way are determined upon, then the grantee shall acquire such streets at its own expense.

Sec. 11. Any alterations which may be required to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any subsurface structures, pipes, etc., laid in the streets, on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the railway company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Sec. 12. All construction of railway crossings shall be done in such manner as shall not substantially interfere with the ordinary use of any street as a public highway, and all streets in any way disturbed by such construction shall be restored to their original condition. In case of failure on the part of the grantee to restore such streets within a reasonable length of time, The City of New York shall have the right, under resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished after due notice and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the fund herein provided.

Sec. 13. The company's property and structures shall not be used for advertising purposes in any way, under a penalty of fifty (50) dollars per day for each offense. Such restriction shall not apply to the interior of stations or cars.

Sec. 14. This grant is upon the express condition that the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, within thirty days after the said company has been duly authorized to operate its railway and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), either in money or in securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by such company of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the privilege and the penalties herein provided, and in case of default in the performance by said company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right, after due notice, to collect the same from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same, with interest, from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company. In case of any drafts so made upon this security fund, the said company shall, upon thirty days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of twenty thousand dollars, and in default thereof the grant hereby made may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Sec. 15. That if the said New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, its successor and assigns, shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and all street crossings in good condition throughout the full term of its occupancy of said streets, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City may give written notice to said company, specifying any default on the part of said company and requiring said company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon the failure of said company to remedy its said default within a reasonable time, said company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to The City of New York the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed and liquidated damages, or the said City in case said structures over or under streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the company, in which case the said company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon; all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinbefore provided.

Sec. 16. This grant shall not become operative until said railway company shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York, within ten days after the adoption of this ordinance.

Sec. 17. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE OF THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK ON TAX LEVY FOR 1905.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen, to whom was referred the assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, of The City of New York, for the year 1904, together with a communication from the Comptroller of The City of New York, dated May 26, 1904, transmitting the Budget for the year 1904, accompanied by his certificate of the amounts authorized by law to be raised by tax in and for the year 1904, and an estimate of the revenues of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation during the current year, respectfully submits the following

REPORT:

The total Budget for the year 1904 is one hundred and six million six hundred and seventy-four thousand nine hundred and fifty-five dollars and nine cents (\$106,674,955.09), which includes county charges and expenses for the four counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, aggregating three million seven hundred and eleven thousand six hundred and ninety-four dollars and thirty-three cents (\$3,711,694.33), leaving one hundred and two million nine hundred and sixty-three thousand two hundred and sixty dollars and seventy-six cents (\$102,963,260.76), as the amount of the Budget which affects the general tax rates of The City of New York.

In addition to the amount of three million seven hundred and eleven thousand six hundred and ninety-four dollars and thirty-three cents (\$3,711,694.33), included in the Budget for County Charges and Expenses, the following amounts disbursed during the year 1903 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds for Judgments and Claims for county charges or liabilities, are to be raised by tax in the year 1904, in the respective counties, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the revised Greater New York Charter, viz.:

Section 902 of the Charter, referred to in the Comptroller's communication, directs that the amounts required for the payment of all county charges and expenses shall be levied and collected from the taxable property within each of said counties respectively, to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred for county as distinguished from City purposes. Compliance with the provision of law will, of course, forever prevent a uniform tax rate from prevailing in The City of New York.

AMOUNT TO BE RAISED FOR CITY AND STATE PURPOSES BY GENERAL RATES.

The following statement shows, therefore, the proportion of the Budget which is to be raised by taxation at uniform rates throughout the whole City:

PERCENTAGE TO BE ADDED FOR DEFICIENCIES IN COLLECTION.

Section 248 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"Section 248. It shall be the duty of the Board of Aldermen to include, in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your Committee has conferred with the Department of Finance in regard to the amount that will be required to provide for and meet such deficiencies as may occur in the actual product of the taxes to be imposed and levied in and for the year 1904, and have concluded to recommend that two per centum (2 per cent.) of the amounts to be collected by taxation for State, City and county budgetary purposes be added to and included in the tax levy for this purpose, this being the same percentage adopted last year and almost exactly the figure which, having prevailed in The City of New York prior to consolidation for over twenty years, has been found by experience to offset with substantial accuracy the deficiencies in the product of the tax resulting from vacated and modified assessments, uncollectable personal taxes, etc., etc.

THE ASSESSED VALUATIONS.

Certain corporations which pay taxes directly to the State are exempt by law from local taxation for State purposes, so far as their assessment affects personal property. It is provided by section 202 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1896, as follows:

"Section 202. The personal property of every corporation, company, association or partnership, taxable under this article, other than for an organization tax, shall be exempt from assessment and taxation upon its personal property for State purposes,

and the personal property of every corporation taxable under section one hundred and eighty-seven a of this article, other than for an organization tax and as provided in chapter 37 of the General Laws, shall be exempt from assessment and taxation for all other purposes, if all taxes due and payable under this article have been paid thereby."

This provision of law requires, therefore, a special rate of tax to be imposed upon the personal estates of corporations which are exempt from local taxation for State purposes, differing from and less than the general rate for State, city and county purposes.

The assessment rolls for the current year, transmitted to the Board of Aldermen July 5, 1904, show the following valuations by counties:

The county lines correspond with the borough lines in all the boroughs except Manhattan and The Bronx, which, together, constitute New York county, and, as the rate of taxation in these two boroughs happens to be the same, it will be convenient in dealing with the assessed valuations to use the county classification.

The assessed valuation of the personal estate of corporations, joint stock companies or associations which have been found to be exempt under section 202 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1896 from taxation for State purposes in the year 1904, as appears by a detailed statement thereof on file in the Department of Finance, is as follows:

It is to be noted that the quota of State taxes due from each of the respective counties is included in the Budget for City purposes and in the above stated amount of tax to be raised by general rates throughout the City. In 1901 the quota of State taxes due from the several counties was included in the county charges and expenses, levied and raised in the several counties. The amount of State taxes due from The City of New York is this year imposed and levied with the tax to be raised by general rates throughout the City, pursuant to an opinion of the Corporation Counsel, expressed in a communication to the Comptroller under date of October 25, 1901.

Your Committee recommends that in fixing the actual tax rates in the tax levy ordinance the decimal fractions of such rates be not carried beyond five figures, i. e., hundred thousandths of one per cent., as any smaller fraction would have no practical effect on individual assessments, while increasing enormously and unnecessarily the difficulties of extending the tax-rolls and preparing tax bills. The total loss by omission of such remote decimals will be only \$244.32 in the whole tax levy of \$86,071,028.27.

As there is nothing to be gained by separate extensions on the tax-rolls of the City, State and County rates, your Committee recommends that the aggregate thereof, or, in other words, the total tax rates in each borough, as the case may be, be fixed in the ordinance levying the taxes for the year 1904. Such an ordinance has been prepared and is submitted herewith for approval and adoption by the Board of Aldermen.

SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS IN THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN, TO BE COLLECTED WITH THE ANNUAL TAXES.

The Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments have added to the assessment rolls of the Borough of Brooklyn:

First—The amounts required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for the payment of principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335, of the Laws of 1886, for flagging, curbing, guttering and paving certain streets in the Twenty-sixth Ward of said borough (late Town of New Lots).

Second—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for sewerage improvements in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and amendments thereto.

Third—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for street improvements in the Thirty-first Ward of said borough (late the Town of Gravesend), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, as amended.

Fourth—The amount required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 544 of the Laws of 1888, for flagging improvements in the Thirtieth Ward of said borough (late the Town of New Utrecht).

Fifth—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889, as amended by chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894.

The amount to be raised for the payment of the principal and interest on the New Lots bonds is twenty-six thousand eight hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$26,892.22); the amount of the Flatbush sewer installment is thirty-six thousand six hundred and six dollars and eight cents (\$36,606.08); the amount of the Thirty-first Ward improvement installment is fifty-three thousand eight hundred and seven dollars and sixty-three cents (\$53,807.63); the amount of the Thirtieth Ward flagging tax is two thousand seven hundred and ninety-five dollars and seventy-three cents (\$2,795.73); the amount of the Flatbush avenue improvement installment is thirty-nine thousand seven hundred and sixty-nine dollars and nine cents (\$39,769.09).

The law requires that these assessments and installments be included in the tax levy ordinance to be levied and collected with the annual taxes.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York, and the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for the payment of the quota of the State taxes due from said counties, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1904.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of eighty million four hundred and forty-one thousand five hundred and ninety-five dollars and fifty-five cents (\$80,441,595.55), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1904, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City debt, and the quota of State taxes due from the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, which sum so imposed and levied by this section is that portion of the Budget for the year 1904, amounting in the aggregate to one hundred and six million six hundred and seventy-four thousand nine hundred and fifty-five dollars and nine cents (\$106,674,955.09), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of three million seven hundred and eleven thousand six hundred and ninety-four dollars and thirty-three cents (\$3,711,694.33), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, included therein, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of twenty-two million five hundred and twenty-one thousand six hundred and sixty-five dollars and twenty-one cents (\$22,521,665.21), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York, in a communication, dated May 26, 1904, transmitting his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made in the Budget for the year 1904, copies of which communication and certificate and of the said Budget are as follows:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the comptroller of said city to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the coporation of the city of New York, as hereby constituted, or for city purposes within said city, as created by this act, and purposes for which said city is liable, and on account of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the city treasury during the then current year from all the sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the sinking funds of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, and of any of the municipal and public corporations, or parts of municipal and public corporations, by this act consolidated with the municipal corporation known as the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, other than the surplus of revenues of any such sinking funds for the payment of interest on the city debt of the municipal corporation known as the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, or the like debts of the municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said board of aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which, by law, they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the comptroller to the board of aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the county officers and the other county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the board of aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of county officers and other county charges and expenses of such county; to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the county for county as distinguished from city purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statements as follows:

First—The Budget, in detail, for the year 1904.

Second—The amount of county charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said Budget, as well as the amount of county charges and expenses paid during the year 1903 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, which amounts together are to be raised, respectively, by levy upon taxable property within each of said counties, as provided by section 902 of the Charter.

Third—The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation. Concerning the receipts of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation, the following are the items of my estimate:

The attention of your Honorable Body is respectfully called to the provisions of section 248 of the Amended Greater New York Charter, as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Board of Aldermen to include, in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them, imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes, as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your attention is also specially called to the provisions of sections 909 and 910 of the same act, prescribing the method of preparing and disposing of the assessment rolls and also to the provisions of section 911 of the same act, designating the fifteenth day of September as the date when the assessment rolls shall be finally completed, to be delivered to the Receiver of Taxes, with the proper warrant or warrants annexed thereto, directing him to collect the several sums mentioned in said rolls, and to pay the same, from time to time, when so collected, to the Chamberlain of said City.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions: 1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates. 2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance." 3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance. 4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease. 5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof. 6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports. 7. "That no money be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers." 8. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 35 cents per week for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

In addition to the sum of eighty million four hundred and forty-one thousand five hundred and ninety-five dollars and fifty-five cents (\$80,441,595.55) imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, in and by the first section of this ordinance, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon said estates, to be raised, collected and paid according to law, 2 per cent. of said sum, or one million six hundred and eight thousand eight hundred and thirty-one dollars and ninety-one cents (\$1,608,831.91), the said amount being necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by the first section of this ordinance, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter.

There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of New York, the sum of two million three hundred and sixty-five thousand one hundred and fifteen dollars and ninety cents (\$2,365,115.90), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1904, included in the Budget, and the further sum of two hundred thousand nine hundred and seventy-five dollars and eight cents (\$200,975.08) paid during the year 1903, from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of two million five hundred and sixty-six thousand and ninety dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$2,566,090.98), and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county 2 per cent. of said last-mentioned sum or fifty-one thousand three hundred and twenty-one dollars and eighty-one cents (\$51,321.81), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making the total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of New York, two million six hundred and seventeen thousand four hundred and twelve dollars and seventy-nine cents (\$2,617,412.79).

Sec. 4. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Kings, the sum of one million one hundred and twenty-five thousand four hundred and twenty-three dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$1,125,423.39), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1904, included in the Budget and the further sum of twenty-two thousand five hundred and eighty dollars and sixteen cents (\$22,580.16), paid during the year 1903 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of one million one hundred and forty-eight thousand and three dollars and fifty-five cents (\$1,148,003.55), and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county 2 per cent. of said last-mentioned sum or twenty-two thousand nine hundred and sixty dollars and seven cents (\$22,960.07), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Kings, of one million one hundred and seventy thousand nine hundred and sixty-three dollars and sixty-two cents (\$1,170,963.62).

Sec. 5. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Queens, the sum of one hundred and fifty-seven thousand one hundred and ninety-four dollars and sixty-eight cents (\$157,194.68), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1904, included in the Budget and the further sum of two thousand eight hundred and three dollars and seventy-one cents (\$2,803.71), paid during the year 1903 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of one hundred and fifty-nine thousand nine hundred and ninety-eight dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$159,998.39), and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates, within said county, 2 per cent. of said last-mentioned sum or three thousand one hundred and ninety-nine dollars and ninety-six cents (\$3,199.96), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Queens, of one hundred and sixty-three thousand one hundred and ninety-eight dollars and thirty-five cents (\$163,198.35).

Sec. 6. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, the sum of sixty-three thousand nine hundred and sixty dollars and thirty-six cents (\$63,960.36), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1904, included in the Budget and the further sum of three thousand seven hundred and twelve dollars and twenty-four cents (\$3,712.24), paid during the year 1903 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of sixty-seven thousand six hundred and seventy-two dollars and sixty cents (\$67,672.60), and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates, within said county, 2 per cent. of said last-mentioned sum or one thousand three hundred and fifty-three dollars and forty-five cents (\$1,353.45), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter,

and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, of sixty-nine thousand and twenty-six dollars and five cents (\$69,026.05).

Sec. 7. The assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, for the year 1904, are hereby ratified, approved and confirmed and the aggregate amount of the assessed valuations of said estates for such year is hereby fixed at the sum of five billion six hundred and forty million five hundred and forty-two thousand six hundred and fifty-seven dollars (\$5,640,542,657), in accordance with the returns of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for said year submitted to the Board of Aldermen on the 5th day of July, 1904.

Sec. 8. The rates of tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, and the several counties and boroughs included within said City are, for the purpose of carrying out and making effective the foregoing sections of this ordinance, hereby fixed for the year 1904, as follows:

I. In the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (being also the County of New York), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.50546 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.51342 per centum.

II. In the Borough of Brooklyn (being also the County of Kings), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.56500 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.57296 per centum.

III. In the Borough of Queens (being also the County of Queens), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.56432 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.57228 per centum.

IV. In the Borough of Richmond (being also the County of Richmond), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.58485 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.59281 per centum.

Dear Sir—In accordance with your oral suggestion to-day, in regard to the transfer of \$381,343.72 which has been made from the several funds of the Department of Education, entitled "General Repairs," I have the honor to report as follows: I have communicated with the Superintendent of School Buildings as to the amount of repairs which could be regarded as "betterments," and received from him the following reply: "June 28, 1904.

"Mr. HENRY R. M. COOK, Auditor, Board of Education:

"Dear Sir—In answer to your inquiry as to the amounts which can be charged off for betterments on contracts let since the Board of Estimate made the transfer of \$381,343.72 from the Special to the General Fund, and contracts yet to be let, I beg to say that as near as can be estimated, I think the total will not exceed \$65,000, the greater bulk of contracts having been advertised and awarded prior to the passing of the resolution.

"C. B. J. SNYDER, Superintendent of School Buildings."

Since the transfer of \$381,343.72 from the several funds for "General Repairs," contract work has been let amounting to \$57,578, all of which was in the nature of "betterments," and, by applying same to bonds or Corporate Stock to be issued in pursuance of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter (as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904), the funds for "General Repairs" are correspondingly relieved. It would appear, however, that such relief can only be extended to cover a few thousand dollars more, and that the maximum amount will not exceed \$65,000. Under the circumstances, therefore, the funds for "General Repairs" exhibit a shortage of \$316,343.72. This money is needed urgently inasmuch as a great quantity of small but important repairs to school buildings must be accomplished during the summer vacation, and the great bulk of the contract work has been let already, and has absorbed such portions of the "General Repair" funds as were not transferred to other accounts as hereinbefore referred to. The money represented by the deficit existing mainly covers quick cash expenditures in sums below \$1,000, and without it the school repairs would be incomplete. The immediate relief suggested by you would be appreciated.

Dear Sir—I would most respectfully request that the application of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for one million of dollars (\$1,000,000) for the purpose of laying water mains in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx be granted.

I am in constant receipt of requests from various sections of this borough that water mains be laid in the streets and avenues of the borough that are still unsupplied with Croton water, and in relation to the last request, which was forwarded by me to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, requesting that water mains be laid in the Lott G. Hunt estate, Twenty-fourth Ward, Van Nest, Borough of The Bronx, the Chief Engineer of said Department reports as follows:

"We are unable to lay all the water mains we desire to lay, owing to the fact that the funds granted this Department for the purpose of laying mains are utterly inadequate for our needs. There are approximately one hundred streets in the Borough of The Bronx, aggregating forty miles in length, which are graded, have sidewalks, curbs, and in many cases sewers, and have buildings thereon, but which have no water mains; and we are unable, with our inadequate appropriations, to supply these streets with water.

"We cannot lay water mains in the Lott G. Hunt estate at the present time. Sometime in the future it is intended to lay a water main in the Bear Swamp road, from the Morris Park race track to the Bronx and Pelham parkway; and in connection with this work we will, if possible, take up the matter of laying a main in the Hunt estate, but at the present time, as stated above, we cannot do it."

Under these circumstances, I respectfully request that the funds requested by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity be granted at an early date.

AN ORDINANCE giving and granting to the Harlem Transfer Company permission to lay and maintain and operate railroad tracks on Railroad or Park avenue, south of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, Borough of The Bronx.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the 10th day of June, 1904, giving and granting the Harlem Transfer Company permission to lay, maintain and operate railroad tracks on Railroad or Park avenue, south of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, Borough of The Bronx, upon the terms and conditions therein specified.

Resolved, That the consent of the Corporation of The City of New York be and the same is hereby given to the Harlem Transfer Company, a corporation, to lay, maintain and operate two (2) railroad tracks along Railroad avenue, East, beginning at the bulkhead line of the Harlem river and extending northerly along said avenue to a point south of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, as shown and indicated upon the map marked "The Harlem Transfer Company, Map showing proposed tracks in Railway avenue, Borough of The Bronx, New York City. Proposed tracks shown in red. Scale, 1 inch, 20 feet. Dated May 6, 1904, made by Edward D. B. Brown, Engineer, and signed Harlem Transfer Company, per J. C. Watson, General Manager," copy of which is annexed hereto, and which is made a part hereof, upon the following terms and conditions:

First—Said consent shall be for a period of time coterminous with the lease now held by the said Harlem Transfer Company of the bulkhead at the foot of Railroad avenue, and the extensions or renewals of said lease, not exceeding twenty-five years from the granting of said consent.

Second—The Harlem Transfer Company, its successor or assigns shall pay into the Treasury of The City of New York, the following sums of money:

During the first five years the annual sum of.....	\$1,320 00
During the second five years the annual sum of.....	1,390 00
During the third five years the annual sum of.....	1,455 00
During the fourth five years the annual sum of.....	1,530 00
During the fifth five years the annual sum of.....	1,600 00

—after which the permission, unless sooner revoked, shall expire by limitation. Such sums shall be paid into the Treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year, provided, however, that the first payment shall be only that proportion of \$1,320 as the time between the approval of this consent and November 1, following, shall bear to the whole of one year.

Third—Upon the revocation or termination by limitation of this consent, the said company shall forthwith remove the plant and property, with its appurtenances, from the street, and the surface of the street shall be restored to a condition equal to that of the surrounding surface or pavement. In default of the performance of this condition by the said company, its successor or assigns, the proper local authorities may cause such tracks, property and plant to be removed from the street aforesaid, and the surface thereof to be restored in the manner above described, at the expense of the said company, its successor or assigns, and such expense shall be recovered by The City of New York by action or otherwise.

Fourth—The consent hereby given shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the acts of the Harlem Transfer Company, its successor or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth—The said railroad tracks may be used and operated by locomotive steam power or by any other motive power which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners, in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law, excepting overhead electrical power, provided, however, that the locomotive steam engines used shall be housed or boxed so as to conform to the type commonly known as the dummy engine.

The number of cars to be included in any train operated upon the railroad tracks shall be limited to ten, and the speed of the engine and cars shall never exceed six miles per hour.

Sixth—The railroad tracks constructed under this consent shall be maintained and operated solely for the purpose of transportation of goods, wares and merchandise, and for no other purpose, and especially for no purpose in connection with the passenger traffic as commonly understood.

Seventh—Such railroad tracks shall be constructed, maintained and operated in the latest improved manner of street railroad construction and operation, and solely upon the terms and according to the lines and surveys and of the character of the rails and other parts of the construction approved by the President of the Borough of The Bronx. Such railroad tracks of the said company, its successor or assigns, shall be maintained in good and safe condition throughout the terms of this consent.

Eighth—Such railroad tracks shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of The City of New York.

Ninth—The Harlem Transfer Company, its successor or assigns, shall at the time of the laying of the tracks hereby authorized to be laid, pave with granite blocks or other material, as required by the proper City authorities, upon a good and sufficient foundation, a roadway of a width of twenty-four (24) feet in the centre of Railroad avenue, East, extending from the bulkhead platform to the southerly side of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, under the supervision of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and shall pay the cost thereof.

Tenth—The said company, its successor or assigns, shall keep in permanent repair the pavement of the roadway required to be laid by it, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe.

Eleventh—The said company, its successor or assigns, shall at all times keep the street between the tracks free and clear from ice and snow.

Twelfth—Said company shall be liable for all damages to persons or property and to the street and the sewer therein by reason of the construction or operation of said railroad tracks, and it is a condition of this consent that The City of New York assumes no liability to either persons or property on account of this consent.

Thirteenth—This consent is upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted relating to surface railroads operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Fourteenth—The said company, its successors or assigns, shall commence the construction of the railroad tracks under this consent and complete the same within one year from the date when it has obtained the necessary permits and resolutions of the City officials and departments and on or before June 1, 1905; otherwise this consent shall be forfeited forthwith and without any proceedings either at law or otherwise for that purpose; provided, however, that such time may be extended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a period not exceeding six months.

Fifteenth—This consent is upon the express condition that the said company, within thirty days after it has been duly authorized to construct, maintain and operate its railroad tracks hereunder and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), either in money or in securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance of the terms and conditions of this consent, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the consent, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice and the quality or construction of the railroad tracks. In case default in the performance by said company of such terms and conditions The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof, after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company.

In case of any drafts so made upon the security fund, the said company shall, upon thirty days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of five hundred dollars (\$500), and in default thereof the consent hereby given may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. Resolved, further, That, pursuant to subdivision 8, section 188, of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of one hundred thousand (100,000) dollars, to provide for the expenses involved in carrying out said plan of the Superintendent of Buildings.

Hon. JOHN F. AHEARN, President of the Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir—In accordance with a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on May 10, 1904, and approved by his Honor the Mayor on May 19, 1904, as follows:

"That the Superintendent of the Bureau of Buildings be and he is hereby authorized to prepare a comprehensive plan for the reorganization of the Bureau of Buildings, the salient points of which shall be

"(1st). A numerical increase in the force of Inspectors commensurate with the needs of said Bureau.

"(2d). The laying out of Inspection Districts which shall cover reasonable territory, and in and for which an Inspector may be held to account for transgressions of the Building Rules and Regulations.

"(3d). More reasonable compensation for Inspectors, so that the head of the Bureau may be enabled to procure the services of the best informed in relation to building requirements.

"(4th). A system of examinations under which appointments are to be made which will bring to the service practical and experienced men, rather than men whose qualifications are theoretic and academic."

I hereby respectfully submit the following plan:

(1st). The Inspectors' force is entirely inadequate and should be increased as follows:

- 25 additional Inspectors of Masonry and Carpentry; 8 additional Inspectors of Iron; 4 additional Inspectors of Elevators; 5 additional Inspectors of Plumbing;

—which, with the present number, would make a force of one hundred and fifty (150) Inspectors. I will also require

- 6 additional Chief Inspectors of Buildings, and 6 Secretaries—or one for each Chief Inspector.

(2d). I propose to lay out the Inspection Districts so that the territory assigned to each Inspector will be such as to enable said Inspector to visit each building in course of erection or alteration in his district daily.

The Inspection Districts will be divided among the Chief Inspectors in proportion to the building operations therein, and they will hold the District Inspectors under their charge strictly accountable for the work assigned them.

(3d) I propose that each Inspector shall receive a salary of \$2,000 per annum; that the Chief Inspector receive \$4,000 per annum; that the Assistant Engineers receive \$2,400 per annum; and that the present Chief Inspector of Buildings receive \$4,000 per annum.

In my opinion, the Inspectors and Engineers are inadequately compensated for the expert and technical work required of them. The present Inspectors now receive but \$1,200 per annum, which is a small remuneration for their services. They are subject to duty throughout the year, night and day, and I consider their positions and responsibilities the most important in the service of the City. The Engineers of this bureau examine and pass upon all plans filed for the erection and alteration of buildings, a responsibility which should command a much higher compensation than they are now receiving.

The city of Boston pays its Inspectors of Buildings from \$1,800 to \$2,000 per annum; the city of Chicago pays its Inspectors \$1,800 per annum; the Borough of Brooklyn pays an average of \$1,700 per annum; the Department of Education of this City pays its Inspectors of Construction of School Buildings at the rate of \$1,500 per annum; whereas, the Inspectors of this bureau, who are expected to visit every building in this City in the course of erection or alteration, from its commencement to its completion, and to discover every unsafe building, receive but \$1,200 per annum.

The force of Elevator Inspectors is too small. There are five thousand passenger elevators in this borough, and under the provisions of the Building Code this bureau is required to make an inspection of the same at least once every three months. This is a physical impossibility with the present force of twelve Elevator Inspectors, if the inspections are thoroughly and properly made.

If the foregoing plan is adopted, in my opinion there will be no recurrence of such an unfortunate calamity as the falling of the Hotel Darlington building, as each building will be under constant surveillance by competent Inspectors, and this cannot be accomplished with the present force.

The building operations in this City are constantly increasing, plans having been submitted to this bureau during the year 1903 representing an outlay of \$75,104,200 for new buildings, and \$11,308,031 for alterations to buildings; and, in addition, 2,616 buildings were reported by the Inspectors during said period as being in an unsafe condition. From the number of plans submitted during the five months ending May 31, 1904, the indications are that there will be a marked increase in the building operations of the present year over those of 1903.

Trusting that the foregoing plan may be adopted, and believing that the objects thereby sought to be obtained will be accomplished, I remain,

"Memorial."

At the regular monthly meeting of the "Associated Employees of the Bureau of Buildings of The City of New York," held on May 1, 1903, the following resolutions were submitted and unanimously adopted.

Know ye by these presents that

Whereas, The "Constitution" of the "United States" and the "State of New York" have in a spirit of liberty granted unto all citizens the right to join together for mutual protection and advancement; while in the pursuit of happiness and

Whereas, It is a just saying, "That the mechanic is worthy of his hire," which must be admitted in every locality where equity and impartiality prevail; and whether skilled or unskilled, it is but right that the remuneration be in proportion to the value of the services rendered to the employer, be that employer an individual, firm, corporation, community, city or government;

Therefore, In order to set forth in clear, just and concise terms the facts which embody the duties of Inspectors of Buildings, in the "City of New York," the value of their services and responsibilities, and the insufficiency of the salaries paid them in proportion to the extent of said services, added to the consideration of the small percentage of mechanics competent to pass the examinations necessary to qualify, as indicated by the records of the "Civil Service Bureau," we hereby offer this "Memorial."

Stated briefly, the question resolves itself into the simple theorem, under two heads:

I.—Are or are not the present salaries of Inspectors of Buildings adequate or commensurate to the services rendered?

II.—Would the Inspectors be justified in asking for more salary? How should they ask for it? And how proceed successfully in order to obtain an increase in salary?

In answering the first query, it will be necessary to set forth the actual details of the duties and their values, in comparison with others of a similar nature, so we answer:

No; it is not adequate or sufficient, for the following reasons:

By comparison—The wages now prevailing in the trades engaged in the several branches will show that those who inspect the work are paid less than those who execute it, and the annexed schedule will explain that the following prices of labor paid up to May 1, 1903, is taken from the scale of wages paid members of the unions controlled by the New York Board of Building Trades:

Table listing various trades and their daily/weekly rates. Society of Carpenters and Joiners, per day: \$4 50. Tar, Felt and Waterproof Workers, per day: 3 50. Plumbers and Gasfitters, per day: 4 25. Plain and Ornamental Plasterers, per day: 5 50. Plasterers' Laborers, per day: 3 25. Amalgamated Painters and Decorators, per day: 4 00. Amalgamated Sheet Iron and Metal Workers, per day: 4 00. Metal Roofers, per day: \$4 00. Bricklayers, per hour: 60. Steam and Hot Water Fitters, per day: 4 00. Steam Pipe Helpers, per day: 2 30. House Shorers and Movers, per day: 3 50. Cement Masons, per day: 4 50. Cement and Asphalt Laborers, per day: 2 50. Electrical Workers, per day: 4 00. Marble Cutters, per day: 4 00. Marble Cutters' Helpers, per day: 2 65. Marble Polishers and Rubbers, per day: 3 50. Mosaic Workers' Helpers, per day: 2 65. Tile Layers, per day: 5 00. Tile Layers' Helpers, per day: 3 00. Portable Hoisting Engineers, per week: 24 00. Wood Lathers, per day: 4 00. Metal Lathers, per day: 4 00. Granite Cutters, per day: 4 50. Journeyman Stone Cutters, per day: 5 00. United Derrickmen, Riggers and Painters, per day: 3 00. Housemiths and Bridgemen, per day: 4 00.

From the above schedule it will be seen that the Inspectors of Buildings receive less salary than the wages of any of the mechanics and only 4 cents per day more than the highest paid laborer, despite superior qualifications as skilled mechanics and higher attainments as experts which they must possess to pass the Civil Service examination, as laid down by law. In plain words, they are rated below the status of the union mechanics and rank, in regard to the financial value, slightly above skilled laborers.

Taking up now the question of their increased duties and responsibilities we maintain that the Building Inspectors are entitled to an increased salary for the following reasons, viz:

I.—By the necessity for closer vigilance on the work.

II.—By its hazardous nature, as buildings are now deeper and higher, and consequently more dangerous.

III.—By the increased technical knowledge required whereby Inspectors must read and keep abreast of contemporaneous practice.

IV.—By the risks involved in night duty, on fires, emergency unsafes, and so forth.

V.—By the fact that Inspectors, on account of their advanced education, knowledge and experience, are entitled to more compensation than the artisans whose varied and different branches of work they must not only be familiar with, but likewise inspect, supervise and see completed according to law, thus placing them on a par with the highest professional element of building construction, composed of architects and engineers, with whom they are in daily consultation in matters of building technics and law.

VI.—By the fact that Inspectors are subject to duty 365 days of the year.

VII.—Because their positions and responsibilities are primarily the most important in the municipal service of New York.

VIII.—The changed and exacting conditions, consequent with the rapid evolution of building construction since the year 1892, when the building code first went into force, a period of ten years has changed the entire nature of the forms of construction, in all details, from brick and timber methods and elementary plumbing, to the skeleton steel and iron frames, complicated combinations of brick, stone, terracotta and various processes which comprise architectural engineering; and similarly with plumbing, for this, too, has undergone a complete revolution of methods and materials, so that the Plumbing Inspector of to-day must be a sanitary engineer; in the same way as a Construction Inspector must combine an architect's and engineer's knowledge, yet there has been no extra or increased compensation for either during these years. Concerning the Inspectors of Iron and Steel Work, it is to be said that they, too, must have had similar experience in the several branches of the trades coming under their supervision; for example, skeleton steel and iron frames and their multitudinous parts, and have worked as practical mechanics for a period of not less than five years, and be familiar with the theory of the construction. With all this requisite knowledge, they are still paid less than the mechanics whose work they superintend and inspect; bridgemen and iron-setters being paid \$5 per diem, while the salary of an Inspector of Iron Work is but \$3.29 per diem, proving that, although the Inspector must be possessed of greater technical knowledge than the mechanic, yet he receives less salary or wages, as you may be pleased to term the compensation. Elevator Inspectors, or Inspectors to supervise elevators, must also be skilled machinists of not less than ten years' experience, be thoroughly familiar with all the electrical and hydraulic machinery used in connection with elevators, and be mechanical engineers and elevator builders, for which qualifications they are paid less than the machinists and builders who erect the elevators.

Furthermore—The Inspectors are entitled to increased salary by the following comparative schedule:

The City of Boston pays its Inspectors of Buildings the sum of \$1,800 to \$2,000 per annum, with a population of 560,000.

City of Chicago pays its Inspectors \$1,800 per annum, with a population of 1,689,575.

City of New York pays its Inspectors \$1,200 per annum, with a population of 3,437,202, or \$600 less than the two sister cities of lesser population.

The United States Government pays each "Superintendent" of Construction in the employ of the "Architect of the Treasury," who is in charge of only one government building from \$6 per diem to \$3,000 per annum, according to the size of the building and the responsibilities involved. Private firms engaged in building construction, also corporations, pay their foremen \$6 and \$8 per day, and superintendents from \$40 to \$100 per week. The Department of Education of New York City pays each Inspector on the construction of one school building only, \$5.50 per diem, \$1,500 per annum. The Bureau of Sewers of The City of New York pays its Inspectors on the construction of new street sewers from \$1,200 to \$2,100 per annum, and this only involves leveling and the superintendence of the brickwork of the sewers. A Tenement House Inspector of The City of New York only requires slight technical knowledge, need have had no experience nor have been as a practical mechanic, yet he obtains a salary of \$1,200 per annum.

We therefore maintain that the present salaries of the Inspectors are too small in consideration of the comparisons set forth above, in addition to which might be added the facts, that the Charter of The City of New York compels them to be men of a calibre superior to any classified in Class D of the Civil Service list, and insists that each and every Inspector of Buildings must have at least five years' practical experience, be a skilled mechanic, pass two examinations, one before the Civil Service Commission and one before the Board of Examiners, either of which may disqualify him for office. The technical knowledge necessary to pass can only be acquired by years of actual practice at a trade or handicraft, and in many cases is absolutely unattainable in less than ten years.

In many of the cases quoted herein we have demonstrated there are many skilled employees of the City who are better paid with much less onerous duties and responsibilities; and for another example we might cite the Inspectors of Masonry on the rapid transit tunnel construction who are at present earning on an average of from \$4.50 to \$5.50 per diem, and with overtime from \$35 to \$40 per week; but the District Inspectors of the Bureaus of Buildings are each responsible for the construction of from 25 to 50 and the legal care, condition and safety of from 500 to 2,000 houses, ranging from the frame shed to the steel skeleton fireproof skyscrapers, receive the least compensation of all, viz.: the small sum of \$3.39 per diem, \$25 per week and \$1,200 per annum.

We therefore ask your Honorable Body to give full and earnest consideration to the statements contained in this "memorial," as we believe it holds facts and figures which are irrefutable and will tend to show the vital necessity for active and urgent action on the part of the association to increase compensations of the Inspectors of the several Bureaus of Buildings by an early and sincere effort to lay these facts before the higher authorities for their consideration and action.

We believe that an increase of salary can be obtained by placing the data and facts as herein set forth in the form of a "memorial" before the Superintendent of each borough, in order that each may scrutinize and approve of the procedure; and when approved or indorsed may serve as an instrument for him to lay before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment when the appropriations for the several departments for the years 1904 are under consideration; or it might be submitted in the meantime to the Presidents of the five boroughs for their approval by the Superintendents of Buildings before the fall of 1903, thus making the "memorial" lawful and regular.

In all the movements which will affect the welfare and progress of individuals and organizations a time arrives when concerted action becomes necessary; that the initiative must be taken, and the best ideas and methods essential to success be transmitted to paper; this, we believe, we have done in this "memorial," and such are fairly and impartially set forth.

Recognizing, however, the truth that there are many members among your Honorable Body whose suggestions and propositions would tend to strengthen and improve the value of the document, it is submitted in this elementary form as a simple basis for future action, and the promotion, discussion and interchange of ideas on the extremely important subject of increasing salaries.

The present progressive movement of the time shows that never in the mechanical history of New York have the trades and crafts reached such a scientific height, and we in conclusion put forward our request as being fair, just, equitable and due our increased attainments and responsibilities.

With the assurance to the organization of our best efforts in all things vital and beneficial to its members this "memorial" is very respectfully submitted.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
