

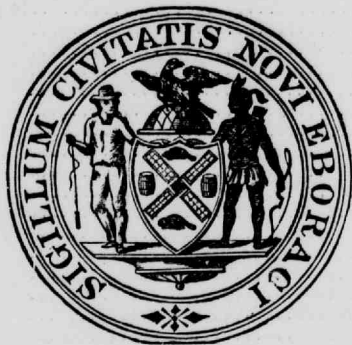

Petition of Eleventh Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., asking for increased armory accommodations.

HEADQUARTERS ELEVENTH REGIMENT INFANTRY, N. G. S. N. Y.,

NEW YORK, June 15, 1879. }

To the President and Members of the Honorable Board of Aldermen of the City and County of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned, Colonel commanding the Eleventh Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., respectfully shows that this regiment now occupies the upper southerly portion of the Centre Market as an armory, and that the northerly portion of said building is now vacant. That the space allotted this command is entirely insufficient and inadequate for drills and meetings, and the proper keeping of uniforms, arms, equipments, etc., for which the undersigned is responsible to the State of New York.

That by virtue of section 3 of chapter 10, Laws of 1879, and section 121, as amended, it is the duty of the county authorities to provide all regiments of the National Guard with suitable accommodation and everything necessary for the protection of the property of the State of New York.

That in order to protect and safely keep the property of this command and of the State of New York in good order, additional accommodations in the said building are needed. It appears that the entire building where the armory is located is the property of this county, it would therefore be an additional expense to the same if this command would be placed in charge of the whole upper part of said building, and the same be remodeled to suit.

Wherefore, your petitioner respectfully asks your Honorable Body to make such alterations and provisions for this regiment to enable them fully to protect the property of the State, its citizens and their welfare.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM DEPARTMENTS AND CORPORATION OFFICERS.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—I duly received the following resolution adopted by your Honorable Body on the 27th of May last, and approved by his Honor the Mayor on the 6th instant:

"Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby requested to inform this Board at his earliest convenience if the terms of office of persons now holding the office of city marshal have expired."

In my opinion the terms of office of all marshals appointed during the six years immediately preceding May 1, 1879, expired on that day. I had occasion, in April last, at the request of his Honor the Mayor, to consider the question when the terms of office of the marshals then in office would expire, and I inclose herewith a copy of the opinion then given by me, which sets forth at length my views in relation to this matter.

Hon. EDWARD COOPER, Mayor:

SIR—I duly received your letter of the 19th instant, requesting my opinion as to when the terms of office of the city marshals now holding office in this city will expire.

Chapter 804 of the Laws of 1871 authorized the Mayor of this city, within ten days after the passage of that act, and every three years thereafter, to appoint thirty-five marshals to hold office for the term of three years from May 1, 1871. Under this statute, any vacancy occurring in the office of marshal was to be filled by the Mayor, but any person appointed to fill a vacancy was to hold office for the unexpired term only of the person in whose place he should be appointed. Pursuant to this statute, a large number of marshals were appointed, and were in office on April 30, 1873, when they were all legi-lated out of office by the so-called Charter, which became a law on that day. Section 25 of that Charter authorized the Mayor to nominate, and by and with the consent of the Board of Aldermen to appoint certain officers therein named, and all other officers not elected by the people. Said section also provided that every head of department, and person therein named, except as otherwise provided, shall hold his office for the term of six years, and in each case until a person was duly appointed in his place. As city marshals are mentioned in section 117 among the officers whose terms of office were to expire May 1, 1873, and as they were local officers, not elected by the people, there can be no question that the Charter removed the marshals who were in office when it passed, and also conferred the power to appoint marshals upon the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen; and as no term of office is prescribed for marshals, I should have supposed that it was clear that the marshals first appointed pursuant to the Charter would hold office for the term of six years from May 1, 1873, and that their successors would hold office for the same term. This view of the law as to the terms of office of marshals does not appear to have been heretofore taken. The communications sent by Mayor Havemeyer to the Aldermen, nominating marshals, stated that they were to be appointed for terms of three years each. Moreover, in 1876, Mayor Wickham nominated, and the Aldermen confirmed the appointment of a new set of city marshals. The communications from Mayor Wickham, making such nominations, stated that the term of the new appointees was to be for three years, ending May 1, 1879. It seems, therefore, to have been supposed by Mayor Havemeyer and Mayor Wickham, that although the power to appoint was derived from the Charter, and must therefore be exercised by the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen, the term of office still remained three years, as fixed by the act of 1871, above referred to. This view seems to me to have been erroneous, because section 25 expressly declares that every person in that section named, except as otherwise provided, shall hold his office for the term of six years, and until a person is duly appointed in his place. City marshals must be regarded as "persons" named in that section, for this is the only section in the Charter from which the power of the Mayor and Aldermen to appoint them at all can be derived; and as the Charter contains no other provision in regard to the terms of office, it would seem to necessarily follow that the term in each case must be six years.

But whether the term of office is six years or three years, I think that the term of the present city marshals will expire May 1, 1879. If the lawful term is three years, then, as their appointments were for a term of three years, ending May 1, 1879, they certainly go out of office on that day. If, as I think, the lawful term was six years from May 1, 1873, then the marshals first appointed were really appointed for terms of six years from May 1, 1873. The term of office being fixed by the statute, the fact that the communications of Mayor Havemeyer, making the nominations, stated the term to be three years, or the fact, if it be so, that their certificates of appointment state the term to be three years, did not shorten their terms from six to three years. I do not know how many of the marshals appointed by Mayor Havemeyer in 1873 were reappointed by Mayor Wickham in 1876. Such re-appointments, however, had no legal effect upon the term. If a marshal was appointed in 1873, for a term of six years from May 1, 1873, and was, in consequence of a supposed necessity therefor, re-appointed in 1876 for three years, of course his term of office would end by law on May 1, 1879.

In those cases in which new appointments were made by Mayor Wickham the same result would follow. The lawful term being six years, the marshals first appointed, and not reappointed, must be

deemed to have abandoned their offices, and their successors must be regarded as having been appointed for the remainder of an unexpired term of six years, which commenced May 1, 1873. I am of opinion, therefore, that in all cases in which an appointment was actually made by Mayor Havemeyer, for a term commencing May 1, 1873, the term of the original appointee, or his successor, will expire May 1, 1879.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Joseph Bonture to retain fruit-stand at the curb-stone on the southwest corner of Wall and Water streets, the consent of the occupants of said premises being hereto annexed, said stand not to be more than six feet long and two feet wide; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Thomas Kent to place and keep a stand for the sale of fruit in front of No. 68 South street, said stand not to be over four feet long by two feet wide; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Michael Garrity to keep a stand for the sale of fruit in front of No. 144½ Bowery, on the sidewalk; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Mrs. Kinney to place and keep fruit-stand on sidewalk at curb-stone line in front of premises northwest corner of Nassau and John streets, the consent of the occupant of said premises being hereto annexed, said stand to be not more than five feet long and two feet in width, of the usual height; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Charles Driscoll to place and keep fruit-stand on southeast corner of Liberty and Nassau streets, said stand to be not more than five feet long and twenty inches wide, and situated at the curb-stone line; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Mrs. Adele Prevot to place and keep stand for sale of fruits and candies at the curb-stone line in front of premises No. 21 Broad street, the consent of the occupant of said premises being hereto annexed, said stand to be not more than five feet long and two feet wide, and of the usual height; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Edward Fulbrook to place and retain fruit-stand on sidewalk at curb-stone line in front of premises No. 25 William street, the consent of occupants of said premises being hereto annexed, said stand to be not more than five feet long and two feet wide, and of the usual height; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The Board then proceeded to reconsider the same in the manner prescribed by law, and upon a vote being taken thereon, was adopted, notwithstanding the objections of his Honor the Mayor, by the following vote, viz.:

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Whereupon Alderman William Sauer took the chair, and Alderman Matthew Stewart acted as Secretary.

REPORTS RESUMED.

The Special Committee appointed to apportion this county into twenty-four Assembly Districts,

REPORT:

That they entered upon the work assigned them with the following objects in view:

1st. To preserve the old outlines, so as to disturb as little as possible the homogeneous and political characteristics of the districts; and

2d. To divide the population as the Constitution requires between the different districts.

The Committee being equally composed of Democrats and Republicans, labored with a common purpose to arrive at a unanimous result, knowing very well that a failure to do so would open the door to a thousand various interests, of a personal and party character, each trying to gain some personal or political advantage, and having once gained a foothold, it would be impossible to tell where it would end, and when we could finish our labors. Of course, both parties in the Committee endeavored to so shape the districts as to gain some advantage for the political party they represented. In this opposition of interests lay the chief difficulty to be overcome, and at one time it seemed as if two separate reports would result from our labors; but after a full discussion of the justice of each claim and a partial yielding of personal and party views, a unanimous conclusion to report the following plan of apportionment to the Board of Aldermen, and ask for its adoption.

First District—All that part of the city bounded by the North and East rivers and lying within Peck slip, Ferry street, Gold street, Spruce street, Park row, Broadway, and Canal street, and including Governor's, Bedloe's, and Ellis' Islands. Population, 34,041.

Second District—All that part of the city lying within Canal street, Broadway, Park row, Spruce street, Gold street, Ferry street, Peck slip, East river, Catharine street, and the Bowery. Population, 40,689.

Third District—All that part of the city lying within Canal street, Broadway, Twenty-third street, Third avenue, and the Bowery. Population, 41,454.

Fourth District—All that part of the city lying within Catharine street, Division street, Grand street, Jackson street, and East river. Population, 42,696.

Fifth District—All that part of the city lying within Canal street, Broadway, Bleecker street, Hancock street (or Cottage place), West Houston street, and North river. Population, 39,907.

Sixth District—All that part of the city lying within Division street, Grand street, Jackson street, East river, Stanton street, Clinton street, Rivington street, and Norfolk street. Population, 47,774.

Seventh District—All that part of the city lying within Broadway, West Twenty-third street, Seventh avenue, West Sixteenth street, Eighth avenue, West Fourth street, West Washington place, Sixth avenue, Carmine street, and Bleecker street. Population, 45,698.

Eighth District—All that part of the city lying within the Bowery, Stanton street, Clinton street, Rivington street, Norfolk street, and Division street. Population, 52,235.

Ninth District—All that part of the city lying within West Houston street, Hancock street (or Cottage place), Bleecker street, Carmine street, Sixth avenue, West Washington place, West Fourth street, Eighth avenue, West Sixteenth street, and North river. Population, 41,648.

Tenth District—All that part of the city lying within the Bowery, Third avenue, Eighth street (or St. Mark's place), Avenue A, Seventh street, Avenue B, Clinton street, and Stanton street. Population, 58,254.

Eleventh District—All that part of the city lying within East and West Twenty-third streets, Lexington avenue, East and West Fortieth streets, Seventh avenue, West Twenty-fifth street, and Sixth avenue. Population, 40,879.

Twelfth District—All that part of the city lying within Stanton street, Clinton street, Avenue B, East Eleventh street, and East river. Population, 45,937.

Thirteenth District—All that part of the city lying within West Sixteenth street, Seventh avenue, West Twenty-third street, Sixth avenue, West Twenty-fifth street, Seventh avenue, West Twenty-ninth street, Eighth avenue, West Thirty-second street, Ninth avenue, West Twenty-sixth street, and North river. Fourteenth District—All that part of the city lying within Third avenue, East Fourteenth street, East river, East Eleventh street, Avenue B, Seventh street, Avenue A, and Eighth street (or St. Mark's place). Population, 37,623.

Twenty-third District—All that part of the city lying within East Ninety-first street, Fifth avenue, West One Hundred and Tenth street, Seventh avenue, Harlem river and East river, including Randall's and Ward's Islands, and that part of the Central Park lying north of the Transverse road, crossing the same at or about Eighty-sixth street. Population, 39,548.

Twenty-fourth District—All that part of the city lying north and east of Harlem river and Spuyten Duyvil creek, and known as the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the City of New York. Population, 36,206.
