REPORTED MORTALITY for the week ending August 16, 1884, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending August 9, 1884.

W. De F. Day, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 657 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 16, 1884, which is a decrease of 51, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 16 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1883. The actual mortality for the week ending August 9, 1884, was 713, which is 38 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.23 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,361,387.
