## BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

New York, August 7, 1905.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at 2 o'clock p. m. at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer, Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Printed copies of the minutes of the meeting held July 31, 1905, were presented and adopted.

The Secretary presented the report of the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx and Brooklyn and Queens, and the following matters were considered:

In relation to the bids received at the meeting of the Armory Board, held July 31, 1905, for Item No. 2, alterations and repairs to the new Seventy-first Regiment armory, the lowest bidder, the Fleischmann Realty and Construction Company, being \$22,675, estimated cost \$9,817.50, the Committee recommended that all the bids be rejected, and the Acting Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the bids received at a meeting of the Armory Board held July 31, 1905, for Item No. 2, furnishing labor and material for making and completing alterations to the quarters of the First Signal Corps in the new Seventy-first Regiment armory, being largely in excess of the amount estimated, be rejected, and that the Secretary be directed to request the Comptroller to return to the unsuccessful bidders the deposit made with their bids.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer, Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Committee also reported in relation to the bids for Item No. 3, repairs and alterations to the Squadron "C" armory, lowest bidder John Kennedy & Son, \$45,800, estimated cost \$31,869.91. The Committee reported and recommended that as the estimated cost for such alterations by the architect and contractor was about \$30,000, and the lowest bid received exceeds \$45,000, a sum which the Committee believes to be greatly in excess of the proper cost of such work, that the bids be rejected and that the work on the armory, as originally planned, be continued to its completion, and the Acting Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the bids received at the meeting of the Armory Board held July 31, 1905, Item No. 3, furnishing all labor and material for making and completing the repairs and alterations to the armory for Squadron "C," N. G., N. Y., in the Borough of Brooklyn, being largely in excess of the amount estimated, be rejected, and that the Secretary be directed to request the Comptroller to return to the unsuccessful bidders the deposits made on their bids.

The Committee also reported in relation to the lighting fixtures and finishing the First Brigade headquarters in the new Seventy-first Regiment armory; the Committee recommended the following resolution:

Resolved, That the sum of \$18,375 be appropriated for lighting fixtures in the new Seventy-first Regiment armory for the three organizations quartered therein, including architects' fees, in accordance with the specifications prepared by Messrs. Clinton & Russell; that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur therein and authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds for the payment thereof, and that the Secretary be directed to advertise for bids and proposals for the same, which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer, Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

It was further

Resolved, That the sum of \$17,850 be appropriated for lockers for the three organizations quartered in the new Seventy-first Regiment armory, including architects' fees, in accordance with the specifications prepared by Messrs. Clinton and Russell; that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur therein and authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds for the payment thereof, and that the Secretary be directed to advertise for bids and proposals for the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer, Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

It was further

Resolved, That the sum of \$3,100 be appropriated for improvements and decoration to brigade headquarters and leaders from tower to main roof, in the new Seventy-first Regiment armory, including architects' fees, in accordance with the specifications prepared by Messrs. Clinton & Russell; that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur therein and authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds for the payment thereof, and that the Secretary be directed to advertise for bids and proposals for the same.

A communication was received from Captain David Wilson, commanding Second Battery, requesting the Board to appropriate a sufficient sum to erect a suitable building for an armory for that organization, which was referred to the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx.

A communication was received from Messrs. Lord & Hewlett, architects, of date June 21, 1905, suggesting certain changes in the wire glass for the roof of the main skylight of the armory of the Second Battalion Naval Militia, which was disapproved. Commander Foreshe of the Second Battalion Naval Militia, appeared before the Board relative to the communication above mentioned, and asked that the Board reconsider their action of the previous meeting, as there would be a saving of \$430 should the Board approve of the changes suggested in the communication. Upon reconsideration, the Board approved of the same.

A communication was received from Messrs. Lord & Hewlett, architects, for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, of date August 4, 1905, relative to the changing of certain windows in the west front of the Armory Building at an expense of \$950, which was referred to the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens.

A motion to adjourn was adopted.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
