Minutes of the meeting of April 3, 1900, read and approved.

The following communications were received and placed on file:

From the Department of Highways, dated March 30, 1900—Transmitting assessment lists for improvements, Borough of Manhattan.

From the Department of Sewers, dated April 2, 1900—Transmitting for apportionment assessment list for private sewer, Borough of Brooklyn.

From the Department of Highways, dated April 2, 1900—Retransmitting assessment lists for paving One Hundred and Sixty sixth street and One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street, Borough of Manhattan.

From the Department of Highways, dated April 5, 1900—Replying to the objections of John C. Shaw, attorney, to the assessment for paving One Hundred and Eighty-third street, from Amsterdam avenue to Broadway.

The assessment lists hereinafter named having been duly advertised and no objection received, were declared confirmed and ordered transmitted to the Comptroller for entry and collection:

Borough of Brooklyn.

Receiving-basins at the southwest corner of First avenue and Fifty-fifth street; northeast and southeast corners of First avenue and Fifty-sixth street, and northeast and southeast corners of First avenue and Fifty-seventh street.

Receiving-basins on the northeast corner of Nostrand avenue and Linden Boulevard; northeast corner of Avenue N and Flatbush avenue, and northeast and northwest corners of Clarkson

Flagging Decatur street at the southeast corner of Bushwick avenue.

Flagging north side of Fifty-second street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues; west side of Fifth avenue, between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets; south side of Fifty-first street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues, and east side of Fourth avenue, between Fifty-first and Fifty-second

Grading and paving Fifty-seventh street, from Second to Third avenue, with granite-block

Sewer in St. Nicholas avenue, between Hart street and Flushing avenue.

Sewer in West Ninth street, between Columbia and Hicks streets.

The assessment lists hereinafter named, for private sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, were duly apportioned, in accordance with section 560, chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, and ordered transmitted to the Commissioner of Sewers:

In the matter of the assessment for paving Third avenue, from the Twenty-third Ward line to Tremont avenue, the objections of T. H. Baldwin, Turner, McClure & Rolston and T. S. Bassford, attorneys, were overruled, the Corporation Counsel having given an opinion, under date of March 30, 1900, that the railroad companies occupying part of the street along the line of the work were not assessable for any part of the cost of the work, and the list was ordered transmitted to the Board of Revision of Assessments for confirmation.

In the matter of the assessment for paving Webster avenue from Kingsbridge road to Amsterdam avenue, Joseph I. Berry, attorney, was present and argued in support of the objections filed by him. He asked that the Board recommend to the Board of Revision of Assessments that a part of the cost of this improvement be placed upon the City, as suggested in the opinion of the Corporation Counsel. The objections of Mr. Berry, John P. Dunn and R. L. Luce, attorneys, were overruled and the list ordered transmitted to the Board of Revision of Assessments for confirmation. confirmation.

In the matter of the paving of One Hundred and Eighty-third street, from Amsterdam avenue to Broadway, the objections of John C. Shaw, attorney, were overruled, the report from the Department of Highways not sustaining said objections, and the list ordered transmitted to the Board of Revision of Assessments for confirmation.

The claims filed by Edgar Ketchum for damages caused by the change of grade of Ogden avenue, from Jerome avenue to Washington Bridge, were disallowed and the list ordered apportioned.

The claim filed by T.S. Bassford, attorney for William Ebling, for damages caused by the change of grade of Cauldwell avenue, from Boston road to Westchester avenue, was disallowed and the list ordered apportioned.
