#### PETITIONS.

By Alderman Morris—  
Ald. JNO. J. MORRIS:

MY DEAR SIR—The inclosed paper left to be signed by the officers of the Harlem Railroad, if after conferring with their attorney it should be deemed advisable so to do, is herewith forwarded to you as per promise.

In doing so permit me to remark that the officers aforesaid—as you will observe—have failed to affix their signatures, not because they are not in sympathy with the aggrieved parties in their efforts to defeat the carrying out of the plan, but wholly because of the phraseology of the remonstrance. A remonstrance against the proposed drain would be signed by them if the grievance was concisely stated.

To the Common Council, and to the Committee on Police and Health Departments of the City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—Consideration has been heretofore given to the subject of the drainage of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, lately annexed to the city, and proceedings have been had, and steps taken for the construction of a main sewer on the line of the Mill Brook, from where it empties into Harlem river to One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, where the Harlem Railway crosses the street, a distance of more than a mile in length. It is a work of great importance and great expense, and ultimately will have to be extended miles beyond its present northern terminus, along the line of the brook.

But the Sanitary Superintendent and Inspector have certified, under the provisions of chapter 566 of the Laws of 1871, and of chapter 549 of the Laws of 1875, that a space five hundred feet wide on either side of Mill Brook, from One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street north to where the railway crosses the Southern Boulevard, a distance of at least three miles, should also be drained, by means other than by sewers; and the Board of Health, under the absolute requirement of the act, has directed that the work be done and sent the papers to this Board, by whom they have been referred to your Committee.

Now, therefore, we do respectfully represent—

That we are the owners of by far the greater part of the land to be affected, holding it as part of the manor of Morrisania, under title which goes back to the year 1632, and occupying it ourselves for agricultural purposes, for which alone it can be used. There is no demand for it for town or city lots, or for any of the purposes of habitation, although some years ago a few small pieces were sold out in lots or strips of twenty or twenty-five feet front, and houses built on them. It is not probable that our land will be required for many years for these purposes, and until the thousands of acres to the south, cut up into blocks and otherwise treated at enormous expense, shall have been occupied.

We are opposed to the measure now proposed. The time may come when the land may have to be drained, and the Mill Brook sewer extended north from One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, but that time has not arrived. Whatever is necessary to be done on our farms we have already done, in order to drain them, and make them tillable and productive; and to allow strangers now to enter on it, and under pretense of the public good, to commence a series of works about which we will not be consulted, will be to destroy the little value it now has, and make us the subjects of public and official plunder. The power granted under the act, to the person having the work in charge, is unlimited; there are no restrictions upon him, no directions even how he is to proceed within the thousand feet in width put under his charge, neither as to the nature or cost of the work. All is in his sublime discretion, and the courts have recently upheld his omnipotence. There is no relief.

The measure, if carried out, is one of ruin to us. We ask to be left alone, and allowed to take care of our land as our ancestors have done, until the time arrives when it may be wanted for other purposes, and of the time, when this arrives, we ask to be the judges. To carry out the present measure against our wishes, without our having been consulted or even knowing what was intended, is an act of tyranny, robbery, and fraud; and, as such, it has been plotted and intended. In a similar case, occurring in the city, under the same laws, and affecting only some five acres, one of your petitioners has recently been condemned to pay fifteen thousand dollars for what the late Commissioner of Public Works was pleased to style an underground drain, a work which, even if done at all, is of no possible value to his property, and the elected court of last resort has confirmed the judgment.

The laws under which these proceedings were concocted and carried out were passed in the last years of the sway of the ring regime; and, in our opinion, should be repealed.

Subsequently Alderman Morris moved that the memorial be printed in full in the CITY RECORD. The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the affirmative.

The petition of the undersigned respectfully shows:

That he is the owner of large real estate interest at Bay Ridge, in the town of New Utrecht, Long Island; that outside the limit of the city of Brooklyn, and within the boundaries of said town, there is a large population without any suitable or proper ferry conveniences to this city; that Hamilton Avenue Ferry is the nearest water transit communication; that to reach that point involves considerable expense, distance, inconvenience, and loss of time.

That Sixty-fifth street in said town, as laid down upon the map of the King's County Town Commissioners' survey, is one hundred feet wide, and is now in use from the Fourth avenue to the Bay of New York.

That the terminus of the New York, Bay Ridge, and Jamaica Railroad is adjacent to this street; that manifest public interest and convenience absolutely requires the privileges of a ferry from the said foot of said Sixty-fifth street to this city.

That the bulkhead at the foot of Whitehall street, within the corporate limits of your Honorable Body, would be a suitable and convenient terminus at this end of the route.

REPORT

A reiteration of the opinions contained in their former report (see page 417, Minutes of March 8, 1877), and that in examining the provisions of the additional papers referred at the last meeting, they have decided to incorporate some of their provisions or suggestions in a new ordinance, which is herewith accompanying. The provisions of this new ordinance are much more simple, and your Committee believe will be more effective in abating the nuisance and averting the danger to which our citizens are subjected from the vast number of useless and vagrant dogs that now infest the streets of the city, as they leave entirely with his honor the Mayor power and authority to take such measures as he may deem most efficient to carry out the provisions of the ordinance.

Your Committee respectfully recommend its adoption.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent the danger of hydrophobia to any of the inhabitants of the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows :

Section 1. Hereafter it shall not be lawful to permit any dog to go abroad loose or at large in any of the public streets, lanes, alleys, highways, parks or places within the corporate limits of the City of New York, under a penalty of three dollars for each offense, to be recovered against the owner, possessor, or person who harbored such dog within three days previous to the time of such dog being so found going abroad loose or at large ; and the Commissioners of Police are hereby authorized and directed to cause complaint to be made to the Corporation Attorney against the owner or possessor of every dog permitted to go loose or at large within the corporate limits, as aforesaid, for the recovery of the penalties prescribed in this ordinance ; such penalties and all license fees, when collected, to be accounted for semi-monthly, and paid to the Comptroller of said city, and upon the requisition of the Mayor, to be applied towards the payment of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance. Nothing in this ordinance shall prevent any dog from going into any such street, lane, alley, highway, park or public place, provided such dog shall be held, by such owner or other person, securely by a cord or chain to be not more than six feet long, fastened to a collar around the neck of the animal.

Sec. 2. Every owner, possessor, or person who harbors any dog shall take out a permit for each dog, at the Permit Bureau, paying the sum of two dollars (\$2) for the same. All permits, and renewals of the same, shall be dated from the first day of May in each and every year, and shall be for one year from date, and all renewals shall be one dollar (\$1). Said permit shall have the name of the owner and the number of the permit or license on it. Any dog so licensed must have a collar around his neck, with a metal tag attached, having the number of the license on it. And any dog so licensed must, when in the street, be held by such owner, or other person, secured by a cord, rope, or chain, not more than six feet in length ; but the owner, at his option, may use instead of the above, a muzzle, constructed so as to prevent the dog from biting. Any dog that is not so secured, although he is licensed, shall be captured the same as if no license was granted. No dog having a collar and tag, with the number of his license on it around his neck, that may be in a wagon or other vehicle belonging to his owner, shall be captured. Any person appointed by his Honor the Mayor to capture dogs who shall permit any person to take one or more dogs from him for nothing, or for pay, shall be arrested, and taken before a police justice, and upon the facts being proven, the judge shall impose a fine of not less than \$10, or more than \$50, for each offense. Any person may make a complaint of persons having dogs unlicensed at the police stations, and the officer in command shall entertain the same ; and all policemen on patrol duty must report all violations of this ordinance the same as any other violation of a Corporation ordinance. All such reports shall be transmitted to the Corporation Attorney, the same as for other violations of city ordinances, and in addition to the \$3 license fee, shall be added all costs and suits of the same as for any other violation of the city ordinances.

Sec. 3. The Mayor of the City of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to take such measures as he may deem most efficient to carry into effect the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance. All dogs found loose or at large, as aforesaid, shall be seized, captured and delivered by such persons as the Mayor shall designate, at a place to be provided and indicated by him, where such animals, if not within forty-eight hours thereafter claimed, and redeemed by the owner or some

other person, shall be killed and destroyed in such manner, and by such persons as the Mayor shall designate.

Sec. 4. Chapter XLIV. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Committee on Law Department, to whom was referred a preamble and resolution deprecating, condemning and protesting "against that false and unwise economy in the public expenditures which would commence with the Educational Department first," requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer any unexpended balances belonging to the "Educational Department" to the fund to "restore the salaries of our public school teachers," and directing the Board of Aldermen to ask the Legislature "to pass the proposed act, heretofore offered, giving the Board of Education the complete control and power over the expenditure of all moneys hereafter raised by the city for educational purposes," respectfully

REPORT :

That, upon inquiry, your Committee learn that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment have appropriated for salaries for the year 1877, the same amount as for the year 1876, and if any reduction is made in the salaries paid to teachers in the public schools of this city, for this year, the Board of Education has acted upon its own responsibility, as it had the exclusive power to do, in making the reduction. The allegation in the second paragraph of the preamble, that "the Board of Apportionment has cut down the appropriation eighty thousand dollars in the present year's estimate, thus compelling either a reduction in the number of assistant teachers or in the remuneration for their services," is therefore erroneous, and the sympathy expressed in the other portions of the paper is wasted, commencing with an erroneous promise, it was inevitably certain to terminate with a wrong conclusion. The Board of Education is not a department of the city government, but claims to be and no doubt is entirely independent of it, except in the item of appropriation, and this limited dependence has existed only since the year 1873, when the present Board was created by the State Legislature. For many years previous to 1870 it obtained and expended money *ad libitum*. The Legislature, in its wisdom, deprived the present Board of that power, and vested it in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. This Common Council has not the slightest control over the question, and it would be not only improper to interfere between the Board of Education and its employees without first being requested by one or the other to do so ; but such interference might and doubtless would be regarded by both as an unsought and therefore thankless intermeddling with their affairs, and be regarded by both as "proffered service," and valued as such.

Your Committee therefore, while unanimously deprecating any reduction by the Board of Education of the salaries of the teachers, feel it to be their duty to recommend your Honorable Body not to take any official action in the matter, and respectfully ask to be discharged from the further consideration of the subject, and that the papers be placed on file.

Resolved, That this Board of Aldermen, as the representatives of the citizens of this great city, fully approve and respectfully ask of our present State Legislature that they will pass the proposed act heretofore offered, giving the Board of Education the complete control and power over the expenditure of all money hereafter raised by the city for educational purposes, and that copies of this preamble and ordinance be transmitted to the Assemblymen and Senators representing this city in the present Legislature.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative, on a division called by Alderman Cowing, viz.:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Cowing, De Vries, Ehrhart, Morris, Phillips, Pinckney, Salmon, Sheils, and Simonson—10.

Negative—Aldermen Cole, Guntzer, Joyce, Keenan, Lewis, Reilly, Sauer, and Slevin—8.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolutions substituted for the recommendation in the report of the Committee.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote :

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Cole, Cowing, De Vries, Ehrhart, Joyce, Morris, Phillips, Pinckney, Reilly, Salmon, Sheils, and Simonson—13.

Negative—Aldermen Guntzer, Keenan, Lewis, Sauer, and Slevin—5.

Alderman Morris was here called to the chair.

The Committee on Police and Health Departments, to whom was referred the annexed petition of property-owners and residents of Forty-sixth, Forty-seventh, Forty-eighth, Forty-ninth, Fiftieth, and Fifty-first streets, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, to have a nuisance abated, caused by the New York Commercial Manufacturing Company, of Forty-eighth street, North river, respectfully

REPORT :

That this is one of these questions the determination of which has been nominally, if not really, taken from the control of the Common Council by the State Legislature in the passage of the Law of 1866, creating the Board of Health for this city, and investing it with limited legislative powers. It is certainly an anomaly in local civil government, but as the highest courts in the State have upheld the State Legislature in thus dividing and subdividing the legislative powers of the city government into small fragments, and investing Boards and Commissioners with co-ordinate if not powers superior to the Common Council, a remedy for the evil complained of must be sought from the Legislature, if it cannot be obtained from its creature—the Board of Health.

Your Committee, therefore, ask respectfully to be discharged from the further consideration of the subject, and that the papers be referred to the Board of Health, with the request that they take immediate action to have said nuisance abated.
