Honored Sir—I have been informed that you are a member of the Railroad Committee and have resolutions Nos. 1627 and 1628 introduced by Alderman Gillen in your charge.

I have newspaper clippings collected during the past year which prove that 40 deaths have occurred through trolley "accidents," and I firmly believe that 500 men, women and especially children have been killed by the deadly trolley since electricity has been used as a motive power in Brooklyn. Eight (8)—5 children and 3 men have been killed since this resolution was introduced.

Every child that goes under the fender is now crushed to death. A guard around the wheels would prevent the killing of the child, but of course it might be injured; but it would stand a second chance after going under the fender, which it does not now stand.

I have two children who attend public school and who are compelled to cross the tracks four times each day, so that I am vitally interested in this matter.

The trolley people will object by saying the expense will be too great, but they do not care a damn for our children's lives. Report favorably on this matter and enact it into law and you will have the thanks and blessings of all the men and women in Brooklyn.

Dear Sir—I would respectfully ask your Honorable Board to authorize an appropriation of four thousand four hundred and ninety dollars (\$4,490), for salaries in this Department. The reasons for making this request are as follows:

The serious condition of affairs which might at any time arise on Hart's Island in the event of the occurrence of a fire on that island, has been the subject of a communication from the Fire Department of this City. In this communication (a copy of which is herewith inclosed) the importance of steamboat connection between Hart's and City Islands is strongly urged. I agree with the Fire Department that this step should be taken as soon as possible. The Department of Correction has a steam launch, the "Thomas F. Gilroy," which can be used for this service, if sufficient means can be obtained to pay the additional crew required for the boat. The men needed would be as follows:

1 Pilot at.....	\$1,200 00
1 Engineer at.....	1,000 00
1 Stoker at \$2 per day.....	730 00
1 Mate at.....	600 00
2 Deckhands at \$480 each.....	960 00

Total..... \$4,490 00

I beg to inclose herewith copy of a report from the Deputy Commissioner of Correction, Mr. George W. Meyer, Jr., to whom the matter was referred by me.

The launch "Gilroy" is now being thoroughly repaired, and if the Honorable the Board of Aldermen will grant this allowance for salaries, as above set forth, the boat can be assigned to this service at an early date, and the recommendation of the Fire Department can be carried out.

The request for the allowance for salaries, as above set forth, was made the subject of a communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 11, 1905. I am now informed that the request should have been addressed to the Board of Aldermen. As I regret the delay, and as I feel the imperative need for this boat service, may I not ask the consideration of the matter by your Board as soon as possible.

Sir—This office is in receipt, through the Bureau of Chief of Department, of a communication from the Foreman of Engine Company 70, reading as follows:

"New York, December 29, 1904.

"EDWARD F. CROKER, Chief of Department:

"Sir—I would respectfully recommend that the Department of Correction provide means of transportation between City Island and Hart's Island for members of this Company in case of fire. The only means of getting over at the present time is by row boat, and even that is not always available, for all boats from early fall to spring are stored away, making it next to impossible to procure one in case of need.

"In stormy weather it would be impossible to get over in a small boat, as it would be swamped before it was 50 feet from shore, such is the fierceness of some of the storms.

"I would also recommend that Special Building Signals, or other telegraph communication, be established on Hart's Island, thus bringing this Company in direct communication with same.

Dear Sir—In answer to your letter of the 9th inst., in which you referred to me a communication received from the Foreman of Engine Company 70, which had been transmitted through you through the office of the Commissioner of the Fire Department, I beg to state that the recommendation of said Foreman of Company 70 should be adopted by this Department as soon as possible. Communication with Hart's Island by means other than the open rowboats now used is greatly to be desired. The Department fortunately has a boat well adapted for this purpose, but in order to make use of this boat, the steam launch "Thomas F. Gilroy," it would be necessary to employ one Pilot, one Engineer, one Stoker, two Deckhands and one Mate.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the "Gilroy" be put in commission as soon as practicable, manned with a full crew, as above suggested.

I would add that Hart's Island has telephone connection, day and night, through the Telephone Central Office, Station "Gramercy," corner of Eighteenth street and Irving place.

Gentlemen—I have the honor to recommend that the salaries of—

(1) The Stenographer to the Police Commissioner be increased from thirteen hundred and fifty to fifteen hundred dollars per annum.

(2) The Stenographer to the Third Deputy Police Commissioner be increased from twelve hundred to fifteen hundred dollars per annum.

(3) John F. Burke, Stenographer (at present attached to the Police Commissioner's office), be increased from one thousand to fifteen hundred dollars per annum.

The three men now filling the above positions are competent and experienced, their duties are more taxing by fully fifty per cent. than most of the other employees of this Department. While they commence work at the customary hour, their duties rarely release them before seven o'clock, and they frequently work until very much later. The same hours obtain during all days of the week, including Saturday. These Stenographers are of equal skill, industry and ability; the work they do, in addition to being very voluminous, is highly important, as in the two offices to which they are attached the great bulk of the business of the Department other than such as is routine is transacted. In comparison with the salaries paid to other clerical members of the Department and the labor performed by them, these Stenographers would not be overpaid at fifteen hundred dollars per annum salary each. I earnestly trust, therefore, that this recommendation to increase their salaries will be acted upon favorably, as I feel that otherwise the best interests of the Department might suffer through these Stenographers securing better paying positions elsewhere.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—I respectfully request that the Board of Aldermen pass an ordinance for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds for the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars

(\$25,000), for the use of the Bureau of Buildings in the Borough of Brooklyn, as a supplemental appropriation to provide for the appointment of additional Clerks and Inspectors. The necessity for this request is shown by the tremendous increase in building operations in Brooklyn, which indicate that \$60,000,000 will be spent in this borough this year. The first three months of the year have always been the duller period for building. Operations seldom begin before the middle of March, and are not in full swing until April, and yet, despite this experience, the first quarter of the present year has witnessed a volume of building operations amounting to \$11,546,753 for new buildings, and \$908,289 for alterations. The total, \$12,679,190, shows an increase of nearly \$5,000,000 over the same period of last year, or, to be exact, \$4,913,809.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated the sum of \$157,725 for the Bureau of Buildings for the year 1905, although in the preliminary estimate submitted by the Superintendent of said Bureau, he urgently requested that the sum of \$170,750 be appropriated for said year.

This extraordinary increase of building operations in the borough has doubled the demands upon the working force, which was already taxed to its utmost, and created a condition which calls for immediate consideration. The extent of the labor and responsibility now devolving upon the Building Bureau is indicated by the following statement for the quarter ending March 31, 1905:

Number of new buildings and alterations for which permits were issued.....	3,518
Number of new buildings completed.....	743
Number of alterations completed.....	453
Violations reported by Inspectors.....	750
Notices issued for said period.....	967
Violations removed.....	590
Number of passenger elevators examined.....	1,098

Superintendent Collins' report for said period further shows that there are now in progress 7,189 new buildings, and that there are 2,808 alterations in progress. Ninety per cent. of the buildings erected in Brooklyn are dwelling and apartment houses of medium cost. The owners are in most cases unable to bear the expense of special expert service to protect them from the carelessness or cupidity of unscrupulous builders, and they rely, as they have a right to, upon the Inspectors from the Building Bureau to see to it that the Building Laws and Ordinances are complied with, that there is no deviation from the plans as approved, and no illegitimate and unsafe work or substitution and use of inferior materials permitted. No class of buildings calls for more constant or conscientious inspection than these apartment houses and dwellings.

To overcome the difficulties mentioned and enable the Superintendent of the Building Bureau to properly establish a system of inspection of new buildings and alterations, and to be prompt and efficient, I am constrained to respectfully but earnestly urge the Board of Aldermen to make a supplemental appropriation of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), as above requested. Unless this is done the work of the Bureau will be retarded and grave risk incurred of damage or disaster due to lack of thorough and frequent inspection of buildings while under construction, and it will be difficult to hold Inspectors to strict account for the work assigned to them in their districts.

I would thank you to lay this communication before the Board at its next meeting.

Gentlemen—Pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, you are respectfully petitioned to provide, by the issuance of Special Revenue Bonds, the sum of \$36,000, for the purpose of repairing, rebinding and labeling books of record in the offices of the Surrogate, Register and County Clerk of Kings County.

The statement prepared by the Commissioner of Records shows that there are 8,627 books of record in the Register's Office, of which 1,351 require rebinding, and 1,106 repairing. In the County Clerk's office there are 4,741 books of record, 1,585 of which are in such condition as to require rebinding and repairing. In the Surrogate's office there are 1,260 books of record, of which 930 require rebinding and repairing. Making a total of 4,972 books in the three county offices, requiring rebinding and repairing, the estimated cost of which is \$30,000.

In addition to this, there will be required for immediate use, 60,000 labels to be placed on 15,000 libers in the three county offices, these being necessary to adapt the books for the new metal cases. Under the old arrangement the books stood upright

and were labelled accordingly. Under the new plan they lie flat, and will be required to be placed in such a way that the books can be readily recognized by persons desiring to use them. The estimated cost for the labeling of these books is \$6,000.

It is of the highest importance that this work be done, and it is earnestly requested that provision be made for the same at the earliest practicable moment.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

On May 21, 1901, your predecessors, the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, approved a route and general plans, theretofore adopted by this Board, for the construction of a Rapid Transit Railway in the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn.

The route and general plans thus approved by the Municipal Assembly were further approved by the Mayor of The City of New York on June 1, 1901; Appellate Division in the First Department on January 30, 1902, and by the Appellate Division in the Second Department on January 17, 1902.

On July 21, 1902, a contract for the construction and operation of the said railway was duly entered into with Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, hereinafter referred to as the contractor. The work of building this railway is now proceeding, and a small part of it, in Manhattan, has been for some time in use by the public.

The general plan, as originally adopted, provided for only two tracks throughout the entire length of the route; but this Board is now of opinion that the plan should be modified in this regard and that provision should be made for four tracks along so much of the route as lies under Fulton street and Flatbush avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

A prolonged and careful study of the transportation problem in Brooklyn has satisfied this Board that any complete development of rapid transit systems in that borough will sooner or later require the use of Fulton street and Flatbush avenue as a connection between several diverging lines, and that the two subway tracks already authorized will be entirely inadequate to meet such demands upon them. The lines which are now contemplated and which would have to use the two streets in question include a line already authorized by your Honorable Body running under Flatbush and Ocean avenues and past the Willink entrance of Prospect Park, and also the following lines which are still under consideration by this Board, viz.:

1. A line under Fulton street, leaving the present line where the latter bends into Joralemon street opposite the County Court-house, and running from there towards the Brooklyn Bridge.
2. A line under the proposed extension of Flatbush avenue, running toward the Manhattan Bridge.
3. A line diverging from the present line in Flatbush avenue and running north-easterly along Lafayette avenue.
4. A line running from Flatbush avenue down Fourth avenue toward Fort Hamilton.

If the construction of the Rapid Transit Railway in Fulton street and Flatbush avenue had been already completed, it would be a most difficult and expensive undertaking to widen out the railway as proposed, so as to double its width. Among other things, it would require the complete reconstruction of all stations. Fortunately, construction has not yet been begun along this portion of the route; and it will be possible now to build a four-track road far more cheaply than if only two tracks were built at present and two more tracks were added later. Moreover, the unavoidable annoyances to abutting property-owners will be very little more in building four tracks than in building two, and they will not have to recur.

The Rapid Transit Act provides that where a contract for construction and operation has been entered into, modifications in it may be made by agreement between this Board and the contractor and his sureties; provided that if such modifications involve changes in the general plans of construction, then the consent of the municipal authorities and the abutting property-owners (or, if they do not consent, the Appellate Division) must also be obtained.

The present contractor is willing to undertake the construction of two additional tracks at this time as a part of its undertaking under the contract of July 21, 1902. There is no condition, express or implied, that this contractor shall be given any contract for future lines. The City will incur no possible obligation to the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company except the obligation to pay the price that may be agreed on for the extra work when the detailed plans shall have been prepared. In addition to laying two more main tracks on this part of the route, it is proposed also to build at the same time proper cross-overs at or near the four junctions above mentioned, which will be depressed so as to allow trains to run to and from the proposed new lines without grade crossings. This is considered essential.

It is also proposed to add a siding, or fifth track, under Flatbush avenue, in order to facilitate operation.

The general plans of construction of the railway provide that the walls of the tunnel shall not come within five feet of private property along the route, except at stations, curves, etc. The addition of the various tracks above described will not require any nearer approach than this to private property, except along the southerly side of Fulton street, between Bond street and Flatbush avenue, where it will be necessary to build close up to the house line.

In all other respects the route and general plans approved by the Municipal Assembly May 21, 1901, will remain unchanged.

This Board, by resolution adopted April 13, 1905, by a vote of seven members, has determined that the route and general plan be modified in the particulars in said resolution set forth. A certified copy of the said resolution, together with a copy of the route and general plan of 1902 and also the map therein mentioned, are transmitted herewith; and this Board respectfully requests your Honorable Body to consent to the said modifications.

If such modifications are to be made, they should be made at once. The work on Fulton street and Flatbush avenue has been held back until the work on the tunnel under the East river was well advanced. This tunnel work has now progressed so far that the contractor must very soon begin work on Fulton street and Flatbush avenue; and if four tracks and not two are to be built, and the cross-overs and connections for future extensions are to be provided, the detailed plans will have to be changed, the design and quantity of steel required will be entirely different, and in many ways the methods of doing the work will have to be modified.

Unless, therefore, prompt action is taken in regard to this matter, it will be useless to take any action.

This Board believes that the modifications now proposed in the route and general plan of construction as set forth in the resolutions of April 13, 1905, are greatly to the interest of the public and The City of New York; it therefore believes it desirable that the constitutional consents be given; and it urges that they be given without delay.

Resolutions of April 13, 1905.

Whereas, This Board did, on the 24th day of January, 1901, adopt certain Routes and General Plan for a rapid transit railroad in The City of New York, a copy of which is hereto annexed entitled "Copy Routes and General Plan adopted 24 January, 1905"; and

Whereas, The said Routes and General Plan were afterwards duly approved by the municipal authorities of The City of New York, and were duly consented to by Commissioners appointed by the Appellate Divisions of the Supreme Court both in the First and Second Departments, which consents were duly confirmed by the said Appellate Divisions, in lieu of the consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property along the said routes; and

Whereas, Thereafter, and on or about the 21st day of July, 1902, The City of New York did by this Board enter into a certain contract with Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company for the construction and operation of the said rapid transit railroad; and

Whereas, It is the interest of The City of New York, and, in the opinion of the said Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, it is likewise in its interest as such contractor, and the said Company desires that said Routes and Plan shall be changed in the respect hereinafter mentioned, but without other change in the said Routes and General Plan.

Now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as in this resolution hereinafter mentioned the said Routes and General Plan heretofore adopted by this Board be, and they hereby are, modified as follows:

1. By striking out from the said Routes and General Plan the words

"For the whole of the route above described, including each of the branches and loops aforesaid two parallel tracks."

2. By inserting in the said Routes and General Plan, instead of the words thus struck out, the following words, to wit:

"For the portion of the route above described beginning at a point in the Borough of Brooklyn in Joralemon street opposite the Kings County Court House near the junction of Joralemon street with Fulton street and running thence along Fulton street to the end of the said route at or near the intersection of Flatbush avenue with Atlantic avenue, there shall be four tracks substantially parallel and placed on substantially the same level, except at the following points where provision is to be made for connections with certain subways or tunnels which are expected to be hereafter constructed and which are expected to run as follows, that is to say: First northwesterly under Fulton street from its junction with Joralemon street, Second northwesterly from Flatbush avenue under the proposed extension of Flatbush avenue toward the Manhattan Bridge, Third northeasterly from Flatbush avenue under Lafayette avenue, and Fourth southerly from Flatbush avenue under Fourth avenue. At and near each of the said points, at which provision is now to be made for future connections, one or more additional tracks may be constructed as a part of the railway herein described, and any one or more of the tracks of said railway may be depressed below the remaining tracks as far as shall be found necessary in order to avoid grade crossings, but not exceeding twenty feet. Along the whole of that portion of the route above described which lies under Flatbush avenue there may be an additional or fifth track for use as a siding. And for the remainder of the route above described, being all of the said route lying westerly from the Kings County Court House both in the Borough of Brooklyn and in the Borough of Manhattan, and including each of the branches and loops aforesaid, there shall be two parallel tracks."

3. By inserting after the words

"No wall of the tunnel or part thereof shall"

the words

"except along the southerly side of Fulton street, between Bond street and Flatbush avenue, and"

so that the whole sentence shall read as follows, to wit:

"No wall of the tunnel or part thereof shall, except along the southerly side of Fulton street, between Bond street and Flatbush avenue, and except at the stations, station approaches, curves and places of access to subsurface structures as hereinafter provided, be within a distance of five (5) feet of the exterior line or side of a longitudinal street of the route."

And it is further

Resolved, That whereas this Board has duly made the inquiries and investigations necessary or proper in the premises, and has determined that the modifications aforesaid of the said routes and general plan is necessary for the interests of the public and of The City of New York and should be established as hereinafter provided, this Board does hereby determine and establish the said routes and general plan as hereby modified, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as hereinafter mentioned.

And it is further

Resolved, That the said modification of the routes and general plan shall take effect only upon and after the following consents thereto and approvals thereof shall be duly had, to wit:

1. The consent of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, contractor, and of its sureties, as follows: Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland, United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, The National Surety Company, the Aetna Indemnity Company, and Empire State Surety Company.

2. The consent of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York or of such other local authorities as may have the control of the portions of Joralemon street, Fulton street and Flatbush avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, above mentioned.

3. The consent of the Mayor of The City of New York.

4. The consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property along streets or such portions of streets as are included in the portion of routes by these resolutions proposed to be modified as aforesaid; or, if such consents cannot be obtained, then, in lieu thereof, the determination of three Commissioners to be appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in the Second Department, duly confirmed by the said Appellate Division.

And it is further

Resolved, That this Board hereby adopts the drawing now produced and entitled "Proposed Four Track Subway showing Two Track Connections with Extensions on Fourth Avenue, Lafayette Avenue, Fulton Street and Flatbush Avenue Extension," as showing in substance the modification hereby adopted.

Copy Routes and General Plan Adopted January 24, 1901.

The centre line of the route shall commence at a point in the Borough of Manhattan at or near the intersection of Broadway with Park row, being the point of commencement of the rapid transit railroad now under construction upon the routes adopted by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners of The City of New York, by resolutions of the 14th day of January and 4th day of February, 1897; and such centre line shall run thence under Broadway and Bowling Green to State street; thence under State street and Battery Park to Whitehall street, and thence under and across Whitehall street and South street to the East river; thence under the East river to the Borough of Brooklyn at a point in Joralemon street, between the East river and Furman street; thence under Joralemon street to Fulton street; thence under Fulton street to Flatbush avenue; thence under Flatbush avenue to a point at or near its intersection with Atlantic avenue. The route shall also include a branch or loop, the centre line of which shall begin at the point which shall be found most convenient in Broadway, between Bowling Green and Exchange place, and shall run thence under Broadway to Bowling Green, and thence under Bowling Green to State

street; thence under and across the line of State street to Battery Park; thence under Battery Park to Whitehall street; thence returning under Whitehall street, Battery Park and State street to Broadway.

The route shall also include suitable tracks and connections in the nature of loops under the City Hall Park and around the City Hall in the Borough of Brooklyn. Wherever the route passes from one street to another, or from the street to the river, or from the river to a street, the route may pass under private property so far as may be convenient for the purposes of the curve or grade of the railway.

The said general plan of construction hereby adopted is as follows:

For the whole of the route above described, including each of the branches and loops aforesaid, two parallel tracks placed on the same level except that, wherever required by special necessities of surface or subsurface structures, or other special or local necessities, or for the purpose of avoiding grade crossings, either track may be depressed below the other track to a depth of not more than fifty feet; but the limitation as to level of the two tracks shall not apply to the portions of the route under the East river. The tracks shall be standard gauge, that is to say, of a width of four feet eight and one-half inches between the rails.

The tracks may at any point of the route (or of the branches or loops therein included) be placed in the same tunnel; or there may be a separate tunnel for each track, as shall be most convenient; and there shall be a width in the tunnels for each track not exceeding fifteen feet, except that at stations, switches, turnouts, curves and cross-overs the width may be increased, provided, however, that the tracks shall be placed under the central part of the longitudinal street of the route, so far as may be practicable and convenient. No wall of the tunnel or part thereof, shall, except at the stations, station approaches, curves, and places of access to subsurface structures as hereinafter provided, be within a distance of five (5) feet of the exterior line or side of a longitudinal street of the route. The roof of the tunnel when under a street shall be as near the surface of the street as grades and street conditions will conveniently permit. The tunnel shall not be less than thirteen feet high in the clear. Wherever necessary to the proper support of a street surface the roof of the tunnel or tunnels shall be of iron or steel girders, with brick or concrete arches, supported by iron or steel columns and masonry walls, or the roof shall be a masonry arch, or the whole of the lining may be of iron. Adjacent tracks shall be connected by necessary and suitable switches and connections and an additional track for siding accommodations may be constructed not to exceed in length one-quarter of a mile for each mile of roadway; and wherever along any part of the route it shall be necessary for the proper maintenance or accommodation of pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures, the width of the tunnel may be enlarged on either or both sides by an additional width not to exceed fifteen feet, provided always that the limits hereinafter provided as to longitudinal streets of the route shall be observed. All or any pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures may be placed in suitable galleries to be constructed within the additional width hereinafter permitted. At each cross street where accommodation for pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures shall be those provided within the tunnel, the tunnel may, in order to provide convenient access to the same, have within the limit of the sides or exterior lines of such cross streets or such lines produced, an additional width on each side of the route not to exceed fifteen feet, provided always that the limits hereinafter provided as to longitudinal streets of the route shall be observed. Pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures shall, at any part of the said route, be removed and disturbed only when necessary for the construction and operation of the tunnel, and if removed or disturbed shall be placed under the streets in such manner and in such location that the use and service thereof shall not be permanently impaired. Such pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures shall be left or shall be so arranged as to give free access for their repair or alteration and for the placing with them, so far as there may be space, of new pipes, wires, sewers, and other like structures, and for making connections between the same and abutting buildings at any time. Stations and station approaches shall, so far as practicable, be at the intersection of streets, and shall be built under streets or through private property to be acquired for the purpose, or both under streets and through private property as aforesaid. The streets under which stations or station approaches shall be built may include cross streets; but no part of any cross streets shall be used for a station or station approach at a distance greater than seventy-five feet from the exterior line or side of the street of the route. The word "street," wherever used herein, shall include an avenue, park, or public place.

The general mode of operation shall be by electricity or some other power not requiring combustion within the tunnels, and the motors shall be capable of moving trains at a speed of not less than forty miles per hour, exclusive of stops. The manner of construction shall be by tunneling or open excavation.

Report of Committee on Bridges and Tunnels—

No. 804.

The Committee on Bridges and Tunnels, to whom was referred on June 28, 1905 (Minutes, page 1039), the annexed communication from the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners of The City of New York, transmitting certificate to the New York Connecting Railroad Company, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they offer the following:

Reasons why the proposed franchise of the New York Connecting Railroad should be returned to the Rapid Transit Commissioners for amendment.

The proposed franchise contemplates an elevated railroad 200 feet wide, extending from the Borough of Brooklyn, through the Borough of Queens, across Ward's and Randall's Islands to the Borough of The Bronx, to be used mainly for transferring freight. It provides that either steam or electricity be used for motive power, and it was admitted by the Vice-President of the railroad company, Mr. Samuel Rae, at the public hearing, that steam power was to be used, as the cost of equipping the road with electric motors would be prohibitive. It also provides that if the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners find that the use of steam power "shall constitute a nuisance or be dangerous to the residents along the route or materially depreciate the value of property," that the said Board may demand that electricity be substituted as motive power.

As the reasons for demanding the change of motive power depend entirely upon questions of fact, the company has the power to deny the existence of the fact or facts, and refuse the demand of the City. The City would then be compelled to go to the Supreme Court, establish the question of fact, and obtain an order from the Court to enforce its demand. After the Court has sustained the demand of the City and granted the necessary order, the company would have, by the terms of the proposed franchise, three years in which to make the change of motive power. It should be the policy of the City in making the terms and conditions with corporations seeking franchises to prevent, not seek or invite, costly litigation. The Boroughs of The Bronx and Queens are rapidly growing sections of the City, and unquestionably an elevated freight bearing structure with steam engines belching smoke, dust, cinders and obnoxious gases, would be at the very commencement of its operation a nuisance dangerous to health and materially depreciate the value of property along the route. The City should therefore insist in all railroad franchises that electricity be the only motive power used. The claim of the Vice-President, that the cost of electric power would be prohibitive, clearly establishes the fact that the company would resist the demand of the City and compel the City to go to the Supreme Court to enforce its demand.

The argument against installing an electric system because of its cost is not sincere, because it would be far cheaper for the company to install an electric system at the outset of its operations than to furnish and maintain a steam-power system and be compelled, after a very few years, to go to the additional expense of installing an electric system.

Chapter 7 of the proposed franchise provides that the City shall have the right, "but only if and when the public necessity requires to open across the route of the railroad company any new streets other than the five last mentioned," and stipulates "that if the railroad company shall deny that the public necessity does in fact exist," then the City must go to the Supreme Court and establish before it a case of the fact of the existence of the public necessity before the railroad company could be compelled to give the City the required right of way. This again would involve the City in constant litigation, which could be avoided by giving the City the privilege, as it has

to-day the unquestioned right under the Charter, to open and establish streets wherever and whenever the City determines a public necessity exists, providing it does not interfere with the proper operation of the franchise. It is but fair and just to the railroad company that if the section of the franchise is altered to give the City the right to open streets across its routes, the next succeeding clause should be changed so that the cost of regulating, grading and paving all streets, which shall be opened across the route of the railroad, shall be borne by the City and not by the railroad company. In the franchise granted by the City to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, the following clause was considered just and proper and made a condition of the franchise: "The City shall have the right to use the tunnel of the railroad for police and fire telegraph and telephone wires, to such an extent as is not inconsistent with the purposes of this franchise." As the proposed franchise is practically a part, in fact an extension of the Pennsylvania Railroad franchise, a clause permitting the City to use the proposed structure for the same purposes, and the privilege for such use, if required by the City, should be a factor in determining the rental value of the grant.

It is therefore recommended that the proposed franchise of the New York Connecting Railroad be returned to the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners and they be requested to insert:

First—That the use of electricity as a motive power be made an imperative condition of the franchise.

Second—That the City shall have the right at any time it determines that a public necessity does exist, to open streets across the route of the railroad.

Third—That the City and not the railroad company should bear the cost of such street opening.

Fourth—That the City shall have the right to place police and fire telegraph and telephone wires along the railroad structure.

Fifth—That inasmuch as it is provided to permit the said New York Connecting Railroad to conduct a local traffic business for the carrying of passengers within the limits of the Greater City of New York, we request that the rate of fare for one continuous ride within the limits of the Greater City be fixed at five cents.

They therefore recommend that the said certificate be returned to the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for amendment.

AN ORDINANCE granting to the Star Telephone Company the right or franchise to lay, erect and construct in, upon and along the streets and highways and public places in The City of New York, wires or other conductors, etc., for the purpose of carrying on a general telephone and telegraph business.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the Star Telephone Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise, right and privilege to lay, erect, construct and maintain suitable wires or other conductors, with the necessary poles, fixtures and appliances in or over, across and under the streets, avenues, highways, parks and public places within the territory comprised in the Borough of Manhattan, the Borough of The Bronx, the Borough of Brooklyn, the Borough of Queens and the Borough of Richmond, and each of them as now constructed (or within the limits of The City of New York), for the following objects or purposes, to wit: For conducting and distributing electricity in the operating of the telephone and telegraph lines and business within the territory bounded as aforesaid.

Sec. 2. The grant of this franchise is subject to the following terms and conditions:

First—The right, privilege and franchise herein granted shall be held and enjoyed by said Star Telephone Company, its lessees, successors or assigns, for a term of twenty-five years from the date when this ordinance is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said grant or franchise for a further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise. Such valuation shall be made in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Star Telephone Company, its successors or assigns; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers, and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigation without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the Star Telephone Company. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties.

Second—Payment for this franchise shall be made to The City of New York by the Star Telephone Company, its successors or assigns, in the manner following: It shall pay to the said City of New York, each year, a sum equal to five per centum upon the gross sum received by the said Star Telephone Company during said year for telephone and telegraph service rendered to its commercial or domestic customers or subscribers within the territory bounded as aforesaid, and the Star Telephone Company shall furnish and install in the various municipal offices for the use of City employees free telephones to a number not to exceed five hundred telephones; that the telephone service of such telephones shall be free. The aforementioned sum shall be paid into the Treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year; provided however, that the first payment shall only be made for that portion of the above sum, as the time from the signing of this ordinance by the Mayor to September 30 next preceding shall bear to the whole of one year. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment.

Third—The said Star Telephone Company, its successors or assigns, shall maintain the business for which it was incorporated, and construct, maintain and operate its wires, conductors, poles, fixtures and appliances in, on, over, across and under the streets, avenues, public parks and places within the territory above described, under the supervision and control of all of the authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of said City, and shall in all respects comply with and observe the provisions of the Charter of The City of New York and the laws of the State of New York applicable to telephone or telegraph companies in said City.

Fourth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this grant may be forfeited and avoided by The City of New York by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel of said City at the request of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Sec. 3. This grant shall not become operative until said Star Telephone Company shall duly execute under its corporate seal an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and maintained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within ten days after the adoption of this ordinance.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
