

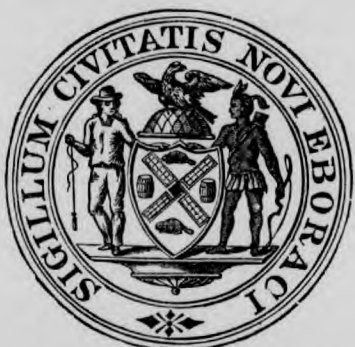

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The number of cases received from the Police Department from January 1, 1885, to December 31, 1886, is 82,239. An analysis shows that of these, 5,852 were for not branding and painting telegraph poles; 426 for failure to erect and maintain gates at railroad crossings; 27 vacant lots not fenced; 560 gutter bridges under which obstructions were allowed to remain; 9 sunken and broken flags on sidewalks; 2 boilers not numbered, and 10 sidewalks over which water was running; which complaints should not have been made to the Corporation Attorney.

2,272 were snow and ice cases upon which suits could not be brought, because in many instances owners were unknown, and duplicate complaints were made for the same storm.

Deducting the total of these improperly reported cases from the 82,239 above mentioned, and there remain 73,081 complaints, upon which 21,061 suits were brought, leaving a remainder of 52,020 upon which no suits were brought.

The number of suits dismissed was 7,425.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At an executive meeting of the Board of Docks, held September 16, 1887.

Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews, and Marshall.

The minutes of the meeting held September 15, 1887, were read and approved.

The communication from the Civil Service Supervisory and Examining Boards, submitting eligible list of Watchmen, was,

On motion, referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The report of Dock Master D. W. Bogert as to the condition of Pier, old 34, North river, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the Secretary directed to send A. B. Valentine, agent of the Cornell Steamboat Company, a copy of said report.

A communication from the Engineer-in-Chief reporting that he had directed that Laborer, acting Watchman, Patrick Lestrangle, shall not be again assigned to duty as acting Watchman for having been found asleep while on duty on the night of Wednesday, the 7th of September, 1887, and recommending that his action be approved.

On motion, the report was received and recommendation adopted.

A communication from Edward Gottschall, Searcher of Water Grants, requesting an increase in compensation, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the compensation of Edward Gottschall, Searcher of Water Grants in this Department, be and hereby is fixed at \$125 per month, to take effect on and after October 1, 1887.

The President, Commissioner Stark, offered the following resolution which was,

On motion adopted.

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and is hereby directed to have built, with the force of the Department, as soon as practicable, a dump with an approach to the same on westerly side of and near the outer end of Pier, new 32, East river, near the foot of Pike Slip, at a cost not exceeding \$950. The same being for the use of the Street Cleaning Department.

A communication from the Comptroller of the city in reference to the substitution of James M. Cumings in place of John Reynolds to the estimate of the Morris & Cumings Dredging Company, for removing the remains of burned Pier, new 37, North river, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the substitution of James M. Cumings in the place of John Reynolds to the estimate of the Morris & Cumings Dredging Company, for removing the remains of burned Pier, new 37, North river.

The following resolutions were, on motion, adopted:

Resolved, That the services of Charles P. Blake as Dock Master be and they are hereby dispensed with, and that he be relieved from any further duty in this Department, and that his name be discontinued from the pay-roll thereof, to take effect from and including October 1, 1887.

Resolved, That John J. Ryan be and hereby is appointed Dock Master, and assigned to take charge of District No. 12, North river, with compensation of \$150 per month, to take effect October 1, 1887, provided he shall file his official bond with sureties duly approved by the President, as provided by article 13 of the By-Laws of this Board, on or before that date.

Resolved, That Charles Hutchinson, Dock Master, be assigned to take charge of District No. 7, East river, to take effect on and after October 1, 1887.

The petition of residents of West Farms and others, requesting the Board to grant permit for the erection of pontoon bridge over the Bronx river, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following preambles and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, An application has been made to this Department for permission to place a pontoon bridge over the Bronx river at or near No. 1924 Main street, West Farms, to the Westchester shore, and a petition has been received in favor of said bridge and placed on file in this Department, and

Whereas, This Department did invite all parties who might wish to be heard on the matter to appear before the Commissioners on Thursday, September 15, at 3 P. M., and there express their views, and

Whereas, Certain parties favoring and opposing the bridge did appear on that day, and were accorded a full hearing, and

Whereas, The conclusions of the Commissioners, after a careful weighing of the evidence for and against, are that the erection of the bridge asked for would seriously interfere with the navigation of the stream by preventing small boats from ascending it above this point, and that it would be of little benefit to the general public, and would, particularly on Sundays, conduce to disturb the order and quiet of the neighborhood, and

Whereas, It appears that the motive for placing the bridge is mostly a private one, the parties asking for it having houses of refreshments at both ends, where spirits and other beverages are sold to numbers of men and boys who frequent the base-ball grounds on the other side, and

Whereas, An earnest protest has been made against the erection of said bridge by many property-owners and reputable residents of the neighborhood; now be it

Resolved, That the application be denied, and the Dock Master of the district be directed not to allow the bridge to be placed thereat, at the point named in the application, nor at any other, without express authority from this Board.

Commissioner Matthews offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to Ketterer & Hayes to use and occupy, during the will of the Board, a berth for coal barge on the north side of Pier foot of West Thirteenth street, North river (recently vacated by A. C. Cheney), for the purpose of unloading coal, at the rate of \$18 per week, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master of the District, commencing September 19, 1887.

On motion, Nelson Parker was relieved from duty as Temporary Watchman, to take effect October 1, 1887.

Nelson Parker was appointed Laborer, to take effect on and after October 1, 1887.

On motion, Henry Crum, Richard O'Brien and Thomas Redman were appointed Dock Builders; Thomas Higgins, Caulker, and Matthew Drum, Ship Carpenter.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
