tions to the building at his own expense, in accordance with plans and specifications to be prepared by the Engineer of the Finance Department, and approved by the Comptroller, a condition which had been agreed to by one of the old tenants of the building, the estimated cost of the work being \$6,000. Upon the termination of the lease the improvements were to become the property of the City.

Plans have been prepared for the construction of a building and estimates of the cost, which for a suitable structure, is found to exceed the original estimate several thousand dollars.

The amount is so large that the old tenant of the building is not willing to expend so much in the erection of the building on a lease for only five years, but is willing and has made an agreement to erect and maintain a new building at his own cost according to the approved plans, on a lease for ten years, and to keep the building insured for its repair or reconstruction if damaged or destroyed by fire, and will bid for the lease, at a minimum rental of \$3,500 per annum.

I recommend that a lease for the term of ten years shall be sold at public auction upon the above terms and conditions, and submit a resolution accordingly.

Plans of the new building proposed to be erected on the site of the Old Arsenal were submitted for examination and approval of the Board, and the terms and conditions of a lease of the premises were considered. The resolution submitted by the Comptroller was amended in several particulars and adopted, but after its adoption, as amended, the resolution was reconsidered and referred back to the Comptroller to prepare it in form to meet fully the views of the Board as to terms and conditions to be provided for in a lease of the premises.

The Comptroller presented the following report on the surrender of Castle Garden by the Commissioners of Emigration:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—In accordance with the resolution of this Board, adopted on December 29, 1890, authorizing the Comptroller to receive the surrender of Castle Garden to the City from the Commissioners of Emigration, I respectfully report that on December 31, 1890, at noon, the premises were duly surrendered to, and taken possession of, by the Comptroller, and are now in his charge and custody.

I submit herewith a communication from Hon. James Daly, Collector of City Revenue, enclosing a schedule of the property as received from the Commissioners of Emigration.

The rent has been paid by the Commissioners of Emigration for their recent occupation of Castle Garden up to the date of the surrender of the premises, but a large amount of rent on old account remains due to the City and unsettled.

The disposition of the property is now subject to such action of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund as they may deem proper and most advantageous for the public interest.

The Mayor called up the resolution offered by him at the last meeting of the Board and laid over, authorizing the Comptroller to transfer Castle Garden to the Department of Public Parks, after taking possession of the premises.

After a general discussion of the proper use and disposition that should be made of Castle Garden, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to transfer the custody of Castle Garden to the Department of Public Parks; provided, however, that the premises shall not be leased or appropriated for any purpose without the approval and consent of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The Comptroller presented the following report on the recent destruction of a part of the new West Washington Market by fire:

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT,

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Early in the morning of December 31, 1890, a fire occurred in the section of the West Washington Market between Loew and Hewitt avenues, west of Lawton avenue, by which the building was materially damaged.

Until it can be repaired the tenants will be greatly incommoded in conducting their business, but as they will continue to occupy their stalls to some extent, a part of the rent at least should be paid, but I think a reduction should be made as in the case of the former fire in that market.

The aggregate weekly rental of that portion of the market building damaged by the fire is \$187.50.

An appropriation was made in the Final Estimate for the present year to pay the expense of the necessary repairs, and steps have been taken to complete them as early as possible. While the repairs are being made I recommend that the rent of the tenants damaged by the fire be adjusted by the Comptroller.

The Comptroller presented a second report and resolution on a lease to the City of premises between One Hundred and Nineteenth and One Hundred and Twentieth streets, and Eighth and St. Nicholas avenues, for the use of the Department of Public Works, as follows:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—At the meeting held on November 18, 1890, I presented a report and resolution on an application of the Commissioner of Public Works for the renewal of a lease of premises on the block between One Hundred and Nineteenth and One Hundred and Twentieth streets, and Eighth and St. Nicholas avenues, which were laid over to see if the rent could not be reduced. The rent asked on a renewal of the lease for the term of two years was \$5,000 per annum, being \$1,400 more than the old rent. I find that the taxes on the property have been increased \$600 more than they were five years ago, when the original lease was made, and that there is ground for some increase of the rent. The agent of the owner, however, has agreed to make a reduction of \$500 on the rent that was asked, and to renew the lease of the premises for two years at \$4,500 per annum.

I now submit a resolution to authorize a lease on these terms.

A certificate from the Architect, John P. Leo, was received, stating that materials and work have been received entitling the contractor to that amount.

Commissioner Coleman offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be directed to pay to Patrick K. Lantry seven hundred and fifty-two dollars and eight cents (\$752.08), the amount due him on this date in accordance with the Architect's certificate, and that a voucher for that amount be forwarded.

F. 6," wherein the said additional parcels of land are numbered 1 1/4, 4 1/4, 4 1/2, 4 3/4, 14 1/2, 15a, 15b, 63 1/2, 63 3/4, 64 1/4 and 64 1/2 ; and we direct that said maps be duly certified and transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation for filing in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, and in the office of the Clerk of the County of Putnam, and for delivery to the Commissioners of Appraisal, as directed by section 11 of the aforesaid act ; and the said Counsel to the Corporation is hereby requested to immediately take the necessary steps to amend the proceedings heretofore taken for the acquirement of lands for the aforesaid reservoirs and dams, so as to include the taking in fee of the above-described parcels of land as the same are shown upon the aforesaid property maps.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same were adopted.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the Secretary was directed to have the final plan sheets adopted on October 10, 1888, described as "Exhibit F. F. 3," showing the additional parcels of land required for the construction of the East Branch Reservoir, or Double Reservoir I, in the Town of South East, Putnam County, New York, cancelled, and to request the Counsel to the Corporation to return the six similar property-maps, described as "Exhibit F. F. 4," adopted on the same day, to the Aqueduct Commissioners for cancellation.
